Tips on Being a Good Neighbor!

BARK! BARK! BARK!

Driving through our streets, especially in the morning and late evening hours, gives you a good picture of how many dogs we have in our community. We could probably put on a pretty impressive dog show all on our own. As much as we love our dogs, however, sometimes they can be a nuisance. Barking dogs can drive neighbors crazy and, eventually, sour a friendly neighbor-to-neighbor relationship. In a community that has many zero lot lines, and thus very close neighbors, it can be a particularly irritating problem.


Many people want their dogs to bark and alert them when people come to the door. A few woofs is fine, but long periods of barking are a problem for everyone who can hear it. Be a good neighbor and have some compassion for your friends who live next door.

Experts suggest that you should teach your dog a "Quiet" command that will allow them to alert you to intruders, but also allow you (and neighbors) to have some peace and quiet.

The Quiet Command

To teach quiet, first you've got to get your dog to bark. Often the doorbell will do the job. Once he or she is barking, give the command "quiet." The second the dog stops barking, praise it and give it a treat. As with almost anything: practice, practice, practice is the key. Eventually, you should be able to get a response to your "quiet" command. At that point, begin waiting 5-10 seconds before giving the treat. Keep increasing the time the dog has to be quiet

before getting the treat. Next, alternate -- sometimes giving treats for "quiet" and sometimes giving praise. Before you know it, you'll have a dog who will stop barking on command. It's important to note that teaching things like "quiet" won't work in all situations on all dogs. Remember, identifying why your dog barks is the key to quieting him or her. If you aren't sure what's causing the barking, contact a qualified animal behaviorist for help. These tips come from the Oakland County Animal Care Center newsletter. 

24th Annual Austin Wooden Boat Show
