I quickly learned that she is the person who runs the Events Committee. Her very dedicated and loyal group of parents, teachers, and volunteers, put on all the annual parties for our kids: the Fourth of July Parade, the Easter Egg hunt, our adult and kids holidav parities and countless other family oriented events. I had no idea how much work and planning went into those things until I joined over 400 parents and kids for the parade last Fourth of July!

- □ Landscape Esc/Slaughter electrical repair to begin mid April
- □ Landscape Circle C West Post Offices
- □ Landscape Turf replacement work to begin mid to late April
- Swim Center & Café Roof Phase I of this project has been completed (new roofs and gutters on both buildings. Phase II (sealant applied to outside of buildings and re-caulking) and Phase III (new awnings) are currently out to bid and should be completed by early to mid April.
- Swim Center Volleyball Courts
- □ Fence off BB Court work to begin mid-April
- ☑ Swim Center Furniture The purchase of three new pool tarps and two lane line storage reels has been completed. New loungers and chairs have been ordered and new tables are currently out to bid.
- ☑ Swim Center Shade Two new shade structures (to be placed on the northeast side of the pool deck), a replacement shade tarp in between the swim center and café building and new awnings have been bid and should be installed by May.

Deed Restriction Update

We will continue driving two sections of Circle C per month to note any violations of the deed restrictions. Violations may include, but are not limited to: excessive weeds, areas of no turf, dead shrubs and/or trees, yard art, grass that is not edged or mowed, areas of dead grass, boats, RV's, trailers and general home maintenance issues. We encourage each of you to evaluate your lawn now so that you have time to re-sod if needed before the heat of summer. We are required to send notification of deed restriction violations via certified mail and we also send regular mail. If you receive a deed restriction violation notice and would like to speak to us about your plans for improvement, please contact the HOA

office at 288-8663. It's impossible to know everyone's individual situation, so we appreciate communication from you. We also recommend that you review the architectural control committee's landscape design guidelines located within this newsletter.

If you have a deed restriction to report, you may email us the specific address at info@circlecranch.info or give us a call at 288-8663. Violations that are reported are generally checked with 2 business days and if we are able to confirm a violation, we will begin the deed restriction process (which you can access on the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/documents/ AssociationDocuments/DeedRestrictions/ CCHOA-DeedRestrictionPolicy2003.pdf

Circle C Landscape

As we move along through spring, hopefully, the CCHOA common areas and your yards are looking great. We do have a couple of reminders for the month of May.

New Water Conservation Ordinance. All homeowners will be required to follow the City of Austin Water Conservation ordinance beginning May 1, 2008. If your address is odd, your watering days are Wednesday and Saturday. If your address is even, your watering days are Thursday and Sunday.

Most of our common areas will water on Tuesday and Friday. However, due to the number of stations, we have applied for a variance to water some areas one different days. We will post the schedule on the Circle C website as soon as we receive the final approval from the City of Austin.

May is Community Fire Ant Treatment month. Treating for fire ants can be very

effective if everyone does it at the same time period. We encourage everyone to treat their entire yards with Fire Ant Bait in May.

The Texas Department of Agriculture recommends that you apply a fire ant bait product with the active ingredient Fibronil. Some of the brand names that have this ingredient are Over and Out, or Top Choice Fire Ant bait.

We have worked on improvements during April, and hopefully, by the time you get this newsletter we will have completed the landscape restoration of the south side of the Slaughter/Escarpment intersection.

Also, during April, we completed a fertilization of the common area, implemented our weekly mowing schedule, weeded beds, trimmed shrubs and tried to keep everything in great shape during this spring growing season.

Hide Your Garbage Can & Recycle Bin!

We are continuing to receive many complaints from residents about owners who are storing their garbage can and recycle bin in view from the street. Garbage cans and recycle bins should be hidden from view - either behind your fence or in your garage. The vast majority of homeowners are able to

hide their cans out of view, please do YOUR part to keep Circle C a beautiful place to live.



