Austin Mayor and County Commissioner to Attend CCHOA Annual Meeting Submitted by Ed Scruggs, CCHOA Secretary/Treasurer

Brief speeches by Mayor Will Wynn and Travis County Commissioner Gerald Daugherty will highlight this year's annual meeting of the **Circle C Homeowner's Association. The meeting, set for 6:30 PM on Wednesday, March 23 at Kiker Elementary**, will also feature the election of new board members and proposed changes to the association's by-laws. All current members of the association are welcome.

For those of you new to Circle C, the annual meeting is an opportunity for the community to come together and have input on the association's future. As our neighborhood continues to grow, it's also chance to meet a good cross section of folks. Some of whom have lived here for years, others for just a few months.

It is an honor for the association to host both Mayor Wynn and Commissioner Daugherty. Over the years, both have expressed a good deal of interest in issues of concern to Circle C residents. It is an illustration of our significance that both men have agreed to speak briefly at the same meeting.

A main feature of any annual meeting is the election of new members of the Board of Directors. This year, candidates running for two open director positions will have the chance to briefly speak to the issues. Following these speeches, all members in good standing will have the opportunity to vote for new directors, as well as decide the fate of proposed changes to association by-laws.

During the meeting, current members of the board will also review the events of the past year, as well as set the course for the future. Financial and Development updates will be featured – along with an address by the CCHOA President Quentin Fennessy.

Dear Neighbors-

Folks, we really need volunteers to assist with the Proposition 2 land adjacent to Circle C. Please read the article from AE Martin on page 7 and volunteer if you can. The Prop 2 lands should become a beautiful addition to our part of Austin, but to succeed we need your help

ABC TV recently completed filming a television show within Circle C Ranch. The show will be aired in the spring – and it will be called House Quest. Look for *your neighborhood*, coming soon to a TV screen (or TIVO screen) near you! The producers of the show have donated several trees to CCHOA. Two of them have been planted at the Mopac/Lacrosse entrance to Wildflower Place.

The report is a combination of review of 2004 expenses and activities as well as some predictions for 2005, including our budget. Please contact the CCHOA office at 288-8663 or <u>info@circlecranch.info</u> if you need a hard copy (it is 24 pages long.)

We maintain insurance for CCHOA – including general liability. Unfortunately the costs for our coverage have again increased by approximately 32%. We paid approximately \$28,000 for GL in 2004. The new rate is approximately \$37,000. Our insurance brokers received 3 quotes for the policy and this was the best rate they found. The rate increases are attributed to the fact that HOAs are frequent targets of lawsuits. AE Martin and Denise Nordstrom are actively working on reducing insurance costs for CCHOA. Perhaps I can report better news later in the year.

We continue to negotiate with UT and Longhorn Aquatics over the rental of the Circle C Swim Center. The UT/LA 2004 contract has been extended through the end of February to allow for the ongoing negotiations. We are committed to providing fair and equitable usage and investment in our pool. The state of the negotiation as I write is that the most recent contract version has been presented to management at UT for review. This process is lengthier than we initially expected. I believe we will reach an agreement –and a *good* agreement that is the result of hard work by the Pool Committee, Denise Nordstrom, Mary Goehring and Ed Scruggs. The new contract should be effective March 1, 2005 or soon after.

Circle C Landscape Update

Hopefully, by the time this arrives at your door, we will have all forgotten the miserable cloudy, cold and wet weather that was the norm for late January and early February. Spring is upon us and we expect the sun to be shining!!

Normal activities for this time of year on the commons areas:

- 1) Finalization of all trimming, pruning, clean up and mulching on the beds
- 2) Pre-emergent weed treatment done in early February
- 3) Late March-April will bring our first fertilization
- 4) Annual flower planting
- 5) Beginning of the mowing season

In addition, the following improvements, approved by the CCHOA Board of Directors that have been completed are:

- 1) Extension of permanent irrigation to Circle C North.
- 2) Tree planting in the front area of Wildflower Park
- 3) Tree planting on South Bay
- 4) Bed installation of native drought resistant plantings in several areas

1 Upcoming improvements:

1) Removal of dead photinia and replacement with drought tolerant shrubs on Escarpment and Barstow

We are looking forward to a great growing season. Last year, we planted a number "Knock Out" Roses. These were the 2004 Superstar Plant of the Year recommended by Texas A & M Horticulture. They are a frequent bloomer that requires very little care, are fungus resistant and very hardy. We will be participating as a certified test area for Texas A & M for this plant, and keeping records on its growth and habits over the next few years. From what we saw last year, we highly recommend this shrub rose that works like a perennial. You can access other plants that are great for our area at www.texassuperstar.com.

A word about your St. Augustine lawn: if you have St. Augustine grass, which most of us do, try to hold off on your spring fertilization until mid-April, get a soil test, and use the least amount of nitrogen. Over utilization of nitrogen causes brown patch, one of the major diseases of St. Augustine grass.

According to Phoenix CEO Steve Bartlett, the process of clarifying the status of available lands is almost complete. Currently, it appears the land planned for a second swim center will not be taken by the government as part of the Gary Bradley bankruptcy case. This seven acre site, to be located next to the new elementary school in Circle C West, is a heavily wooded tract of land approximately twice the size of the existing swim complex. Aside from a new pool and related amenities, it may be possible for a community center / club-house to be located here.

Slaughter Creek Water Quality Protection Land Update

Docent training is planned in March for the Slaughter Creek Water Quality Protection Land public access program. This is the property adjacent to Circle C on the west which was purchased by the city to preserve water quality. To allow public access for recreational purposes several organizations including Circle C Homeowners Association are developing use rules. The March event is the first in a series of training sessions for docents who will conduct tours on the property when it becomes open to the public. In addition to hiking, biking, and equestrian use, educational tours will be offered about the history of the property as well as information about native plants and wildlife. Volunteers gathered on February 5th along Slaughter Creek in the City of Austin Water Quality Protection Lands to plant trees. Volunteers were given a short lecture on the history of the site, the geology that makes it special, how the water gets into our water supply, and a demonstration on tree planting. They planted about 50 trees in sites with a drip water line and 30 saplings, which were distributed in a more random pattern. The trees were native to the area, all grown from seeds in a nursery that the city operates near Kyle, Texas.

Ever wonder who all those people are you see jogging/running through our neighborhood, riding their bikes along MoPac /45 and around the Veloway, and swimming laps year round in our heated community pool are? Well, a lot of them are your neighbors who train for triathlons. Triathlon is perhaps the perfect way to get and stay in shape as it requires a slow, gradual build-up towards peak endurance performance.

What amazed me most when I started was the wide variety of people you meet when doing triathlons. People of all ages and varying physiques participate. Most people have the misconception that triathlons are those grueling events that you see beamed from Hawaii every year, called "The Ironman®." While that is the grand daddy of all events, most people participate in smaller "sprint" distance events that typically consist of a ¹/₄-mile swim, followed by a 12-mile bike, and end with a 3-mile run.

The key to triathlon training is long, slow workouts to gradually improve your endurance.

I started by walking/jogging a little over a mile. My initial bike rides were around ten miles and my first swims were a few laps. Since I was always doing something different, I rarely became bored. Additionally, going slow was the perfect way to transition from "couch potato" to "triathlete." Just remember, whenever starting a new physical training program it is always advisable to consult your physician.

If you're tired of training alone, or want to try a new sport that will help you achieve those New Year's Resolutions all year long, then join us at our inaugural meeting.
