

The Cypress Community Honors a **Retiring Firefighter**

Tracy Martin, Fairfield resident, has decided to hang up his helmet to devote more time to his family.

Tracy began volunteering with the Cy-Fair Volunteer Fire Department at the Copperfield Fire Station #9 in October 1987. He is a Lifetime Member of the CFVFD and wore many hats during his twenty plus years of service to the Cypress community. Tracy served as Communications Supervisor from the mid 1990's until 2003; was elected Vice President of the CFVFD Board of Directors - served from 1997 to 2000; awarded the honor of Dispatcher of the Year in 1995; and was appointed to the position of Safety Officer in 2005. He has held the distinguished position of Lieutenant at both CFVFD Station #7 and Station #9 and carries certifications in both Firefighting and as an EMT.

Tracy moved to the Fairfield community in 1999 to Inwood Park and currently resides in Bradford Creek with his wife, Wendy, and their 3 1/2 year old son, Quentin. Not only did Tracy serve as a Volunteer in the CFVFD, but has held a "regular" job working for the City of Jersey Village since 1993 where he is the Communications Supervisor.

Joe Davis, R.Ph. D.Ph., Fairfield resident and Fire Chief for the CFVFD, had this to say about Tracy: "We will miss Tracy and as in all organizations of our type there are only a select few that continue to give all of their hard work and energy back to their community. The Cy-Fair Volunteer Fire Department appreciates the 20 plus years of dedication and enthusiasm that he has contributed. From Firefighter to Station Officer to Vice President of the Board he has given back to his community without asking for anything in return; the mark of a true volunteer

spirit. We will miss him and it is my privilege to have served our community together."

In the great essay of Benjamin Franklin, "Brave Men at Fires" – he explained the unspoken creed of all firefighters when he wrote: "Neither cold nor darkness will deter good people, who are able, from hastening to the dreadful place, and giving their best assistance to quench the flames." Tracy Martin exemplifies this creed and has served his community in the best traditions of humanity through his compassion for those in need and his bravery to defy dangerous consequences to help them.



BRADFORD CREEK BOARD OF DIRECTORS NEWS

Since we have received several contacts concerning the operation of our Bradford Creek pool we thought it best to share some general information concerning all Fairfield pools. A document titled "RE-CIPROCAL SWIMMING POOL USAGE AGREEMENT" was put into effect in July of 2002. The basic premise is that "Each neighborhood Association shall contribute funds to pay the total costs incurred to operate all of the swimming pools and related amenities owned by and/or under the jurisdiction of the Neighborhood Associations." The beneficial part is that "The owners and/or occupants of any residential dwelling under the jurisdiction of a particular Neighborhood Association shall have the right to use any swimming pool and related amenities owned by or under the jurisdiction of any other Neighborhood Association ..."

Since our Bradford Creek pool has been the most popular pool in Fairfield this agreement is a mixed blessing for Bradford Creek residents. i.e. You have the right to use any pool but you may prefer to use your neighborhood pool - possibly within walking distance from your residence. However, since it has been the most popular pool it has reached capacity (Texas Department of Health rules) on the early weekends this spring and some people had to be directed to other neighborhood pools that were not at capacity.

We apologize for any inconvenience this may have caused our Bradford Creek residents. In addition, we want to assure our residents that the plan is to have the Bradford Creek pool remain open 6 days per week through the 2008 pool season.

Since the planning and operation of Fairfield swimming pools is a rather complicated process we will not attempt to detail further in this article. If you have a particular interest about this subject or want to provide input for the next pool season please contact one of your resident Directors listed in the front of the Gazette. The planning process begins in late fall with budget allocation for next year so it is not too early to provide your ideas or comments.


Dear Residents,

The 2008/2009 Fairfield Village Community Association (FFVCA) assessment invoices are in the mail (or should have been received). Please note that the amount is due July 1, 2008 and considered delinquent after July 31, 2008.

