

A GENTLE REMINDER LOOSE PETS/BARKING DOGS GOOD DOGS NEED LEASHES TOO!!

Now that Fall is upon us and the weather will become pleasant, many of us will be outside more often and taking our pets walking with us. To most of us, our pets are members of our family. Sometimes we forget that our best friend won't snap at us but may snap at an unfamiliar face or another dog. Harris County law states that when your pet is outside the confines of your property, that pet (dog or cat) must be leashed and under the direct supervision of a responsible person.

It has been brought to our attention by many residents of Fairfield, that there has been an increase in the amount of dogs (and cats) running loose (being left outside of backyards and homes) and unusually prolonged and noisy barking. We have been receiving an increasing amount of "barking dog" calls. This problem can be easily solved by the purchase of a bark collar. They have become fairly reasonable in price and have been advised this is a humane way to control barking.

Again, some of us forget out pets are strangers to others and just by letting them out for a few minutes or longer can lead to a dangerous situation. As stated above, the Harris County Animal Control Ordinance governs all pets within Harris County, which includes the Fairfield Community. Please adhere to these laws as they have been put in place for the safety and well being of everyone in the community. No dog obeys 100% of the time and a leash goes a long way to comfort people who fear dogs. Dogs, even good dogs, can sense fear and aggression. They communicate with body language that often is not read until it's too late. If your dog truly stays at your side, putting on a leash should not cause an inconvenience to.

Harris County Animal Control has been notified of this problem and will consider any roaming animal a stray. Your pet could be picked up by Animal Control, taken to the Harris County Animal Control facility and, if your pet is not claimed within three days, it will be destroyed. (To claim a pet from this facility can be expensive and very sad and frustrating). The Harris County Deputies and Constables are also aware of this problem and may, at their discretion, issue citations to owners whose pets are roaming loose in the community or being walked without a leash. Ownership of animals is fairly quickly ascertained by talking with neighbors and the children who play outside.

Also, should your pet need to relieve itself, please be prepared to immediately clean up after your pet.





Dental Tip of the Month.

Fluoride, what is it all about?

Dear Friends,

Fluoride helps prevent tooth decay and even reverses early signs of tooth caries. How does it work? Fluoride makes the tooth structure stronger by mineralizing the tooth so the enamel is more resistant to acid attacks. Acid comes from the bacteria that breaks down the sugars taken from the food we eat. Repeated acid attacks can cause tooth decay.

Systemic fluorides are those that you ingest into the body and become incorporated into forming tooth structures. That is why kids, who have teeth forming, need more fluoride when they are young (so the fluoride can get incorporated into the tooth structure early).

As adults, I recommend having topical fluorides applied as frequently as possible. This strengthens and re-mineralizes the teeth and creates a tooth surface more resistant to decay. I can help you assess whether you are receiving adequate levels of fluoride.

If you want to know more about sources of fluoride and how much is good for you or your family, we'd be pleased to discuss this with you at your next appointment.

Did You Know?

Most scientists today believe the earth to be about 4.6 billion years old. The Bible, however, after tracing the genealogies to Adam, brings the date of the earth's creation to approximately 4,000 BC. Occasionally there are minor gaps in the Bible's genealogies, but even in the most extreme scenario, the planet's date of birth couldn't be more than 10,000 years according to Genesis. Obviously there is a great chasm between evolutionary thought and biblical documentation.

Though many believe the concept of a young earth is preposterous – adhered to only by mindless right-wing Christians – it must be noted that there is *nothing* truly scientific about an old earth philosophy. In evolutionary thought the earth is *assumed* to be old, and this bias is what determines most of the conclusions we read about and/or hear about regularly. It is important, however, to understand that most rock strata "dates" were actually assigned long before the first use of radioactive age estimating methods in 1911.

Consider the dating techniques. The first technique for date determination is the Carbon 14 method. At best this method is only useful for estimating the age of clothing, wood, and other non-fossilized organic materials that are less than 5,000 years old. The two dating methods used for rocks are the *potassium-argon* method and *uranium-lead* method. These methods observe a radioactive form of potassium that is found in minute quantities in some rocks. It disintegrates at an exact rate into calcium and argon. Similarly, the radioactive element uranium decomposes into lead and other elements. The speed of the disintegration process is measured when some of the material is ground up to determine the ratio of radioactive "parent" atoms to the decayed products. Unfortunately, age estimates are often inconclusive and contradictory. For example, following a volcanic eruption in Hawaii in 1949 new rocks were formed after the lava hardened. Even though these rocks were known to be recently formed rocks, they were dated at 3 to 10 billion years old! Recently, a new "foolproof" dating method was used on two lava flows in the Grand Canyon. What did it find? Only that young basalt rock at the *top* of the Canyon was said to be 270 million years *older* than ancient basalt rock at the Canyon's bottom.

Another case in point is the human population. Currently, the annual population growth rate is 2%. However, if man evolved 2 million years ago and increased at only 1/10 of the present rate there would be 5 *quintillion* people on the earth (currently 6 billion). Even if each two people produced, on the average, 2.6 children in their lifetime, the earth's population would double each year. If that process began in 4,000 BC, the earth's present population would come just short of 10 trillion! Man simply couldn't have originated that long ago. Population observations show that man is a *recent* creation of God just like Genesis teaches.

Remember that God created Adam as a man. He created trees, the sun, stars, and mountains with maturity. They were created with the *appearance* of age. Be careful adhering to evolution's "conclusions." All of their "facts" are negated with each new find.

