President's Letter A Season of Pride and Promise

With the Texas heat blazing down on all of us, it may be difficult to characterize August as a time for optimism, yet this month marks a return to school and the opening of **Clayton Elementary**. Situated on a beautiful multi-acre tract along the western end of LaCrosse, it represents a victory for our kids and those who have fought for many years to alleviate the systematic overcrowding of schools in our area. Another day many thought would never come is finally upon us – and the air of excitement is truly infectious. Administrators, faculty and staff are working long hours in preparation for a student and parent open house on Aug. 13 and the start of classes two days later.

I had the pleasure of meeting up recently with **Clayton Principal**, **Dr. Dru Robinett**. She's a true professional who exhibits a tremendous level of enthusiasm regarding the challenging road ahead. I have little doubt our kids are in good hands with Dru at the helm. For more on the Clayton opening, please see my interview with Dru, included inside this month's newsletter.

Major change is also in the making at **Kiker Elementary**. For the first time **Wildflower Park** students and their families can forgo the "leisurely" trek down Brodie Lane to Baranoff in favor of the quick trip over to Kiker. It doesn't impact a great number of students, but this is a common sense boundary change that helps make Circle C a more inclusive family. New students (including my 5-yr. old son) are sure to benefit from the tremendous efforts of **Principal Lori Schneider** and some of the hardest working staff and faculty in AISD. They've gone the extra mile helping with the Clayton ramp-up while at the same time dealing with a continuing series of oft-delayed renovation and expansion projects.

It is a pleasant irony that La Crosse will soon be home to two of the most respected public schools in the region. When factoring in the great job the faculty and staff are doing at **Mills Elementary**, it shows just how blessed we are to live in community with such commitment to providing the highest quality of education. This rare commitment offers the foundation upon which the neighborhood continues to grow and prosper. The promise of a supportive future for our children is what inspired many of us to move here. It's a promise that can serve as a very positive and unifying force in a community as large and diverse as Circle C.

With another school year upon us, we'll soon be dealing with the congested pedestrian and automobile access surrounding Kiker during the morning drop off and afternoon pick up periods. As most know, the streets intersecting at Kiker recently received a new gravel coat – erasing the **bike lanes** many enjoyed during the off hours and on weekends. After recent discussions with the City of Austin, it appears we are likely to permanently lose the bike lanes on **LaCrosse from Escarpment to Dahlgreen**. The city has adopted a firm policy prohibiting re-striping of existing bike lanes unless parking is forbidden at all times along the entire route. We've basically been told that if we insist on the original lanes being re-striped, we'll lose all parking in front of Kiker. Obviously, that will never be a viable option.

We should also expect additional bike lane changes. Traffic lanes on **Escarpment between Slaughter and LaCrosse** could be restriped to allow parking along the western curb only. The bike lane

would continue in both directions, but likely with some substantial alterations. Bike lanes along Escarpment throughout the main body of Circle C (La Crosse to 45 South) will be re-striped, although we should expect to see parking completely prohibited in each direction.

I'll conclude with a mixed bag of association news. First of all, I regret to announce that Matt Cano has sold his home and resigned from the CCHOA Board of Directors. Matt gave countless hours to the neighborhood during his brief tenure. His level head, legal expertise and wry wit were valuable assets to the neighborhood and will be greatly missed. The good news is Michelle Moran, who many may know as director of the Child Development Center, has been appointed by the board to complete the remaining 21 months of Matt's term. 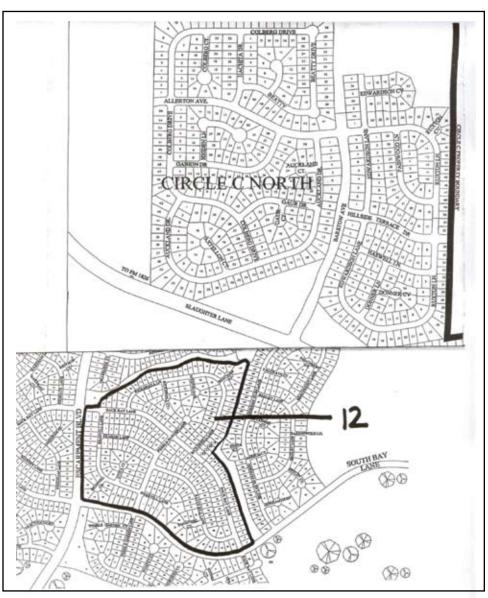

