Letter from the Board of Directors

The Association hosted its' annual homeowners meeting March 28th and held an election for three board of directors, a bylaw change and a proposed special assessment. The Board recommended the following amendment to allow all interested, qualified members of the association to be official nominees for open Board seats. The current bylaws require the Nominating Committee to create the list of official nominees at its discretion. They do not set minimum requirements, nor do they say how the Nominating Committee should use its discretion. This amendment sets explicit minimum requirements to become an official nominee. The amendment to the bylaws passed. There were 876,153 in favor and 126,564 opposed.

The proposed \$150 special assessment was specifically earmarked to be used towards major repairs and renovations to the Swim Center facility, the most visible of which will be the new Baby Pool. Remaining funds, if any, were to go towards other swim center development or improvement. The proposed special assessment failed. There were 749,442 in favor and 2,870,380 opposed.

Votes are based on your home's previous year's property value, so if you have a \$300,000 home, you have 3000 votes.

Deed Restriction Update

We are still in the process of driving the entire neighborhood to look for lawn violations. Violations may include, but are not limited to: excessive weeds, areas of no turf, dead shrubs and/or trees, yard art, grass that is not edged or mowed and areas of dead grass. We encourage each of you to evaluate your lawn now so that you have time to re-sod if needed before the heat of summer. We are required to send notification of deed restriction violations via certified mail and we also send regular mail. If you receive a deed restriction violation notice and would like to speak to us about your plans for improvement, please contact the HOA office at 288-8663. It's impossible to know everyone's individual situation, so we appreciate communication from you. We also recommend that you review the architectural control committee's landscape design guidelines located within this newsletter.

If you have a deed restriction to report, you may email us the specific address at info@circlecranch.info or give us a call at 288-8663. Violations that are reported are generally checked with 2 business days and if we are able to confirm a violation, we will begin the deed restriction process (which you can access on the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/documents/AssociationDocuments/DeedRestrictions/CCHOA-DeedRestrictionPolicy2003.pdf.

Also, please look for a separate article in the newsletter regarding Community Service opportunities. Names that are collected will be listed in the newsletter and given as reference to those who may have received a deed restriction violation notice and are unable to do the work themselves.

Unauthorized trash dumping

It has come to our attention that some of the landscape companies servicing the residents in our community are dumping their bagged clippings at other resident's homes. You may not be aware this happening so please be sure to speak to your landscape provider and let them know this is NOT okay.

Trash Can and Recycling Containers Should Be Hidden From View

The Circle C Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions clearly state that trash cans and recycle bins should be stored Out of View from the street. Please be sure your trash can and recycling container are hidden.



Policy on Commons Area Fencing

Created May 2004 • Amended January 2007

The fencing which faces any commons area of the CCHOA is subject to review by the Architectural Control Committee prior to the establishment of any new subdivision and prior to any subsequent modifications. These areas include Escarpment Boulevard, Barstow Avenue, South Bay Lane and sections of La Crosse Avenue. Height, location, material and construction must be reviewed and approved. Fencing of front yards in general will not be approved. Additionally, City of Austin fence ordinances may apply.

Wooden Fencing. All fence repair including picket replacement, fence straightening, installation of new posts and new pickets will be the sole responsibility of the homeowner. The homeowner must follow the Design Guidelines as written by the Architectural Control Committee for fencing. Any change in design, material and/or color must be submitted to the Architectural Control Committee for approval.

Masonry Fencing: Drainage repairs and aesthetic repairs to the exterior side (side facing the commons areas) of masonry walls will be the responsibility of the CCHOA.

In the event of an accident which causes damage to a fence that abuts the commons area fence, the CCHOA will assist the homeowner in locating any person who caused the accident to happen through police department records or reports by other homeowners. The CCHOA encourages all homeowners in this situation to pursue an insurance liability claim against the person or persons responsible for the damage.



Circle C Landscape Update

As part of the overall long term landscape plan for Circle C Ranch, the CCHOA Board adopted guidelines and priorities for tree care for the vast numbers of trees that are on the commons areas.