CCHOA News Continued Yard Waste Should Be Collected in Paper Bags or Designated Garbage Container

The City of Austin has contacted the HOA office to request that we remind residents that all yard waste should be placed in paper bags (can be purchased at Home Depot or Lowes) and not in plastic bags. You may also have a separate garbage container (up to 30 gallons) that is used exclusively for yard waste. The City takes all yard waste to the Hornsby Bend Waste Water treatment plant to be composted and they cannot take anything in plastic bags. Yard waste should be placed at the curb along with garbage containers on collection days, not any sooner. If you have any questions, please contact the City at 974-1945.

ME AND MY SHADOW

Park West resident Jackie Rollins wrote the following in the form of email messages to friends and neighbors after her 15-year old cat, Shadow, twice a cancer survivor, went missing. We believe that those of you with a beloved pet will find this an amazing story.

Gone

March 27, 2008

I have some sad news about my beloved cat Shadow. He went missing on Saturday, March 8, nearly three weeks ago. The last I saw of him was when he went out the front door at 11 a.m. and paused on the walkway enjoying the sunshine. Later, a neighbor said he saw him in the front yard next door at 11:45 a.m. It was highly unusual for him not to come back in through his flap in the back door at least in mid-to-late afternoon for a snack. I began calling him before dark. Normally, he would have been on the back patio, on a bench or chair. I stayed up most of the night, walking the neighborhood and calling him.... but nothing, then or now.

March 8 was a year and two months since his surgery for a second cancerous intestinal tumor. At that time, it had been about a year and three months since the first tumor was removed, in late September 2005. He had exceeded the veterinarian's - and everyone else's - expectations of his surviving maybe 8 months, tops, after the first surgery. I am

so blessed that I did at least have him for an extra 2-1/2 years. With this history, speculation is that he just decided to go off by himself to die. I hope and pray he didn't suffer, especially if another animal is responsible for his disappearance. (There is a greenbelt in the back of the houses across the street from mine, but Shadow never ventured beyond a fence line.) If he went off to die, though, anything is possible. I can hardly bear it because I didn't have a chance to say goodbye to him. I miss my companion of nearly 14 years so very much.

When I told his surgeon, Dr. Runk, that Shadow was gone, I also asked her about doing something in his memory through Central Texas Veterinary Specialty Hospital. She referred me to the business manager, and today I set up the "Shadow Rollins Memorial Fund" to help defray the cost of surgery for pet owners who are unable to pay all or part of the cost and who otherwise might have to let their pet be put to sleep, even if surgery could save their life. I plan to add to the fund on a regular basis and hope that my friends and neighbors who knew this special cat will contribute to it in his memory. My grief is unbearable, especially since there are so many unanswered questions as to what has really happened to him. In my heart I cannot accept the fact that he would disappear of his own accord so suddenly and so completely. The silence is deafening.

A Miracle

April 1, 2008

A miracle happened tonight! A message left on my answering machine at 7:57 p.m. from a young woman who gave just a street name - no house number or phone number - said my cat was in her yard and she didn't know how long he would remain there but I could call back later. My home phone doesn't have caller ID. It was obvious the caller read the name and phone number from Shadow's tag. Was he actually alive? I dialed Star 69 but got a busy signal. I yelled for my next door neighbor Leslie, who happened to be

outside my front door, to listen to the message. The street the caller mentioned was "Bramble Bush." We looked it up on Google. It's in zip 78747 – across both Loop 1 and I-35, off William Cannon, not far from McKinney Falls Parkway, in far southeast Austin!! It was now 8:45 p.m. She, her husband and I piled into her SUV and drove about



12 miles to Bramble Bush (a short street with 14 houses on each side). Not knowing what we were doing (we had no clue which house the call came from) and in the dark, in an unfamiliar neighborhood, we started walking down the street. One lady heard us calling for Shadow and came outside and asked me if it was a gray cat I was looking for. Yes! She said she'd seen one near her house about three hours earlier. Then Leslie screamed that she heard a cat meowing (we'd heard nothing

but dogs in backyards barking until then) and started walking toward the sound. Then she screamed again! At the very end of the street, in front of the last house on the left side of the block, stood Shadow! He came right up to her and I ran up and grabbed him into my arms.