PARENTS, EAT YOUR WORDS!

Are you pleased with your progress toward healthful nutrition and fitness habits but frustrated with your children's? Do you suspect that the lunches you send to school are traded or thrown away? Do you shudder at the sight of your pantry shelves displaying high-fat snacks and sugary cereals that you vowed you would never buy? Can you really win the battle against advertising, peer pressure and kids' love affairs with sugar and fat?

THE BAD NEWS AND THE GOOD NEWS

Kids today are fatter and less fit than previous generations. Between the mid-1960s and the late 1970s, obesity increased 54 percent among young children (ages six to 11) and 39 percent among adolescents (ages 12 to 17). Recent studies show that obesity has continued to increase into the '90s.

Food companies spend millions of dollars on television advertising to convince children that high-fat, high-sugar, processed foods are worth eating. Food is consumed because it's cool, fun or comes with a free toy rather than for its impact on health or even for its taste!

So what's a parent to do? Eat your words! The fact is that parents who have adopted a lifestyle that includes healthful foods and regular exercise are living role models for their children. We know that the behaviors children see most often at home are the ones they will be most likely to adopt for themselves and parents' efforts to promote healthy food habits do make a difference. The first step is to stop battling with your kids about food. You may need to slow the rate of change in your children's food choices and offer reasonable alternatives as you gradually reduce those highfat, high-sugar foods. Be sure to include some of their favorite foods in daily meals.

Much of nutrition is common sense. For

instance, stock the kitchen with a majority of healthy items, keeping in mind that kids want some of their favorite foods, which may be sweet and/or salty. Buy pretzels, which are low in fat, instead of greasy chips. Keep cut-up vegetables and readyto-eat mini-carrots in the refrigerator. Sprinkle air-popped popcorn with grated parmesan cheese instead of butter. A good way to get kids involved and committed to healthy eating habits is to involve them with the food shopping and preparation. There are lots of children's cookbooks on the market; select one that emphasizes ways to modify many favorite foods rather than eliminate them. Children who feel competent to select and prepare food will make more intelligent food choices.

BALANCE IS EVERYTHING

The key to keeping kids happy and healthy is to strike a balance between foods that are good for you and those that just taste good, between leisure or TV time and physical activity.

Which brings us to the other side of the healthy living equation. The most obvious impact of inactivity on kids is the strong association between the number of hours spent watching TV and the level of obesity among youngsters.

Make physical activity a family affair. Go for walks, fly kites, rollerblade around the neighborhood, play miniature golf or other sports. Anything that gets you moving together will no doubt be good for you, too.







Preheat oven to 350°F. In a medium bowl, combine flours, oats, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Stir with a fork to blend. Set aside.

Place butter and sugars in a large bowl; beat with a mixer at medium speed until well combined and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Add peanut butter and beat until blended. Add egg and egg white; beat until combined. Fold in peanuts and chocolate chips. Spread

Genetic Clues To Cardiomyopathy's Origins Revealed In Mice

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON -A genetic discovery sheds new light on the cause of cardiomyopathy and sudden death in young adults, which originates in the previously overlooked right ventricle of the heart, said a researcher at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) and Texas Children's Hospital (TCH) in Houston.

In a report that appears online today in the journal Circulation Research, Dr. Jeffrey Towbin, professor of pediatrics at BCM and chief of pediatric cardiology at TCH, reports that a study in mice identifies conclusively for the first time genetic origins of cardiomyopathy, one of the leading causes of sudden cardiac death in young adults.

"We are getting to the underlying cause of this disease," said Towbin, principal investigator of the study. "For the first time, we have taken a human disease gene and put it into an animal model so that we can study its mechanisms in greater detail."

Arrhythmogenic Right Ventricular Cardiomyopathy (ARVC) is a rare, progressive condition that causes diseased heart muscle and impairs cardiac function. In many cases, ARVC leads to fatigue, irregular heartbeat (arrhythmia), and, potentially, heart failure and sudden cardiac death.

In a previous study, Towbin and colleagues first identified mutations in the desmoplakin gene, which encodes a protein in the connecting junction between heart cells. In this study, funded by the National Institutes of Health and the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, the authors implanted a mutant human desmoplakin gene into mice, which resulted in the mice's cardiac integrity being compromised, leading to dilation of the right ventricle, buildup of scar and fatty tissue, and arrhythmia.

Towbin calls ARVC "underrecognized" in the United States primarily because of its relative newness and difficulty evaluating the right ventricle technically, which can lead to misdiagnosis and improper treatment. Statistics of its prevalence in the United States have yet to be determined, but in Italy the disease is known to be the leading cause of sudden cardiac death in otherwise healthy young adults.

"ARVC is underrecognized here in the United States because of the novelty of the disorder and the lack of advances in technology that assess the right ventricle," said Towbin. "But I predict that in the next several years this will be shown to be a key player in sudden cardiac death."

The new findings will help pediatric and adult cardiology experts better understand the root cause of ARVC and advance the care of patients with this specific abnormality, Towbin said.

"We now have the genetic ability – that is, making a diagnosis off of a blood test of the gene – to evaluate these patients from the perspective of the disease's origin," said Towbin. "Hopefully we will be able to engineer new targeted therapies on the basis of these findings."

Towbin's coauthors include first author Dr. Zhao Yang, of BCM, as well as contributors from Johns Hopkins University, University of Arizona, Harvard Medical School, and the University of Padua in Italy.






