SPRING IS AROUND THE CORNER!

Here are some garden tips to help you get the most enjoyment out of your outdoor living space!

- Prepare beds for planting flowers.
- When purchasing perennials, try to buy them while not in bloom.
- Fertilize newly planted perennials with a slow-release product in spring or fall.
- Newly planted perennials should receive one inch of water a week during the growth season, either from rain of through irrigation.
- Mulch garden beds 2 to 3 inches deep with an organic mulch.
- Mulch around trees to reduce mower injury and conserve moisture, but be sure to keep mulch pulled back from the base of the tree.
- Newly planted trees and shrubs will need a total of one inch of water a week during the growing season.
 During periods of drought, water trees deeply every 10 days.

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Thyme Out for Gardening: March Gardening Notes

_March is another busy month in the garden as we enjoy our brief period of spring weather and try and prepare our landscapes for the impending summer heat. If your shrubs and perennials need pruning and you weren't able to get to them in February, go ahead and check that task off your list in March. Azaleas should be pruned immediately after they bloom, before they set their blooms for next year. Fertilize azaleas at the same time with either an azalea formula or your favorite organic products.

Spring blooming roses should also be pruned back as they finish their blooming cycle. If you missed the traditional day for rose pruning, Valentine's Day, go ahead and cut them back now. Most repeat-blooming antique and Earthkind roses can be cut back by up to a third just about anytime during their growing season with few ill effects other than a little interruption in the bloom cycle. My 'Mutabilis' rose usually needs trimming 4 times a year.

Check your roses for aphids this spring, and watch for them on hibiscus and other perennials. With our "even milder than usual" winter this year, I suspect that we'll have even higher than normal numbers of aphids, scale, and mealy bugs in our landscapes. Healthy plants, including antique roses, will usually be able to grow through their bug problems with the help of lady bird beetles and other beneficial insects who feed on the true pests. If an infestation does seem to be getting out of control, try an integrated pest management (IPM) approach as we've discussed before. First identify the pest, then use the least toxic treatment necessary to achieve your desired level of pest control. Start with something as simple as manually removing the pests and squashing them or washing the pests off of your plants with a strong blast from the water hose. If you need something a little stronger, citrus oil, neem oil, or insecticidal soap should take care of the problem. Please read and follow all product label instructions carefully!

Ornamental grasses should be cut back to about 2 inches above the ground – they'll grow in again quickly. If your clumps of grasses have gotten too large or thick for their location, dig up the clump, divide it, and replant a portion of the clump in the same location. Most plants can be transplanted easily this month while the weather is still a little on the cool side. Adding a handful of compost to the planting hole and water well to add nutrients to the soil and help get your plants off to a good start. Keep watering and fertilizing your winter annuals as most of them can look attractive for another month

It's not too late to try planting some leaf lettuce or arugula seeds in a pot or in your flower beds – lightly rake the seeds in and make sure the area doesn't get too wet or too dry. The seeds should sprout fairly quickly and if you sow seeds every couple of weeks, you should enjoy salads through the end of May. Tomatoes and peppers can also be planted this month – just be on the lookout for a late frost and be

If you have a water garden, the end of March is a good time to clean it and divide and repot your water plants. String algae can be a problem during the spring months – keep it pulled out of your water garden and consult a water garden specialist about algae control products.

prepared to cover the plants if necessary.

Add compost and mulch to your flower beds as needed to maintain a 2 to 3 inch layer around your plants' roots. This will nourish your soil, reduce water loss, and help reduce the weed population. Remember to avoid those mulch volcanoes – don't mound mulch or compost up on the trunks and stems of your plants.

Also remember that you shouldn't fertilize your lawn until it is actively growing – the rule of thumb is to wait until you've cut real grass, not weeds, twice. If you fertilize before the grass is actively growing, the grass will not be able to utilize the nutrients and the excess could end up washing down the storm sewers. At best, you will have wasted your money and at worst, contributed to the run off pollution that is damaging our waterways. I hope to further discuss lawn care in next month's column because it's an important topic from an environmental standpoint and because it's one thing that everyone in the neighborhood has in common.

Some birds started building nests in February, while others will start nesting over the next month or two. They'll be looking for construction materials in the form of twigs, pieces of vines and grasses, leaves, and even dog hair. You can help the birds by simply leaving some of these materials in your landscape when you trim your plants or remove dead stems and foliage. You can even create a small brush pile in an out of the way location so that the birds can pick and choose their favorite materials. If you insist on a pristine garden with nary a twig out of place, then place the materials in a basket and place it on your patio or hang it in a tree – the birds will find it!

Because of weather conditions and the life cycle of the imported red fire ant, April, May, October, and November are the months when fire ant control measures are the most effective. To help you decide what fire ant treatments are best for your landscape this year, Harris County entomologist Paul Nester will be speaking to the LOEN Gardening and Nature Club on Wednesday, March 8, 2006 at 7:00 p.m. If you're interested in attending, please send me an e-mail and I'll let you know where we're meeting.

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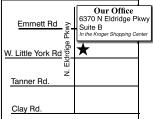

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Normal Acetaminophen Dosage Can Trigger Liver Failure In Alcoholics

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON — (Feb. 10, 2006) – It only takes a few pain pills to do life-threatening damage to your liver if you drink too much alcohol, say liver experts at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in Houston.