The guidelines include providing annual funding for tree care and maintenance in order to preserve the health of the trees. The goal of the program is to systematically tag and survey all trees, set priorities for regular pruning, identify all landmark trees, prevent disease, ensure that young trees are pruned in a timely fashion to secure good growth habits.

For 2006, the following specific areas were identified and have been treated by a certified arborist.

- A) Wildflower Park. Tag, survey, prune all trees in the park area. Provide oak wilt fungicide treatment for all live oaks.
- B) Prune all young live oak trees on Escarpment, north of the bridge to Slaughter.
- C) Identify and prioritize landmark trees (trees 19" caliper and above). Provide a health prune for these trees once priority list is made
- D) Prune all trees at the Circle C Swim Center
- E) Fertilize water oaks on Escarpment medians.

In addition to the tree program, Circle C Landscape is moving forward on the approved commons areas 2007 improvements. Native plant installations have been completed in Circle C North, Vintage Place, Eclipse, Dahlgreen, and on Escarpment. The next phase of improvements will be the installation of decorative and understory trees on Escarpment.

What about the turfgrass?

One of the goals of the long term improvement plan for landscaped areas is to reduce the turf areas and restore the turf in weedy areas.

Most of the older commons areas boulevards such as Slaughter Lane and Escarpment were installed with hydromulched Bermuda grass. As the trees reached maturity, much of this grass died out due to excessive shade in addition to being over treated with chemicals. St. Augustine grass migrated from the residential neighborhoods to the commons areas. With the variety of conditions, weeds have infiltrated these mixed areas.

The long term plan utilizes native grasses and perennial beds to reduce the amount of turf area needed. Then the bad grass/weeds are killed out, organic top soil is added, and new sod has been laid down. The areas along LaCrosse from Escarpment to Dahlgreen have received this treatment, along with areas at the swim center plaza and terraces and newer areas in Circle C West. The preferred sod is Pallisades zoysia. These areas have responded well to lower water and fertilizer usage. Eventually, over a number of years, all turf areas will be brought up to this standard.

Design Guidelines for Front Yard Landscapes

Submitted by the Architectural Control Committee

Circle C residents are welcome to improve their existing landscapes through plant, shrub and tree enhancements, bed edging, additional flower beds, or turf replacement without going through the Architectural Review Committee approval.

The following items require approval from the ACC:

- -- <u>hardscape in the front yards</u>, including but not limited to walls, fences, fountains, patios. No vertical hardscape greater than 18" in height will be approved.
- -- transition to a native landscape in front yards. The ACC encourages drought tolerant plantings and limited turf area. However, landscapes that dramatically change from the original landscape design must go through the approval process. A conceptual plan showing bed locations, turf locations and a list of plants must be provided to the committee.

The following items will be considered in reviewing a plan:

- amount of turf area. Turf can be limited but must be present next to sidewalk and driveway edges and used to define bed areas
- landscape designs must include evergreen shrubs as well as perennial and deciduous plants and wildflowers. Plants beds must be designed to enhance and give order to a front yard landscape
- it is important that landscape designs retain a Texas Hill Country feel, rather than a desert Southwest design. Natural colored gravel (excluding pea gravel) and decomposed granite may be used in limited amounts for paths or accents. They may not replace mulch in bed areas.
- all designs must be able to be maintained in a way that
 is compatible with traditional yards in the neighborhood.
 Perennials must be pruned at the appropriate times, shrubs
 must be trimmed, wildflower areas may cycle through the
 wildflower planting and reseeding times, and then must be
 trimmed appropriately.
- beds should be mulched to retain moisture and control weeds.
 Mulch should be between 2" and 3" in depth, and updated as needed.
- flower pots must integrate into the overall design and be well maintained. Empty pots and dead vegetation must be removed.

