How do I Sign Up?

Thank you to everyone for their patience while we have transitioned to our new and improved website. We have received many questions over the last few weeks regarding the sign-up procedure. Hopefully we can explain the procedure in more detail here and answer your questions.

The CCHOA master database is maintained by our financial manager, Terri Giles, and is used as the official homeowner record for the HOA. This database is used when mailing assessments and ballots or official correspondence from the HOA.

We imported this database into the new website database to be used for verification purposes when residents sign up for the website. Unfortunately the website host only allows one owner (typically there are two on record) to register within the system and then requires that the registered user ADD any additional users. In other words, if Mr. and Mrs. Smith own a home and Mrs. Smith signs up for an account on the website, she must log in, click on the profile key located at the top right hand corner, and add Mr. Smith to the contact list or vice versa. In addition, if you own a home, but are leasing, you must first sign up as the owner and then add your tenants to the contact list.

We are also still in the process of making certain sections of the website private and certain sections public. Our goal in creating the new website was to make it more user friendly and make it easier for you to find information. Deed Restriction Update

We will continue driving two sections of Circle C per month to note any violations of the deed restrictions. Violations may include, but are not limited to: excessive weeds, areas of no turf, dead shrubs and/or trees, yard art, grass that is not edged or mowed, areas of dead grass, boats, RV's, trailers and general home maintenance issues. We are required to send notification of deed restriction violations via certified mail and we also send regular mail. If you receive a deed restriction violation notice PLEASE CALL the HOA office at 288-8663. It's impossible to know everyone's individual situation, so we appreciate communication from you.

If you have a deed restriction to report, you may submit the specific address at info@circlecranch.info or give us a call at 288-8663. Violations that are reported are generally checked with 3 business days and if we are able to confirm a violation, we will begin the deed restriction

process (which you can access on the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/ documents/AssociationDocuments/ D e e d R e s t r i c t i o n s / C C H O A -DeedRestrictionPolicy2003.pdf

The Community Association Institute (CAI)

The Circle C HOA made a dramatic management shift around 2003, which included a number of steps to modernize the office and the processes used to run the organization. Along the way, we discovered a non-profit group that specialized in providing education, training, and other resources for Condo and Home Owner Associations. Their national offices are in Denver, Colorado, and recently, an Austin chapter was formed.

Since we joined the group, we have learned many important lessons about how to manage our HOA, how to maintain better records, and how to deal fairly and effectively with our membership. We have used a number of their suggestions from adopting their Model Code of Conduct, to books on what the HOA officer's roles are, books on topics like Reserve Studies, and professional development courses for our staff members.

In July, I attended the first Austin CAI Tradeshow. It was underwritten by Colonial Bank and it featured a very diverse collection of companies that service our industry. I think there were 40-50 booths, which included Real Estate attorneys, auditors, banks that specialized in HOA, CPAs, contractors, landscaping, playscape vendors, software vendors, and security systems. They also had several seminars about legal issues and security. We will be using much of this information and many of the contacts we made, in the future. I also think that we'll be participating more in the Austin CAI chapter.

We aren't alone in this business and it's important for us to keep in touch with the other professionals in this field. We learn from each other and we share tips, contacts, and give vendor referrals. Circle C Landscape

I would like to take this opportunity to update you on the watering schedule and water conservation measures that we use on the commons areas of Circle C Ranch. As you know, the City of Austin enacted a new ordinance city-wide for both residential and commercial property.

At Circle C we have a large and complicated watering system. There are 40 irrigation controllers, each having anywhere from 12 to 24 watering stations (valves). We estimate a total of 800 plus valves and about 10,000 heads. Further, these are connected to about 30 different water meters.

In the newer areas of Circle C, developers were required to install water meters and controllers that could accomplish the watering of all sections within

a Stage 2 drought condition, which is approximately 9 hours of watering time. We are currently in Stage 1 water restrictions, year round, which allow 15 hours of watering time (7 p.m. to 10 a.m.) on our designated water days, so all of the newer sections are easily watered.

