#### Circle C Landscape Update

If the weather has gone as predicted, the relentless days of summer are probably upon us. After such a wet spring, our vegetation will now have to adapt to the much more challenging conditions of the long hot Texas summer.

The City of Austin has adopted all of the recommendations of the Water Conservation Task Force and will be

producing a new water conservation ordinance in the near future. This, most likely, will limit residential irrigation watering to 2x per week. This should be fine for your turf and beds, but paying attention to some basic facts about Circle C will help.

-there are shallow soils here, it is best to run your irrigation systems for short periods of time, and if needed, run them a second time after your first watering. The goal during very hot weather is to keep everything alive (although some areas may experience summer dormancy), and to keep the soil soft enough to take in water. You should also adjust the height of your mower and keep the grass a little higher to protect from the sun.

-If you have new landscaping, particularly trees of any kind, they

will need a deeper watering. It is important not to drown your trees, so you should not over-water. A good rule of thumb is to reach down into the soil about 4-5 inches and water when this is damp to dry. Water slowly and soak all the way through, and then let it dry out to a reasonable degree until you water again. Also, make sure the trees are mulched well.

-If you are replacing a yard, it is important to choose the right grass for the right location. St. Augustine will do well in very shady areas, but fries out in the sun. Bermuda grass takes eight hours of full sun, so it will thin out in the shade. Your grass provider can give you more information about your specific conditions.

On the commons areas for July we will be performing the regular maintenance which includes mowing, blowing, weed-eating, bed care, trimming, mulching. In late June through July we do a pruning on the perennial beds, cutting back the vegetation that has flowered in the spring. Be careful not to cut back your Texas Mountain Laurels, the seed pods you see on them are next year's flowers.

Hopefully, by the time you get this, we will have completed repairs on Dahlgreen and at MoPac/LaCrosse. The spring rains, storms, etc. put some repairs on hold, but we are anticipating that these will be planted out in June.

The number 1 question of the month... What is going on with the Baby Pool? Well, I am happy to report that it is moving along and taking actual shape. By the time you receive this newsletter, the gunnite (which is the structural concrete of the baby pool) should be completed and the concrete decking should be in full progress. We are looking for the grand opening to be the beginning of August! Now, the Number 2 most asked question of the month... What has taken so long? Although this is a new pool we are building, the project is considered a renovation. With any renovation project there are always unexpected situations. There were unmarked utilities that were discovered during the demolition process. Working around these discoveries have added more construction time along with the City of Austin pool permitting process which unfortunately took the full eight weeks for review and some additional time for comments, neither of these items were anticipated in the original time line. Crystal Clear and G Creek are not anticipating any more major hold ups from this point forward, but as we have seen with any construction, things can and will happen. All of us on the Board are fully aware of the numerous frustrations regarding this project. In a perfect world everything would have gone on schedule and our babies would all be swimming away, however, that is not the case and all we can do is continue to work together and through this process.

I would like to take a moment to congratulate and commend the pool staff in general for all of their hard work and persistence at keeping the pool up to the highest standards possible. It is an aging facility and with the construction mess on top of that, things have been quite tricky, but the staff has worked through it and continue to keep everyone safe and the areas clean.

#### Wildflower Park & Vintage Place Park Improvements Update

One of this year's capital improvement projects has been the long awaited purchase and installation of playscapes for our neighborhood's parks. Initially, the Amenities Development Committee had decided to invest its energy and efforts into completely building out the Wildflower Park before turning our attention to the Vintage Place park or other pocket parks. However, once we discovered the design services would take a significant percentage of our anticipated budget, the Committee and the Board developed a more flexible, more robust strategy.


The new plan was to use the initial budget dollars allocated for Wildflower Park and instead use that money to purchase playscapes for both Wildflower and Vintage Place. Once the playscapes were installed, we would then see how the neighborhood used the playscapes, what paths they created to reach the playscapes, and any other needs that developed, then turn our efforts to completing the parks with trails, landscaping, or any other features.