I will always be grateful to my neighbors for giving up their evening and dinner (which had just been delivered) and taking me on what could have ended up being a wild goose (cat?) chase to help me track Shadow down.

This is so unbelievably incredible! How did he get there? Was he just wandering from place to place for 25 days and 24 nights? How did he survive on the streets in such a remote area for nearly a month? Was he taken on purpose and dumped? I'll never know. But what I do know is that it WASN'T his time to go yet - and I have him back at last! And thank God his collar and tags were intact for that fateful anonymous call. I prayed every day for a miracle, and I got one! He looks thinner but doesn't seem worse for the wear - no wounds or missing fur. He's beautiful! He ate a small can of Fancy Feast (yes, I saved it, hoping) and drank a lot of water. We'll be heading to the vet in the morning for a thorough check up. And right now, he doesn't want to leave my side. He's been following me from room to room and purring up a storm. He knows, and he's as grateful as I am, that he's finally home. What a survivor! He snuggled up with his Beanie Buddy immediately, like they had never been apart!

Dear Neighbors and Friends:

In the early days of Circle C (late 1980s and early 1990s) a collection of your neighbors and fellow investors gathered together to fight all comers, including the environmentalists and those who actually believed that the development of Circle C was inconsistent with the betterment of the greater Austin area. Your neighbors won all of those battles, and we now have a community of nearly 4,000 homes and about 11,000, more-or-less citizens. During that time it became necessary to separate the political actions of our community from the Circle C Homeowners Association, so there was formed by majority vote the Circle C Political Action Committee (CC PAC). The voting representatives of the CCHoA decided to establish the CC PAC and to automatically make everybody who was a member of the CCHoA automatically a "member" of the CC PAC. The CC PAC was set up as a separate, arms-length organization with its own board of directors, but responsible to the members of the Circle C community.

In the early days, we picked and elected folks who had served in various positions either with the CCHoA or in other assignments as "directors" of the CC PAC. From time to time, those directors have issued recommendations for prospective candidates as to their probability to serve the interests of our community. Many of our neighbors have requested and demanded some directive from the CC PAC about whom to support by virtue of the CC PAC's interviewing and discussions with various candidates, and from time to time the CC PAC has issued white papers showing recommendations, and the CC PAC also has from time to time bought advertisements in local periodicals which, interestingly, had a lot more impact than only for Circle C.

This evening (March 4) I had the privilege of standing in line with (my guess) maybe 300 to 500 Democrats at the caucus in Precinct 367, and I began to realize that for all of these years, the CC PAC has been overly weighted by history, on the conservative side. The purpose of the CC PAC was to represent the cross-section of our community, and I submit that somehow we have failed. So, I am recommending to our Board to solicit volunteers (all of whom will have to be confirmed by a vote by the membership [typically at a CCHoA meeting] as elected directors of the CC PAC. The purpose

(For Park West Residents) - Submitted by Jackie Rollins

As the deadline for this column approaches, Park West's roads and gates maintenance project is in its final stages. The objective was to fill cracks and ruts in the streets and apply a seal coat to protect them from the elements. The gates were painted and repaired as necessary. With few exceptions, everyone cooperated, and despite weather delays and some disruption of residents' daily routines, everyone got through it with the knowledge that this complex undertaking will not be necessary again for many years. In response to inquiries about the total cost of the project: \$20,000 was budgeted for road work, actual cost was just under \$18,000; \$3,000 was budgeted for gate repair, actual cost was just under \$2,500. Bottom line: the project, which was originally planned for later in the year, was completed ahead of schedule and under budget. The Park West BoD thanks all residents for their patience and cooperation.