Prohibited elements in front yard design:

- Yard Art. Non-vegetative elements must be compatible and an integral part of the landscape design. Excessive yard art of random objects is prohibited, including but not limited to statuary, flags, gazing ballls, birdbaths. Residents are encouraged to put yard art in the back yard.
- Artificial Flowers, silk flowers, artificial flower baskets.
- Recycled glass, large fountains, aluminum lawn chairs and loungers.



On page 8 of the April issue of the Circle C newsletter, Circle C HOA printed its Circle C Design Guidelines for Front Yard Landscapes. These rules also apply to Park West residents and prohibit: statuary, flags, gazing balls, birdbaths, artificial flowers, and aluminum lawn furniture. Park West residents with complaints about such items in neighbor's yards should call the Circle C HOA management office at 288-8663. Similar calls concerning parked boats, ATVs, and junk cars have been effective with the good folks in the Circle C office taking quick action. The Circle C office also

takes complaints on residents whose trash cans spend too much time in the street.

Park West had no reported vehicular accidents in 2006, but unfortunately, one accident has already occurred this year. A resident backed into a car parked on the street, thereby becoming our fourth reported vehicular accident since February 2005. All accidents have involved parked cars. If you park on our Park West streets, you are parking on our commonly owned streets; in so doing, you increase your chances of being in an accident, you may endanger pedestrians, and you impede emergency vehicles. For the sake of your fellow neighbors, please park in your driveway or your garage.

Both sets of Park West gates are now closed 24/7. We do keep one entry gate open during traditional Sunday Open House periods from 1:00-3:00 PM and during scheduled hours for the Circle C Wide Garage Sale. During a power outage, the entry gates open automatically and remain open until power is restored.

In August 2006, we reported that PW board members met with Pedernales Electric and Circle C Ranch officials to discuss routing of a new backup underground power line from Park West Pass, east along La Crosse and north along Escarpment. The work is now complete near the property walls on the 'outside' (on Circle C HOA common area property). The new line replaces an original underground line that traveled under Tasajillo Trail. As of this writing, we are waiting for Pedernales to seed the grass.

That Green Space with the Fence Around It

Circle C has a number of fenced in, posted, environmentally critical areas. They add attractive patches of wild greenery to our neighborhoods. The fences and postings are required because these areas contain karsts—small, open caves that carry rainwater directly into the Edwards Aquifer. It can be difficult, certainly, to explain to children that these tempting, little forests are not playgrounds, but an informed explanation will be more than worth the effort.

Although the environmental issues involved are complex, elementary school students are more than capable of dealing with them. Most of the concepts are part of the Austin Independent School District curriculum for 5th grade science, and some of the most appealing karst-related sites on the Internet were created by teachers and grade school students. It's a great area for study and discussion because the science of karst systems is so fascinating and various, involving chemistry, physics, geography, geology, hydrology and biology.

Unlike the rainwater in your yard, which percolates though layers of sand and rock for years and is naturally filtered before it reaches the underground water supply, water in karsts moves quickly, without being filtered at all. Last night's rainfall could reach Barton Springs in a matter of days. Sadly, any pollutant would reach the Springs just as quickly.

Water created the karsts. Rainwater and ground water that were slightly acidic dissolved the limestone and carved out the karsts' underground caves and streams over millions of years. When the aquifer, including the karst on your block, was being formed, dinosaurs, like the ones in the statues in Zilker Park, roamed across central Texas. The animal and plant biology of the Austin karst system is equally amazing. It is home for forty unique and eight additional species, among them the Texas blind salamander.

Despite their age, karsts are fragile. Austin's karst system is one of the ten most endangered in the world. It is threatened by major problems like urban sprawl, industrialization, drought and excessive ground water use, but individual karst features, like ours, can be endangered by something as simple as debris. If surface openings become clogged, not only does the surface water not reach the aquifer, whole sub-surface areas can collapse into deep sink holes.







Stop Colon Cancer in Minutes

Baylor College of Medicine

In just a few minutes, it can help stop colon cancer before it begins.

