Dental Tip of the Month.

All Porcelain Crowns in the Molars, Just One Dentist's Opinion...

Dear Friends,

The technology in porcelain has led us to create almost life-like teeth.

In the front teeth, where people can see when you smile, I agree with getting all porcelain crowns placed.

However, in the molar region, even to this date, the best, longest lasting crowns are pure gold crowns. I agree, not many people want gold in their mouths, as a result, they have what we call porcelain fused to gold, so one gets the strength of the gold and beauty of a porcelain.

Is it better looking then being all porcelain and no gold – the answer is NO! However, it is far enough back in the mouth, that people won't notice much and you will have a longer lasting crown.

Disadvantage of an all porcelain crown is that you have to shave off twice as much tooth structure then you would with porcelain fused to gold. Already the molars are short for most people. Added to that, if you take off so much tooth structure, the only thing that will hold that crown is the cement. When cement will fail, the crown will fail.

Second disadvantage of an all porcelain crown is that it speeds up the wear process of the opposing natural enamel. Thus your teeth will wear out faster.

Lastly, porcelain as a material doesn't have any "give". It will break, but will not bend like gold would.

Did You Know?

The marrow found in human bones produce a variety of cells that defend against diseases. They recognize and attack germs of all kinds in those with strong immune systems. The AIDS virus, however, has the ability to seek out and kill these cells that prowl around through our blood and keep us healthy. And when the AIDS virus kills the good cells the body wastes away because its defense system is broken down.

This illustration serves as a picture to the words of Jesus in Matthew 5:13: "You are the salt of the earth, but if the salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is no longer good for anything except to be thrown out and trampled under people's feet." The immune system of the human body and its destruction by AIDS serves as a great illustration for Christians who are called to be the salt of the earth. Just as a body infested with the AIDS virus is doomed, so too is the world we live in plagued by the disease of sin (cf. Rom. 1:18–23).

Now since the Lord has not removed His people from this sinful planet and all of its corruption, we are therefore called to be the salt of the earth – the immune system for the world. But what does it mean that we are called "salt"? Here's a short list of what salt is and does:

- 1. Salt is a preservative that prevents rot (society and morality are rotting all around us).
- 2. Gargling with salt water soothes a sore throat (many hurting people out there in need of comforting words and teaching).
- 3. Salt gives flavor to food (when's the last time you spiced up an office conversation with a word from Jesus as opposed to gossip or a dirty joke?).
- 4. Salt causes thirst (do you know anyone thirsty for good news?).
- 5. Salt melts ice (know any cold hearts in need of a warm "hello" or pat on the back?).

Salt purifies (alkali, a form of salt, is the leading ingredient in soap, and soap cleanses).

It's important to note that Jesus did not call his people "the honey of the earth" or the "sugar of the earth." Sappy sweet Christianity is not what God called us to be, yet that is what it has become. Sugary and charming is what churches teach their audiences today, but that is not what Jesus taught. He called us to preserve the world with orthodox preaching, giving comfort to those who hurt, adding flavor to a bland society, saying things that cause people to want to hear more about Christ, preaching to cold and stony hearts in order to break them, and to clean up the society around us with bold proclamations of who Jesus is and what He requires of us.

Woodrow Wilson (president from 1913-21) told the story of a visit he paid to a barbershop illustrating the salt of the earth: "I was sitting in a barber chair when I became aware that a powerful personality had entered the room. A man had come quietly in upon the same errand as myself to have his hair cut and sat in the chair next to me. Every word the man uttered, though it was not in the least didactic, showed a personal interest in the man who was serving him. And before I got through with what was being done to me I was aware I had attended an evangelistic service, because Mr. D. L. Moody was in that chair. I purposely lingered in the room after he had left and noted the singular effect that his visit had brought upon the barbershop. They talked in undertones. They did not know his name, but they knew something had elevated their thoughts, and I felt that I left that place as I should have left a place of worship."

Unfortunately a lot of churches can be like this. There is religious language you don't understand. People are asked to do things that they have no context for. And guests are left feeling shut out and disregarded.

We have made a deliberate choice at Trinity Vineyard to be welcoming and understanding to our guests. Some churches target their entire services, from beginning to end, to their guests. If a guest doesn't like singing for 30 minutes, they don't do it. If a guest doesn't like a lot of bible teaching, they don't do it. At Trinity Vineyard, we don't take it quite that far.

going to come together and eat. Get Ready To Hit The Slopes

You don't have to wait for the snow to start falling to get ready for ski season. Start your training now and you'll be sailing past those other ski bums on your way down the mountain.

Dusting the competition or showing off to friends are not the only reasons to get in shape before ski season. Skiing is an activity that requires a variety of skills: strength, endurance, balance and coordination. Hit the slopes without developing these skills and you may be in for more than a little embarrassment - you might even hurt yourself.

