The primary mission of the Board of Directors is to maintain and grow our members' property values. We do this through a variety of methods, by working to give our neighborhood top-notch and competitive amenities, a strong reputation in the Austin community, and dealing with the details of our large and growing homeowners association.

Recently, it came to light that Camden, a large and well known national builder, was developing a large apartment complex across the street from Bowie High School with the intention to call the complex "Camden Circle C." The Board of Directors was concerned by an apartment complex using the Circle C name given the strong affiliation residents of Austin have with our name and our neighborhood. No matter what other Austin residents think of our neighborhood, there is a definite sense of what Circle C means in the minds of Austinites and allowing an apartment complex to dilute that name and brand would be something that could ultimately lower our property values.

Over the past several months the Board of Directors has worked with a number of outside representatives to address this issue. We are happy to announce that Camden has agreed to rename its apartment complex to Camden Cedar Hills. While this is unlikely to be the last time another real estate developer attempts to leverage the strong reputation Circle C has in our community by using our name, this is an important milestone in showing that our homeowners association has the ability to prevent this dilution and ensure that we control what the name Circle C means here in Austin. Our thanks to everyone who assisted in this effort.

2008 Capital Budget Projects Report

As reported in the 2007 CCHOA Annual Report (Feb 2008 newsletter), the Board of Directors has budgeted several capital improvement projects for 2008. They include:

- □ Landscape Esc/Slaughter
- □ Landscape Circle C West Post Offices
- □ Landscape Turf replacement
- ☑ Swim Center & Café Roof Phase I of this project has been completed (new roofs and gutters on both buildings. Phase II (sealant applied to outside of buildings and re-caulking) and Phase III (new awnings) are currently out to bid and should be completed by early to mid April.
- □ Swim Center Volleyball Courts
- □ Fence off BB Court
- ☑ Swim Center Furniture The purchase of three new pool tarps and two lane line storage reels has been completed. New loungers and chairs have been ordered and new tables are currently out to bid.
- ☑ Swim Center Shade Two new shade structures (to be placed on the northeast side of the pool deck), a replacement shade tarp in between the swim center and café building and new awnings have been bid and should be installed by May.
- Playscape Phase II
- □ Escarpment Fence

We will continue to report the progress of each of these projects in the newsletter. We will also have a link on the website that will give updates and what funds have been expended to date.

Deed Restriction Update

We will continue driving two sections of Circle C per month to note any violations of the deed restrictions. Violations may include, but are not limited to: excessive weeds, areas of no turf, dead shrubs and/or trees, yard art, grass that is not edged or mowed, areas of dead grass, boats, RV's, trailers and general home maintenance issues. We encourage each of you to evaluate your lawn now so that you have time to re-sod if needed before the heat of summer. Please also refer to the City of Austin Grow Green inserts on lawn maintenance and care. We are required to send notification of deed restriction violations via certified mail and we also send regular mail. If you receive a deed restriction violation notice and would like to speak to us about your plans for improvement, please contact the HOA office at 288-8663. It's

impossible to know everyone's individual situation, so we appreciate communication from you. We also recommend that you review the architectural control committee's landscape design guidelines located within this newsletter.

If you have a deed restriction to report, you may email us the specific address at info@circlecranch.info or give us a call at 288-8663. Violations that are reported are generally checked with 2 business days and if we are able to confirm a violation, we will begin the deed restriction process (which you can access on the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/documents/ AssociationDocuments/DeedRestrictions/ CCHOA-DeedRestrictionPolicy2003.pdf

With April showers (hopefully) bringing May flowers, one would think that we don't have to worry about watering just yet. However, the last six months have been the indicators of drought conditions. Many forecasters are predicting a big departure from last year's wet and rainy spring and summer.

If that's the case, then all of us will be facing some challenges as we adapt to the new City of Austin residential and commercial watering restrictions. Here are a few tips for keeping your vegetation alive, and hopefully thriving during the dry weather.