Working toward that goal, the Amenities Development Committee under the leadership of Tony Gendron gathered proposals from several noted playscape design and installation companies, then passed along a recommendation to the Board of Directors. The Committee collectively recommended the proposals made by T.F. Harper & Associates. The illustrations for those proposals are seen on this page, and although the final result will differ from the computer illustration, we are very hopeful to have something similar at the end of the project.

One key part of this project is the money for the playscapes. The Board is currently looking at our current financial situation and how to best finance such a project. Look for more news on this topic and the overall project on the web site.

#### **Deed Restriction Review Update**

Since we began our drive of the entire neighborhood in March we have sent over 400 notices of deed restriction violation. We have had 300+ residents cure their violation and we would like to THANK YOU for cooperating with the association. Violations may include, but are not limited to: excessive weeds, areas of no turf, dead shrubs and/or trees, yard art, grass that is not edged or mowed and areas of dead grass. We encourage each of you to evaluate your lawn now so that you have time to re-sod if needed before the heat of summer. Please also refer to the City of Austin Grow Green website at www. growgreen.org. We are required to send notification of deed restriction violations via certified mail and we also send regular mail. If you receive a deed restriction violation notice and would like to speak to us about your plans for improvement, please contact the HOA office at 288-8663. It's impossible to know everyone's individual situation, so we appreciate communication from you. We also recommend that you review the architectural control committee's landscape design guidelines located within this newsletter.

If you have a deed restriction to report, you may email us the specific address at info@circlecranch.info or give us a call at 288-

8663. Violations that are reported are generally checked with 2 business days and if we are able to confirm a violation, we will begin the deed restriction process (which you can access on the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/documents/AssociationDocuments/DeedRestrictions/CCHOA-DeedRestrictionPolicy2003.pdf.

#### **Architectural Control Committee** Landscape Design Guidelines Submitted by the ACC

Circle C residents are welcome to improve their existing landscapes through plant, shrub and tree enhancements, bed edging, additional flower beds, or turf replacement without going through the Architectural Review Committee approval.

#### The following items require approval from the ACC:

- hardscape in the front yards, including but not limited to walls, fences, fountains, patios. No vertical hardscape greater than 18" in height will be allowed.
- transition to a native landscape in front yards The ACC encourages drought tolerant plantings, and limited turf area. However, landscapes that dramatically change from the original landscape design must go through the approval process. A conceptual plan showing bed locations, turf locations and a list of plants must be provided to the committee.

#### The following items will be considered:

- amount of turf area. Turf can be limited but must be present next to sidewalk and driveway edges and used to define bed areas
- landscape designs must include evergreen shrubs as well as perennial and deciduous plants and wildflowers. Plants beds must be designed to enhance and give order to a front yard landscape
- it is important that landscape designs retain a Texas Hill Country feel, rather than a desert Southwest design. Natural colored gravel (excluding pea gravel) and decomposed granite may be used in limited amounts for paths or accents. They may not replace mulch in bed areas.
- all designs must be able to be maintained in a way that is compatible with traditional yards in the neighborhood. Perennials must be pruned at the appropriate times, shrubs must be trimmed, wildflower areas may cycle through the wildflower planting and reseeding times, and then must be trimmed appropriately.
- beds should be mulched to retain moisture and control weeds. Mulch should be between 2" and 3" in depth, and updated as
- flower pots must integrate into the overall design and be well maintained. Empty pots and dead vegetation must be removed.

#### Prohibited elements in front yard design:

• Yard Art. Non-vegetative elements must be compatible and an integral part of the landscape design. Excessive yard art of random objects is prohibited.

· Artificial Flowers.

#### Front Yard Landscaping Standards

The Architectural Control Committee has recently published the new landscape design guidelines for the neighborhood. You can access a copy on the Circle C Ranch website at www.circlecranch. info under the ACC Review Section and there is also a copy included in this newsletter.

Each of you had an installed landscape by the builder upon the purchase of your home. All of the landscape plans had received ACC approval prior to installation of the landscaping, and a final inspection was performed to insure compliance with the plan.

