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Notes from the June Board Meeting

The Board of Directors of Lakes on Eldridge Community Association met on Tuesday, June 17, 2008. The following is a summary of what was discussed.

HOMEOWNER/GUEST FORUM

A resident reported that she had several concerns regarding pool conditions and that the level of cleanliness was her chief concern. She was advised that the Board was meeting with the pool management contractor regarding the same concerns.

A resident made an appearance to appeal the denial of her application to the ACC.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Financial Statements: The Board reviewed the financial statements for the month ended May 31, 2008. The Association had cash balances of \$401,245 in the Operating Fund and \$378,531 in the Replacement Fund. Operating income for the five months ended May 31, 2008 was \$429,139, Operating Expenses were \$546,652 and the Deficit was \$117,513. The Operating Deficit was the result of the \$80,000 contribution to Reserves plus the transfer of all sales tax refunds to the Reserves. Several line items were to be investigated for reclassification. The financial statements were accepted.

Collections: The Board reviewed current delinquent accounts and the legal status report from the community's legal counsel and instructed the managing agent accordingly. \$7,268 of delinquent accounts was collected during May 2008 and a further \$8,373 was collected during the month of June 2008. Total Accounts Receivable at May 31, 2008 were \$47,311 as opposed to the \$83,602 that was past due at May 31, 2007.

The Board reviewed the legal status report and all delinquent accounts and instructed the managing agent accordingly including authorizing the filing of a lawsuit to collect a delinquent account.

<u>Collections Agent:</u> The Board approved the engagement of collection agency as the Association's collection agency and executed the engagement agreement on behalf of the Association.

<u>Signature Cards:</u> The Board signed new signature cards for the Association's accounts at Amegy Bank of Texas.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Access Control: It was reported that the gate attendants have expressed again their need for a comprehensive map, and this will be prepared and printed by the end of June.

A recent incident highlighted the need to update the gate directory, and also indicated that phone quality to and from the gate phone is poor. This will be investigated further during the next week. The Board further agreed that the callbox was no longer necessary and instructed the managing agent to have it removed, replacing it with a corded/cordless telephone at the gatehouse.

Complaints continue that not all of the attendants at the main gate provide the level of courtesy and attentiveness that our residents expect, and that this community needs to display. The managing agent reported he had also received complaints and that ISSC was responding to the matter.

All vendors are now advised upon arrival that soliciting is not tolerated within the community.

Parks & Pool: It was reported that the LOE

Swim Team Season is almost over. The last home meet was completed last weekend. Now only Divisionals and Red, White, And Blue or Ponderosa swim meets are remaining. The Board and the managing agent have been working closely with GHPM with spotty results. Cleaning up and putting trash at the curb have been inconsistent. The sand in the pool is so bad that the life guards have to vacuum each week.

This month there were problems with one of the recirculation pumps and electrical shorts on the pump starters. A supervisor was working on the chlorinator and it malfunctioned sending straight chlorine to all the jets of the pool and making a cloud that made everyone evacuate the pool. The LOE Swim Team and residents were using the pool during this mishap and one small child was standing in the baby pool and caught a full jet of chlorine causing coughing, burns, and vomiting. The child was taken to the hospital, treated, released and is at home without permanent injury. The Board is meeting with the pool contractor to discuss this matter and plans to enhance safety at the pool.

The bathrooms continue to be a problem and are still stinky and need ventilation. AMI is working to get a quote for a fan to come on when the lights are activated in the bathrooms.

Regarding the old issue of revamping the showers, it was noticed at a neighboring swim meet that shower heads were installed on the outside wall of the bathroom building to allow residents to rinse off pool water and sand before entering the pool. This

would be easily modified at LOE and solve the "aesthetics" issue of constructing showers by the steps.

<u>Landscape</u>: It was reported that the application of Ant Bait in all areas with heavier concentration along walkways and trails had been completed. Weekly spot treatment on active mounds as they are detected will continue.

The landscaper continued tree pruning and trimming with special attention given to the river birch in and around all the lake areas.

Pruning of the oaks and Bradford pears at the main entrance was completed to keep the clearance needed for school buses and emergency vehicles.

The landscaper has used an additional crew for 7 days throughout the month of May to pull and remove weeds in planting beds.

With the hot weather and lack of rain, water times and frequency has increased in an attempt to keep grass and plants alive and green.