The real challenge comes in on the Escarpment corridor, which is a 3 mile loop fed by two large water meters with over 100 sections of irrigation. These can be run 2 sections at a time, resulting in a 23 hour watering cycle. Because of this, Circle C Landscape has worked with the Association to make a comprehensive watering plan for the entire neighborhood. This plan was presented to the City of Austin Water Conservation Department and was approved. It allows us to water no more than 2x per week, however, instead of trying to get everything watered on Tuesday and Friday (normal commercial watering days), we are able to water on two alternate days

in order to be able to water at all. We have adapted to the schedule pretty well. The major problem at this point is if we have a line break or major problem on a large area and have to shut the water off, it is sometimes difficult to make the repair, let it dry and get the water back on by the next watering time. If you see brown out on the commons areas, this is most likely the case.

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

Some residents have expressed concern that we have watered at 7:00 p.m. rather than waiting until overnight. Again, our preference would be to water in the overnight or early morning hours, but in some cases that is just not possible due to the restrictions of the ordinance.

We check the system all the time and you will see the Circle C Landscape irrigators constantly making adjustments. We have a special checking team that goes to each area and runs a test, makes small adjustments, and flags all of the bigger problems. The bigger problems are then placed on the repair list and fixed asap.

Please do not remove any flags from the commons areas. We have found that after we check a section, the flags have been removed by the next morning. This just negates the time and energy that has been put into checking the system.

Our water consumption is closely monitored. I receive a copy of each water bill on a monthly basis. We are able to look at these and determine if there are any unusual billings (either a mistake by the City of Austin or a leak that is hidden underground) and correct it quickly.

The CCHOA has been very proactive in addressing water concerns. With the adoption of the Green Community Landscape model, our water consumption is going down, rather than escalating even though more area has been added. Over the past five years, water costs have been more than \$100,000 under budget.

More recommendations have been made for the future. We are currently exploring options for conversion to "Smart" or ET controllers. These take real time weather conditions and calculate when and where you need water. The City of Austin is moving toward these for commercial installations, however, they have yet to produce a list of acceptable controllers. This technology is rapidly developing and we will be setting up some pilot areas to perform real test on our commons areas prior to making a recommendation to the CCHOA Board. This is important due to the size of the property. Conversion to this technology will require some capital improvement funds, and we want to make sure that it will be cost effective for the Association.

If you have any questions about watering on the commons areas, please feel free to email info@circlecranch.info and we will get back to you as soon as possible. If you see a malfunctioning sprinkler head or water leak, please let us know. We are here daily, but new problems are continuous and we may not be aware of something that you can see.

CCHOA News Continued Walking Your Dog In the Summer

As a general rule, if the sidewalk is too hot for you to walk on barefoot, it's too hot for your dog to walk on. The pads of a dog's paws can burn.

Dogs cool themselves by panting. If panting can't reduce their body heat, dogs can develop heat exhaustion leading to heat stroke. Early signs are rapid breathing, heavy panting, and salivation. Please be careful when walking your dog in the heat this summer.

Remember, dog owners are required by City of Austin Code 3-4-6, Ord.031009-9, to promptly remove and dispose of feces except when left on owner's property.

Don't Feed the Wildlife

We are getting more reports of wild animals (raccoons, possums, snakes) in the yards of homes both near greenbelt and naturalized areas as well as in established parts of the neighborhood. This is most likely due to food being supplied by those who leave pet food outside. Fruit bearing trees, planted but not permitted per the Deed Restrictions, also provide daily meals. These constant food sources attract wild animals and feral cats. Wild animals may turn aggressive and could be a danger to children and family pets. Please don't leave your pet food outside.

Parents and their children have had a great time with the Circle C Swim Team this year! We wanted to let our community know about our team and the wonderful experience it gives our children.