For those of you who are new, there are two assessments for your home in Fairfield – one is your individual neighborhood that is due in January of each year and the FFVCA assessment which is due each July.

In order to avoid collection costs these fees must be kept current. We do accept payment plans – however it is the homeowner's responsibility to make a payment every 30 days to avoid legal action. If your account is turned over to the Attorney for collection the legal penalties are substantial – if a suit is filed for foreclosure the fees are over \$2,000. Please plan for these fees to avoid the above situations!







District to Implement No-cost EKG Screenings

Beginning in the 2008-2009 school year, Cypress-Fairbanks ISD will implement an electrocardiogram (ECG, also commonly referred to as EKG) screening program for incoming ninth-grade student athletes. The District is partnering with local cardiologist Dr. Tom DeBauche to bring EKG machines to each high school at no cost.

Electrocardiograms display the electrical activity of the heart over time, and can identify most individuals who are at risk for life-threatening heart conditions. According to Dr. DeBauche, the implementation of the screenings could reduce the potential loss of life by student athletes by 90 percent. "This is an example of what makes Cypress-Fairbanks ISD a very special place, when community members like Dr. DeBauche take an active role—not only with an idea, but with a means to achieve that idea—making sure our students are given the best care possible in the school district and taking a proactive measure to prevent possible tragedy," said CFISD superintendent Dr. David Anthony. Beginning in the summer, Dr. DeBauche will train district nurses and athletic trainers on how to conduct the screenings. According to Jan Jones, director of health services, the plan is to begin screening incoming ninth-grade students by the spring of 2009. The long-term goal is to have every high school student athlete undergo an EKG screening. "We will be the only school district in the state of Texas that intends to test every student athlete," Dr. Anthony said. "In my 34 years in education, I've never experienced a donation of time, expertise and material more important to the lives of students."

KAISER LOOKS TO BUILD SUCCESSFUL TENNIS PROGRAMS AT NEWEST CY-FAIR HIGH SCHOOL

Scott Kaiser comes to Cypress Ranch High School as the Mustangs' tennis coach after building a winning tradition at Morton Ranch High School in Katy. Kaiser, 48, helped open the 5A school in 2004 and the Mavericks' program finished fourth and gualified for the District 18-5A playoffs in its first two varsity seasons, then finished third last fall. The Mavericks accomplished this feat in a district that features 13-time Region III champion Katy Taylor and regional powerhouse Cinco Ranch. The tennis team is one of only two MRHS programs to qualify for the playoffs every season since the school's inception. Kaiser is certified in English, history and journalism. 




Greetings to all Fairfield Singles:

Did You Know? The Bible speaks of a final judgment day when all will stand before God while He opens various books to judge them. What are these books? The Old Testament prophet Daniel saw a vision of God's end-times judgment: "A river of fire was streaming forth and proceeding from God's presence. Many thousands were ministering to Him; many tens of thousands stood ready to serve Him. The court convened, and the books were opened" (Daniel 7:10).

The Apostle John, some 600 years after Daniel, saw a similar vision: "Then I saw a large white throne and the one who was seated on it; the earth and the heaven fled from his presence, and no place was found for them. And I saw the dead, the great and the small, standing before the throne. Then books were opened, and another book was opened – the book of life. So the dead were judged by what was written in the books, according to their deeds. The sea gave up the dead that were in it, and Death and Hades gave up the dead that were in them, and each one was judged according to his deeds. Then Death and Hades were thrown into the lake of fire. This is the second death – the lake of fire. If anyone's name was not found written in the book of life, that person was thrown into the lake of fire" (Revelation 20:11-15).

Both prophets saw God at the end of time, on judgment day, opening "books." What are these books, and what do they contain inside? First, in Psalm 87:6, one of these books is a registry of all living beings. This would be like a city's registry of living residents. When a person dies, they are taken off of the registry in that town. On a couple of occasions there are biblical writers who show their disdain for those who hate God, and they plead with God to remove these from this "book of the living" (Ps. 69:28; cf. Rev. 3:5).