From that point, the ACC encourages landscape improvements and does not require that bed upgrades, such as adding vegetation, adding borders around the flower beds, adding decorative trees, and any other small landscape improvement go through the ACC process. If you are re-sodding your yard in a similar way, likewise, that does not require approval.

However, if you are altering your landscape in any substantial way, you must receive ACC approval for a substantial change, such as conversion to a native landscape, complete re-location of the beds, etc. This also applies to yard art which is defined as non-landscape items, such as plastic animals, gazing balls, statuary, fencing, walls, etc. You may log onto the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/

The ACC will consider approving one or two items if they integrate into the landscape plan. Please plan to relocate your other items to the back yard. The design guidelines apply only to the front yard, unless you have an item in the back yard that is higher than the privacy fence.

#### **Summer Flood Hazard**

There are a number of summer hazards in Austin, one of which is flooding. In 1919 Austin saw its wettest July on record: 12.80 inches of rain. Austin saw summer floods in 1952 and 1954. The 1954 flood resulted from Hurricane Alice. Tropical Storm Claudette caused flooding in 1979 and Tropical Storm Amelia caused Hill Country flooding in 1978. Medina, Texas saw 48 inches of rain in 52 hours from Amelia. In the summer of 1979 Austin Bergstrom had July a July rainfall of 9.77 inches. According to the American Red Cross, the July 2002 Austin Flood was 2nd largest natural disaster that year, affecting over 25,000 families. In all, Austin has seen flooding in 1869, 1900, 1915, 1921, 1935, 1957, 1960, 1974, 1981, 1991, 1998, 2001 & 2002. Creeks commonly affected include Bee Creek, Bull Creek, Onion Creek, Shoal Creek, Walnut Creek, West Bouldin Creek, and Williamson Creek.

The Great Thrall/Taylor Storm occurred September 8-10, 1921 and holds the record for the greatest continental U.S. rainstorm during an 18 hour period. The remnants of a Gulf hurricane followed the Balcones Escarpment before settling over Williamson and Travis Counties. Taylor saw 23.11 inches of rain in 24 hours and Thrall reported approximately 36 inches in 18 hours. The Great Thrall/Taylor Storm resulted in 224 deaths in seven counties.

While most people are familiar with "Tornado Alley", Austin lies in "Flash Flood Alley." According to the Austin Office of Emergency Management, several factors contribute to our propensity for flooding:

- Moisture from the Gulf of Mexico and the Pacific Ocean
- The jet stream inflow from the Rocky Mountains
- Juncture of dry desert air and moist Gulf air creating the West Texas "dry line"
- The atmospheric uplift created by the Balcones Escarpment
- Flood waters from the Edwards Plateau affecting downstream creeks and rivers in the Austin area
- Limestone and thin topsoil contribute to high runoff
- Violent storm cells release heavy rain, causing unpredictable flash floods

The Lower Colorado River crosses the entire state of Texas, so Austin may be affected by flooding in any of the river's watershed areas. The LCRA dams reduce the flow of floodwaters, but they do not prevent flooding. Approximately 7,000 homes and 300 bridges in Austin may be affected by flooding. While only a few parts of Circle C may be affected by flooding from Slaughter Creek and Onion Creek,

most Circle C residents commute through areas prone to flooding. Be sure you know the difference between the various flood terms used by governmental agencies and news broadcasts (source: FEMA):

*Flood Watch:* Flooding is possible. Tune in to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, or television for information.

*Flash Flood Watch:* Flash flooding is possible. Be prepared to move to higher ground; listen to NOAA Weather Radio, commercial radio, or television for information.

*Flood Warning:* Flooding is occurring or will occur soon; if advised to evacuate, do so immediately.

Flash Flood Warning: A flash flood is occurring; seek higher ground on foot immediately.

#### FEMA provides the following advice in the event of a flood:

- Listen to the radio or television for information.
- Be aware that flash flooding can occur. If there is any possibility of a flash flood, move immediately to higher ground. Do not wait for instructions to move.
- Be aware of streams, drainage channels, canyons, and other areas known to flood suddenly. Flash floods can occur in these areas with or without such typical warnings as rain clouds or heavy rain.
- If you must evacuate, secure your home. If you have time, bring in outdoor furniture. Move essential items to an upper floor.


