Harris County MUD 341 Minutes

Please find an excerpt from the HARRIS COUNTY MUNICIPAL UTILITY DISTRICT NO. 341 Minutes of Meeting of Board of Directors August 9, 2004 (the following information was taken from page 5 of the minutes and we thought the LOE residents might be interested)

ANNEXATION REQUEST RECEIVED FROM STOREGUARD INVESTMENTS, LLC.

The Board next considered the status of the annexation request received from Storeguard Investments, L.L.C. ("Storeguard") for an approximate 9.6 acre tract of land along Tanner Road into the District's boundaries. In connection therewith, Mr. Cohen advised the Board that he met with representatives of the Lakes on Eldridge Homeowner's Association ("HOA") to discuss the imposition of certain restrictions by the HOA on the proposed development pursuant to the terms of an annexation agreement with Storeguard. Mr. Cohen then advised the Board that he spoke with a representative of Storeguard who advised him that the cost of pursuing the proposed annexation appears to be too high for Storeguard to pursue, and in light of the foregoing, advised that Storeguard will not be moving forward with the proposed annexation. Mr. Cohen advised that he will keep the Board apprised of any new developments regarding the matter.

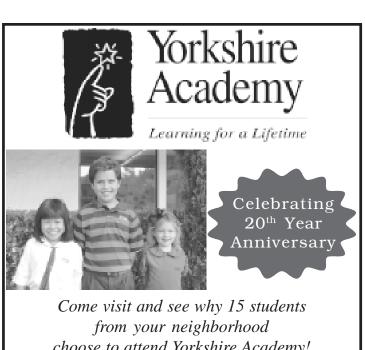
October 28th - Founding Mothers: The Women Who Raised our Nation by Linda Cokie Roberts. While the "fathers" were off founding the country, what were the women doing? This will be the story of some of those women, as learned through their seldom seen letters and diaries, and the letters from the men to them. Founding Mothers is essentially a series of entertaining mini-biographies and engaging vignettes. Roberts fleshes out familiar textbook figures like

Abigail Adams or Dolley Madison, and rescues more obscure women from the footnotes of academic dissertations. If you don't have time to read the entire book, pick a few of the biographies and we'll share the discussion.

November 18th (a week earlier because of Thanksgiving) – The Sins of the Wolf by Anne Perry Private investigator William Monk's trusted accomplice, Nurse Hester Latterly, is on trial for her life. 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Need To Post A Sign??

Every now and then you need to get information to the community in a quick manner. You type up your sign and tape it to the gates. It

usually rolls or folds back because it is not very secure. Then when you are done, more than likely, there is tape residue left on the gate. Not a very pretty sight.

So here is a somewhat better solution. There will be black magnetic clips, and small poster board donated at the guardhouse. Type up your sign as usual, drop by the guardhouse, tape your sign to the poster board, and pick up 4 clips for each sign that needs to be posted. Use the clips at each corner of your sign and magnetically adhere to the gates. It's less messy, looks prettier and gives us a uniform style of posting information. 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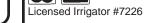
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EGGSHELL GHOST

- 1. Wash out and let dry over night, eggshells from 3-4 eggs
- 2. On a piece of poster board, draw a simple ghost outline about an 8½" by 11" size
- 3. Cut out the ghost and punch a hole at the top
- 4. Draw and color two eyes (and mouth if wanted)
- 5. Put the eggshells in a ziplock baggie and have the kids roll a canned good can back and forth over the eggs until they are crushed into an even texture
- Spread glue over the ghost in sections and let your little one sprinkle the crushed egg all over the glue. Sprinkle until finished and let your ghost dry.
- 7. Tie a piece of yarn through the punched hole to hang for decoration

Some of the eggshells do fall off, so you may need to find a suitable location for hanging your ghosts.

Creepy Crawly Gelatin

1 ½ cups boiling water
1 pkg (8-serving size) JELL-O
Orange flavor gelatin
1 ½ cups cold water
Gummy worms

Stir boiling water into gelatin in large bowl at least 2 minutes until completely dissolved. Stir in cold water. Pour into 9-inch pie plate which has been sprayed with no stick cooking spray.

Refrigerate about 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hours or until thickened. Push gummy worms into gelatin. Refrigerate 2 hours or until firm. Unmold. Garnish with

additional gummy worms, if desired.