For Summer 2008, we had 200 children who live in Circle C, participate on the team. They all worked hard at swimming and had a wonderful time. The swimmers ranged in age from 4-18 years old and started swim practice at the Circle C Pool in April. They had their first swim meet in May and finished the season the end of June. The swimmers can join the team after passing a swim test. They need to be able to swim across the pool, which is 25 yards in less than 60 seconds. Also, we give preference sign up to residents of Circle C and through the years, we have always made a full team with residents only.

The swimmers get great exercise and they learn the different swim strokes such as freestyle, breaststroke, backstroke and butterfly. Being a part of the swim team is terrific for kids who like individualized sports, but enjoy the camaraderie of a team. Some relay events at a swim meet are made up of teams. The goal of the Seals is for the kids to grow in their sport and still enjoy their summer . . .having fun!

Circle C Ranch is a great place for swimming because the team is very flexible on practices and divides the practice time for various

age groups. The swimmers practiced in the afternoons before school was out for the summer and then once summer began, the kids could practice either in the mornings or evenings Tuesday- Friday.

Circle C Seals is no longer a part of Longhorn Aquatics and is currently a member of the Capital City Summer League, which was formed two years ago. This league is made up of nine teams from different neighborhoods. There were 1,300 children in the league this year. Some other teams that we swam against this season included, Travis Country, Belterra, The Courtyard, St. Stephen's, and South Austin Area Barracudas.

When Circle C hosted a swim meet, we usually had about 400 swimmers! That's a lot of swimmers and explains why our neighborhood pool was closed some Saturday mornings due to swim meets. All of our parent volunteers worked hard to finish the meets as soon as possible. Our Circle C parents were a fantastic group of volunteers and did an amazing job for the children. Other teams in the league loved to swim at the Circle C pool because we had eight lanes to utilize during a swim meet, we had a lot of room around the pool for the crowd to watch the races, and Jaime at Circle C Grill was open and sold breakfast and lunch.

Volunteers (Like You!) Help Students Soar to New Heights in Reading

We all like a little special Students on Adventures attention now and again. And when you're a kid in elementary school, that extra attention could make the difference between passing and failing the state mandated TAKS test. Six years ago Kiker Elementary parent


Sue Smaus started "Camp Read", a program designed to give additional individual to students in danger of failing the reading portion of the TAKS test. In 2006, the program was transplanted to Clayton Elementary. Redubbed "SOAR" (Students on Adventures in Reading), the program has helped over 100 students prepare for the state exam.

According to program coordinator Nina Telang, children are selected to participate based on their benchmark scores. If the teacher or the administration thinks that the student will benefit from some individual attention, they participate in SOAR. The SOAR student is typically one who doesn't have a reading disability, but just needs practice.

There's truth to the old adage that practice makes perfect. Last year, every child who participated in the spring semester of SOAR passed in the first try. And what's more, over 50% of the 3rd grade SOAR children earned commended scores in their reading TAKs test.

At the core of this wildly successful program is a team of 80 to 100 dedicated volunteers. These volunteers "mentors" devote just two half hours per week to reading with a child, cheering them on, and giving them the special attention they need to, well, soar.

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT, PWHOA BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Fellow residents of Park West,

About seven months have gone by since you elected your new Board of Directors. I believe each one of us promised to keep the line of communications open with the community as a whole. In fact, we have been in personal contact with many residents on many issues and have taken appropriate actions to provide services and answer questions. Recently, I have received e-mails from some concerned homeowners on the status of proposed covenant changes which prompted me to give you this update of BOD actions.

Over the past months the BOD has put in many hours beyond our monthly meetings to achieve the goals we established for ourselves. The following are examples of some of our major accomplishments to date:

- Canvassing the community before changing from private to City trash collection.
- Formulating a 2008 budget with no change in the monthly assessment.
- Negotiating a multi-year landscape contract with a savings of \$20k over two years.
- Planning and conducting the annual HOA meeting and Board member election.
- Hiring a contractor to apply a protective seal coating over all Park West streets.
- Hiring a contractor to repair and paint the east and west automatic gates.