We are required by Texas State Law to notify owners in writing via certified mail of a deed restriction violation. We also send correspondence via regular mail to ensure that you receive. 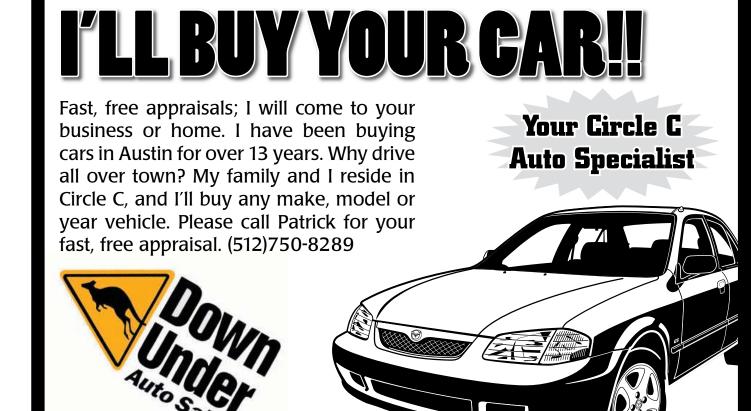

Reminder: If you need access from a major road or boulevard for a backyard project, you must get approval from the CCHOA and possibly the City of Austin in advance. These areas operate similarly to private property in that you need permission from the owners in advance of any access. Also, landscaping and other items located in these areas are regulated or owned by the CCHOA or the City of Austin. Please do not attempt to perform any maintenance in these areas. There are strict insurance and other requirements and you could put yourself or others at risk. Thank you for your help.

Clayton Principal Up for Challenge

Opening a new elementary school may be the definition of "controlled chaos". With only days to go before the unveiling of Circle

C's latest crown jewel, teachers and staff are feverishly piecing together the final touches. Right now it's a sea of computer cable, desks, library books and school supplies jockeying for position – and Doctor Dru Robinett is the one tasked with navigating it all.

"I don't consider this a challenge as much as I do an opportunity," said Robinett, a woman who is drawing upon her doctorate from the University of Texas and 16 years of experience as an educator

and administrator in the Houston, Round Rock and Austin school districts. "We have the good fortune of being part of something very special. We are creating history. It can be whatever we want it to be...but we are also asking ourselves, 'How do we want this to look from the eyes of child?""

Dr. Robinett is well aware of what's at stake. She lives in the Clayton attendance zone and two of her own children are set to take the journey along with her. She also knows that in spite of years of severe overcrowding and stressed facilities, Circle C parents and their kids have set a standard for academic excellence. "Mills and Kiker are good role models in how to collaborate with parents and the community at large. Parents have high expectations for their schools and we have high expectations for our kids. Meeting these expectations requires a good deal of time, energy, thought and commitment."

In such a close knit community, some may look at Clayton and see the makings of a rivalry and competition for volunteer time and resources, but Robinett says just the opposite has occurred. Teachers and parents from both Kiker and Mills gave countless hours helping with Clayton's staffing process and the formation of a Community Advisory Council. Others are pitching in to help coordinate an upcoming community open house and the formation of a strong PTA. The schools are also forming a unique partnership that will result in a pooling of resources and talent. Teachers will collaborate in their training and strategic planning; equipment will be shared and joint field trips are in the works.

View the Circle C Ranch Newsletter each month online at www.PEELinc.com "It's a huge investment," she said. "There's no way Clayton could have gotten off the ground without so many giving their time and energy."

Energy is going to be a valuable commodity, as Clayton is set to hit the ground running. AISD projects 529 students to be on hand for the first day of class, but Robinett expects the actual number to jump as high as 600. Current plans call for the school to start with six kindergarten, five first grade and four second grade classrooms filled close to capacity. Three classes of fourth graders and two groups of fifth graders are also expected.

A Community Open House, slated from 2-4 pm Sunday, Aug. 13 is an opportunity for Clayton students and their parents to preview the new facilities and gain critical information aimed at making the first day of school more enjoyable. Plans for picking up and dropping

off students will be addressed, but this is something sure to evolve over time. Robinett is urging patience while the school finds it's footing during in these early days.

Clayton is certainly an impressive facility. Surrounded by 14 acres of natural open space, it features 40 traditional

classrooms as well as top flight computer and science labs. Community volunteers are using grant money to establish an outdoor science lab to study the ecosystems of existing stock ponds and AISD is working with CCHOA on a proposed system of bike trails. Still, Robinett believes the school's future is only as strong as the character of the people it is built to serve.

"We've created a special connection between our location and the natural environment, but the best thing about Clayton is going to be the kids and their families who walk in that door August 15th."

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Circle C Landscape

As I am sitting down to write about landscaping, we are once again getting to the hottest and driest month of the year. Survival for plants, people and pets is the name of the game.