Getting screened regularly is the most effective way of preventing this "silent" but deadly disease, say doctors at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in Houston.

"There are several screening options, but a colonoscopy is the most sensitive and accurate way to find precancerous growths," said Dr. Waqar Qureshi, associate professor of medicine and chief of endoscopy at BCM. "Colon cancer has no warning signs and without screening you won't know you have it until it's too late."

By the time symptoms such as rectal bleeding, abdominal pain, weight loss, or anemia occur, the cancer has more than likely spread beyond the point of being cured. Screening, on the other hand, can catch precancerous growths at a time when life saving treatments are still effective.

During a colonoscopy, a thin, flexible device called a colonoscope is used to view the colon. A small video camera helps doctors look for abnormalities such as polyps, which are growths found on the colon wall. Almost all instances of colon cancer begin as polyps, which are easily removed during a colonoscopy.

"It takes a polyp about six to eight years to turn into a cancer," Qureshi said. "That is a huge window for polyps to be detected."

Colonoscopy screening should take place every ten years starting at age 50. If colon cancer runs in a family, testing should begin earlier in age and be preformed more often.

Colonoscopies take about twenty minutes and, since sedation is used, they are painless. Qureshi said most patients tell him they don't remember the procedure.

"There isn't an excuse to not have a colonoscopy," Quershi said. "It is a quick, painless, and life saving procedure."

A proper diet has been shown to lower the risk of colon cancer. Qureshi suggests eating more fruits, vegetables and diets low in saturated fat. Adding calcium supplements to your daily routine can also help.

"Improving what you eat is always good, but nothing can replace regular colonoscopy screenings." Qureshi said. "It is a routine procedure, and it can save your life."



With Seasonal Allergies, The 'Eyes' Have It

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON – Red, itchy, swollen eyes don't have to keep you from enjoying the season, say doctors at Baylor College of Medicine (BCM) in Houston.

"The same pollen that causes nasal allergies also causes eye allergies," said Dr. Yvonne I. Chu, assistant professor of ophthalmology at BCM. "Like in the nasal mucosa, when allergens such as pollen touch the ocular surface, the conjunctiva, mast cells release histamine which causes many symptoms. However, the two allergies can have different issues that can appear separately."

Seasonal allergic conjunctivitis, eye allergies that begin to show up this time of year, can cause the eyes to become red and irritated. Symptoms include itching, swollen eyes along with burning, tearing, and discomfort.

"Rubbing your eyes is a natural reaction, but it's only going to make matters worse," Chu said. "Prevention is the key, keep allergens from getting into the eye in the first place.

Chu recommends keeping track of pollen counts and staying indoors if too much pollen is in the air. Using an air filter and keeping windows closed can also help reduce allergens indoors.

Because many of the allergens that trigger eye allergies are airborne, the following steps can be taken to relieve unavoidable seasonal allergy symptoms that pop up:

- Use over-the-counter artificial tears to dilute and flush out allergens from the eyes. This will also relieve some of the itching and redness.
- Apply a cold compress to the eyes to ease discomfort and reduce puffiness.
- Over-the-counter antihistamines that are designed to help nasal allergies can also help treat eye allergies.
- For more severe seasonal allergic conjunctivitis cases, an ophthalmologist can prescribe eye drops such as mast cell stabilizers and topical antihistamines which block histamines from being released.

Histamines are derived from an amino acid and once released; it increases the blood flow to areas that are injured or to areas where a foreign substance has entered the body. In the case of allergies, histamines kick in when materials such as pollen or ragweed touch the surface of the eye.

Don't let this time of year get you irritated: preventative measures and topical treatments can help allergy sufferers get the "spring" back in their step.

Fit Facts

Bike + Mountains = Excitement And Challenge

Tired of paved roads? Want to go where there aren't any speed limits? If you answered yes, then your vehicle of choice could very well be a mountain bike. Ever since a group of friends took a fast-paced ride down a steep incline in Northern California, mountain biking has been an exciting challenge to offroad riders.