The irrigation crew has had to repair dozens of line brakes including the 6 inch main line brake at the main pump. As repairs are made we are finding many problems with the way the pipe was originally installed and these problems will continue to surface given the aging irrigation system. The landscaper is making 2-3 service trips weekly to make a variety of repairs to keep the system operational especially on the zones where we have a mix of spray heads and rotors.

The landscaper will be replacing the plants and shrubs at Ginger

Pond entrance that were damaged by the large truck running over the beds. The utility work on Tanner has also caused damage and breaks to the irrigation system that must be repaired before replacement of the plant material.

During the next several weeks the landscaper will concentrate on keeping the irrigation system operational and continuing to prune and trim the smaller trees.

<u>Lakes & Wildlife:</u> It was reported that there are four healthy cygnets but that Randy has a treble hook embedded in his tongue as a result of some resident casting lures too close to the swans. One child was knocked off his tricycle by Randy at the last swim meet. To my knowledge nothing has been reported to the managing agent. The managing agent confirmed.

Social Committee: National Night Out in Texas is set for October 7th - The board wants to recognize volunteers in the community on this night. The Social Committee will work on getting the Fire Truck as well as the Sheriff's department to come to the Beach Club. The date has been confirmed as October 7th. Volunteers in each village will be encouraging their neighbors to attend. One suggestion is that a volunteer in each village get their residents together to create a village phone book/list to distribute after National Night Out.

MANAGEMENT REPORT

Action Items: The Board reviewed the list of action items and instructed the managing agent accordingly. The board approved the following:

- Replacement of a waterfall pump in the amount of \$7,950.
- Painting of the arbors by in the amount of \$890 each.

The managing agent provided a quote for an LED message board in the amount of \$12,588 for general consideration.

<u>Deed Restrictions:</u> The Board reviewed the deed restrictions at June 12, 2008 and instructed the managing agent accordingly including referring two owners to the attorney for not having removed rainbow tarps from play structures.

SCHEDULE NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Directors was scheduled to be held at 6:30 p.m. on July 22, 2008.

Anglers, Does This Belong To You?



On Memorial Day there were a lot of families and guests having a great time. Three adults were fishing on the small lake by the tennis courts where Randy, Dominic, and their four cygnets live. Despite all of the CAUTION and DANGER signs surrounding the lake, a lady was sitting on the bulkhead with her legs hanging in the water and two men were standing on the bulkhead casting with their rods even though Randy was swimming back and forth five feet from them. All of the anglers were casting with lures. As you can see in the picture, this lure has only one three pronged or "treble" hook on it but it should have three. Several boys were fishing off the rocks in

the same lake later that day and were also fishing with lures. What is wrong with the picture? It's missing two treble hooks that are embedded in Randy's tongue and the black skin around his eye. Each hook has a barb on it, which makes it more difficult to remove the hook from a fish or a swan's tongue. Randy was caught by a group of us and we worked with needle nosed pliers and other instruments used to remove hooks from fish. Because the hooks are embedded in the thickest part of Randy's tongue, they didn't go through the bottom of the tongue, which might have allowed us to clip off the ends of the hooks and pull them all the way through the tongue. Randy was in pain as we worked on him trying to pry his mouth open, trying to hold him down, and trying to help him. In order to get the hooks out of the tongue, he will have to undergo surgery, stay out of the water for two weeks leaving his "family", and have injections of tetracycline every other day for the two weeks. Please, those of you who insist on fishing, be more careful. I have found so much filament in the lakes and around the bulkheads that you have just left behind instead of disposing of it. The ducks and swans become entangled in this fish line and it can cut off their breathing if it gets around their necks. One lead weight picked up off the bottom of the lake by a swan will kill it so please do not use lead. Thank you Deborah and Robert for coming to the rescue. I felt so alone when I saw the lure hanging from Randy's beak.





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LOE OKTOBERFEST

"From man's sweat and God's love, beer came into the world." - Saint Arnold, Patron Saint of Brewers

The Lakes on Eldridge Social Committee is excited to bring Houston's own Saint Arnold Brewery to Lakes on Eldridge for a beer tasting this fall. "Oktoberfest" will be held at the Beach Club, Friday, October 17th. Mark your calendars and tell your neighbors, you won't want to miss this event. Admission will be \$2, which will get you a souvenir Saint Arnold tasting glass from which you will be able to sample 6 beers. A representative from the brewery will discuss what we will be tasting and tell you more about their company. Non-alcoholic refreshments and snacks will also be available.

Not familiar with Saint Arnold?