On the commons areas, we are doing very little replacement of materials due to the heat. That will start up again around September 15. We use August to clean up and detail, and keep the maintenance level going as things dry out and start to look pretty ragged. The strategy is to keep everything alive (it is probably not going to be at its prettiest) and look forward to either a surprise summer rainy period or cooler weather.

The water management plan for Circle C is working quite well. One of the critical elements of the Green Community Landscape Model is water conservation. A recent look at water usage and savings over the past few years validates the approach. Since 2003, the Association has increased the commons area by about 14%. This comes from the addition of boulevards that have been previously designated to be in the commons area when build out occurs, like Spruce Canyon and LaCrosse West. The water budget for 2003, 2004, and 2005 was \$130,000 each year. By good management practices and revised landscape planning, the Association has been under budget every year

(18% in 2003, 16% in 2004 and 6% in 2005 which was a drought year), for an average 13% water savings. Over the 3 year period, about \$41,000 in water savings has occurred despite our growing commons areas. Even though there are still a few areas to be added, the revised landscape plan uses less water and the developers doing the installations are required to use very targeted irrigation systems allowing us to maintain a lower watering schedule.

I have received some questions and requests lately about individual homeowner landscapes and what can be done to improve them, especially in the older areas of Circle C. Many of you have shrubs and plants that were installed many moons ago. At some point, you may want to consider just sending them to the great recycling bin. Shrubs that look overgrown and have thickened at the bottom and are pressing against your home may be at the end of their useful life. Also, most of the vegetation installed way back when was not all that environmentally friendly. I recently took a pretty radical approach and pulled out everything in my own front yard, except the native trees and the grass. Then, in keeping with the revised landscape model, I expanded the bed spaces dramatically, and eliminated a

good portion of the front yard sod. For the new beds, replacement with high quality garden soil was a must, so that came next. Last, installation of sustainable low water plants topped off with a good layer of mulch, completed the project. I left the original St. Augustine in for now, but when it's possible, I would like to replace it with a more drought tolerant grass like Pallisades zoysia. We are enjoying the new front yard, which is now about 70% native beds and 30% turfgrass. You are welcome to drive by and take a look (6426 Aden Lane) if you would like to get some ideas for your own front yard landscaping. There are quite a few homeowners who have done the same thing, and next month I hope to have a list of more homes for you to look at. I need to get in touch with the owners and make sure they would like to be on the list. You can also find basics about the Green Community Landscape Model, along with plant lists and other helpful tips on the Circle C HOA website at www.circlecranch. info. If your yard has been installed or renovated in a way that saves water, uses sustainable and drought tolerant plants and you wouldn't mind folks driving by to take a look, please e-mail me at shoover@ onr.com.

Adventure Racing (Or Why On Earth Would I Do That?)

The self styled, world's toughest expedition race ® and ultimate test of human endurance, Primal Quest, finished on July 4 in MOAB, Utah. This, the fourth annual incarnation of this race, sent coed teams of 4 across a grueling 450 mile course of trekking, mountaineering, horseback riding, canyoneering, mountain biking, whitewater swimming, paddling, including day and night navigation.

As I was unable to compete this year for various reasons, I watched my team mates avidly via the web. With GPS tracking, up to the minute links and video reports, the race is extremely well organized and it needs to be. The top team (Nike Powerblast) completed the course in 7 days, the slower ones in 9. Top teams from around the world compete for a hefty purse and lesser mortals can race alongside them in one of the most spectacular races on the planet. Of the field of 90 teams, many fail to complete the course through exhaustion, injury, self doubt or just poor team dynamics.

ESPN and ABC will be showing the race in their Fall season.

Interestingly, these races do not favor the younger element, as one perhaps might expect. Nike Powerblast, who have reigned supreme over adventure racing for several years, all age over 40 and one Austin based team who competed this year averaged a youthful 50

years old with one member being not only 56 but a grandfather and GREAT grandfather to boot. They finished the race in good shape. And you are too old for this, you say?

However, thankfully not all races are quite so grueling or quite such a self inflicted painfest.

Adventure Races are primarily designed to be immensely enjoyable, and indeed they are. Races can be as short as just a couple of hours, many of them are local and they come in all shapes and sizes. And not only for the athletes, either. Look at Muddy Buddy on the web for a great, fun 2 person run and ride race- nobody comes away from that race without a huge smile and it sells out quickly every year.

At the tail end of August there is a local race of about 12- 18 hours for coed teams of 4. Disciplines will include mountain biking, trekking and kayaking plus, as is common with adventure races, 'mystery events'. These last ones include everything from whizzing along zip lines through the treetops to physical or mental challenges. Fancy taking that challenge?