Some of the other projects we are working on include Lot 103 problem areas, mail center improvements, budget reserve requirements and potential covenant changes. We are striving to make progress on all these tasks as well as stay on top of the unscheduled requirements which occur all the time. Because of recent inquiries, the following is a recap regarding the issue of covenant changes: Because we are a gated community, the HOA is responsible for maintaining the roads, curbs, sidewalks, gates, street lights, mail centers and all other common areas. Most other subdivisions don't have all these costs. In addition, our covenants require the HOA to maintain all "Street Yard Improvements" which includes driveways, irrigation systems, trees and landscaping. Very few communities share this cost burden. In order to reduce this extra burden and attempt to keep future assessments down, the previous Board proposed a covenant change to shift some of the "Street Yard" responsibility to the homeowner.

The present Board is now in the midst of completing the covenant change project. Richard Scott, HOA Vice President, is leading the effort, which includes legal consultation, homeowner input and community meetings as necessary in order to answer questions prior to a vote. This process is anticipated to continue over the summer months, with a vote to be held in the fall when most HOA members are likely to have returned home. Richard can provide more details.


In conclusion, the Board thanks all of you who have supported our efforts over the past several months and welcomes your continuing feedback.

BROKEN RECORD DEPARTMENT

• Use your automatic sprinkler system according to the City of Austin ordinance:

- Odd numbered houses Wednesday and Saturday.
- Even numbered houses Thursday and Sunday.
- NO sprinklers on between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. ever.

• Place your garbage and recycling containers out of view from the street, either in the garage or behind the fence. Do not leave them curbside longer than a total of 12 hours from before and after pickup. Never put them out a day (or earlier) in advance or leave them out for a day or longer after pickup.

• Carry a plastic bag for the scooped poop when walking your dog.

• Drive careful, to paraphrase a former Texas governor. The speed limit on all Park West streets is **20 mph**. Please slow down.

• No overnight parking is allowed on the street. Please move your vehicle onto the driveway or into the garage. Exceptions? What are the rules on trash containers and recycle cart storage?

Trash containers and recycle carts are permitted to be at the curb only on your scheduled collection day. Trash containers and recycle carts are to be stored where not visible from the street at all other times.

Are basketball goals allowed in Circle C?

Permanently installed goals are not permitted in Circle C. The deed restrictions state that basketball goals are to be stored out of the view of neighbors when not in use. City of Austin code states that only motorized vehicles are allowed to be parked on public streets and all sidewalks must remain clear and open for pedestrians.

Are cars allowed to be parked on the street?

The CCHOA does not have jurisdiction over the streets in Circle C; they are the responsibility of the City of Austin. Obviously inoperable vehicles may not be parked or left on public streets for more than 72 hours. Please call 974-8119 to report an abandoned or non-operating vehicle. Please call 311 to report illegally parked vehicles.

What should I do about barking dogs and stray animals?

Stray Animals may be picked up by animal control by calling 311. The City of Austin states it is unlawful for dogs to make frequent noise disturbing to persons in the neighborhood and violations should be reported to the City. You may also call the CCHOA office at 288-8663 with specific date and time for excessive barking. The staff will send a cooperative letter to the homeowner.

How do I report a street light outage?

Every light pole has an assigned number mounted on the pole. Jot down the number and call the City of Austin at 505-7617.

Are boats, trailers and recreational vehicles allowed in Circle C? The Deed Restrictions require that any vehicle or trailer other than a conventional automobile be stored, placed or parked in an area concealed from view of other Homeowners.

What are the rules on maintenance?

Homes are to be kept in a well-maintained, safe, clean and attractive condition at all times. Lawns and garden areas should be

kept alive, free of weeds and attractive. Lawn mowing is required on a regular basis. Trees and shrubs are to be pruned. Public right of way and sidewalks should be clear and unobstructed. Litter, trash, dead vegetation and debris should be promptly removed.

What are the rules in Circle C on walking with your dog off leash and what about picking up after your dog?