A second book spoken of in the Bible is seen in Psalm 56:8: "You keep track of my misery. Put my tears in your leather container. Are they not recorded in your scroll?" This book is a recording of all the events of our lives – right





down to every tear we have shed.

A third book referenced in Scripture is found in Psalm 139:16 which says, "Your eyes saw me when I was inside the womb. All the days ordained for me were recorded in your scroll before one of them came into existence." This book, therefore, is the one that holds all the days that have been ordained for our lives – from our birth to our impending death.

A fourth book the Bible speaks of is found in Psalm 51:1 which says, "...According to the greatness of your compassion, blot out my transgressions." This book contains a list of deeds that we have done throughout our lives. The psalmist has just sinned, and he fears that his deeds will be remembered by God. Therefore, he asks for them to be blotted out – to be forgiven.

A sixth book spoken of in the Bible is the Book of Life (Philippians 4:3). This book was written by God before the creation of the world (Revelation 13:8; cf. 21:27), and it records the names of all who will receive Jesus Christ as Lord – those who truly respect the Lord God (Malachi 3:16) and who will live with Him eternally. These folks are not perfect, and when they do stand before God's judgment seat they are judged with reference to eternal rewards in heaven and not eternal punishment (2 Corinthians 5:10). They do not stand in the same judgment as unbelievers do (Psalm 1:5), but they will answer to God for their actions, whether good or bad.

All of these books will be opened one day in your presence. Now the book of our deeds will not save us. It is the Book of Life that is crucial, and the only way to know if your name is there is to receive Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. He gives life to all who call upon his name.

FAIRFIELD COMMUNITY GAZETTE HOW TO TRAVEL LIGHT AND BE A "HAPPY TRAVELER"

Your carry-on bag could be the solution to some of the summer travel season's likely woes — including checked baggage fees on American Airlines and possibly other carriers — but it also has the potential to cause headaches. You don't want to find a rumpled mess when you arrive at your destination or spend your vacation shivering or sweating because you weren't ready for the weather.

It is possible to pack fashionable clothes in an efficient way. Some tips from the pros:

CHOOSE A GOOD BAG

Some travel experts recommend a standard rectangular-shaped bag with wheels for business trips because clothes are less likely to become wrinkled. For recreational travel, however, soft-sided duffel bags are better.

One way to pack play clothes to fit into space more economically is to roll them and stuff them into a bag like cigarettes into a cigarette box. But if you're using the rectangular-shaped bag, it's good to use Zip-lock plastic baggies, which come in 1 and 2-Quart sizes, as well as 1 gallon and 2 gallon sizes. Simply lay your garment or garments inside the bag, then as you zip it shut, squeeze as much air as possible out of the bag. Voila! Your bag/garment is flat as a pancake and takes up practically no space. And best of all, clothes do not tend to wrinkle using this method - unless they are fabrics that are prone to wrinkle anyway.

It's a good idea to separate undergarments and socks into one zip-

top plastic bag, tech gear such as cords and batteries into another, and toiletries all in yet another. (Any liquid needs to be stored in a see-through bag.)

Since you may be asked to open carry-on bags during a security check at the airport, things will go much more smoothly if items are organized. Otherwise, everything can spill out, which can be both inconvenient and embarrassing.

Carry-on bags tend to be treated more gently than checked bags so there is an opportunity to choose more of a fashion-forward bag than basic black. Plus, using a bright colored bag, or one with graphic print, will make it easy to find your bag in the overcrowded overhead bins.

Also, be mindful of your airline's size limit for carry-on bags. American's, for example, is 45 linear inches (height plus length plus width).

WHAT TO PACK

To minimize the number of garments you have to pack and unpack, choose a neutral color palette — maybe blue and tan, maybe black and white — and then stick with it for the trip. By limiting the number of colors and patterns, everything matches and there's no need for that extra sweater to go with the lime green skirt. To keep your wardrobe from being too boring, pack colorful scarves or cute belts, which take up very little room in a bag.