- Turn off utilities at the main switches or valves if instructed to do so. Disconnect electrical appliances. Do not touch electrical equipment if you are wet or standing in water.
- Do not walk through moving water. Six inches of moving water can make you fall. If you have to walk in water, walk where the water is not moving. Use a stick to check the firmness of the ground in front of you.
- Do not drive into flooded areas. If floodwaters rise around your car, abandon the car and move to higher ground if you can do so safely. You and the vehicle can be quickly swept away. Six inches of water will reach the bottom of most passenger cars causing loss of control and possible stalling. A foot of water will float many vehicles. Two feet of rushing water can carry away most vehicles including sport utility vehicles (SUV's) and pick-ups.

#### After a flood, you should:

- Listen for news reports to learn whether the community's water supply is safe to drink.
- Avoid floodwaters; water may be contaminated by oil, gasoline, or raw sewage. Water may also be electrically charged from underground or downed power lines.
- Avoid moving water.
- Be aware of areas where floodwaters have receded. Roads may have



weakened and could collapse under the weight of a car.

- Stay away from downed power lines, and report them to the power company.
- Return home only when authorities indicate it is safe.
- Stay out of any building if it is surrounded by floodwaters.
- Use extreme caution when entering buildings; there may be hidden damage, particularly in foundations.
- Service damaged septic tanks, cesspools, pits, and leaching systems as soon as possible. Damaged sewage systems are serious health hazards.
- Clean and disinfect everything that got wet. Mud left from floodwater can contain sewage and chemicals.

#### A Convenient Truth

The people speak, CCRCC hear and respond! Our absence from the pages of this worthy HOA periodical has been noted, lamented, commented upon, spoken of at the poolside, debated in the house and requests received to rectify the situation. We hear you, and we are now back in print. And in good time, too.

#### But it's a dry heat...

Summer is the peak time for cycling and it is also rather warm

out there. Here are some pointers to note for enjoying the summer cycling before you enthusiastically dust off the 2 wheeler.

#### Cool Head

Helmet, helmet, helmet. You do not need to spend \$200 on a helmet, but you do need one- you would put one on your child, wouldn't you; what makes your head and life less susceptible to injury? Don't be silly, wear a helmet. (Preaching over with.) All helmets must meet rigorous safety standards and in these hot summer months a helmet with good ventilation will be better as it may be more suited to preventing heat related injuries. Bell and Giro are two solid producers of first class helmets- most of which are very inexpensive. Drop into the Bicycle Sports Shop on S Lamar and ask someone about them. If your helmet has 2 vents in the front and looks like a Styrofoam bowl- it's time for a change.

#### Water, water everywhere

Drink! Perspiring (or 'glowing' for the ladies) is your body's natural mechanism for cooling down and works most effectively when your body is well hydrated. Cycling is a calorie burning activity (now that has your attention, does it not?) and you need to replace not only the

fluids but also the electrolytes lost during activity-however moderate it may be. The thirst impulse is a sign that you should have been drinking earlier, so drinking every 15 minutes, or more frequently, will reduce your risk of heat-related illnesses. This is especially important if taking the children with you- they need to drink regularly.

There is a dizzying array of sports drinks and pseudo sports drinks (and flavored waters!) on the market. One of the classics 'gatorade' will likely be fine and probably is better than water for our purposes here. Should you wish to venture into the technical hydration field, Hammer nutrition make a couple of scientifically balanced drink powders.

#### The morning after

Alcohol tends to remove water from the body and can leave the body more susceptible to dehydration. If you plan to ride outdoors in the summer (and you do) then consider eliminating alcohol from your diet (I know that is almost crazy talk at peak grilling season) so at least abstain or reduce consumption prior to a ride.

#### Stop!

Give your body a chance to cool down by taking frequent breaks throughout the ride. Find a shady spot or call in on an air-conditioned coffee house or gas station, and refill those water bottles while you are there.

