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
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LOE Stitchers

Stressing Neighborhood Safety

We have many residents who like to take advantage of our beautiful streets and sidewalks for walking, jogging, riding bikes, and other activities. We welcome and encourage this, but ask each of you to take the proper precautions to protect yourselves and your families from accidents or mishaps. It is particularly difficult at dawn and dusk for motorists to see pedestrians, and vice versa. Further, we have too many motorists who are speeding and not stopping at stop signs. The following procedures and precautions are highly recommended:

- Use the sidewalks for walking, jogging, pushing strollers, roller blading, etc. This will make it safer for you as well as authorized motorized vehicles that may not see you.
- · We ask that every resident obey all traffic signs and laws observe posted speed limits, come to a complete stop at stop signs, etc., and that they ask the same of family members, friends,
- Bicycles should be ridden in the streets, not the sidewalk, and should obey all traffic signs the same as authorized motorized
- Non licensed drivers and non-licensed motorized vehicles (specified in another article) are not allowed in Lakes on Eldridge.

Please be courteous to your neighbors. The more we expect of ourselves, the more we can expect of our friends and neighbors, so let's set a great example to give others something to follow. It's our responsibility to ensure our own safety!



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Unlicensed Vehicles And On-Street Parking

About a year and a half ago, the Board, in response to a number of complaints from homeowners, passed a resolution dealing with the operation of unlicensed vehicles and on street parking in Lakes on Eldridge. Among the principal concerns behind the resolution were safety, inconveniencing homeowners and noise. The resolution includes ways to enforce the rules, if necessary, including taking legal action, towing and fines. The resolution was reviewed and approved by the Association's counsel and has been recorded in the Real Property Records.

The Board and AMI have received, in recent weeks, a number of complaints from homeowners concerning go-carts, motorized scooters, ATV's, etc. all which are certainly included in the unlicensed vehicle category. In addition, the operation of unlicensed motorcycles of any kind is also prohibited on the property. If licensed, motorcycles may be operated on the streets if done safely, but not on the green belts. At its February meeting, the Board voted to impose a \$200.00 fine each time two residents are willing to witness to such offenses and due process has been afforded to the alleged offenders.

With respect to on-street parking, the resolution includes three provisions:

- On street parking is discouraged except for short periods of time
- No vehicle shall be parked so as to inhibit free flow of traffic, create a safety hazard, block access to driveways, mail boxes, fire hydrants, etc, block a clear view of an intersection or be parked directly across the street from a driveway
- Commercial vehicles must be parked in an enclosed garage at all times

The effectiveness of these rules really depends on the willingness of homeowners to make them work. As a practical matter, there is no way the Board or AMI can enforce them without homeowner help. Phone or e-mail AMI when you feel action is called for.

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
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Crime Awareness

The Lakes on Eldridge Board of Directors has a committee called the "Crime Awareness Committee". Our purpose is to do all that we can to make the LOE community a safer, more enjoyable place to live through the involvement of all of our residents. Although we are a 'gated community', we are by no means a 'guarded community'. We have a gate attendant at the Eldridge Parkway entrance whose job includes monitoring the traffic into LOE and screening out visitors who do not have a legitimate purpose in coming into our community. Of course, this is not a rigorous process and any determined 'visitor' can get in if he really wants to. The two entrances on Tanner Road are unattended and are supposed to be used ONLY by residents to enter LOE. We all know that many vendors and other non-residents come in by following closely behind a resident's vehicle, in violation of the signs directing them to enter at the Eldridge entrance only. Residents who observe this behavior should gently remind the offenders about the policy, but we do not want anyone to have a confrontation or an altercation with non-residents. If you observe suspicious persons coming into LOE via the Tanner Road gates, report it to the gatehouse at 713-937-8825 or call our management company (AMI) at 713-932-1122. Crime and vandalism costs every LOE resident (through your community association fees) many hundreds of dollars every year. For example, the direct cost of repairs and replacements from vandalism in 2004, which is a line item in our budget, was \$7,690. We also have felt the need for the services of the Harris County Sheriff's Department. We have contracted for off-duty deputies to provide surveillance. They have been effective in identifying some individuals who have no business being in LOE and escorting them out. Several juveniles (both LOE residents and non-residents) have been found loitering late at night and have been asked to go home or leave the premises.

Since we cannot afford to pay deputies to patrol our neighborhoods constantly, everyone's safety and peace of mind will be increased if residents stay alert for any suspicious persons and by reporting illegal, dangerous or destructive activity. All residents are encouraged to call the Sheriff's Department (832-593-7164) to report incidents that you believe to be detrimental to the peace and security of LOE. Get to know your neighbors and offer to watch each other's property when on vacation or when going away for an extended period of time. Pick up newspapers and mail that may be inadvertently delivered to an absent neighbor. Teach your children to always respect other people and their property.