Sports specific training

This is where sports-specific training comes in. Generally speaking, sports-specific training programs involve focusing on the various skills associated with a particular activity.

Depending on the sport, this may include health-related fitness components such as cardiorespiratory endurance, muscular strength and endurance, and flexibility.

A specific program may also take into account skill-related measures of fitness such as agility, balance, coordination, power, speed and reaction time. Most sports require a mixture of these components.

Skiing is a sport that relies heavily on skillrelated fitness. A traditional fitness program, which includes a combination of weight training and cardiovascular exercise, will only take you so far.

A specific training program to develop specific skills for skiing will take you from the peaks to the valleys in record time.

Get ready to ski

There are several ways to begin a sports-specific training program. The simplest way is to include several new exercises in your regular workout schedule.

For example, performing wall sits that require you to ''sit'' against a wall will help build up the isometric strength needed for the tuck position in skiing. Squats and lunges will build lower body strength for skiing tough terrain like moguls.

Exercises such as crunches to work your abdominals are essential in creating a solid "core" for balance and agility.

It is important to train your body to withstand and absorb the impact associated with skiing. Plyometric movements, such as hopping from side to side, develop muscle power and strength as well as improve agility.



Set up your own ski circuit

A great way to integrate these elements into your existing routine is to create a circuit training program, which involves rapidly moving from one exercise to the next. You can set up a circuit in any large room, or at your club's aerobic studio.

Be sure and place all of your stations before beginning your workout so you don't have to stop in the middle. Set a specific time limit for each exercise, as well as a set period of breaks between each station. Thirty seconds of work followed by 30 seconds of rest are common interval periods.

Then, simply turn up the music and make your way around the circuit. You might even want to create your own music tape with timed intervals of music for exercise and silence for rest periods.

Try these stations to help you gear up for the slopes: use the slide for lateral training, perform one-legged squats to develop balance and strength, and use a step-bench platform to improve power. Try catching a bean bag as it drops off your forearm to improve reaction times or bounce two tennis balls to improve coordination.

To improve agility, create your own slalom by running between cones. In sports-specific training, you are limited only by your imagination.







A Dish Without Onions Would Be A Crying Shame

(NAPSA)-Cooks who know their onions prefer storage onions for creating the most flavorful dishes.

Available in the fall and winter months, storage onions have earned their name because they can be stored longer-for one to three months. When shopping for a storage onion, look for bulbs with multiple layers of thick, papery skin free of spots or blemishes.

These onions are known to have a more intense flavor than fresh onions. However, when cooked slowly over low heat, storage onions mellow and become rich and savory.

Here's a tasty dish that incorporates sautéd storage onions in a savory frittata. This French-style omelet can be tossed together for a quick breakfast, brunch or light supper and is fancy enough for guests.

Frittata With Onion, Basil And Tomato

- 1 large or 2 small onions (about 2 cups)
- 3 tablespoons olive oil (divided)
- 1 cup fresh chopped or canned diced tomatoes*, drained
- $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped fresh basil
- 6 large eggs
- ¹/₄ cup grated Romano or Parmesan cheese

Cut onions into halves, place flat sides down and cut each half into narrow wedges. Heat 1 tablespoon oil in 9- or 10-inch skillet or sauté pan. Add onion and sauté 8 to 10 minutes until golden. Remove about one-third of the onion from pan and keep warm. Add drained tomatoes and all but about 1 tablespoon basil to pan and cook with onions 1 minute to heat. Beat eggs in bowl with fork. Add onion-tomato-basil mixture to eggs, stirring just to combine. Heat remaining 2 tablespoons oil in skillet. Pour egg mixture into hot skillet. Cover and cook over low heat until set, about 15 minutes. Top with reserved onions and basil; sprinkle with cheese. Let rest 2 or 3 minutes, then cut into wedges to serve. Makes 4 servings.



Nickel Allergies Are Itching To Come Out Of Hiding

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON - People with nickel allergies take precautions to stay itch-free, but a Baylor College of Medicine expert says nickel can be hiding in some unexpected places.

Nickel is a naturally occurring metal that is mixed with other metals to create an alloy. It's commonly used in necklace clasps, earring posts, and costume jewelry; but it's also used in other items like eyeglass frames or buttons.

"Most people only think to look out for reactions to jewelry," said Dr. Rajani Katta, associate professor of dermatology at BCM. "So they don't realize their nickel allergy caused the rash on their cheeks from their glasses."

Katta also said pant buttons can leave a rash on the stomach, but since it can take a day or two for a reaction, people might not associate the rash to what they were wearing.

