Homeowners Association Dues

These were due by the end of February and any not paid by that time are now accruing monthly interest. If you are among the 53 homeowners who have still not paid your dues and are having difficulty paying them, please contact AMI immediately to discuss your situation and to work out a mutually acceptable solution.

Your Board has always been, and continues to be, willing to work with any homeowner who has difficulty paying his dues and who genuinely wants to work out a solution. The solution must address payment of the total amount owing – the Board does not accept partial settlements. Besides the conventional method of sending a check in full payment before the end of February, credit card payments ((American Express, Visa and Discover) are accepted, but are subject to a 3.5% convenience charge since that is the amount our bank charges LOE for this service. Other payment plans can also be arranged, but these are subject to interest charges if the account is not settled in full by the end of February. One homeowner has opted to send monthly payments in advance throughout the year to avoid having to write the large check in February.

The size of the overdue homeowner account status was discussed at the last Annual General Meeting and the Board explained that they had taken various steps in the preceding months to reduce that amount, including hiring a collection agency and instructing the LOE attorneys to pursue overdue accounts earlier.

Your Board is pleased to report that these efforts are having an effect. Our attorneys have been successful in obtaining full payment of several significant accounts and several other accounts have been turned over to our collection agency. Compared to the situation last November, the LOE seriously overdue accounts at the end of March had been reduced by over 30%. Unfortunately the 53 new delinquencies have once again caused the account to increase dramatically. The Board will continue pursuing all these overdue accounts using all the methods now in its power.

While credit card payments and other payment plans can involve a small interest charge, that charge pales in comparison with the charges a homeowner has to pay if their account is sent to the collection agency or to the attorneys. The collection agency adds a 35% collection fee on top of the amount LOE asks them to collect on their behalf. Attorney fees increase as the case progresses – one recent case had over \$2,500 added to the account in attorney fees by the time the case was settled in court (almost doubling the original amount due). As the judge on one occasion stated - homeowners' associations are not banks; every homeowner has to pay his fair share.

Please do not let your payments get out of control – if you need time to pay, do call AMI to work out a plan.

Child Killer

Many of the residents here in Lakes on Eldridge chose this neighborhood because they felt this gated, tranquil community would be an ideal and safe environment in which to raise their children. It is sad and infuriating that our own neighbors are recklessly endangering our children with deadly weapons every day by driving Ferraris, motorcycles and dirt bikes at high speeds on the weekends and, most abhorrent of all, by racing around school buses while they are stopped, with stop signs out and red lights flashing, loading and unloading our children.

I really cannot believe that my neighbors have such little regard for a child's life, much less the law. If a child darts out into the street and, although you are operating within the speed limits, you hit a child, the result is a tragic accident. If, however, you knowingly

choose to speed past a bus while loading or unloading and hit a child, the result is a tragedy due solely to your unlawful and intentionally reckless behavior. There is no real difference between gunning the engine and passing a bus while loading or unloading children and coming to a complete stop, exiting your vehicle, and randomly discharging a weapon at a school bus while loading or unloading. Neither act is an accident, but an intentionally reckless act, with potentially devastating consequences. In either case, whether the weapon is a loaded gun or 3,000 lbs of steel, the result is the same--a dead child.

Help keep our children safe: If you know these people, be a hero; counsel them and prevent a tragedy in our community. Thank you.



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Improper Disposal of Lawn Clippings and Other Debris

We have received complaints from our landscape company and from several homeowners that a number of residents are throwing lawn clippings, branch trimmings, empty bottles and other debris over their back fences/walls into the greenbelt and perimeter areas. These actions detract from the beauty of our community and are absolutely not permitted.

This results in additional work for the landscapers, additional cost to Lakes on Eldridge (and hence, to you) and potential danger due to mowers running over glass containers. There is also the real possibility of damage or injury to the livestock that pastures on the eastern boundary of our community and to the other wildlife we all enjoy in this community.

All owners who border the greenbelt or live on the boundaries of LOE must ensure that no member of their household or their contractors ever throws anything over the fence/wall into the greenbelt or the outside perimeter of our community. Our landscape contractor is being instructed to throw any such debris back over the fence whenever such it is encountered and to notify AMI of the associated addresses.

Unauthorized Entry to LOE



Last month's newsletter had an article asking all homeowners not to allow tailgaters to follow them into the neighborhood, and to not let unauthorized vehicles enter the property through the Tanner gates.

Initial indications suggested that homeowners had read the article and were helping all of us maintain the security of LOE. HOWEVER, the owner of a white pickup apparently does not feel such measures are necessary.