- Trees—trees will need a little extra attention, especially if they are new trees. The best way to water trees is thorough deep root watering on a regular basis. Basically, you want to water your trees with the hose, very deeply. The down side of this is that you have to let the trees dry out between watering periods. They should not be so dry that the soil is cracked and crumbly, but if you have created a mud pit, there will be a problem. The primary cause of decline and death in new trees is over watering!!
- Beds and shrubs—if you have drought tolerant plantings, the twice a week watering schedule should be plenty. If you have an irrigation system, it is preferable for your beds and turf to be running on separate zones. Spray heads for shrubs emit quite a bit of water in a short period, so generally nothing more than 10 minutes in this situation will take care of your shrubs. Watering in the early morning is best; it helps prevent fungus. If you have a lot of run off, shorten the watering time until the water does not run off, and then run two cycles to get in depth watering.
- Turf—perhaps the most tricky. The turf will benefit from regular deep watering. You will be limited to 2x per week watering and the length of watering depends on whether you have rotors or spray heads. One way to tell how much water is emitted in a certain period is to put out a few cans under your rotors; run the section for 30 minutes and measure the water in the can(generally in inches). You can then reference the City of Austin website for information on ET data, but as a rule of thumb 1/2" per watering will be considered deep watering. This may be needed either 2xper week (maximum allowed) or 1x per week if the conditions are right. Try to water in the early morning hours to prevent fungal diseases of the lawn.

Basic rules of the new watering schedule: residential watering is limited to 2 days per week May 1 through September 30. Odd house numbers water on Wednesday and Saturday, even house numbers water on Thursday and Sunday. No irrigation systems or sprinklers may water between 10am to 7 pm. Hand watering is allowed at any time. If you need additional information from the City of Austin go to www.waterwiseaustin.org.

Satellite Dishes

We have received quite a few emails and calls recently about whether or not satellite dishes are allowed in Circle C. While the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions do speak to this, they were written over 20 years ago and referred to the large outdoor satellite dishes of the past. The Architectural Control Committee has written guidelines that we are posting below. Please make sure that you have complied if you have a satellite dish attached to your home.

Satellite Dishes & Play Equipment Guidelines

• Satellite dishes:

According to the Circle C Ranch Covenants Conditions and Restrictions (Article V, Section 3e) "Television satellite reception discs shall be screened by a fence or other similar facility so as to conceal them from view of any public street or Common Area." The Architectural Control Committee has clarified this provision by adopting the following guideline:

Small satellite dishes, (smaller than 3 feet in diameter) shall be installed behind the main ridgeline of the home and out of view of any public street. If this is not possible or if you live on a corner, please submit a proposal for location to the Architectural Control Committee for approval.

In the event that a home backs to a major boulevard or Common Area (such as Escarpment, LaCrosse, Slaughter, Barstow, Dahlgreen, Eclipse, South Bay, and any other future areas common areas) residents must go through the Architectural Review Process and receive approval in writing.


Hide Your Garbage Can & Recycle Bin!







By the time this newsletter arrives, the deadline for storing garbage and recycling containers from street view will have come and gone. The container storage issue is so important that it received front page coverage in the March issue of the CCR Newsletter. On April 1, the extension previously granted by the PWHOA Board of Directors expired and our garbage and recycling containers must now be stored hidden from street view. This is in keeping with the Circle C Covenants and the Park West HOA Rules. If storage is still a challenge, consider exchanging the large garbage container for a smaller 30 or 60 gallon size. The recycling container is available only in the larger size. Beginning April 1, both containers must be stored in the garage or kept hidden from street view, either on the side of the house (but out of street view) or in your backyard.