Both of these issues fall under the jurisdiction of the City of Austin. It is against CoA ordinance to have a dog off leash except on your private property. It is also a requirement by the City that dog owners pick up and properly dispose of their dog's feces. In this regard, we recommend dog walkers carry a plastic grocery bag or newspaper sleeve. Slide it on like a glove, pick up the offensive matter, pull the bag back over your hand, knot it and throw it in your trashcan when you return home. Please keep our landscaped commons areas beautiful and clean for the enjoyment of all.

Do I have to submit plans for improvements and/or additions to my home?

All improvements such as decks, patio covers, pools, change in fencing or any other permanent structure must be submitted to the Architectural Control Committee. You may download an

application form as well as a fee schedule on our website at www. circlecranch.info under the "ACC" quick link section.

What do I need to visit the Swim Center?

All residents must possess and show their swim center ID card to enter the facility. ID cards are available at the aquatic office. Contact 288-6057 for information on what is required to obtain an ID. Guests of Circle C residents must pay a \$3 entrance fee and sign a liability waiver before entering the facility. Children under 3 are free.

Are door to door solicitors and door flyers allowed in Circle C?

Both of these issues are governed by the City of Austin. By City ordinance, solicitors must abide by "No Soliciting" signs on private property. Some neighbors have had success in placing a small "No Soliciting" sign near the doorbell and/or a small staked sign near the front porch.

What do new Texas residents need to know?

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety (www. txdps.state.tx.us) a new Texas resident is required by state law to obtain a Texas driver's license, get a Texas vehicle inspection and a vehicle title/registration within 30 days of moving to Texas to legally operate a vehicle.



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
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Locks of Love Kickoff

IT'S YOUR MONEY Give Your Finances a Clean Sweep

(NAPS)—Anytime of year can be the right time to get your home office organized—and while you're at it, your finances too. Here are some tips:

- Take out the garbage. Start with your desk top—not the one on your computer, the real one. If your desk is covered in paperwork, weed out what's important and store key documents in a central place. This could be a good time to dust off your credit report as well. If you are the victim of identity theft, one of the first places it can show up is on your credit report. Even though new legislation entitles you to one free report each year, it's estimated that only 10 percent of consumers are taking advantage of it. According to Money Magazine, 33 percent of those who did get a report found errors. To request a copy, visit annual creditreport.com or contact one of the major credit bureaus: Equifax, Experian or TransUnion.
- Make everything within reach. When organizing your office, it's important to keep frequently used items close at hand. The same applies to your financial goals. Set goals you can reach. For example, start your retirement fund by putting a set amount every month into an Individual Retirement Account (IRA).



Have a backup plan for files and finances. If you have important documents stored on your computer, back them up onto CDs once a month and store them in a fireproof safe. When it comes to financial backup, create an emergency fund of at least three months salary. Also, update your life insurance policy. Newsweek recently stated that for a married couple with two children, it is advisable to have life insurance protection that equals eight times your annual income. And while you're at it make sure your will is current.

Shred it and forget it. If you don't have a paper shredder, get one. Shred old quarterly statements on investments once you have the annual statements. Also, shredding anything you don't need that contains your Social Security number or birth date can be your first line of defense against identity theft. One easy way to eliminate clutter in your home office may be to sign up for online banking and cut down on the need for paper statements.

Make it automatic. One easy way to eliminate clutter may be to sign up for online banking and cut down on the need for paper statements. Plus, you can set up monthly withdrawals from your checking account that are deposited into an IRA—starting with as little as \$25 a month.



Texas + Flood = Higher Risk

During the dry season, it's sometimes hard to remember that Texas actually is a high-risk state for flooding. In fact, Texas actually led the nation in insurance payments for flood-related damage until 2005.

The risk is not just to our coastal communities, either – inland areas are just as vulnerable. For example, "Flash Flood Alley" in Central Texas, with its steep hills and winding rivers, is particularly prone to flooding during heavy rainfall.