Note: To unmold, dip pie plate in warm water for about 15 seconds. Gently pull gelatin from edge with moist fingers. Place moistened serving plate on top of pie plate. Invert pie plate and serving plate; holding plates together, shake slightly to loosen.

Candy Corn Popcorn Balls

 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) butter
 1 package (10 ½ oz) miniature Marshmallows
 1 package (4-serving size) JELL-O Gelatin dessert, any flavor

12 cups popped popcorn I cup candy corn

Microwave butter and marshmallows in large microwavable bowl on HIGH 1 ½ to 2 minutes or until marshmallows are puffed. Stir in gelatin until well mixed.

Pour marshmallow mixture over popcorn and candy corn in large bowl. Mix lightly until well coated. Shape into 15 balls or other shapes with greased or wet hands. Wrap each ball in plastic wrap and tie with raffia or ribbon if desired.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS

Careful thought and planning may go into a child's Halloween costume, but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful on the streets.

Both children and adults need to give real attention to safety on this annual day of make-believe. And with a little extra thought and planning, we can make sure that all children have fun and safe outings on Halloween.

MOTORISTS

The National Safety Council urges motorists to be especially alert on Halloween and offers the following driving tips:

- Watch for children darting out from between parked cars.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.
- If you are driving children, be sure they exit on the curb side, away from traffic.
- Do not wear your mask while driving.
- At twilight or later in the evening, watch for children in dark clothing.

BEFORE THEY GO OUT

Before children start out on their "trick or treat" rounds, parents should make sure that:

- An adult will be supervising the outing for children under age 12.
- Children travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.
- Children know to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well-lit and never to enter a stranger's home.
- Each child has change for a phone call in case they have a problem.
- A return time has been established.
- Youngsters understand not to eat any treat until you have inspected it.
- Plan and discuss the route trick-or-treaters intend to follow. Know the names of older children's companions.
- Review all appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules with the children.

COSTUME DESIGN

- Only fire-retardant materials should be used for costumes.
- Costumes should be loose, so warm clothes can be worn underneath.
- Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries on Halloween.)
- · Outfits should be made with light-colored materials. Strips of

reflective tape should be used to make children even more visible.

• For youngsters under the age of 12, attach their names, addresses and telephone numbers (including their area code) to their clothes where it will be easily visible.

FACE DESIGN

- Masks can obstruct a child's vision. Facial make-up is safer and more colorful.
- When buying special Halloween makeup, check for packages containing ingredients that are labeled "Made with U.S. Approved Color Additives," "Laboratory Tested," "Meets Federal Standards for Cosmetics," or "Non-Toxic." Follow manufacturer's instruction for application.
- If masks are worn, they should have nose and mouth openings and large eye holes.

ACCESSORIES

- Knives, swords and other accessories should be made from cardboard or flexible materials. Do not allow children to carry sharp objects.
- Bags or sacks carried by youngsters should be light-colored or trimmed with retro-reflective tape if trick-or-treaters are allowed out after dark.
- Carrying flashlights will help children see better and be seen more clearly.

ON THE WAY

Children should understand and follow these rules:

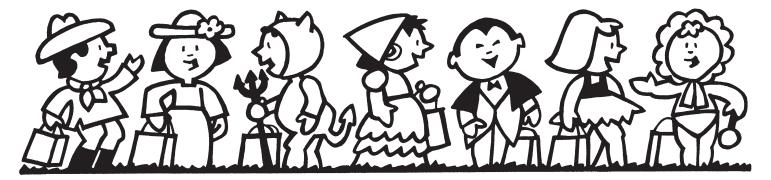
- Do not enter homes or apartments without adult supervision.
- Walk from house to house. Do not run. Do not cross yards and lawns where unseen objects or the uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.
- Walk on sidewalks, not in the street.
- Walk on the left side of the road, facing traffic, if there are no sidewalks.

TREATS

To ensure a safe and enjoyable trick-or-treat outing for children, parents are urged to:

- Give children an early meal before going out.
- Insist that treats be brought home for inspection before anything is eaten.
- Wash fruit, and slice it into small pieces.
- Report to the police anything that appears suspicious about treats.
- When in doubt, throw it out.