Spring is springing, the birds are singing.....soon, anyway. In Park West, you'll know that spring is here with the scheduling of the popular Spring Garden Tours event. The Park West Social Committee is looking for residents who would like to share their gardens, courtyards or greenhouses with their neighbors on Sunday, May 4, from 1 P.M. to 4 P.M. Your garden or landscaping does not have to be perfectly manicured. This is not a contest for the neatest

garden but rather a way to share ideas and meet your neighbors. Do you have hardscape features such as fountains, arbors, pathways, garden art or water features that are pleasing to you? Attractive plants or collections? Do you garden for wildlife? Perhaps you have success stories or disappointments to share. The deadline to register is April 15. Information on registering is posted on the mail center bulletin boards, on the PWHOA website and in a flyer that you may have already received. 



Be safe: When an Armadillo Sees its Shadow, is it Boating Season in Texas?



Have fun this summer but remember: Nobody's Waterproof.

The time of year known nationally as the official boating season is about as relevant to Texans as Punxsutawney Phil seeing his shadow on Groundhog Day in Pennsylvania.

Our climate does not limit water recreation to three months out of the year as in may other states across the country. Many a Texas Christmas photo shows family members sporting shorts. On Feb. 25, Austin's 92-degree high was one of the warmest on record for that date. With warm, sunny days today, boaters and swimmers are not waiting until May to enjoy water recreation.

And with LCRA's meteorologist Bob Rose forecasting a trend of warmer temperatures, we can expect to see the numbers of lake visitors on the

rise well before the official first day of spring. What we don't want to see, however, is more lake accidents occurring earlier as well.

Unfortunately, the first two Highland Lakes drownings already occurred in February. They were both at Lake Travis and both victims were Austin-area residents. This is the earliest in a year that a lake fatality has occurred on Lake Travis in at least eight years.

So just as our mild Texas winters don't limit use of the lakes, actions and precautions that make lake visits safer should not be limited to Memorial Day through Labor Day. That doesn't mean folks won't hear plenty about National Safe Boating Week when it takes place May 17-23; it just means we want the safety reminders to be heard now when tit's already warm enough to enjoy the lakes.

Plenty of water in the Highland Lakes and warm temperatures provide a great opportunity for people to enjoy the water by boat or from the shoreline. And lake visitors of all types can benefit from following a few easy water safety tips such as swimming or boating with a friend, wearing a life jacket, drinking responsibly and taking time to learn about risks such as water-related illnesses that are associated with any lake.

For the third year, LCRA will promote safe enjoyment of the lakes through its Nobody's WaterproofTM campaign. See www.nobodyswaterproof.com for dates and locations of these interactive lake events as well as tips to make sure your lake visit is fun and safe from start to finish.

Five to stay alive

- Always swim with a friend. Recognize the signs of someone in trouble. Most drowning victims don't yell for help; instead, they panic and slip quietly under water.
- Always wear a life jacket. And, don't overestimate your swimming abilities.
- Drink responsibly. Many drowning accidents involve alcohol, which affects your coordination and judgment, especially when boating or swimming. Always drink lots of water.
- Boat safely. Familiarize yourself with the lake, and be aware of your surroundings at all times.
- Have required equipment onboard. And, make sure it works correctly!

Be Safe and Prepared in the Water Submitted by LCRA

If someone does get in trouble in the water, here are things you can do to help while keeping yourself out of danger.

- Reach To help someone in the water, reach first with a fishing pole, long stick, floating noodle, or boat oar, but don't get in the water yourself.
- Throw Scan the area for items such as an empty milk jug, cooler, ring buoy, other flotation device or a rope. Bring a boat cushion that floats and keep it close at hand.
- Row It is not safe to go near a swimmer with the boat motor running. Turn the motor off and use oars to bring the boat close enough to reach or throw.
- Don't Go Without training and experience in life-saving techniques, you could put yourself in danger along with the person you are trying to help.
- Know and Call Know where you are on the lake or at the park so that when you call 9-1-1, emergency personnel can locate you.

Spring is Here. . . Head for the Parks Submitted by LCRA



Spring break and Easter have come and gone, so you know what that means in Central Texas: It's time to head for the parks to camp, fish or just take a long day to play in the warming weather.

