Architectural Control News

Recently some questions have arisen concerning the guidelines regarding non-permanent yard appurtenances (including, but not limited to: yard art, fountains, planters, etc.) for our homes here in Wortham Villages. The Architectural Control Committee and the Wortham HOA Board of Directors have developed some general guidelines to clear up these questions. This newsletter article will serve to communicate these guidelines. These guidelines are general in nature and have been developed for consistency; however, all structures must continue to be submitted with the proper Request for Home Improvements and Modifications Form, available through Crest Management or on the worthamweb.org website for written approval by the Architectural Control Committee. General guidelines include:

- 1. No more than two (2) non-permanent appurtenances are allowed per yard
- 2. All appurtenances must be less than three (3) feet tall
- 3. All appurtenances must be located within a plant bed no more than ten (10) feet from the house or garage
- 4. All fountains must be in working order.

All submissions will be approved on a case-by-case basis at the discretion of the Architectural Control Committee. Contact Crest Management for any questions.

That last word is the most important. If every swimmer is not having fun, then we are not doing our job. Every swimmer is an individual as well as an important part of the team. EVERY swimmer makes a difference. Every family member also makes a difference. Yes, this is an activity for the whole family. Swim Team is the single largest community activity in the neighborhood. We all have fun. Don't you want your family to be a part of that?

I hear many different reasons why someone can't swim for the Whitesharks - most of them just don't hold water (pun intended). Here are some of the reasons I hear the most, and my response:

NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH NEWS

I have a lot of news to report to you that I hope will interest all residents. At the February 6 Block Captains meeting we had a guest speaker from the Harris County Sheriff's Office. Deputy Janet Brown spoke on the RAD (Rape Aggression Defense) program. This is a program of realistic, self-defense tactics and techniques.

It is a comprehensive course for women that begins with awareness, prevention, risk reduction and avoidance, while progressing on to the basics of hands-on defense training. RAD is not a Martial Arts program. The courses are taught by certified RAD Instructors and provide you with a workbook/reference manual. This manual outlines the entire Physical Defense Program for reference and continuous personal growth. It is dedicated to teaching women defensive concepts and techniques against types of assault, by utilizing easy, effective and proven self-defense. The program is open to women starting at age 13 and does not have an ending age. Women in their 60's and 70's have enrolled. To find out more or to enroll, you may contact Deputy Brown at 281-647-9371 or 713-225-3273. The courses are held at various locations that have the capacity to hold 30 women plus the instructors.


Another topic that she discussed was the Harris County Juvenile Curfew Ordinance. A juvenile under the age of 17 must not be out between Midnight and 6 A.M., seven days a week. If a Deputy stops a juvenile he or she may be picked up and detained until a parent or guardian is notified. This is a Class C Misdemeanor with up to a

\$500 fine. The exceptions are: Accompanied by parent, guardian or custodian; traveling to or from employment; participating or traveling to or from a school or church activity or a government, civic or non-profit organization that takes responsibility; on sidewalk of juvenile's residence or sidewalk of next door neighbor, if neighbor does not complain; involved in an emergency; in a vehicle or aircraft involved in interstate travel with consent of parent, guardian or custodian; and lastly married or previously married or had minority removed by a court of competent jurisdiction.

The last topic was Home Security. A Deputy would come to your home to inspect for locks on windows, dead bots, etc. that could save the homeowner 5% to 10%

on their homeowners policy. To contact a Deputy for this service you may call Deputy Brown at 281-647-9371 or the District V storefront at 281-290-2100

We were fortunate to have Deputy Brown speak with us and answer all questions. We received helpful information that will benefit our community.

I have enrolled in the Citizen's Police Academy along with my husband to learn more about the duties of a Deputy. This opportunity was presented to me by the Harris County Sheriff's Office. It is open to all citizens after application and a back-ground check. It is an 11 week program for approximately 3 hours 1 night each week. Classes began Feb. 1 with an introduction to various Deputies, Sergeants and Captains. Last week a class was taught by Deputy Faas on the subject of Penal Code and Case Law. It was very interesting to learn about Misdemeanors and Felony from a professional instructor. He made to class fun and well as the serious side of such penalties that some people face. This coming week the topic will be" Patrol procedures and the Truth about Tasers". I will keep you informed.

Our community continues to be a safe place to live, work and play with very little incidents that are reported. To the right you will find a copy of that list for the month of January.