Its inclusion as an event in the 1996 Olympics confirmed what riders already know: Mountain biking is one of the fastest growing sports in the world, both in popularity and participation.

If you've never been on a mountain bike you might wonder what all the fuss is about. Many riders say it's the freedom. After all, destinations are unlimited on these machines built for rough terrain.

THE RIGHT EQUIPMENT

Mountain bikes are sturdier than your average 10-speed or hybrid bicycle so they can withstand rough roads. They have wide tires that grip the trail, and cantilever brakes, similar to those found on a motorcycle.

When purchasing a mountain bike, be sure that it isn't too large. You should always be able to put a foot on the ground to steady yourself. A helmet is a must, and knee and elbow pads are sure-fire scar preventers.

YOUR BODY ON A BIKE

Riding a bike is one of the best cardiovascular exercises around. Not only does it provide an aerobic workout, but it strengthens the large muscles of the lower body, including the thighs, hips and buttocks, without putting a lot of stress on the joints. The upper body and arms come into play when climbing hills.

Always warm up before you begin your ride. Pedal in a low gear over flat terrain until you begin to sweat or feel warm.

This usually takes about five to 10 minutes. And don't neglect to cool down when you come to the end of your ride. Gradually lowering your heart rate can help prevent the pooling of lactic acid in the muscles. Again, pedal slowly in a low gear.



ON THE TRAIL

Practice makes perfect isn't a cliché when it comes to handling a mountain bike. Once you start heading up hills and mountains and over rocks and steep falls, you'll need to rely on your instincts, which, if they don't come naturally, develop through practice.

One of the first things to do is to get a feel for how the brakes work. The front brake on a mountain bike usually has more power than the back, and pulling it alone may send you flying over the handlebars. Practice quick stops before you hit the trail so you can feel how your weight may affect how you stop. Cantilever brakes are stronger than those on other bikes, allowing riders to control factors such as their rate of decline. When descending a hill, lightly squeeze and release the brakes - a technique called feathering - to prevent the wheels from locking.

Change gears as it becomes necessary in order to keep a steady cadence. Use a low gear when you need power, and a high gear when you want speed.

Climbing requires a shift in your weight that will control the tires' grip on the ground. Short, steep hills may require out-of-the-seat pedaling to garner more power.

If you try this on a long climb, however, you'll likely tire before you reach the top. Shift your weight forward, off the seat if necessary, to gain the power you need.

GET PEDALING

You can obtain information about trails in your area from your local library or mountain-biking group. The sooner you start pedaling, the sooner you can test your limits those set by both your body and your mind.

Spring rains beg the question: Is the drought over?

It's raining again. Lake Travis is up. The ground is saturated. Springs are flowing. Burn bans and watering restrictions are being lifted.

So is the drought finally over?

Experts at LCRA agree that the heavy March rains certainly put a dent in the drought that has afflicted much of Central Texas for more than two years. But they point out that drought conditions still linger in the Hill Country, which is still recovering from a two-year rainfall deficit of more than 20 inches. And they caution that the wet weather may only be providing a temporary respite to drought conditions, as happened during the record drought of the 1940s and '50s.

Austin, downstream basin generally free of drought

For those folks living east of Interstate 35, "there's certainly no question that the drought has ended," said Bob Rose, LCRA chief meteorologist. Austin and downstream communities have enjoyed the heaviest of the

rains that have been falling intermittently in the basin since late December.

On the other side of the Interstate, the Hill Country benefited from rains of up to 4 inches or more during March, which poured more than 100 billion gallons of water into lakes Travis and Buchanan – almost enough to fill all four of the smaller Highland Lakes (Inks, LBJ, Marble Falls and Austin) twice.

The rains and resulting runoff have raised Lake Travis by more than 20 feet to an April 5 elevation of 667.2 feet above mean sea level (msl), its highest elevation since November 2005.

As of April 5, lakes Travis and Buchanan combined were more than 70 percent full, holding 1.4 million acre-feet, or almost 466 billion gallons – a 32 percent increase from a month earlier.