We all have a significant investment in our homes in Lakes On Eldridge. Property values and our quality of living are greatly enhanced by our beautiful surroundings and by maintaining a safe environment. Let's each one of us do his part in keeping it that way.

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Grand Parkway Making Slow But Steady Progress

HOUSTON (March 8, 2005) – To casual observers, it might seem that the extension of the Grand Parkway through northwest and north Houston is a forgotten project. But behind the scenes the wheels are continuing to turn to make the limited-access freeway a reality.

Still, it will be a while before visible construction takes place. Segments E and F-1, which stretch from Interstate 10 West to Texas 249, are scheduled to be built by 2009, said Robin K. Sterry, assistant executive director of the Grand Parkway Association, as she addressed the March meeting of the Transportation Committee of the Cy-Fair Houston Chamber of Commerce.

Segment F-2, from Texas 249 to I-45, and segment G, from I-45 to U.S. 59 North, are scheduled to open in 2011 and 2010, respectively.

Sterry summarized the history of the project, which dates back to the early 1960s when it was first conceived of by the city of Houston planning department. The project was called the Grand Parkway because it was to connect parks in the Greater Houston area.

The project received a boost in 1984 when the Texas Transportation Commission formed the Grand Parkway Association and 17 other nonprofit transportation corporations. The Grand Parkway Association is the only one of those organizations that remains.

Currently, a 20-mile stretch of the Parkway, also known as Texas 99, exists from U.S. 59 South to I-10 West. Sterry noted that the Grand Parkway differs from other freeways in Houston because it is a limited-access freeway with no access roads.

The project continues to move slowly as officials meet mandatory environmental requirements, acquire right of way and hold public hearings and proposed alignments. Sherry said there has been little opposition in segments E and F-1 to proposed alignments, but the

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Grand Parkway Association has encountered much resistance in the Spring area regarding segment F-2, which connects Texas 249 to I-45 North.

When segments E, F-1, F-2 and G are built, it's likely they will be designated as toll roads, Sterry said.

"The state's gasoline tax doesn't generate enough revenue to even maintain the existing highway system," she said. "The Grand Parkway, being a new roadway, is a prime candidate for a toll road. I'm sure (sections E, F-1 and F-2) will be built as a toll road."

In response to a question from the committee, Sterry said the Grand Parkway is no longer being considered as part of the alignment of Interstate 69 when it is built as part of the Trans-Texas Corridor. Heavy development north and west of Houston convinced planners to move I-69 further away from Houston, she said.

Sterry also noted that the Grand Parkway is no longer considered "a developers' highway" as it was in the 1980s.

"When the Grand Parkway Association was first formed in the '80s, there were fewer but larger land owners," she said. "They were approached about donation of right of way. Donation is something we approach now after we finish the environmental process. The community has changed enough that what was open to us in the early '80s is no longer available to us."



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Mute Swan

Cygnus olor

The Mute Swan is the common swan of parks and estates. It is native across Europe and Asia and has been introduced in many other areas, including parts of North America. In England, all Mute Swans were considered royal property of the Crown until the 18th century.

Mutes can be distinguished from other white swans by their long S shaped neck and the triangular naked black area in front of the eyes and the black knob above the deep orange bill. The fleshy knob on the head of these swans is more prominent on the males. An adult male (the cob) can weigh 25 lb (10.5 kg) and an adult female (the pen) 21 lb (9 kg). Usually juveniles are pale gray with gray legs, which become black in adulthood. Some Mute Swans have been recorded to live past 30 years of age.

Although quieter than some other species, it is by no means mute. Among its vocalizations are a loud snort when annoyed, shrill trumpeting when really angry, and an aggressive hiss. They are the most territorial of the swans and two males will fight viciously if one intrudes on another's turf. Nesting territories can cover 4-10 acres and are reoccupied by the same pair year after year. March and April is the swan's breeding season and they can be quite aggressive to people approaching. Their large size makes them somewhat dangerous in this situation, so it is best to avoid them at that time especially if you are walking with young children. Stressed swans will not reproduce so let's all give them extra consideration during the upcoming mating season and hopefully we will be rewarded with some new juvenile swans this year!

Need To Post A Sign??

Every now and then you need to get information to the community in a quick manner. You type up your sign and tape it to the gates. It usually rolls or folds back because it is not very secure. Then when

you are done, more than likely, there is tape residue left on the gate. Not a very pretty sight.

So here is a somewhat better solution. There will be black magnetic clips, and small poster board donated at the guardhouse. Type up your sign as usual, drop by the guardhouse, tape your sign to the poster board, and pick up 4 clips for each sign that needs to be posted. Use the clips at each corner of your sign and magnetically adhere to the gates. It's less messy, looks prettier and gives us a uniform style of posting information. When you are finished, please return all clips to the guardhouse.

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