Don't underestimate your chances of being a flood victim. During the course of a 30-year mortgage, homes in a high-risk area are three times more likely to be damaged by flood than by fire. In fact, about 25 percent of all Flood claims paid are for policies in low-to moderate-risk communities. Texas homeowners were paid more than \$2.7 billion for flood damage during the last quarter century (through 2004).

Obviously, no one can stop a flood. But here are a few steps you can take to limit that damage and out-of-pocket costs:

• Get Flood insurance.

Don't make the mistake of thinking that your Homeowners policy provides coverage for flooding – it doesn't. You need a separate Flood policy. You don't have to be in an area where Flood insurance is required to be eligible for it. If your community participates in the National Flood Insurance Program, you can purchase Flood insurance, and you may qualify for a Preferred Risk policy with lower rates. That's where I come in: Call me and we'll take a look at whether you're exposed, and you can decide what to do about it. Be aware that a Flood policy doesn't take effect until 30 days after purchase, so don't wait for floodwaters to rise.

• Elevate.

Get a licensed electrician to take a look at the electric switchbox, outlets and switches to see if they can be elevated at least 12 inches above the projected flood elevation for your home. Ditto for your washer and dryer – you may be able to elevate them on masonry or pressure-treated lumber, or move them to a higher floor. If you're planning to remodel, ask your licensed contractor about relocating or elevating your furnace and water heater.

• Have an emergency plan.

Get your emergency supplies ready – for example, flashlights, batteries, portable radio, nonperishable food and water. Make sure family members know what to do and how to communicate if a flood is imminent or if you have to evacuate.

We live in the best place in the USA to be a kayaker. Lake Austin & Travis are in our backyards and Lady Bird Lake, the San Marcos, Colorado and Guadalupe rivers are also close - within two hours there is even more unexplored territory. The Texas Parks & Wildlife has created numerous "Texas Paddling Trails" for you to explore across the state.

You can kayak for fun and sun, to enjoy nature, for cardiovascular and muscular fitness, to catch fresh and saltwater fish or even to become a competitive paddler.

Kayaking is experiencing exponential growth and participation has tripled since 1998. Boats have become more stable and less expensive. You can choose from sit-ontops, sit-inside, touring boats and inflatables that come in plastic, wood or kevlar. Choose a single kayak or a double that is big enough for a friend and even a child or dog. Best yet, kayak skills are easy to learn with a little instruction. There is no need to paddle 2 miles in a zig-zag pattern when 1 mile is in order. (Remember surviving your first summer camp canoe experience.)

As is the case with learning golf or tennis skills, basic paddling skills training will make you efficient and the sport more enjoyable. It's also important to understand how to select the right boat, accessories and equipment, how to efficiently load and transport the boat and the importance of safety.

Once your skills have improved, there are many new places to paddle and different ways to use your paddling skills. For instance, you can join Canyon of the Eagles kayak tour on Lake Buchanan or register for a recreational canoe race like the Great Castell Kayak race on the Llano.

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
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
Kayak wave surfing on the gulf is another popular alternative.

Or you can just kickback and enjoy an adventure on Lake Austin without burning fossil fuels – your choice – stayfit and have fun.





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
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Tennis Tips Submitted by Fernando Velasco

Watch for Dehydration - Avoid Heat Stress by:

- Schedule practice time in the morning and late afternoons.
- Wear light-colored clothes with breathable material.
- Wear white hat to protect face, skull and neck
- Drink 18-20 oz of fluid two or three hours before your match, then again another 8-10 oz ten to twenty minutes before match.
- During play, drink 8-10 oz every ten to twenty minutes (during changeovers.)
- If you have heat cramps, stretch the muscle, and take rehydration drinks with glucose and electrolytes.
- If you feel light-headed and think you might faint, lower your head or lay down on your back with your feet up. It would be a good idea to stop playing and to sit down in a cool area.
- Take two coolers on the court. One full of ice and water to drink and one with ice only with a towel. Between games, soak your towel in the cooler and refresh your face, neck and wrists.

Enjoy your tennis games and stay "cool"

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