"Saint Arnold was born to a prominent Austrian family in 580 in the Chateau of Lay-Saint-Christophe in the old French diocese of Toul, north of Nancy. He married Doda with whom he had many sons, two of whom were to become famous: Clodulphe, later called Saint Cloud, and Ansegis who married Begga, daughter of Pépin de Landen. Ansegis and Begga are the great-greatgrandparents of Charlemagne, and as such, Saint Arnold is the oldest known ancestor of the Carolingian dynasty.

Saint Arnold was acclaimed bishop of Metz, France, in 612 and spent his holy life warning peasants about the dangers of drinking water. Beer was safe, and "from man's sweat and God's love, beer came into

the world." The people revered Arnold. In 627, Saint Arnold retired to a monastery near Remiremont, France, where he died on August 16, 640.

In 641, the citizens of Metz requested that Saint Arnold's body be exhumed and ceremoniously carried to Metz for reburial in their Church of the Holy Apostles. During this voyage a miracle came to pass in the town of Champignuelles. The tired porters and followers stopped for a rest and walked into a tavern for a drink of their favorite beverage. Regretfully, there was only one mug of beer to be shared, but that mug never ran dry and all of the thirsty pilgrims were satisfied.

Saint Arnold is recognized by the Catholic Church as the Patron Saint of Brewers.

The local brewery brews ten different beers. Five are made year round and five are seasonal. They are available in bars, restaurants, grocery stores, liquor stores and warehouse stores in Houston, Austin, Dallas, Ft. Worth and San Antonio.

Their first keg of beer was shipped on June 9, 1994. Founded by Brock Wagner and Kevin Bartol, they chose Houston because, other than living here, this was the largest city in the country that did not have a microbrewery. Brock was a longtime homebrewer and had considered opening a brewery as far back as college, although that was quickly dismissed as a silly idea. Seven years after graduating, Brock revisited the idea, enlisted Kevin's

help and the brewery was off and running." reprinted from www.saintarnold.com



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

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LOE BOOK CLUB



July 28 – The Namesake by Jhumpa Lahiri. In The Namesake, Lahiri enriches the themes that made her first literary collection an international bestseller: the immigrant experience, the clash of cultures, the conflicts of assimilation, and, most poignantly, the tangled ties between generations. Here again Lahiri displays her deft touch for the perfect detail -- the fleeting moment, the turn of phrase -- that opens whole worlds of emotion. The Namesake takes the Ganguli family from their tradition-bound life in Calcutta through their fraught transformation into Americans.

August 25 – The Diplomat's Wife by Pam Jenoff. Love was not a luxury Marta Nedermann could afford during the war. But with the Nazis defeated, her life takes a surprising turn when she meets Paul, a handsome American soldier. Their whirlwind romance is cut short when his troop is deployed, but promises of marriage and a rendezvous in London bolster Marta's spirits. Then, tragically, a plane crash claims Paul's life, and Marta is left alone to discover—to her delight and dismay—that she is pregnant. Now, two years later, Marta has picked up the pieces and moved on. She has started over in London with her husband, a British diplomat, with whom she shares a companionable, if passionless, marriage. Simon asks her no questions, and Marta is happy to keep close her memories of Paul and let her deeds of the past remain unspoken. But Marta's new life is anything but simple. A new war has been brought home to her doorstep: Communist loyalists have infiltrated British intelligence, and the one person who holds the key to exposing the leak is connected to Marta's past. There is a traitor amongst them who needs to prevent Marta's involvement, and no one—not her former friends or current lover—can be trusted.

September 29th - The Shadow of the Wind - by Carlos Ruiz Zafon. Barcelona, 1945-A great world city lies shrouded in secrets after the war, and a boy mourning the loss of his mother

finds solace in his love for an extraordinary book called The Shadow of the Wind, by an author named Julian Carax. When the boy searches for Carax's other books, it begins to dawn on him, to his horror, that someone has been systematically destroying every copy of every book the man has ever written. 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August Landscaping Submitted by Ron Kerwin

August is a great month to stay inside and make your plans for this fall's plantings. Browse the catalogs for ideas and bulbs to order now to plant in November and December for next spring's display. If you are going to work in the lawn or garden, plan it around the early morning or evening in the cooler hours. Drink plenty of water to keep from dehydrating.