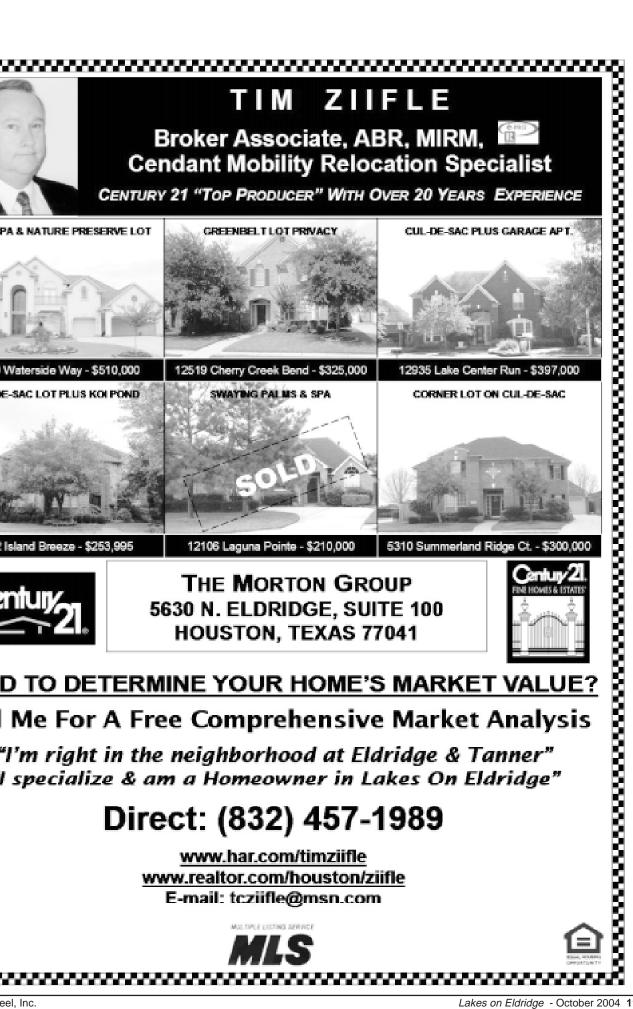
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Before You Get Lasik, Know The Basics

Baylor College of Medicine

Considering LASIK surgery? Well-informed patients are more satisfied with results, say experts at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in Houston.

"When patients understand the benefits and risks, they have realistic expectations about the procedure's outcome," says Dr. Douglas Koch, professor of ophthalmology at BCM. "Having expectations that are realistic for a particular case is most important to a patient's ultimate satisfaction."

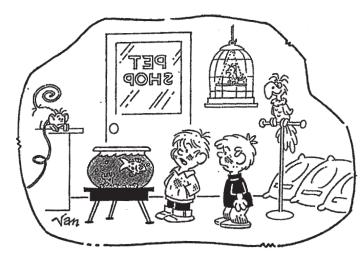
LASIK, an acronym for laser in situ keratomileusis, uses a laser to reshape the cornea, and can be an effective treatment of farsightedness, nearsightedness, and astigmatism. However, prior to receiving LASIK, Koch encourages patients to develop a trusting relationship with their surgeon.

"The decision regarding a surgeon is a very personal one, and ultimately, patients need to decide for themselves how comfortable they are with any answers they receive from their surgeons," he said.

Koch encourages patients to ask doctors the following questions when considering LASIK surgery:

- How many LASIK procedures have you performed?
- · What are the outcomes you are achieving?
- Who shall I contact with questions regarding healing?
- Do you provide a list of patients I can contact?

"When a patient leaves a doctor's office, he or she should have a better understanding of the status of their vision, how it is likely to change over time, and their options for managing their vision correction."

Harvest Colors

- 1 8-inch ceramic bowl
- 3 oranges and/or miniature pumpkins (white or orange)
- 8 stems white freesia
- 5 stems orange miniature spray roses
- 4 stems yellow stock
- 5 stems hypericum berries
- 1 large stem green hydrangeas
- 3 wood picks
- 2 to 3 bricks floral foam Floral preservative Knife
 - Floral clippers
- 1. Soak the floral foam in water that has been treated with floral preservative for at least 30 minutes.
- 2. Cut the foam to fit the interior of the container. With the knife, shape the foam so it is domed-the center should be higher than the sides.
- 3. Insert one wood pick (or cut shish kabob skewers into 3-inch lengths) into each orange or miniature pumpkin. Insert them into the floral foam, scattering them evenly.
- 4. Begin inserting flowers around each orange or pumpkin. All flowers are cut short to approximately 4 to 5 inches in length. Think of the arrangement in pieces, each piece is built around each orange or pumpkin.