On Saturday, March 17 at approximately 11.15 am, a large "Living Earth" truck was waiting at the Ginger Ponds gate presumably hoping that some homeowner would let him enter. He was in luck! Not from the black pickup truck immediately behind him, but from the white pickup trying to turn in from the left lane of Tanner, going east. He appears to have considered only his desire to get off Tanner and into LOE, and made no evident attempt to talk to the driver of the large truck before allowing him to enter, nor to talk to him subsequently. Someone jumped out of the passenger side of his white pickup, operated their clicker to open the gate, and the "Living Earth" truck entered the property. No, the driver of the white pickup did not appear to have any connection to the driver of the "Living Earth" truck since they went in opposite directions at the end of Ginger Ponds.

An observant and concerned homeowner noticed the incident and provided the material for this article.

Anyone interested in reserving the Beach Club can call AMI for available dates.



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
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BOARD NOTES: MARCH 2007

The Board of Directors of Lakes on Eldridge Community Association met on Tuesday, March 20, 2007. The following is a summary of their discussion. The full minutes can be read on the LOE Website.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Financial Statements: As of February 28, the Association had cash balances of \$506,605.31 in the Operating Fund and \$129,943.85 in the Replacement Fund. For the first two months of 2007 the Association had Total Income of \$184,131.83, Total Expenses of \$200,230.09 and an Operating Deficit of \$16,098.26. The Deficit was mainly due to the \$65,000 reserve contribution. The financial statements were accepted.

Collections: \$220,608.82 of assessments and fees was collected during February. The Board reviewed the March collections legal status report. A trial date has been set in one collection case and a Board Member has agreed to attend as required by the judge. The managing agent was requested to continue providing ongoing updates of all collections.

2005 Audit – Draft Report: Answers to several questions have now been received from the auditor. The Board requested time to review the revised report before signing it. The managing agent was asked to pursue the possibility of the auditors' opining on the association's collection procedures further.

Audit Engagement: A decision was deferred pending receipt of the auditor's reply to the clarification mentioned above.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Architectural Control: Nothing to report.

Access Control: An interim written report from the Committee regarding their study to develop recommendations for improving LOE security including the Beach Club alarm system was requested.

Parks & Pool: The Board approved the swim team's request for a DSL in the clubhouse with the swim team paying the full cost. The Board will continue developing pool shower suggestions now that the managing agent has clarified that there are no health requirements for pool showers. The swimming pool gate continues to be defective and the managing agent was once again asked to have it repaired immediately.

Landscape: The Committee has not yet developed a recommendation regarding landscape or other barrier systems for the Tanner exit corners to avoid vehicles tearing up the grassy areas. No report was received about the possibility of striping at the Tanner gates.

Lakes & Wildlife: The Board instructed the managing agent to notify Waste Management that it expected drivers to slow down, immediately report and accept responsibility for any incident and pay \$2,000 in liquidated damages for the death of the swan. The



\$2,000, once received, will be earmarked for the wildlife fund.

Newsletter The Board agreed to have a suggestion and Board comment section added to the newsletter in hopes of creating more community interaction.

Website: The Board agreed to take over operational control of the website from the managing agent and, by using volunteer help, reduce the monthly cost from \$150 to \$90. The Website Committee will meet with the managing agent to take over control. The committee continues to research options for the website.

Social/Events: The annual Easter Egg Hunt has been scheduled and the Social Committee will assist Elizabeth Tobin in running this event.

MANAGEMENT REPORT

Radar Signs: This subject was again tabled in light of the report that has now been requested from the Access Committee.

Pool Filter: The Board approved a bid from GHPM to provide necessary overhaul parts and labor at a cost of \$1,800.00. GHPM will also inspect all lateral piping and replace as necessary at an additional cost of \$19.00 per lateral.

Power wash Tanner wall: The Board approved pressuring cleaning and chemical treatment of the Tanner road wall at an expense of \$2,954.00.

Tennis Courts: The Board approved resurfacing all three tennis courts at a cost of \$8,125.00. The managing agent will contact the tennis team to coordinate the schedule.

ADDITIONAL BUSINESS

Beach Club Remodel: The Board discussed the interior decorators suggestions at length, divided them into three phases and authorized the first phase with a maximum expenditure of \$15,000. The other phases will be done as the budget permits.

Free Use of Beach Club: The Board determined that only Board authorized groups would be allowed to use the Beach Club at no charge. The Board will consider any application on its merits. The only clubs/groups that have already received approval for free usage are Bible Study group, Mom's Club, Stitchers, Swim team and the (Boys and Girls) scouts, and the latter is only when space is available.


Meeting with MUD 341: Two Board members agreed to represent LOE at the meeting, which the MUD has requested.

Front Gate Regulations: The preliminary update was discussed and additions suggested. A new update will be distributed.