Important news for everyone! The curbing of water waste is of primary importance to Austin's future water availability; therefore, the City of Austin has several new outdoor watering ordinances that will take effect on May 1. That's now! Details were included in a flyer sent with the latest City of Austin utility bill. If you haven't read it yet, please do so. If you tossed it or misplaced it, go to www. WaterWiseAustin.org or call 974-2199 for details. You can also visit www.ci.austin.tx.us/watercon/summer.htm for information. Compliance with these new ordinances is mandatory. Fines for violation of these ordinances can be assessed at up to \$2,000 per day per offense with court appearances and the potential of being charged with a Class C misdemeanor! Do I have your attention now? Please read on. The new watering schedule provides two days per week for outdoor watering at any one address. For Park West, that means odd number addresses water on Wednesday and/or Saturday, even number addresses on Thursday and/or Sunday. In addition, from May 1 - September 30, no outdoor watering is allowed between 10 A.M. and 7 P.M. except with a hand-held hose or bucket. Readers, please take note: an additional year round restriction that is already in effect is that NO AUTOMATIC SPRINKLER SYSTEM MAY WATER BETWEEN 10 A.M. and 7 P.M. It has been observed on an almost daily basis that some residents' sprinklers go off after 10 A.M. or at different times in the afternoon, and some as many as three or four times a week. Timers must be reset to adhere to the rules or a substantial fine could be in your future! Suggestion: you may want to consider turning off the timer and turning your system on manually when it's time to water.

And while we're on the subject of water, water conservation and sprinklers, here are some words of wisdom from the experts, Park West's own Pearson Landscape Services.

- Don't water during daylight hours. Doing this wastes water and is not good for plants or grass.
- Don't overspray onto driveways, sidewalks or your house.
- Tall risers should only be used in shrub beds and at the foundation of the house. Ones that over-spray beds and grass are wasting water. Many plants, especially roses, do not respond well to being watered in this manner.
- Watering should be done according to the City of Austin schedule.
- If you have plants that need additional watering, the City allows hose watering any time, but use your best judgment.
- Main points:
 - 1. Water in the early morning, which is the best time.
 - 2. Don't water the concrete.
 - 3. Make sure your sprinkler system is working properly. Send an e-mail to lance@pearsonlandscape.com for your annual sprinkler
 - 4. check if you haven't already done so.

A big thanks goes to all of you who rallied to the April 1 deadline reminder in last month's column about garbage and recycling carts having to be stored from street view. If you have plans to add fencing, a walkway or make other modifications for a more permanent place to park the carts on the side of your house due to lack of garage space, be advised that you will need to follow the formal process of going through the Circle C Architectural Control Committee for permission.

The guidelines and directions can be found on the Circle C website at www.circlecranch.info/landscape.asp. There is a form that will need to be submitted, along with the plans and a small project fee (\$30), to the ACC. All of the instructions can be found online. School News

CCHOA Education Committee Update Election Day: May 10, 2008

On Election Day, we will have the opportunity to approve funding for the purchase of land for a new high school in south Austin, to provide relief for Bowie and Austin High Schools. The decision to include this purchase in the bond proposal is a result of our Circle C community voicing our concerns based on the student population growth in our elementary and middle schools. The following summarizes what is included in the bond.

- Improve education by addressing overcrowding: Purchase land to address existing overcrowding at Bowie and Austin High Schools. Construct and renovate high school science labs to meet new four-year state requirements; construct new schools and classroom additions at overcrowded campuses;
- Protect the environment: Renovate air conditioning and heating units; purchase low-emission-fuel hybrid buses; implement upgrades to meet new health code requirements and complete other critical repairs and renovations that will save resources and promote healthier and safer learning conditions.
- Expand technology to ensure equitable access for all Austin schools: Expand wireless networks to the 30 percent of our schools that do not currently have wireless capability; purchase technology for all schools so that teachers can more closely monitor students' achievements; meet state requirements for special education testing; help students meet the requirements of the 21st Century.
- Build a performing arts center for use by all schools: Construct a performing arts center and renovate school auditoriums to ensure equitable standards at local high schools and to support the fine arts curriculum district-wide.