Note: Cut the leggy tops off the stock and just use their meaty full blossoms. Use sprigs cut from the one hydrangea blossom throughout the arrangement.

Risk Of Concussions In Contact Sports Is Low

If your teenagers are itching to join the soccer team, sign them up — the benefits outweigh the risks.

"With contact sports, there is always a chance for injury, including concussions," said Dr. Albert C. Hergenroeder, a professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "This risk should not be a reason to keep adolescents out of any contact sport including football, soccer or baseball, unless they have had several concussions associated with loss of consciousness or persistent symptoms."

A concussion is a traumatically induced alteration of mental status, not necessarily associated with loss of consciousness. Symptoms can include headache, dizziness, nausea, fatigue and memory problems.

A mild concussion is characterized by confusion only, without amnesia, and loss of consciousness. If amnesia occurs, or if the confusion lasts more than 15 minutes, it is considered a moderate concussion. If any loss of consciousness occurs, even for a few seconds, the concussion is severe, says Hergenroeder, also a sports medicine specialist at Texas Children's Hospital.

Sports Physicals Important Preseason Activity

Just because a student athlete appears to be healthy doesn't mean they shouldn't have a thorough physical before the season starts.

"Some of the things we see a lot of, even in children, are high blood pressure which can severely stress the heart, which can lead to a sudden death," said Dr. Kaare Kolstad, assistant professor in the department of orthopedic surgery at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

A physical is especially important for those athletes who have a family history of heart disease or other life-threatening illness, especially anybody with a family member who has died at a very early age. They definitely have a higher potential of having a catastrophic event, even as a high school student, said Kolstad.

Having a physical early gives physicians time to treat any problems before the season begins.

Stationary Bike Alternative To High Impact Workout

You can burn a lot of calories by doing aerobics, running, or walking. But how hard do you have to ride a stationary bike to get the same results?

"You vary the resistance and the speed and this allows you to burn calories. Some of the fancier models have heart monitors so you can monitor you pulse so you can see how hard you're working from a cardiovascular standpoint," said Dr. James Bocell, assistant professor in the department of orthopedic surgery at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Aerobics, walking and running can burn calories, but they can also be tough on the joints. A stationary bike might be easier, especially for someone with arthritis in the knee.

With arthritis, if you put a lot of load across the knee, sometimes you'll get pain, sometimes you'll get swelling and you can decrease that by decreasing the load, and that's easy to do with a stationary bike, said Bocell.

The position of the seat is also important for people with knee problems. If you want to straighten the knee, move the seat back as far as you can. If you have trouble bending the knee, move it as close as you can.

Is Your Child At Risk For Heart Disease?

Could your 10-year-old be one of the 8 to 9 million overweight children in the United States at risk for adult heart disease?

Pediatricians at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in Houston say that overweight kids are more likely to be overweight adults with risk factors associated with heart disease.

"Over half of kids who are overweight, or at risk for being overweight, will have an identifiable risk factor for adult heart disease, including hypertension, or high blood pressure, hypercholesterolemia, lower high density lipoproteins (HDL), higher low density lipoproteins (LDL), and/or type 2 diabetes," says Dr. Louis Bezold, assistant professor of pediatric cardiology at BCM.

Obesity causes the heart to work harder to pump blood throughout the body. Risk factors from being obese or overweight can lead to adult heart disease such as atherosclerosis, or hardening of the arteries and ischemia or insufficient blood flow to the heart, which causes heart attacks.

"The bottom line is that kids in elementary school and all the way through high school are not getting enough physical activity," says Bezold, also director of preventive

cardiology at Texas Children's Hospital. "The benefits of exercise are twofold. It keeps weight down and also may improve lipid profiles, including increasing HDL or good cholesterol."

Parents can help their kids lower cholesterol by establishing healthy eating habits and implementing regular physical activity early, says Bezold.

Weight loss is difficult to maintain. Some studies would suggest that many kids who lose weight will eventually gain the weight back, so it is most important to keep children from becoming overweight.

At least 15 percent of kids from the ages of 6 to 19 are classified as overweight, meaning they have a Body Mass Index (BMI) in the 95th percentile or above. BMI is a measure of body fat based on height and weight. Another 15 percent in their age range are at risk for obesity, meaning they are in the 85th percentile or above.

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
