PROTECT YOUR IDENTITY AND INVESTMENTS

Identity theft is one of the fastest growing crimes in America. Here are a few tips to arm yourself against this crime.

- Check credit card and bank statements (at least) monthly for unauthorized activities
- Call the credit card company if a statement that you normally receive in the mail is missing. It could be an indication that a thief has recently obtained your information
- Utilize the Uni-ball [®] 207 [™] Gel Pen to write checks. It has a specially formulated gel ink to help prevent against a common form of check fraud known as "check washing"
- Unless you initiated the contact never give out personal information over email, Internet or phone
- Use intricate passwords for your computer, email and Internet accounts that include a combination of numbers, lower and uppercase letters

- If you have ordered new checks and they haven't arrived call, the vendor of the checks
- Never carry your Social Security card around with you
- Only give out your Social Security number when absolutely necessary. Ask if you can use a different form of identification
- Shred documents with personal information prior to disposal
- Get a copy of your credit report at least once a year to review for any unauthorized activity

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MINUTES FROM THE AUGUST BOARD MEETING

The Board of Directors of Lakes on Eldridge Community Association met on Tuesday, August 21, 2007. The following is a summary of what was discussed.

Homeowner/Guest Forum: Lee Mueller gave his report on the M.U.D meeting he attended on August 30, 2007 on behalf of LOE. Full details of this meeting are contained in the MUD minutes.

A manager from ISSC was also in attendance. The Board had requested he come to the meeting to discuss the gate attendant situation. The Board expressed its dissatisfaction with the overall service, the lack of adherence to Lakes on Eldridge rules and regulations and cited numerous problems. ISSC explained the steps they are already taking to address these problems, citing as a major reason for the delay in implementation difficulty in finding good applicants for this type of work in the current labor market. An extended and helpful discussion ensued about security within LOE and the Board then asked ISSC to provide detailed quotes for some of the possibilities that had been discussed. In response to a question from the Board, ISSC suggested some minor improvements that should be considered for the gatehouse and the Board asked AMI to develop quotes for these.

Financial Report The Board reviewed the financial statements for the period ended July 31, 2007. The Association had cash balances of \$406,680 in the Operating Fund. The total Replacement Reserve

amount was \$88,945 for the same time period. Operating income year to date is \$558,546, with total expenses of \$535,269 showing a Surplus of \$23,276 that is mainly from the Sales Tax Refund. These will be transferred to the reserve fund in August.

Collections: The managing agent reported that \$11,915 in assessments was collected during July 2007. \$55,409 remains to be collected in delinquent assessments and fees. The Board again expressed major concern about AMI's reporting of and attention to this very important problem.

Architectural Control: It was reported that all was quiet this past month and no report was available to be given

Access Control: The managing agent is to contact the Access Control Committee Chairman to obtain his report for this past month. The Board discussed the Ginger Ponds gate vandalism and authorized a \$1,000 reward.

Parks & Pool: It was reported to the Board that there was no report to be given at this time.

Landscape: It was reported that the maintenance company has had to struggle to keep the property mowed despite all the rain we have had. The intermittent very wet and scorching heat has been stressful on our landscaping. The first to show signs of this environmental stress are the ornamental pear trees. So far, we have been lucky and

seen relatively few problems. In July and August two pear trees had to be removed. In several areas around the property, pear trees along homeowner's properties are sickly or dead. Issues as to the ownership of pear trees and/or Cleyera bushes that run along sides of properties have arisen in the past. These trees are expressly the responsibility of the homeowners. The homeowners should avoid further delay in removing the trees.

* In the last week, the pine trees along Tanner have begun to show signs of stress. They have dropped some needles, however, are putting on new growth.

* An oak tree located along Lake Center Run that was damaged by an automobile last month appears to be stable. Aside from the large gash in the trunk, it appears to be doing well and will not need to be removed.

* There has been an on going issue with water and mud washing from the landscape bed across the sidewalk in between Bristol Banks and Crystal Falls. The landscaping company visited the homeowner and located the irrigation related malfunction. The homeowner has arranged for LIOT to make the necessary repairs and bill the homeowner directly.

* Several extremely long and large rut marks that look as though a large truck lost control and went down into the ditch along the grass frontage of Eldridge have been repaired.

* After numerous delays, the boulders for the Tanner entrances will be installed tomorrow (note that the Board has also authorized some appropriate landscaping for these boulders).

* Flowers were replaced in several areas around the property that were not doing well.

* Iris and Purple fountain grass were replaced in the landscape bed at Indigo Falls.

* Mulch has been added to the center beds just inside the main entry, the front beds at the Clubhouse and the landscape bed that runs along the school fence.

* We are looking into adding a special blend of Nature's Way compost that is rich in organic matter and bioinoculants to support plant health in areas where hollies were recently planted.

* The area near the tennis courts where concrete tables were installed last year needs some attention. The weed barrier is coming up and posses a tripping hazard and additional pea gravel is needed. LIOT has been asked to clean up the area and give us a proposal to add some additional gravel (note that the Board has already requested AMI to obtain quotes to replace the gravel with concrete).

Website: It was reported by the Website Committee Chairman that the snap shot of the new website was received and he is awaiting the updates from the managing agent.

2nd Draft of 2008 Budget: The draft was reviewed briefly and the Board voted to discuss it at length at a separate Budget meeting (*Continued on Page 7*)

To do List: The Board expressed major concern about AMI's updating of this important tool and insisted that ALL items arising from Board meetings, resident calls, or other communications MUST be added to this list. This list is intended as a helpful tool for all parties and, when used properly, will ensure that no action item is overlooked, as has been a serious problem in the past.

Deed Restrictions: The Board reviewed the deed restrictions listing from August showing 193 open work orders with 374 having been closed and 104 new letters being sent out. The Board asked AMI to follow up on several individual deed restriction problems that did not appear to be receiving their proper attention.

Lakes on Eldridge North: The Board requested the managing agent to contact Lakes on Eldridge North to confirm that LOE is interested in discussing items of common interest with them.

The next regular meeting of the Board of Directors was scheduled to be held Tuesday, September 25, 2007 at 6:30 p.m. at the Beach Club.



October 29 – Water for Elephants by Sara Gruen. When Jacob Jankowski, recently orphaned and suddenly adrift, jumps onto a passing train, he enters a world of freaks, grifters, and misfits, a second-rate circus struggling to survive during the Great Depression, making one-night stands in town after endless town. A veterinary student who almost earned his degree, Jacob is put in charge of caring for the circus menagerie. It is there that he meets Marlena, the beautiful young star of the equestrian act, who is married to August, the charismatic but twisted animal trainer. He also meets Rosie, an elephant who seems untrainable until he discovers a way to reach her. Beautifully written, Water for Elephants is illuminated by a wonderful sense of time and place. It tells a story of a love between two people that overcomes incredible odds in a world in which even love is a luxury that few can afford.

November 26 – The Book Thief by Markus Zusak. It's just a small story really, about among other things: a girl, some words, an accordionist, some fanatical Germans, a Jewish fist-fighter, and quite

a lot of thievery Set during World War II in Germany, Markus Zusak's groundbreaking new novel is the story of Liesel Meminger, a foster girl living outside of Munich. Liesel scratches out a meager existence for herself by stealing when she encounters something she can't resist—books. With the help of her accordion-playing foster father, she learns to read and shares her stolen books with her neighbors during bombing raids as well as with the Jewish man hidden in her basement before he is marched to Dachau. This is an unforgettable story about the ability of books to feed the soul.

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
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Board Seeking Volunteer for Website Committee