#### Get acclimated

Ensure that you are used to the heat. Acclimatisation can take some time so limit those first few summer rides and build up to the longer ones. Especially if you have children with you. The veloway is a great, convenient and safe place to start.

Choose your ride time wisely, early morning or evening are cooler than the midday sun, which is, of course, if the song by composer and theatrical bon-vivant, Noel Coward, is to be believed, when mad dogs and the author are out! There is some truth in that.

#### Solo

If planning a long ride (and long is a relative term-long for your level of experience, fitness etc) you will likely be exposed to high temperatures for a significant period so be safe (on so many levels) and take someone along with you. The friendships that develop might surprise you.

#### Choose your clothing carefully.

To be comfortable during the summer months wear garments made of a moisture wicking fabric and in a light colour to be cool in all senses of the word- such as the rather fetching CCRCC jerseys, for example! It does not have to be skin tight but if your clothing is too loose then it will not wick away body moisture effectively.

Which brings us neatly to the subject of appropriate pants which (Continued on Page 30)

requires an essay unto itself.

#### **How to Choose Cycling Shorts**

Cycling shorts are best chosen after considering the quality of materials and the overall construction and how well they conform to your unique anatomy. Sometimes a relatively inexpensive pair may work better for you than a high end model. The end result is a to find a pair of shorts that do not result in discomfort during or after the ride. Simple enough and you will pay for a poor choice in many ways.

Shorts, like saddles, are difficult to recommend because of anatomical differences and riding positions. So try them on; below are some things to consider when doing so:

Price: Generally, the more expensive the shorts, the higher the quality. Avoid cheap shorts as the material and construction may be substandard resulting in discomfort. They may be sewn from only 4 or 6 pieces ("panels"), which will not provide the best anatomical fit and result in some rather impressive chafing which tends to focus the mind.

Panels: Here less is definitely not more. It is likely that 8 panel shorts will conform to your contours better and be far, far more comfortable than those made from fewer pieces. Quality producers use flat seam stitching which does not abrade the skin.

Liner: The padded liner in the crotch is called a "chamois" and should be large enough, soft enough, thick enough (but not too thick), shaped correctly and sewn without irritating seams. Thick chamois can bunch and chafe if incorrectly conforming to your body. Gel inserts, while soft and squishy trap moisture in the chamois resulting in a wet behind and skin irritation-diaper rash anyone?

Leg length: Theory has it that shorts are designed to hold the muscles in a more efficient position when riding and hence are snug. Thus the leg should cover a good portion of the thigh. If however tan lines are a source of concern for you, then shorter leg lengths might suit. Make sure that the nose of the saddle (the pointy end) does not rub against bare skin, if you wear shorties. While we are talking of legs...

Leg grippers: Leg grippers are designed to stop shorts riding up the leg, bunching at the crotch and resulting in an agonizing time. Leg grippers should be wide (1/2" or so generally), made of "sticky" rubber-like material and securely sewn in.

Waist band: Waist bands are best if made of elastic and elastic that is wide enough not to feel like a cord around your middle. Some manufacturers add a drawstring. Just elastic is fine. Just a drawstring is not. If a drawstring is the only thing keeping shorts in place, you will feel it!

Overall: Snug, not tight, is the desired state. Shorts must stay in place during the cycling activity or chafing will result; but too tight and you won't be going very far. For the fashion conscious, shorts may look a bit baggy in the backside when standing up but should be smooth when bent over in a riding position.

#### And to help you get on the road.

Every Thursday from 6:00 to 7:00 PM, Bicycle Sport Shop holds a FREE basic maintenance class and on the first Thursday the class is held at 'our' store at 517 S Lamar. Go along, you will enjoy it and learn something too. Plus their 2006 rental bikes are available to purchase- some good deals to be had.



#### **Park West HOA News**

(pertains only to Park West residents) • Submitted by Board of Directors, Park West HOA

Park West HOA sends a big thank you to our Social Committee's Co-Chairs Alanna and Richard Scott, hosts of this year's annual Park West BBQ! They are delightful hosts, and we all enjoyed visiting with our neighbors in their lovely home and beautifully landscaped back yard. About 70 Park West residents and guests attended (the Scotts have a big back yard!). Four members of the Circle C Austin Fire station joined us as our guests and had a great time again this year, asking to be invited back next year!