Jersey fabrics, as well as washable silks and athletic fabrics, usually pack flat and travel well, according to Susan Foster, author of a book entitled "Smart Packing" (See website at http://www.smartpacking. com/). She recently became sold on The Limited's new travel suit, made in a polyester-wool-and-Lycra blend, because it has a slimmer, more modern cut than most travel-specific clothes. Check Travel Smith and Magellan's for travel-friendly wardrobes also. (Both have online shopping sites available.)

The layered look is always works well, with enough T-shirts, camisoles or shells for each day, but only one sweater and light, water-resistant jacket to go on top.

Toiletries tend to take up a lot of room and liquid products are also subject to the 3-ounce security rule, so it might be a good time to move toward dry products, such as a stick deodorant and mineral cover-up makeup. It's also a good idea to pack shampoo with a builtin conditioner and moisturizer with SPF.

Some business travelers are forgoing the toiletry hassle altogether, ordering travel-size products (see http://www.minimus.biz) to be waiting for them at their hotel.

WHAT TO LEAVE HOME

A different outfit for every day is the worst strategy because you might need different shoes, a different handbag and different accessories for each one.

Instead, switch out only the pieces that other people notice. Change the tops, scarves, etc., but who'll notice which black pants I'm wear-

July Landscaping

July heat will take its toll on our lawns, and everything in our lawns if we fail to use water properly. Water less frequently and deeper with each application. Our lawns need one inch of water per week. Do not water so much per application that it runs off into the street curbs, but do water as much as possible per each application. Put any straight-sided container out in the lawn, water for a specific period of time, and then simply measure the amount of water you caught in the container for that period of time. You now can figure an easy formula for the goal of 1 inch per week. Your lawn turf roots will seek a deeper soil level if you water longer with each application. Deeper roots will be healthier and less drought susceptible.

If your lawn turf is getting sparse under your trees, you might take at look at the following as a possible solution. Dead or damaged limbs in your trees are very visible right now. Remove them for a healthier and better looking tree. Raising the tree canopy will allow more sunlight to reach the lawn turf underneath. Raising the canopy means you simply remove the lower limbs from the tree trunk base upward to a point. This height varies with tree variety and it is basically up to your desires. After working on the canopy, you can work at thinning the tree. This involves removing the small diameter growths from each branch starting at the bottom limbs and working upward. Depending on the overall tree size you can remove these small growths out about 1/3 of the limb length from the main trunk. Removing all this will allow more light to get through to your soil. It also allows for an increase in air circulation through the tree, which is also a benefit to the tree. Another option would be to construct a bed and plant ground cover (Asian Jasmine or English Ivy) as examples of shade loving plants.


This is a good month to remove rose bush branches that are sickly or dead. A light pruning now will increase your fall flower production. Get a good thick layer of mulch down in all your beds to help your flowers and shrubs survive the heat we all know is coming. It is easy to figure your needs. Most mulch comes in 2 cubic foot bags. Take the length of your bed times it width, multiply by .17 (2 inch depth of mulch), or by .25 (3 inch depth of mulch), and divide by 2 cubic feet per bag. The result is how many bags you need to buy. Your shrubs bases take up some space so you can subtract one or two bags and still get by fine. Example- your bed is 5 feet by 25 feet. 5x25x.17/2=10.6 bags, buy 10 and you'll be just fine.







Some Like It Hot! Structure Of Receptor For Hot Chili Pepper And Pain Revealed

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON – (May 19, 2008) – You can now not only feel the spicy kick of a jalapeno pepper, you can also see it in full 3D, thanks to researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Using sophisticated equipment, the research team led by Dr Theodore G. Wensel, professor of biochemistry and molecular biology at BCM, generated the first three dimensional view of the protein that allows you to sense the heat of a hot pepper. The report appears in the current issue of the Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences.