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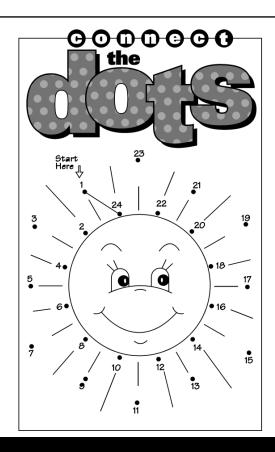
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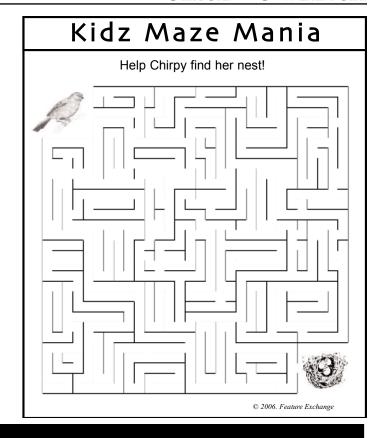
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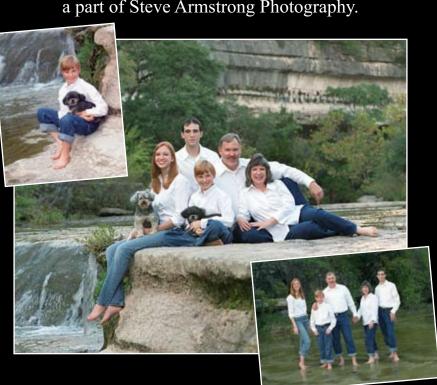


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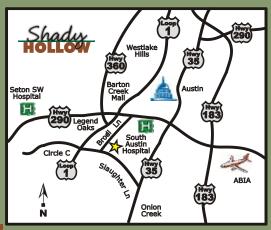
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Beat The Heat Before It Beats You

Keeping cool when the weather is hot

It's summertime and you head out for a run. Before you even finish the first mile, your body feels as though it might ignite from the heat.

It's not your imagination. Fifteen minutes into your run and your body temperature could be as high as 5° F above normal. If you were to continue at this pace, fatigue and heat illness would no doubt take over.

Strategies to protect yourself from heat illness

The above scenario doesn't have to happen. Drinking enough fluid, whether it be water or a sports drink, is imperative for exercising in hot or humid weather.

Maintenance of body fluids is essential to maintaining proper body temperature. Sweat dispels heat through your skin. If you let your body become dehydrated, you'll find it much more difficult to perform even the lightest of workouts.

But don't wait until you're thirsty to start replenishing those fluids. Chances are, by the time you actually feel thirsty, your body is well on its way to becoming severely dehydrated.

The following strategies will help you protect yourself from the onset of heat illness:

1. Hydration

Fluid replenishment before, during and after exercise is essential to avoid progressive dehydration. Always consume more fluids than you think you need before and after exercise, and strive to drink six to eight ounces of fluid every 15 to 20 minutes during exercise.

2. Exercise Intensity

You should probably reduce the intensity of your workout, particularly the first few times you are exposed to higher temperatures.

3. Temperature

Use the heat stress index table to determine the risk of exercising at various combinations of temperature and humidity. While a 90° F outdoor temp is relatively safe at 10 percent humidity, the heat stress of 90° F at 50 percent humidity is the equivalent of 96° F. When the heat stress index rises above 90° F, you may want to consider postponing your exercise session until later in the day. Or, plan ahead, and beat the day's heat by working out early in the morning.

4. Fitness

Physical training and heat acclimation can increase your blood volume, helping to regulate body temperature more effectively.

Interestingly, the acclimatization process can be completed in 7 to 14 days of repeated heat exposure. However, you must always continue to drink fluids before, during and after exercise.

5. Clothing

Wear minimal clothing to provide greater skin surface area for heat dissipation. Your clothing should be lightweight, loose fitting, light colored to reflect the sun's rays, and of a material that absorbs water, such as cotton.

6. Rest

Know when to say 'no' to exercise. Using common sense is your best bet for preventing heat stress when Mother Nature turns up the heat.



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Tomatoes-No Refrigeration Required

(NAPSA)-Did you know that one of the most popular vegetables in the United States is actually a fruit? Categorized by botanists as a fruit but eaten by consumers as a vegetable, tomatoes are appreciated for their combination of sweetness and acidity.

Any way you slice it, tomatoes are a delicious way to add nutrients to the diet. They are rich in vitamins A and C and are a good source of potassium. Tomatoes are also naturally low in sodium and contain no cholesterol.