The busiest weekends of 2008 recreation season are upon us as outdoor lovers by the thousands pull out their stored-away camping equipment to give it a check and uncover the boat to make sure it still runs and is safe.

Then they head for outside adventures, including flocking to LCRA's 40 parks and recreation areas that are located from the Highland Lakes down the Colorado River to Matagorda Bay.

Because of the drought-breaking floods last summer, the Highland Lakes are full and offer plenty of water for recreation of all types.

Depending on what Mother Nature does with the weather – remember this is Texas and spring can mean rainy and cold or perfect 70s or higher - some people will even jump in the cold river or lakes for an early springtime dip. Or maybe water ski. If you do this, consider these safety tips: Don't stay in the water too long and swim with a buddy.

Back on land, it's a little early for wildflowers. Some trees will start to bud and the prime wildflower season is just around the corner.

This is also a good time to watch birds migrating north, such as hummingbirds,

robins and purple martins.

If the weather is right, early spring can provide some of the best tent camping of the year. RV camping is good even if it's raining and chilly because you can be snug in your camper anywhere.

Word to the wise: Campgrounds and particularly cabins and RV spots get reserved early. In fact, reservations can be made 333 days out. For instance, some reservations were made last fall for Memorial Day. So the sooner you call the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department Reservation Center at (512) 389-8900, the better chance you have to get the spot you want when you want it. Plan ahead.

Special discounts may still be available during the spring at some LCRA parks. Call the individual parks to check.

It's a good practice to check on county burn bans before you go.





SCOUTS AIM TO "KEEP TEXAS FED"

Scouting for Food drive has goal of collecting 250,000 pounds of food in Central Texas

AUSTIN – Thousands of Scouts will visit homes in April to collect more than a quarter-million pounds of food for needy Central Texas families.

The 2008 "Keep Texas Fed" Scouting for Food drive is on Saturday, April 12, 2008. In its inaugural year in 2007, the drive collected more than 83,000 pounds of food for the Capital Area Food Bank and its Partner Agencies.

"Many people donate food during the traditional holiday months," says Adrienne Longenecker, Deputy Director Community Relations for the Capital Area Food Bank. "But we have a serious need just before summer, as children who were counting on meals at school spend more time at home. The 'Keep Texas Fed' drive was a tremendous help last year and we know that Scouts will rise to the occasion again this year."

76% of households receiving assistance from Capital Area Food Bank Partner Agencies report incomes below the federal poverty level (source: Hunger in America 2006: Central Texas Report, in association with America's Second Harvest). These are families that are working, trying to support themselves but have trouble making ends meet.

Starting in April, Scouts will leave door hangers on the front door of homes in their communities, informing residents that Scouts will be back on Saturday, April 12, starting at 8am, to collect food donations. Instead of providing bags for the donations, Scouts are asking people to put the food in plastic shopping bags already in their homes. After Scouts pick up the bags, the food will be donated and the bags will be recycled.



There's No Such Thing As Buzzards

To most Texans, vultures are simply "buzzards," an unfortunate misnomer that stems from the term early settlers used to describe these birds that reminded them of a common, medium-sized hawk found in Europe. American vultures have their own distinct family and differ from vultures found on other continents, which are more closely related to hawks and eagles.

Vultures are characterized by small, unfeathered heads and hooded beaks, which help them feed on the carrion that makes up most of their diet. As scavengers, they often feed together and assemble in large groups to roost at night. These gregarious birds become solitary during the spring nesting season, from March to June in Texas, and prefer protected rock ledges, caves, hollow trees, and even deserted buildings as nesting sites, as they do little to no nest construction. Male and female vultures look alike, and they have no song or call, although they will grunt and hiss when feeding or frightened.