As a result of our Circle C community support of the 2004 bond, we have received the expansion of Kiker Elementary and the new Clayton Elementary. The construction of the New Southwest Middle School at Slaughter and 1826 has commenced and the school will open in fall of 2009. The AISD school board has also approved another new

elementary school to provide relief for Clayton Elementary. Our Circle C community support of the AISD bonds programs helped make all this possible.

If the Circle C Community supports this AISD bond on Election Day, it will be a vote in favor of continuing to improve our community's education facilities, which will in turn continue to improve the quality of our children's education.

- Proposition No. 1: For Growth and Overcrowding Relief and to Support Academic Achievement
- Proposition No. 2: For Health, and Safety, Environmental Improvements and Other District needs
- Proposition No. 3: For Education, Special Programs and Expansion including the Performing Arts Center for the use by all schools in the district. Land purchase for a new high school.

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Gardening in the Hill Country May 2008

Spring is in full swing with bright green mornings full of sunshine and bird song. Area garden centers are bursting with eager gardeners loading carts with compost, flowers and landscape supplies. While riding the energy of the season to beautify your yard, keep in mind a few things that will help the garden flourish through spring and summer.

Healthy soil supports a healthy landscape. Dedicate energy every year to improving your soil, and you will be richly rewarded with better blooms, improved water efficiency, and fewer disease problems. Work compost into garden and flower beds, and top-dress established areas and lawns with compost. Compost improves soil quality, and reduces or eliminates the need for fertilizer.

Water your garden efficiently and effectively. Although some watering is necessary to sustain gardens in the Hill Country, many people water too much! Over-watering wet or shallow soil results in weakened or diseased plants as well as runoff (water and money down the storm drain). For our thin and clay Hill Country soils, ¹/₂ inch, twice per week is the maximum amount you should need to water--even during the heat of summer. During spring and fall, ¹/₂ inch once per week is plenty.

Watering between dusk and dawn further increases the effectiveness of the water you use by reducing evaporation and increasing the amount of water that makes it to plant roots. Twice per week summer watering is good for landscapes and also good for water supply. Over 60 percent of residential water is used on landscapes in the summer, resulting in water treatment plants experiencing peak demands. Efficient watering reduces the need to built new water treatment plants.

The City of Austin recently adopted a mandatory twice per week watering schedule effective May 1 through September 30. In April, the LCRA board will consider adopting the same watering schedule for LCRA water customers. The watering schedule is as follows:

Odd addresses: Wednesday and Saturday

Even addresses: Thursday and Sunday

Commercial and HOA common areas: Tuesday and Friday

Healthy soil and efficient watering will assure that the vibrant flowers in your shopping cart at the garden center thrive in your yard throughout the growing season. Happy planting!

COMPOST & AERATION: Keys to a Healthy Lawn

Compost and Aeration are key ingredients to a healthy, vibrant green turf. The combination of both Compost and Aeration help to improve the lawn's root system, soil compaction and soil composition.

The first key ingredient is Aeration. This is the process of perforating the soil with small holes that allow water, air and fertilizer to get closer to the roots. This enables the roots to grow more deeply producing a healthier, greener turf. The aeration process removes thin, cigar-shaped plugs of dirt and then deposits them on the surface of the lawn. These plugs are left on the lawn in order to get oxygen to the root system.

When lawns are not aerated, air gets squeezed out of the soil and roots cannot grow as efficiently. "The soil under the lawn tends to compact readily because, unlike garden soil, it is virtually never worked or turned. For the lawn, aerating is the alternative to tilling."*

The second key ingredient is the compost or top soil. Compost is an all natural, organic fertilizer that dispenses nutrients into your soil. The lawn is top dressed with compost after aerating. As it slowly decomposes throughout the year, it leaves you with a strong, green and lush lawn. Compost also has more of a significant amount of additional nutrients than any "brand name" fertilizer you can buy at your local home and garden center.

The process of Aerating and applying compost decreases the soil compaction, allows nutrients into the soil and strengthens your lawn root system during the stresses of summer. Both Aerating and Composting are key factors to a healthy lawn.

The old saying "we are what we eat" is so true. Everything we consume is digested and absorbed into our bloodstream to 'fuel' our bodies.