The prospect for additional rains is good, Rose said, with the National Weather Service's latest outlook calling for above-average rains through the rest of April

Drought conditions linger in Hill Country

But effects of the two-year drought linger. Most of the rains fell in the Lake Travis watershed, so that the March rains and runoff resulted in Lake Buchanan rising only a little more than 4 feet, as opposed to the 20-foot rise on Travis. Both lakes are still below their average elevations for this time of year – more than 4 feet for Travis, almost 9 for Buchanan.

Even with the outlook for above-average April rains, the region continues to transition from a wet "El Nino" weather pattern to a drier "La Nina" pattern, Rose said.

Heavy rains fell during Drought of Record

And historical precedent indicates that heavy rains are no guarantee of an end to long-term drought. The best example occurred during the decade-long Drought of Record during the 1940's and '50s that dropped Lake Travis to its all-time low of 614.2 feet msl, almost 70 feet below its full elevation.

On Sept. 10, 1952, rains of up to 15 inches throughout the Hill Country caused Lake Travis to rise by 55 feet within a 16-hour period. Continued rains pushed Travis above its full elevation of 681 feet msl by January 1953

But the drought, temporarily vanquished by the rains, returned in full force within a couple of years. Many long-time residents recall 1955 and 1956 as the driest conditions they ever encountered. In spring 1957 massive rains and floods broke the decade-long drought for good.

While the spring rains have eased the prospect of mandatory water restrictions later this summer, LCRA continues to encourage basin residents to use water wisely. Check the Water IO Web site at www.waterig.org on tips on how you can save water and money without crimping your lifestyle.

A Charlotte That's A Peach Of A Fine Dessert

(NAPSA)-Here's a fresh approach to using canned peaches as part of a memorable dessert.

Using canned peaches may help a cook cut down on preparation time, but it won't cut down on nutrition or taste.

California Peach Charlotte

Ingredients:

- 3 (15-oz.) cans California Cling Peach slices, well drained (reserve 5 slices for garnish)
- 8 ounces (2 sticks) unsalted butter, at room temperature
- 1 cup sugar, preferably superfine
- 5 tablespoons Amaretto almond liqueur, Grand Marnier, or syrup from the peaches (if using peach syrup, add ½ teaspoon almond extract)
- 1½ cups finely ground almonds (reserve
- 1 tablespoon for garnish)
- 2 cups whipping cream
- 1 tablespoon sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Equipment:

1 8½" springform pan Waxed paper and plastic wrap



Even when used in a luxurious dish, such as this Charlotte, canned peaches can be a source of vitamins A, C and E.

Preparation: Line the bottom of the springform pan with a circle of waxed paper. Using an electric mixer, cream the butter and superfine sugar together for 4 or 5 minutes, until pale and airy. Add the Amaretto almond liqueur, Grand Marnier or reserved peach syrup and almond extract.

Continue to beat for a few more minutes until the sugar has nearly dissolved. Blend in the almonds. Reserve. Whip the cream with the sugar and vanilla until it just holds very soft peaks. Fold the lightly whipped cream completely into the almond mixture.

Cover the bottom of the springform pan with 1/3 of the almond cream. Arrange half of the peach slices in a sunburst pattern on the almond cream. Cover with another 1/3 of the almond cream. Repeat with another layer of peach slices and cover with the remaining almond cream. Firmly tap the filled pan onto work surface to settle the mixture and remove any air pockets that may have formed. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for at least 5 hours or overnight. The California Peach Charlotte may be prepared a day in advance to this point.

To Serve: Remove the plastic wrap and run a knife around the edge of the pan. Unlatch the springform pan, leaving the ring in place. Place the selected serving plate upside down over the mold and reverse the finished charlotte onto the plate. Remove the ring and the bottom of the pan. Remove the waxed paper. Garnish with reserved peach slices and sprinkle with the reserved ground almonds. Refrigerate until service. For best results, slice with a damp knife.