Many people store tomatoes alongside other vegetables in their refrigerator's crisper drawer, but that's not the best place for them. Tomatoes should be stored at room temperature to maintain maximum flavor. Cool temperatures inside your refrigerator will stop the ripening process and begin to decrease the flavor and change the texture. Try storing your tomatoes in a decorative bowl on the counter.

Tomatoes and bananas help each other ripen quicker. Tomatoes and bananas emit a naturally occurring ripening gas called ethylene and when you store the two together they both ripen rapidly. If you need to ripen a tomato quickly, store it in a closed paper bag on the counter. The ethylene



gas speeds up the ripening process when confined around the fruit in a closed bag.

Although tomatoes are native to Central and South America, they are now eaten throughout the world and are an ingredient in countless recipes. Many people consider tomatoes an essential part of their vegetable gardens each summer and they are available at your local market year-round.

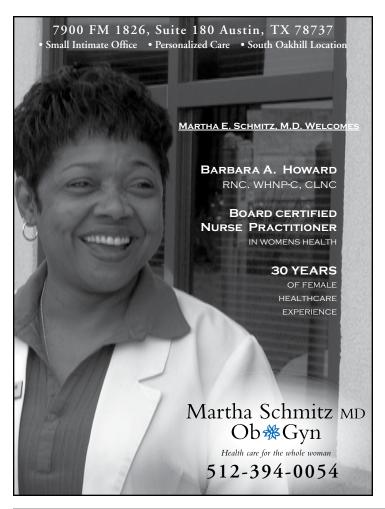


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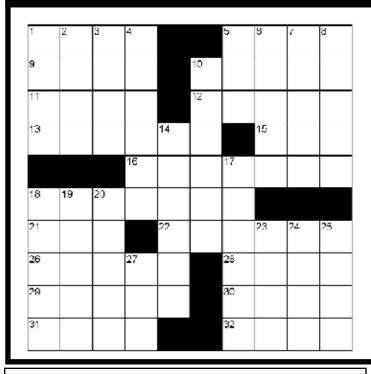
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Crossword Puzzle

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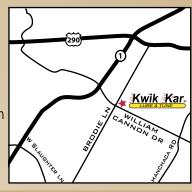
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Pack More Stuff

(NAPSA)-There are two kinds of travelers in the world: those who pack light and those who wish they had. The key is to include everything you need in as little space as possible.

Some of the most travel-savvy people in the world-travel agents-offer some helpful tips and techniques for efficient packing for all types of travel:

- Make a plan and stick to it. As an architect plans a building, so must you plan the contents of your suitcase. A packing list eliminates the panic of last-second packing, serves as a handy guide for repacking at the end of the trip and can be beneficial in the unfortunate event of lost or stolen luggage.
- Check the weather forecast of the destination and plan accordingly. Also, be sure to know the local traditions. - Travel kits are best for toiletries. Having a travel kit perpetually stocked in a waterproof case will save packing time before the trip and aggravation after arrival. Most personal toiletry items come in inexpensive travel sizes, so purchase these whenever you see them, so as not to arrive with a half-empty bottle of your favorite hair gel.
- Iron everything before packing. If it goes in crisp and clean, odds are more in its favor of coming out the same. Button all buttons and zip all zippers.
- Know when to fold 'em. Practice folding like it's done in clothing stores-that method is used for a reason. The better the fold, the fewer the creases.
- Try to think chronologically, placing the items to be worn first on the top. This will prevent rooting around the suitcase for a specific item

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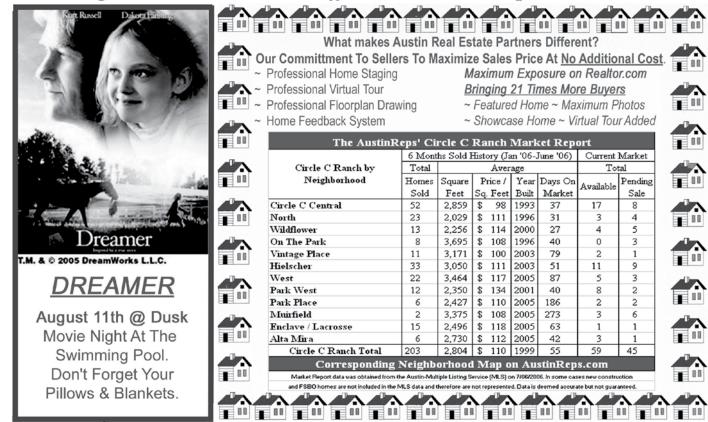
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
