Message From Your President And Board

This month we would like to discuss the road work being done on our streets in the Courtyard and address some of the questions raised by residents. First, the process used by the City of Austin (City) this time is different from past years, and the material is supposed to be more environmentally sensitive. However, you may have noticed areas where oil is oozing up above the gravel, and members have complained that this oil is being tracked into their homes by way of tires and shoes. In response, your Board of Directors has been in communication with the City's Department of Public Works, and the Department is aware of the problem. It indicated that it plans to sand these areas then sweep it clean. Second, as many of you have noticed, the cul-de-sacs are not finished. The cul-de-sacs require a different process due to the tight turning radius within the cul-de-sac. This work is scheduled to be done around September. We hope this answers some of your questions. In case you would like to call about the work schedule, the Department's Public Works telephone number is 974-8777.

As long as we're talking roads and transportation, here's an update on our DRIVE SLOWLY IN THE COURTYARD campaign. You may have read that the City is proposing to lower the speed limit in neighborhoods from 30 mph to 25 mph. Maybe some one at the City is reading our newsletter? Whatever the City's reason to lower neighborhood speed limits, we think we're on the right track with our DRIVE SLOWLY IN THE COURTYARD campaign. Thanks to all your cooperation, the campaign is really working. Keep up the good work!