Turkey vultures are one of two vulture species common in central Texas. Large, sleek, and black with a naked red head, white beak, and longish tail, the turkey vulture has a six-foot wing span. Combined with its relatively light weight, you will often see this bird using thermals to carry it aloft, soaring high above the ground in sweeping circles. From below, its slender wings appear two-toned, with leading edge black wing linings contrasting with trailing edge light grey flight feathers. Unlike other vultures, the turkey vulture uses its sense of smell to locate carrion. And like its stork relatives, this vulture often defecates on its own legs, using the evaporation of the water in its feces to cool itself down.

Smaller, with a shorter tail, naked black head, and a wing span of less than five feet, the black vulture is not built for endless soaring like the turkey vulture. As such, you will often see this bird alternate rapid flapping of its wings with short glides. From below, its wings also appear two-toned, but with the light grey feathers appearing only on the wing tips. Unlike the turkey vulture, the black vulture will supplement its carrion diet with small mammals, reptiles, and young birds, and will depend solely on its vision to find food. A more aggressive bird, black vultures will often form small groups and gang up on a larger turkey vulture to drive it from a carcass.

Populations of turkey and black vultures fluctuate throughout the year in central Texas. Although some stay year-round, many turkey vultures spend the winter in Central America. Black vultures also migrate, and may travel as far south as Brazil for the winter. Protected by the Migratory Bird Treaty Act of 1918, it is illegal to take, kill, or possess turkey or black vultures, except for birds that are injured and unable to return to the wild.

TAX TIPS - 2008

Don't forget to file your Federal Income Taxes (or apply for an extension) by Tuesday, April 15, 2008!! The IRS has made it much easier to file electronically if you do not want to file a paper return or are in need of a last minute extension. You can also file form 4868 electronically which will give you an extension of up to 6 months to file your return (October 15, 2008) but it does not extend the payment for those taxes. If you think you will owe when you do file your return, then you must pay the balance along with the extension request or you will pay the government interest and penalties.

Looking for your refund? If you have already filed your return and want to know the status of your refund, you can now log on-line and find out when you can expect to receive it. This option is available whether you requested automatic deposit into one or multiple accounts or a check mailed to your home address. Log on to: www.irs.gov for a link to this feature.

Make sure you: Maximize your credits!

The credits available to many filers are often overlooked. These include:

<u>Child & Dependent Care Credit</u>: may be available for daycare expenses paid even if you participate in a flexible spending program with your employer.

<u>Child Tax Credit:</u> generally available for taxpayers having qualifying children with adjusted gross income under \$110,000

<u>Education Credits:</u> for higher education expenses two different credits apply, the Hope Credit and the Lifetime Learning Credit

<u>Adoption Credits:</u> a nonrefundable credit available for taxpayers with qualified adoption expenses

Watch Out For: The IRS has new substantiation requirements for common itemized deductions such as employee business deductions and charitable contributions including non-cash contributions.

Make sure you get with your tax advisor if you think any of the above could possibly benefit you as each individual situation is different.

• RUN with the HEROES – 04-20-2008



Alternatives to Lawn Expense

For a long time now, most American landscaping has focused on maintaining a manicured green lawn. This requires a lot of water and fertilizer. Native trees, shrub masses, ground covers, prairie or meadow patches, wildflower beds, and attractively mulched areas are better environmental choices for people and for wildlife. Below are some more reasons to consider reducing your lawn and the expense that goes with it.

If you are fed up with lawn maintenance, here are some alternatives to consider...

- · native species of ground cover instead of grass
- native trees and/or shrub masses
- water garden or pond
- rock garden
- mulched paths
- · native annual or perennial beds
- · meadow or prairie patch
- hedgerow
- organic vegetable garden
- · butterfly or hummingbird garden

Remember if Buffalo Grass is used instead of regular turf grass, no additional water is required after it is established. When it gets dry, it goes dormant, when it rains it greens up. It only grows about six inches high so mowing is not necessary. If you must water, the city recommends water every 45 days for Buffalo Grass to stay green. Mowing can increase weed infestation so hand weeding is recommended if you cut your Buffalo Grass. 