"This protein, known as TRPV1, not only senses spicy foods, but also makes it possible to feel real heat and the pain and inflammation related to other medical conditions," said Wensel, senior author on the study. "This method of viewing the protein now gives us the chance to clearly see the functional relationship between outside stimuli and the nerve cell."

The outside stimulus used in this study was the heat of a chili pepper. It has been known for years that the burning sensation results from the action of a chemical known as capsaicin on TRPV1 found on the nerve cell membrane. TRPV1 is an ion channel, a tiny pore on the cell membrane that allows chemicals such as calcium to flux in and out.

"Any time you feel a burn or pain sensation, it is mediated by a TRPV1 channel. Different levels of heat are mediated by different TRP channels," said Dr. Vera Moiseenkova-Bell, a postdoctoral associate in Wensel's laboratory at BCM and first author of the study. "They are all related but each is regulated in a different manner."

Wensel said the three-dimensional image of TRPV1 revealed surprising information about its structure. It is made up of a pore domain embedded in the cell membrane, and a "hanging basket" of regulatory domains that extend into the interior of the cell.

"It's an unusual thing. There is a whole hollow 'basket' area but we don't know what's that's for," Wensel said. "Now the search is on to understand how the 'basket' area regulates the channel."

Isolating TRPV1 gives researchers an idea of how other channels are structured as well.

"Visualization of TRPV1 gives us insight on other TRP channels since they are structurally similar," said Moiseenkova-Bell. "Pharmaceutical companies target these TRP channels to make sure the drug binds properly. With this first structure we can start to build models of binding sites and hopefully in the future design more effective pharmaceuticals for a wide range of medical conditions."

Studying these channels is nothing new. In the past, scientists could measure the activity in the cells but it was unclear what each channel was responding to. Determining which proteins interacted with TRPV1, however, required Wensel's lab to create a purified model.



The protein had to be removed from cells, purified, and reconstituted in a synthetic membrane so researchers could control channel activity.

"Since calcium is involved in cell signaling, following the calcium movement confirmed the protein is active," said Wensel. "We are the first group to purify a TRPV1 channel and control what goes in and out when the channel opens."


Others who took part in this work are Dr. Lia Stanicu, of Purdue University, Dr. Irina Serysheva, adjunct associate professor of biochemistry at BCM, and BCM graduate student, Ben J. Tobe.

Prevent Osteoporosis Now

Today is the day to begin preventing osteoporosis, an age-related disorder in which bones become gradually thinner, more porous and less able to support the body.

This condition affects both men and women, but women usually suffer more severely because bone loss accelerates rapidly after menopause. By the time a woman reaches the age of 70, she may have lost as much as 30 percent of her bone density.

Prevention is the Key

The following lifestyle-related factors may lead to the development of osteoporosis:

- lack of exercise
- calcium and vitamin D deficiency
- prolonged use of drugs, alcohol, caffeine, high-phosphate soft drinks
- smoking

The good news is that osteoporosis may be prevented by a combination of exercise and good nutrition.

Get Plenty of Exercise

Weightbearing exercises can help prevent bone loss and may encourage bone growth. Specific exercises to twist, bend, stretch and compress bones are needed to strengthen the common sites at risk: the upper arm at the shoulder, the forearm at the wrist, the thigh bone at the hip, and the spine. This process is known as "bone loading."

Before beginning any exercise program, always consult your physician. If you're given the go-ahead, start slowly and build up over time. An ideal program should include

bonespecific, aerobic weightbearing exercise three days per week. Weightbearing exercise includes such activities as walking and crosscountry skiing.

Include a variety of exercises that will stimulate as many different bones as possible. Add upper-body muscle strength and endurance training two days per week.

Stick with your program and work up to at least 20 to 30 minutes of physical activity a day, on most, preferably all, days of the week. Also, think about ways to increase your daily activity, such as taking the stairs or gardening.

