Humble Area Assistance Ministries

The holidays are coming and unfortunately not everyone is looking forward to them. Humble Area Assistance Ministries (HAAM) sees over 100 people a day needing help with things that most of us just take for granted. HAAM feeds over 3,000 people per month. These are your neighbor as HAAM just serves the greater Humble area.

With the holidays coming HAAM needsabout 50 tons of food and several thousand toys to address the needs of these families. HAAM documents that each family lives in our service area, is low income and that the children receiving the gift reside in the home.

Every year the process of gathering enough food for Thanksgiving and Christmas baskets and toys for over 2,000 children gets more difficult. It would not be possible without the help of generous people and businesses in the area. For those of you unfamiliar with HAAM, it is a 501 (C) 3 charitable, interfaith community coalition which was founded in 1989 to help families in crisis. HAAM gives over \$800,000 worth of social service to our community annually. All services are provided free of charge. We have over 1400 volunteers who donate their time to make all this possible.





Christmas And Pets

For the last several Christmas eves I have worked in an Animal Emergency Clinic. Every year a number of pets are seen that have preventable problems. Below are some of the more common problems that I have observed during holiday seasons.

A family goes shopping or to church, and when they return a box of chocolate left on a coffee table has been completely eaten by the family dog. A single Hershey Kiss would not be dangerous to a pet, but any significant quantity of chocolate eaten by a dog can be dangerous.

Both cats and dogs like to chew on Christmas tree ornaments. I have seen dogs that have chewed up the hollow bulbs that hang from trees and cutting their mouths. Cats will chew on paper and plants, swallowing foreign material causing digestive upset. Some house plants are quite toxic to pets.

As cold weather sets in people often change their car's radiator fluid. The antifreeze in radiator fluid is extremely dangerous to pet. When exposed to this sweetish tasting fluid they are in serious danger and need to be treated immediately. These pets are in imminent danger of going into complete kidney failure.

Often during family holiday meals there are a lot of leftovers, and pets are fed high fat foods, spicy foods, or other foods which may cause severe digestive problems. In an effort to be kind to the pet the family makes their pet sick!

Young puppies and cats like to chew on electrical cords. Watch that the pets don't get a hold of the Christmas tree lights! These may be quite attractive to the pet, and may lead to electrocution.

Another safety issue that occurs any time during the year is pets getting into medication. I have seen pets that have gotten into the owner's Valium, heart medications, chewable pet medications, and other drugs and medications. So be sure that you protect your pet from medications just as you would protect a child from accidental drug ingestion.

So remember, it is better to prevent problems than to have a Holiday emergency with your pet.

Prepare Your Child For The Holidays

As the holiday season approaches, the kids are excited about vacations, gifts, and playing with friends- things children should concern themselves about. As parents, grandparents, guardians, and caring friends, we should know there are other things to prepare for.

We make sure that are children are dressed for the weather, wear their helmets and knee pads, and eat a healthy diet- but we also have to prepare our children for other realities.

Does your child know what to do if a stranger asks them for help? Does your child know how to reach you in the event of an emergency? Does your child know your full name? Do you have a recent color photo of your child? Do you know all the medications they may be taking? Do you know your child's friends?

We live in a time where these are just the basics. We can prepare ourselves and our children for the dangers that can be just outside our doors. With just a few basic rules, for both you and your children can better prepare you for an emergency situation.

- 1. Teach your children that the police are their friends and that they can rely on them if they are in trouble.
- 2. Set-up a password. A secret word only between you and your child. In the event someone else has to pick them up-your child knows only to go with them if they have the password.
- 3. Teach your children that strangers should not ask a child for assistance. Adults should ask adults for help.
- 4. Always accompany your child on door-to-door activities.
- 5. Know you neighbors and neighborhood. Regularly check for registered offenders in your area.
- 6. Rethink the signs on your lawns and vehicles that give strangers too much information. (Their name, team name, team number, sport, school, address, and vehicle information all in a glance.)
- 7. You should not put your child's name on their clothes where it is visible. Children feel more comfortable around others that already know their name.
- 8. Teach your children that no one should ever touch any part of their body that a bathing suit would cover.
- Never leave your child alone in a public place, stroller, or car for even a minute.
- 10. Always accompany your child to the restroom in public places.

These are just a few of the basics. Too often we hear terrible stories that break our hearts. We need to start preparing our children for some of the realities that are just outside our doors. We also need to prepare them from some invaders in our homes, namely the Internet. Know where your children are going. Put a computer in a place that you as an adult can easily see where they are and what information they are giving out. Use the tools that are out there that filter out the garbage you don't want your children to see.