The Social Committee meets on the 2nd Monday each month. They are busy planning additional events for the coming year to include a wine tasting at the Wild Flower Center and a Holiday Party in Park West. They are also working on a Spring Garden Tour and another Memorial Day BBQ for next year. If you would like to join the group, call Alanna and Richard Scott at 809-7482.

The Roads & Gates Committee has recommended that maintenance for Park West's streets be delayed until next year in light of the following: 1) construction has not been completed and the trucks continue to frequently travel over the streets; 2) the overall condition of the streets remains good. The PWHOA Board has voted to delay this project.

The responsibilities of Park West's Board of Directors include

managing the Association's affairs with regard to disposition of funds and assessments. It is critical to base budgeting decisions on the most accurate information possible. At their April meeting, the Board voted to conduct a professional reserve analysis. A Reserve Study is a budget planning tool used to identify the current status of the Reserve Fund, and a funding Plan to offset the anticipated future "major common area expenditures". A Reserve Study consists of two parts: Physical Analysis - determines an objective forecast of capital replacements or repairs including cost estimates which incorporate inflation, and Financial Analysis - recommends adequate annual reserve contributions to fund future capital expenditures for the next 20 to 30 years which incorporate interest earned on reserve balances. After evaluating and receiving bids from five companies, Reserve Advisors, Inc., was selected to perform Park West's reserve study. The study should be complete by the end of summer and will include assessment of Park West's documentation; engineering assessment and recommendations for maintenance of the property (gates, fences, streets, common areas, etc.); and expert assessment of our financial situation (income, expenses, dues, etc.). Recommendations will include tentative schedules for major maintenance such as street re-paving. This information will

be shared with Park West Homeowners, and will be considered as we move into the 2008 budget process.

Park west dues have remained at \$100/month since 1998, and we anticipate the dues will need to be increased in order to maintain current standards. The Board of Directors will likely call a Special Meeting of the Homeowners later this year, after they receive the report on the reserve analysis and work to determine options that can be presented to the membership. Please stay tuned for more details.

After February's Annual PWHOA meeting, the Board contacted our attorney requesting legal opinions on a number of questions left unanswered when the developers turned HOA management over to the homeowners. The board and several resident lawyers are reviewing these opinions and will develop policy accordingly. Examples of opinions include: PWHOA is not responsible for maintaining homeowner fencing that shares a boundary with HOA common areas; PWHOA has the authority to determine what is acceptable for front yard decoration (i.e., "yard art"); homeowners are not entitled to 'opt out' of front yard landscape services performed by the landscaper under contract. When this project is completed, the policies will be presented to the HOA membership.

The "Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions for Park West at Circle C" (PW CC&R's) was written in 1996, and has not been amended since 2002! When homeowners purchase in Park West, they agree

to be bound by the terms set forth in these documents. The Bylaws & Covenants Committee will be re-convening in the near future to review the PW CC&R's, and it is anticipated that an amendment will be recommended to the Board. Because any amendment must be approved by members of the association entitled to cast at least 70% of the number of votes of the association, all homeowners will be kept well-informed of potential proposed changes. To help guide the committee, the Park West Board has received legal assistance with interpretation of some sections of the PW CC&R's. These documents can be quite difficult to read, however since this is the base document that all Park West HOA governing documents are subordinate to, it is important that you make every effort to become familiar with them. Please let us know if you have concerns or thoughts on any particular section. Due to the complexity of these documents, and to ensure clarity of your comments, all such information should be submitted in writing and mailed to Marilyn Childress at Goodwin Management, dropped into one of the mail center suggestion boxes, or emailed to any Board member. All such submissions will be forwarded to the Bylaws & Covenants Committee for consideration.

Landscaping in Park West has never looked better, but now that we are in the cycle of summer heat and dry weather, please water your lawns several times weekly, preferably in the early morning, for ten minutes per station.