Eat for Stronger Bones

You can bolster your bone strength by eating a high-calcium, high-fiber, low-fat diet.

Did you know that two-thirds of your bone is composed

D for various individuals.

You need vitamin D to help metabolize calcium. The best source of vitamin D is the sun, but fortified milk products offer the same benefit without the risk of skin damage. You can also get a good dose of calcium from the following sources:


- nuts, seeds, beans and peas



Cancer Patients Develop Can-do Attitude At Summer Camp

Baylor College of Medicine

HOUSTON - (May 28, 2008) - For many children, summer camp is an annual tradition. Kids with cancer - even those who are physically disabled because of their treatment or illness - don't have to be excluded from this rite of passage.

Camp is an impactful experience for children battling cancer that can instill in them the can-do attitude it takes to deal with their disease, said Dr. ZoAnn Drever, associate professor of pediatrics - hematology and oncology at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"I always tell people that camp is the single most important thing we do next to treating the kids' cancer," said Drever, who serves as medical director for Camp Periwinkle, a week-long summer camp that promotes emotional healing for patients at the Texas Children's Cancer Center, a major component of the Dan L. Duncan Cancer Center at BCM.

When children don't have the right attitude, they often do not tolerate therapy well, and they may not have a good perspective on life as long-term survivors, Dreyer said.

"In that case, cancer becomes something that, instead of being a limited illness, affects them for the rest of their lives in a negative way," she said.

Camp Periwinkle is celebrating its 25th anniversary this summer. It is available to patients at the Texas Children's Cancer Center between the ages of 7 and 15 and their siblings, and it is completely free for families.

The relationships that are built at camp are very strong because they are built on the same foundation, Drever said.

"Each one of them has faced life-threatening illness, and they draw strength from each other and from the counselors," she said. "These children come from all sorts of different backgrounds, but at camp the playing field is equal. It doesn't matter that they have cancer and are undergoing treatment. They're just like everybody else, and there's nothing they can't do."

Often parents feel apprehension about sending their sick children off to camp, but Dreyer said they should feel secure knowing there is a full medical staff, often the same doctors who treat their children at the cancer center.

Camp Periwinkle is a program of the Periwinkle Foundation, a nonprofit organization dedicated to enriching the lives of children, young adults and families who are being treated for cancer and other life-threatening illnesses at the Texas Children's Cancer Center, a center of Baylor College of Medicine and Texas Children's Hospital.

The foundation got its name from the perennial Vinca minor, the periwinkle plant. It is the source of one of the most common chemotherapy agents used - vincristine.



A 'Pain In The Neck' May Be A Thing Of The Past


HOUSTON – (May 27, 2008) — Getting rid of a pain in the neck is usually easier said than done.

Patients who suffer from muscle pain don't always find immediate and lasting relief, however, a new treatment option may be the solution. According to experts at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, injecting Botulinum toxin into trigger points in the muscle may offer longer lasting relief for patients suffering from muscle pain in the back or neck that is due to muscle spasms.

"This treatment used in conjunction with physical therapy can help loosen the muscles and provide relief for several months," said Dr. Benoy Benny, assistant professor of physical medicine and rehabilitation and director of the spine, sports and pain program at BCM.

Many patients suffering with this type of pain have tried several treatment options including non-steroidal anti-inflammatories, physical therapy and trigger point injections with a local anesthetic. Those who felt short-term relief from the trigger point injections may find that Botulinum toxin injections provide the same relief for a longer period of time, said Benny. Whereas the trigger point injections may last for a few hours, days or weeks, Botulinum toxin injections can last for as many as three months for some and can be repeated if necessary.


Over time, the frequency of the injections can be reduced as the patient continues with physical therapy.



Doctors are now exploring what other areas of pain this treatment can be used in, and whether it may be an alternative to surgery for those suffering from refractory back pain. However, the treatment is not recommended for patients with neurological symptoms as it is not meant to treat these symptoms, said Benny.