The equivalent of two or more alcoholic beverages daily, coupled with poor eating habits that reduce nutrition, greatly increases the risk of liver failure when the common pain reliever acetaminophen is used, according to Baylor Liver Health director Dr. John Vierling.

"These people may have lesser ability to detoxify acetaminophen and a greater likelihood of producing toxic byproducts even if they take acetaminophen for the right indications and do not exceed the maximum recommended doses," said Vierling, also professor of medicine and surgery at BCM.

Acetaminophen, the active ingredient in hundreds of over-the-counter pain relief medications and fever reducers, can cause liver toxicity when daily doses exceed the maximum recommended four grams, or the equivalent of eight extra-strength Tylenol® tablets. Those who regularly consume alcohol or have a poor diet, however, should limit their acetaminophen intake to two-and-a-half grams per day, says Vierling.

According to Vierling, the best solution is prevention, which starts with improved public education about acetaminophen. Roughly half of all acute liver failure cases in the United States are now caused by acetaminophen overdoses, accounting for an alarming increase over the frequency a few years ago. Children are especially vulnerable to acetaminophen overdosage.

"One form of pediatric formulation may contain much higher amounts of acetaminophen than the next," said Vierling. "People must read the labels carefully to be sure the dose being given is safe. Adults also must be more aware that acetaminophen is often found in prescription pain killers and over-the-counter cold remedies, which can lead to unintentional consumption of excessive amounts."

In severe cases of liver failure caused by acetaminophen, liver transplantation may be the only life-saving hope, but even urgent transplantation is not always possible because the availability of donor livers is limited and some patients may become too ill to undergo transplantation.

Nevertheless, recent advances in intensive care of patients with acetaminophen liver failure have improved outcomes without transplantation by stabilizing the patient long enough for the liver to regenerate itself.

Vierling says that many patients with acetaminophen-related liver failure who might have required transplantation in the past are now surviving without the operation because of these advances in care.

"Acetaminophen can kill a large portion of liver and place a patient on death's door, but with advanced intensive care, many, but not all, can be stabilized long enough to rebuild their liver without a transplant," said Vierling. "We hope that future advances will make it possible for all patients with acetaminophen liver failure to survive with transplantation."

1 cup coconut

1 cup chopped pecans

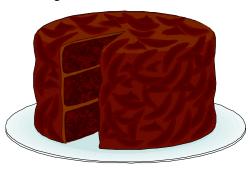
1 - 2 layer pkg. German chocolate cake mix

8 ounces cream cheese, softened

½ cup melted oleo

1 - 1lb. pkg. confectioners sugar

Sprinkle coconut and pecans in greased and floured 8 x 14" cake pan. Prepare cake mix using package directions. Pour into pan. Beat cream cheese and oleo in mixing bowl. 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Fit Facts

Flexible Benefits

We take part in aerobic activity to improve our cardiovascular endurance and burn fat. We weight-train to maintain lean muscle tissue and build strength. Those are the two most important elements of a fitness program, right?

Actually, there are three important elements. Often neglected is flexibility training. That neglect is regrettable, because flexibility training:

- Allows greater freedom of movement and improved posture
- Increases physical and mental relaxation
- · Releases muscle tension and soreness
- · Reduces risk of injury

Some people are naturally more flexible. Flexibility is primarily due to one's genetics, gender, age and level of physical activity. As we grow older, we tend to lose flexibility, usually as a result of inactivity rather than the aging process itself.

The less active we are, the less flexible we are likely to be. As with cardiovascular endurance and muscle strength, flexibility will improve with regular training.

Stretch for success

Before stretching, take a few minutes to warm up as stretching cold muscles can cause injury. Begin with a simple, lowintensity warm-up, such as easy walking while swinging the arms in a wide circle. Spend at least 5 to 10 minutes warming up prior to stretching.

When performing any stretch:

- Start each stretch slowly, exhaling as you gently stretch the muscle.
- Try to hold each stretch for at least 10 to 30 seconds.



Avoid these stretching mistakes:

- •Don't bounce a stretch. Holding a stretch is more effective and there is less risk of injury.
- Don't stretch a muscle that is not warmed
- •Don't strain or push a muscle too far. If a stretch hurts, ease up.
- •Don't hold your breath.

Fitting stretching into a compressed schedule

Time constraints keep many people from stretching. Some complain they just don't

have time to stretch; others hurry out of their fitness classes before the cool-down exercises are completed. Ideally, at least 30 minutes, three times per week, should be spent on flexibility training. But even a mere five minutes of stretching at the end of an exercise session is better than nothing. And all aerobic activity should be followed by at least a few minutes of stretching.

Here are some tips for fitting stretching into an overstuffed schedule:

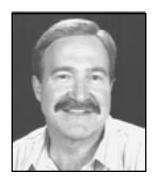
- 1. If you don't have time to sufficiently warm up before stretching, try doing a few stretches immediately after a shower or while soaking in a hot tub. The hot water elevates muscle temperature enough to make them more pliable and receptive to stretching.
- 2. Try a few simple stretches before getting out of bed in the morning. Wake yourself up with a few full-body stretches by pointing the toes and reaching the arms above your head. This can clear your mind and help jump-start your morning.
- 3. Take a stretching class such as yoga or tai chi. Scheduling a class will help you to stick with a regular stretching program.







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