Some other items where nickel can be found are zippers, snaps, and bra clasps.

Fortunately, there are ways to work around a nickel allergy. Katta suggests buying nickel-free products which include eyeglass frames and jewelry. She also said using a few layers of clear nail polish on a button close to the skin can prevent an allergic reaction.

"I have also seen some people sew patches to cover an exposed clasp or zipper," Katta said.



While a rash from a nickel allergy is rarely severe, possible scarring could occur if exposure continues and the effected area is not treated.

Nickel allergies can appear at any age so being aware of what touched the skin before a reaction could help you deduce where this allergen can be hiding. Anything metallic can have the potential to contain nickel.

The Truth About Mucus

(NAPSA)-It starts with a harmless little sniffle, then a constant trickle from your kid's nose, and before you know it, your child is coughing and sneezing and generally miserable. It's cold season, so you better get used to all that extra mucus in his nose and chest!

Believe it or not, mucus is actually good for the body and helps protect it. In fact, the body produces up to four cups of mucus a day. The nose continually produces mucus so it can moisten and clean the nasal membranes, humidify the air in the nose and fight infection. Those hard things in your kid's nose? Mucus that has dried and hardened around dust and other particles that try to sneak into his body through his nose.

Allergies and infections can make the body produce too much mucus. Too much slow-moving mucus can trigger coughs, sore throats, a husky voice and bad breath. When this happens, it's time to break up the mucus and move it out of the bronchial passageways.

So what can you do to provide relief when Junior has too much mucus in his chest and nose?

• Have him (or help him) blow his nose, which is the best way to get rid of mucus. For chil-

dren under the age of 2, use a bulb syringe to suck mucus out of the nose.

- Give him plenty of liquids, which help thin out the mucus. Hot liquids soothe coughs and sore throats while also clearing mucus.
- Think tropical! An enzyme in pineapple is believed to thin mucus. If he likes spicy food, chili peppers also have been known to break up mucus and act as a decongestant.

- Make sure he gets exercise. Physical activity can loosen mucus in the respiratory system.
- Use humidifiers, which help add moisture to the air and ease the flow of air through nasal and breathing passages. Be sure to clean your humidifier at least once a week to prevent the growth of bacteria.
- Give him an expectorant to loosen and thin out the mucus so he can cough more productively. A new form of expectorant for kids offers parents a whole new way to help the medicine go down, and provides fast relief from chest congestion. Mucinex(r) Mini-Melts(tm) are quick-melting granules that taste good and are easy for children to swallow.
- Give him nonprescription cold remedies, including decongestants and cough suppressants. The medicine won't prevent or shorten the length of the cold, but it can provide relief from some of the symptoms.

Eat Less, Live Longer?

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON-The fountain of youth may not be a fountain after all. Simply reducing caloric intake may help you lead a longer and healthier life.

Dr. William Wong, professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine's USDA Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston, was awarded a \$2.2 million grant from the National Institute of Aging to help determine if a reduction of calories can increase longevity and decrease the risk of chronic disease. Previous animal studies suggest this is the case.

Wong's lab will serve as the central doubly labeled water lab to support the NIA's Comprehensive Assessment of Long-term Effects of Reducing Intake of Energy, or CALERIE, study.

Doubly labeled water is a non-invasive way to estimate energy expenditure under free-living conditions, said Wong also co-director of the Obesity Center at Texas Children's Hospital. Participants drink the labeled water and return to their daily routine. Researchers label the water with two non-radioactive naturally-occurring isotopes -deuterium, a heavier isotope of hydrogen, and oxygen-18, a heavier isotope of oxygen. The isotopes disappear at different rates over time because in addition to being eliminated from the body in the form of water, the oxygen-18 is also being eliminated from the body as it exchanges with carbon dioxide in the lungs. By then measuring the remaining levels of the isotopes in the urine, energy expenditure can be determined.

This method has been used safely in premature babies, newborns, children, adolescents, pregnant women and nursing mothers, said Wong.

The study will help determine the effects of a 25 percent caloric restriction on the physiology and chronic disease risk of normal weight adults. The study's findings will have important implications including dealing with the current obesity epidemic and the possible prevention of many age-related chronic diseases.

The phase 2 CALERIE clinical trial will study the effects of cutting calorie consumption by one-fourth. Wong's lab will use the doubly labeled water method to establish the participant's caloric need, which will then be decreased by 25 percent in participants assigned to the treatment group.

The study will follow two groups for two years with participants coming in periodically for follow-up doubly labeled water studies. "The follow-up visits of doubly labeled water studies are used to monitor compliance and to monitor the level of caloric restriction achieved by the study participants," said Wong. "The visits will also provide an additional measure on potential changes in body composition during the treatment period."