SCHEDULE NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Directors was scheduled for Tuesday, April 24, 2007 at 6:30 p.m. at the Beach Club.





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A FEW GOOD IDEAS!

A number of LOE residents have sent in some really good ideas thru our Suggestion Box.

• One resident brought to our attention a drainage problem on the sidewalk on the east side of Lake Center Run between Lake Shore Ridge and Bristol Bank. Water and mud were almost always standing at two places on the sidewalk

After inspection of this area, the Board found that a resident was over watering their lawn causing the constant standing water. This was brought to the attention of the resident and the water problem dried up.

• One resident suggested the lights be removed from the soft drink machine located at the rear of the clubhouse. In the evening the garishly lit machine detracts from the view of the clubhouse across the lake. He suggested the view of the clubhouse upon entering the development would be much better without the commercial lights of the soft drink machine.

Bingo! The lights in the coke machine were turned off.

• One suggestion was "a Community Spray Day". West Nile Virus is a threat added to the usual nuisance of mosquitoes. The suggestion was to give residents the opportunity to treat their yards at the same time as the subdivision is sprayed.

The mosquito-spraying schedule was printed in the newsletter.

- One resident requested more park benches around the lakes. Two park benches were placed on the lake next to the tennis courts and additional benches are in the planning.
- Several residents have made suggestions for improving our website.

We now are forming a website committee and completely revamping our website to be more user friendly.

- One resident made several great suggestions regarding the speeding in the neighborhood that prompted the recent newsletter article on speed bumps. Several of this resident's suggestions on LOE's speeding and driving problems are now under consideration by the Board.

SWAN UPDATE

Currently there are 15 white mute swans at LOE. Juliet, our breeder swan, left her lake after Romeo's death to seek a new partner and returned with Antonio. Together they have constructed a nest on which Antonio sat until Juliet finished laying seven eggs. Juliet has now taken over the incubation and we are hoping the eggs are fertile and will hatch around Mother's Day. There were two male swans on the lake by the tennis courts that frequented the clubhouse lake. One of these was Antonio. The one left behind roams to other lakes with swans on them. Randy and Dominic, his mate, have relocated themselves on the

farthest lake in the subdivision and did not nest this spring. Several attempts were made to bring them to a closer lake but they were persistent and kept going back. If Juliet and Antonio do produce cygnets, these will be relocated in October or November to lakes that have no swans on them accomplishing our goal of having swans on every lake in LOE. Waterfowl funds have almost been diminished and again many thanks to those of you who contributed last spring. Another call for donations may be made in a month pending the amount of money Waste Management reimburses us for the loss of Romeo and pending the Board's decision to allocate annual funds for the waterfowl. NOTE that because of the Memorial Day holiday, we have moved May's date later and will skip a regular June meeting.

June 11 (note: later because of Memorial Day) – Widow of the South by Robert Hicks. In 1894 Carrie McGavock is an old woman who has only her former slave to keep her company...and the almost 1,500 soldiers buried in her backyard. Years before, rather than let someone plow over the field where these young men had been buried, Carrie dug them up and reburied them in her own personal cemetery. Now, as she walks the rows of the dead, an old soldier appears. It is the man she met on the day of the battle that changed everything. The man who came to her house as a wounded soldier and left with her heart. He asks if the cemetery has room for one more. In an extraordinary debut novel, based on a remarkable true story, Robert Hicks draws an unforgettable, panoramic portrait of a woman who, through love and loss, found a cause. Known throughout the country as "the Widow of the South," Carrie McGavock gave her heart first

to a stranger, and then to a tract of hallowed ground-and became a symbol of a nation's soul.

July 23 – To the Tower Born by Robin Maxwell. In 1483, Edward and Richard of York—Edward, by law, already King of England were placed, for their protection before Edward's coronation, in the Tower of London by their uncle Richard. Within months the boys disappeared without a trace, and for the next five hundred years the despised Richard III was suspected of their heartless murders.

In To the Tower Born, Robin Maxwell ingeniously imagines what might have happened to the missing princes. The great and terrible events that shaped a kingdom are viewed through

the eyes of quick-witted Nell Caxton, only daughter of the first English printer, and her dearest friend, "Bessie," sister to the lost boys and ultimate founder of the Tudor dynasty. It is a thrilling story brimming with mystery, color, and historical lore. With great bravery and heart, two friends navigate a dark and treacherous medieval landscape rendered more perilous by the era's scheming, ambitious, even murderous men and women who will stop at nothing to possess the throne.





