A Time for Reflection and Vision

As January begins it is time for both reflection and vision. In 2005 we saw continued growth in ministry and in Good Shepherd's ability to be a servant to the community. It is our vision as a body to match the excitement of our members and to reach into the community to be a presence for Christ. The disasters in Louisiana and East Texas allowed the community as a whole to reach out, to be the hands and feet of Christ to the world. Amazingly, even after the effort shown in hurricane relief the community again stepped up surpassing our expectations in the "Camp for Christ" program (see below). In addition, we have seen dynamic growth in many different respects. Increased numbers are noted in attendance as well as in new areas of Bible Study, Youth Group, UMArmy, JUMMP, local mission projects, Easter Egg. Hunt, and our second international mission trip to name a few. Of course the Christmas season was a wonderful time for our church family with a Tree Lighting Celebration - Annual Hayride and Hotdog Roast - "That Feeling of Christmas" musical program – and the uplifting celebration of the miracle of Christ's birth on Christmas Eve in four services. But with reflection also comes vision - where are we going in the New Year and how can we further minister in the community. There are many ways:

<u>Camp for Christ Highlights</u> - Of special note, and with great thanks to all of the neighboring communities, the junior and senior high groups marshaled their resources to meet the needs of those in our community with Camp for Christ. The participation of 65 youth plus sponsors over a month, under girded by your generosity, wrapped up with the complete filling of the entire entrance area to the multi-purpose building with clothes, blankets, and other necessities for the homeless. This continues to be a tremendous experience for all who participated.

Bible Study: We have several studies meeting virtually every day of the week. They range from women's, men's, couples', and youth. We also have contacts for many other studies throughout the community. More are on there way here at Good Shepherd. Join or call us for details on any of these. One new program starting in January is "Alpha" designed specifically to answer the questions regarding the relevancy of the Church in today's world. Also in January our Senior Pastor, Bill Haygood, begins a five-week series on Marriage designed to inform, strengthen, resource and revive the marriage relationship.

<u>Prayer</u>: We strongly believe in the power of prayer and encourage an active prayer life within our fellowship. Prayer emails, prayer groups, and prayer lists – including on line at <u>www.cypressgs.net/</u> and a prayer time in each worship service help draw us closer to our Lord.

Service and Mission: We have groups active in many areas such as very active Women and Men's groups, CAM, CareNet Pregnancy Center, and many more. Of special note here are the mission trips our youth will be taking next summer. Senior high can participate in UM Army, the annual camp that provides youth the ability to help repair the homes of those in need, in late July. Junior high students are set to go to JUMMP, which is a less intense version of UM Army, in early June. Registration for all three starts in January so contact Jeff Dunbar at the church office for more information on where you can get involved. Adults – another mission trip is on the drawing boards. Stay tuned for details.

Certification is the first thing to look for

A personal trainer should be certified because that's your assurance you're working with a trainer who has the knowledge to provide you with a safe and effective workout. A checklist to help you hire the right personal trainer:

- · Ask for references
- Ask the trainer for the names and phone numbers of other clients with goals similar to yours. Call to see if they were pleased with their workouts, if the trainer was punctual and prepared, and if they felt their individual needs were addressed. The best personal trainer to hire is the one others give high marks to.
- Make sure the trainer has liability insurance and provides business policies in writing Many personal trainers operate as independent contractors and are not employees of a fitness facility. You should find out if the trainer you want to hire carries professional liability
- insurance. A reputable personal trainer should also make sure you understand the cancellation policy and billing procedure. The best way to avoid confusion and to protect your rights is to have (Continued on Page 15)

those policies in writing.

· Look for a trainer who is able to assist you with your special needs

A personal trainer should always have you fill out a health history questionnaire to determine your needs or limitations. If you have a medical condition or a past injury, a personal trainer should design a session that takes these into account. If you're under a doctor's care, a personal trainer should discuss any exercise concerns with your doctor, and should ask for a health screening or release from your doctor.

· Find out what the trainer charges

Rates vary, depending on the trainer's experience, and the length and location of the workout session. For example, a personal trainer who works in a fitness club will probably charge less per hour than one who works independently and needs to come to your home or office.

· Decide if this is someone you can work with

Some people like to exercise in the morning, some in the evening. Will the personal trainer you're talking to accommodate your schedule? What about the trainer's gender? Some people do better working with a trainer of the same sex; others prefer the opposite sex.

The personal trainer you select should motivate you by positive, not negative, reinforcement. Even more important, that trainer should be someone you like.

Ask yourself if you think you could get along well with the trainer. Ask yourself, too, if you think the trainer is genuinely interested in helping you.

The personal trainer who best measures up is the one to hire. Because that's the professional who will help you get the best results.


