Take a Leadership Role in Willowbridge/Stonebridge By Fred Edler

The May 7th Houston Chronicle Real Estate Section was primarily devoted to "Houston Area Home Price Trends" from 2004 to 2005. The Chronicle reported the average Harris County Home Sale per Square foot in 2005 was \$70.04. The average percentage increase in value from 2004 to 2005 was 3.8%.

Willowbridge beats the Harris County percentage of increase with a significant 6.9% increase in Home Values with the average Home selling for \$77.07 per square foot.

For most of us our personal Home Value protects one of our single largest investments. You don't have to drive very far to observe what can happen when homes and subdivision communities began to age and are not cared for on a long term basis.

Fortunately the Willowbridge/Stonebridge HOA is working very hard to protect your investment. Sometimes the protection of that investment comes directly to your home in the form a "Deed Restriction or ARC Guidelines" violation. When you purchased a home in our community you signed, as part of the sale agreement, a statement that you agreed to abide by the HOA Rules.

The HOA Board is charged with enforcing those rules. The Board, ARC and PCMI look not just at the single Home in violation but how that violation effects the entire Willowbridge/Stonebridge community and how it effects the long term community property values. Please help us with your co-operation.

You're elected HOA Board and associated committees are completely made up of VOLUNTEERS. No one on the Board or serving on a committee is paid a salary.

We serve because we choose to help our community be the very best we can make it. The key words here are WE CAN MAKE IT. Since members of the Board are elected by the Home Owners, the "WE" in WE CAN MAKE IT changes every year. The "WE" is chosen by the entire community if they chose to vote and can be any home Owner in the community, even you.

Members of the Board serve for three year terms. The terms are staggered so that they are changing regularly. Personally, I believe an elected member of the Board should only be allowed to serve one term. This would allow for the constant influx of NEW ideas, thoughts, strategies, and fresh eyes looking at financials.

Unfortunately, there is a great deal of apathy in our community. At *(Continued on Page 10)*

Safety Issues at Gleason Elementary

Providing a safe environment for students is the number one priority at Gleason Elementary. Therefore, it is important for staff, parents, and community to periodically review and revise safety procedures. The following reminders to the parents of Gleason students will help ensure their safety.

• Please get in the car rider line if you are dropping your child off in the morning. Please do not walk your child to the front door, unless you have business at the front office or a teacher conference. If you park on Willowbridge Park Blvd. and allow your child to cross over the car rider line to get to the front door, you are creating a dangerous situation for your child, as cars, day care vans, and buses enter the school drive and are moving every few minutes.

• Please do not park on either side of Willowbridge Park Blvd. to pick up your child at dismissal time for the same reason as arrival time. Your child would have to cross over moving traffic to get to your car. For this reason, at dismissal time, we do not release children to parents who are parking and waiting for their child in their cars or walking to the front entrance to pick up their children.

• One of our major concerns is the safety of the walkers and bikers because the location of the crosswalk is in close proximity of the school entrance. Many students exit the building as walkers and bikers, and it is a very congested area. Please do not park on Willowbridge Park Blvd. at the crosswalk to pick up a child who is a walker. If you are driving to the school and parking to pick up your child, then you child

is a car rider and not a walker. We appreciate the parents who get in the car rider line for pick up rather than parking on the street.

Our District does not provide trained crosswalk guards because Cy-Fair provides bus service for all students in the District, even if they live across the street from the school. School employees assist children into the building as soon as they arrive on the campus grounds and when they are leaving; but they do not direct traffic on Willowbridge Park Boulevard because they are not trained.

We are fortunate to have Constable Tracy Shillock who periodically patrols the area in and around Gleason in the mornings and helps with safety issues. He is not assigned to our campus on a daily basis, as he is responsible for all schools that feed into Cook Middle School. Constable Shillock has assured me that he does not direct traffic to use the semi circular driveway of the community clubhouse as a "turnaround."

We know that traffic conditions near schools can seriously affect the safety of school children as well as cause traffic conditions for home owners in the community. We are a team, so any safety suggestions will be well taken.

At Gleason Elementary, the administration and staff are committed to the safety of our students. We thank our parents for following the above guidelines, and we appreciate the community for helping keep our children safe.

4. Each household may reserve up to 3 non-consecutive hours per week.


5. If a reservation is made and is not claimed within the first 10 minutes then it is automatically cancelled.

the annual General Meeting, in October, when elections are held, we usually have less than 150 people attend. A few more vote through a Proxy Ballot. This means the majority of Home Owners allow a small minority to elect your Board who in turn appoint committee members. The Leaders of your community.

Many Home Owners are quick to criticize, even though they don't vote or volunteer; even though they didn't take an interest in electing the Board. That's OK. Everyone is entitled to their opinion. But if you really don't like what's happening in your community there's 3 ways to have a significant voice in changing it:

1-VOTE

2-Run for a Board position


3-Get involved-Volunteer
