Neighbors Clean Up Perry Park By Nadene Morning, David Seaton, Carolyn Robinson

HPWBANA held its first Perry Park workday/cleanup on January 15. More than 50 adults and children pitched in and made the cleanup of our neighborhood park a great family event.

We have been working with the City of Austin PARD, Highland Park Elementary, and neighbors in the area to improve this wonderful section of our neighborhood. One concern had been the accumulation of dead wood, ragweed, brush, and vines throughout the entire park. Neighbors worked together to make several large piles of brush that were fed into a chipper by PARD personnel, who were onsite for the event. Even the large, dead tree that was in the old quarry for years was (or will be) removed. Another concern had been the bamboo that was growing densely into the wooded area. It was so thick in one spot that a full-size couch was concealed in it. This entire bamboo grove was cut down and hauled off.

Removing brush, bamboo, and trash was our focus for this cleanup, and you can see a big difference. But we are not finished. More Perry Park workdays are being planned to give this park the attention it needs. Thanks to everyone who helped out. Your efforts made a big difference! (Note: The workday did not involve the running trail. Improvements to the running trail are the focus of the Highland Park PTA, which is working with drainage and trail experts for solutions.)

Urban Coyote Update

Neighborhoods to the north of us are experiencing serious problems with urban coyotes and we are getting reports of the similar problems in our area (missing cats for some time now but also attacks on dogs and adult deer).

The city is implementing control methods. Call 311 to report coyote incidents (911 - emergency).

Coyotes are very common in the natural areas within our boundaries and we all need to be aware of this problem and help out with solutions. Check out our website www.hpwbana.org, the wildlife page for information. Note the Wildlife Services Fact Sheet about Urban and Suburban Coyotes for recommendations on how to discourage coyotes from becoming comfortable around people.

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HPWBANA Introduces

a New Neighborhood Watch Program

HPWBANA is trying to increase awareness of neighborhood crime in our community. An increase in residential and automobile burglaries in the neighborhood has prompted interest in expanding our Neighborhood Watch program. Because research shows that the most effective programs are those that involve neighbors in small, localized groups, we are establishing a crime contact network using Neighborhood Watch Groups (NWG) within our boundaries. This will assist in disseminating information about crime and safety issues to as many residents as possible.

Our neighborhood has been divided into six NWG areas to start this program. See our website www.hpwbana.org for a map of the six areas. Community volunteers have come forward to join our NWG crime contact network. Contact a HPWBANA board member to see who in your area is currently involved.

We have already put this program to use in communicating an ongoing problem on a large median in our neighborhood. The median on Ridge Oak Drive and Lake View Drive has been vandalized for years now. A recent incident prompted us to send out a Neighborhood Watch Notice to our NWG contacts and also communicate solution options directly with a letter to residents.

Our established methods of communicating crime issues, such as our Yahoo email group, website notices, newsletter articles, and neighborhood meetings will also be expanded to include more crime topics. With the introduction of neighborhood watch groups we can distribute crime and safety topics directly to as many residents as possible. With added attention to crime concerns we can all work together to maintain the safe community we live in today.

With over 1700 homes in our neighborhood association boundaries we need help from residents to make the program worthwhile. 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Mopac Sound Wall Progress

On January 18, MoNAC was very pleased to have Bob Daigh, TxDOT's District Engineer for District 14 speak with neighbors concerning, what else, the MoPac corridor. The agenda was to discuss Managed Lane concepts and the Development of Sound Walls.

This is a highlight of the information presented by Mr. Daigh:

Managed Lane Concepts

A "Managed Lane" is a technique for actively moving traffic with variable policies as to who can use the lane. For example, busses can use the lane during peak hours then other traffic at other times. It can be tolled or non-tolled. It can be high-occupancy or single-occupant vehicles. Essentially, it is a way to keep the lane filled using economics.

Development of Sound Walls

Mr. Daigh began by saying he would not have all the answers at this time. Before the sounds walls can begin, a new engineering consultant team must be hired. This is in process and will be done by spring. The consultants will work on plans for the corridor keeping in mind the specifications that came out of the CAMPO Special Committee in 2001 (take no more ROW, no elevated lanes, etc.)

In addition, the MoPac corridor would need added capacity (i.e., managed lanes) to trigger funding for the Sound Walls.

Bottom line: Added Capacity = Sound walls

Mr. Daigh's estimate is that this could well be done in 1-2 years. There is some sound measurement occurring now and there will likely be "sample" walls constructed in the interim.

The neighbors in MoNAC are certainly disappointed that the time table is not as soon as we thought for the long-needed sound walls. However, as Commissioner Karen Sonelitner said last night, "It is a new Daigh with TxDOT," and went on to say that she has found Bob Daigh to be very open to work with. That is the impression that he left with the MoNAC meeting, that the neighbors' interests would be considered at every turn. Now it is MoNAC's job to work closely with the project.

Hancock Bridge Area Gets a New Look

The Hancock bridge area is looking great these days with new landscaping at the southwest corner of Hancock Dr. and W. Frances Place. After the HPWBANA Beautification Committee worked for several, yes several, months with the City of Austin staff, our persistence paid off and we obtained approval to improve the area. The native perennials and trees we planted last October will provide seasonal color and shade in years to come.

The Beautification Committee coordinated all aspects of this project, including design, approvals, fundraising, materials, and labor. A local builder donated the rocks that border the perennial bed. A small business helped out by getting us great prices on plants. And a neighbor volunteered to provide the water needed to get the plants established. Overall, this made a significant improvement to the wild area of high grasses that once grew there. 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
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