The July heat may have already taken its toll on your annuals. If they are beyond help, pull them out and replace them with more heat tolerant varieties. If they are okay but overgrown, you can trim back your annuals and perennials by 1/3 to 1/2 to get better flowering in the fall. You can also trim off the dead or damaged canes and the errant chutes from your roses to enhance the fall blooms. Fertilize your roses right after you prune, as this application is very important. Do NOT trim flowering shrubs, like Indian Hawthorns, after July or you will probably trim off the buds (look like berries) that would provide the flowers next year. Rework your beds to prepare them for fall plantings of flowers or vegetables. Bury in the compost materials and add the mulch on top. They will be ready for planting when it is time. You can fertilize your lawns this month with a 3-1-2 ratio 50% slow release nitrogen fertilizer. This is a good fertilizer for your shrubs and flowerbeds too.

The heat stresses all our lawns, shrubs etc. We will probably not get much rain so we will have to water with irrigation systems or drag around sprinklers to keep everything from burning up. 1 inch of water per week should be enough. Do not water in mid-day, as most of it will simply evaporate prior to getting into the ground. Irrigate in the early morning if possible. Water deeply, not frequently. Watering in the evening can lead to plant diseases. Maintain the water in the soil of your beds more effectively by having a good thick layer of mulch. Most every month I comment on the benefits of thick mulch but it is a topic worth repeating, as its benefits are many.

If your property is in need of new sod, it can be put in now with no problems as long as you water it properly. With new sod, you do not have to suffer with mud in the fall and winter.

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

Green Up Your Everyday Cleaning

When I began going green, I started with the chemicals under my sink. I had already deduced by the chemical components, the ingredient list and the disposal warnings - they couldn't be good for the planet. What I didn't know is that despite heavy marketing claims that these products were not only safe but necessary to keep my home beautiful and healthy, they were actually causing far more harm than good.

I was shocked to find, during my research, that the EPA estimates indoor air pollution is up to five times greater than outdoor air pollution in part due to common household cleaners, aerosols, air fresheners, disinfectants, and even dry-cleaned clothing (solvent emissions). Recent studies also show a link between common household cleaners and asthma, the number one childhood chronic illness. The reason for this is that the chemical compounds in these products, when used and even while stored, emit harmful gasses that can cause eye, nose and throat irritation and respiratory issues. They are also linked to headaches, loss of coordination, nausea and liver, kidney and central nervous system damage. In some cases, they have been known to cause cancer in laboratory animals and humans and are suspected in links to neurological issues including ADHD and Parkinson's disease.


You don't have to compromise between the health and safety of your family and a clean environment. Below are my top five green cleaning solutions. Not only are they non-toxic and as effective as commercial cleaners but all of them are significantly less expensive than their commercial counterpart, something I appreciate in the midst of today's rapidly rising gas and grocery prices.

- 1. Baking soda is a very low cost yet extremely versatile foundation to green cleaning. Among other things, it can be used as a deodorizer, a stain remover, and a mild abrasive that can be used on porcelain bath and sink fixtures and stovetops. I once removed permanent marker from my coffee table by scrubbing with baking soda and a damp cloth.
- 2. Vinegar acts as a mild disinfectant and often boosts the power of baking soda. Nothing, not even Mr. Clean's Magic Eraser, can compete with the combined power of vinegar and baking soda on baked on food. Use to clean toilets, floors, windows and stove tops. Sprinkle baking soda into a slow drain and follow with vinegar, the reaction will help loosen clogs and open drains.
- 3. Pure Essential Oils are good substitutes for synthetic fragrances. Sprinkle your favorite essential oil (my favorites are lavender, peppermint and lemon) in a bowl of water to sit on the counter, sprinkle in closets, vacuum bags or vehicle

- carpets for a safe air freshener. Be careful, essential oils are toxic to cats if applied directly to their fur.
- 4. Grain alcohol with high alcohol content is an effective disinfectant or even window cleaner to replace the harsher ammonia-based window cleaners or petroleum-based disinfectants. It can also be used in the occasional after cleaning cocktail! As with all alcohol products, keep out of reach of children.
- 5. Lemon juice is a natural stain remover and laundry brightener; a safe alternative to bleach. I recently removed a black grease stain from a pair of white pants with the power of pure lemon juice. It can also be mixed with vinegar to make a powerful disinfectant that can be used in the kitchen, in the bathroom, on floors and anywhere else germs may be lurking.

If you shy away from making your own cleaning products, there are now many safe non-toxic alternatives available on market shelves. My favorite for non-toxic dish soap (both liquid and automatic dishwasher soap), laundry soaps and softeners are made by Seventh Generation but there are other good products such as Mrs. Meyers and Planet. For an even bigger boost to the environment, use cloth rags that can be washed with the laundry instead of disposable products such as wipes or paper towels.








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