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Feral Feathers



You may have noticed an emerald green flash go by on a walk around Lakes on Eldridge. If you remove your iPod, you may also hear an unusual call, instantly noticeable and unusual among the familiar calls of Blue Jays and Mockingbirds. You have just seen or heard a Monk Parakeet, Myiopsitta monachus. The Monk Parakeet, also called Quaker Parrot, is not a native to this area or the United States. Wild birds were imported to the U.S. in the late sixties from Argentina, Brazil, and South America as pets. As the birds inevitably were released or escaped, they thrived in their new environment and have formed large colonies in the Southern and Southeastern U.S. These hardy birds have even established colonies as far north as Chicago and Connecticut.

The Monk Parakeet is green with pale grey on the forehead, cheeks, throat and chest. Some blue can be found in the tail and wing feathers. There are several color mutations including blue, albino, and cinnamon, although only the common greens have been spotted in our neighborhood. Monk Parakeets are unusual in that they are the only Parrot that builds a stick nest either in trees or on manmade structures. Other Parrots nest predominantly in hollows in trees. Also unusual is that they often build large nests for multiple pairs with separate entrances for each pair. Nests have been reported as large as small automobiles.

At least one colony has established itself near the main lake by the clubhouse here at Lakes on Eldridge. The birds are often seen near the clubhouse, sometimes carrying small branches that they cut with their beaks from the birch trees along the lake. Monk Parakeets have also been seen at Pecan's Grill on Tanner. The birds are not reported to have a very large range and the sightings at Pecan's beg the question of whether there is more than one colony in the neighborhood. In pet stores, Monk Parakeets cost between \$50 and \$200 for handfed babies while the rarer blue varieties may cost up to \$400. Although they are cherished as pets and most people enjoy the novelty of seeing them wild in their neighborhood, they are considered a pest to agriculture by many of their native countries. Although it is disputed, they are also considered an agricultural pest in some areas of the U.S. and eradication programs have been implemented in some of these areas.

Keep a look out for these colorful invaders or put out a feeder with sunflower seeds and you may be treated with a visit from one of our colorful and vocal tropical immigrants.

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

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Tired of paved roads? Want to go where there aren't any speed limits? If you answered yes, then your vehicle of choice could very well be a mountain bike. Ever since a group of friends took a fast-paced ride down a steep incline in Northern California, mountain biking has been an exciting challenge to offroad riders.

Its inclusion as an event in the 1996 Olympics confirmed what riders already know: Mountain biking is one of the fastest growing sports in the world, both in popularity and participation.

If you've never been on a mountain bike you might wonder what all the fuss is about. Many riders say it's the freedom. After all, destinations are unlimited on these machines built for rough terrain.

THE RIGHT EQUIPMENT

Mountain bikes are sturdier than your average 10-speed or hybrid bicycle so they can withstand rough roads. They have wide tires that grip the trail, and cantilever brakes, similar to those found on a motorcycle.

When purchasing a mountain bike, be sure that it isn't too large. You should always be able to put a foot on the ground to steady yourself. A helmet is a must, and knee and elbow pads are sure-fire scar preventers.

YOUR BODY ON A BIKE

Riding a bike is one of the best cardiovascular exercises around. Not only does it provide an aerobic workout, but it

strengthens the large muscles of the lower body, including the thighs, hips and buttocks, without putting a lot of stress on the joints. The upper body and arms come into play when climbing hills.

Always warm up before you begin your ride. Pedal in a low gear over flat terrain until you begin to sweat or feel warm.

This usually takes about five to 10 minutes. And don't neglect to cool down when you come to the end of your ride. Gradually lowering your heart rate can help prevent the pooling of lactic acid in the muscles. Again, pedal slowly in a low gear.



ON THE TRAIL

Practice makes perfect isn't a cliché when it comes to handling a mountain bike. Once you start heading up hills and mountains and over rocks and steep falls, you'll need to rely on your instincts, which, if they don't come naturally, develop through practice.

One of the first things to do is to get a feel for how the brakes work. The front brake on a mountain bike usually has more power than the back, and pulling it alone may send you flying over the handlebars. Practice quick stops before you hit the trail so you can feel how your weight may affect how you stop. Cantilever brakes are stronger than those on other bikes, allowing riders to control factors such as their rate of decline. When descending a hill, lightly squeeze and release the brakes - a technique called feathering - to prevent the wheels from locking.

Change gears as it becomes necessary in order to keep a steady cadence. Use a low gear when you need power, and a high gear when you want speed.

Climbing requires a shift in your weight that will control the tires' grip on the ground. Short, steep hills may require out-of-the-seat pedaling to garner more power.

If you try this on a long climb, however, you'll likely tire before you reach the top. Shift your weight forward, off the seat if necessary, to gain the power you need.

GET PEDALING

You can obtain information about trails in your area from your local library or mountainbiking group. The sooner you start pedaling, the sooner you can test your limits - those set by both your body and your mind.
