Your input has been invaluable as we work to translate artist's drawings into budgets and actual construction plans. The strong consensus from your e-mails confirmed the direction the Board wanted to take – building a high-quality facility while keeping the costs realistic so as not to bankrupt the Association or cripple it with heavy debt. It is always reassuring as a Director to have confirmation that your intended plans accurately reflect the desires of the neighborhood.

A few of you commented that you had no use for a pool because you do not swim. An integral part of the project is the community center. This amenity will best serve Circle C if we receive input from every segment of the community. In designing meeting space for those who are not interested in swimming, we need to know how you would like to use the space. What types of clubs, meetings and/or activities could use convenient meeting space in Circle C? How many rooms could we regularly use, and how many people should we plan on accommodating? What special features should we include? Do we need an indoor sports court, a large meeting hall, a stage area, or a full kitchen? Let us know what clubs or other organizations you'd like to house in the community center, or what events you have that you'd like to be able to rent space for. Neighborhoods with welldesigned community centers keep them busy almost every day. With your input, we can build a community center that has something to offer every member of the Association.

Be creative, and help us design a neighborhood facility that will serve the needs of every resident of Circle C. It is clear from our research that there is a real need for public meeting space in South Austin. As your elected Board, we want to make sure that we design a community center that meets the needs of Circle C residents first and foremost, and then serves the greater community as well. With your help, the new facility will become a true focal point that brings our neighborhood together and serves all ages and interests. Once the Center is filled with people and activities, Gary Bradley's vision will transcend the collection of buildings and landscaping to become a living, breathing community. We will continue driving two sections of Circle C per month to note any violations of the deed

restrictions. Violations may include, but are not limited to: excessive weeds, areas of no turf, dead shrubs and/or trees, yard art, grass that is not edged or mowed, areas of dead grass, boats, RV's, trailers and general home maintenance issues. We are required to send notification of deed restriction violations via certified mail and we also send regular mail. If you receive a deed restriction violation notice PLEASE CALL the HOA office at 288-8663. It's impossible to know everyone's individual situation, so we appreciate communication from you.

If you have a deed restriction to

report, you may submit the specific address at info@circlecranch.info or give us a call at 288-8663. Violations that are reported are generally checked with 3 business days and if we are able to confirm a violation, we will begin the deed restriction process (which you can access on the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/documents/AssociationDocuments/DeedRestrictions/CCHOA-DeedRestrictionPolicy2003.pdf

#### **Gated Community Council**

Circle C Ranch has 4 Gated communities within it (Park West, Muirfield, Enclave I, and II). Each of these neighborhoods has their own HOAs, which add more control and additional services. Park West was the first of these HOA's to get on its feet and they have been working closely with CCHOA ever since. So, when Muirfield's HOA elected officers, I thought it would be beneficial to bring them together, along with our CCHOA board, to meet each other and share best practices.

For lack of a better term, I'm calling it a "Gated Community Council" meeting. The first one is scheduled late in July, after our Newsletter deadline, but my expectation is that this will be an informal meeting with no specific agenda. The gated communities all work under all of the same CC&R's that the rest of Circle C Ranch does, but they also have their own landscapers and tighter security, by virtue of a gate and fence.

They don't allow solicitors and street parking is discouraged. They have the same city services as the rest of us, except for street maintenance. They are entirely responsible for their roads, sidewalks, street lights and mail centers.

Since street repairs can be very expensive, they may also have to keep a rather large reserve fund. Park West, in fact, has already had a Reserve Study prepared for them, so that they can better plan for future maintenance and repairs. Some of the things that I think they will want to share among themselves, include banking, property management companies, landscaping contracts, street parking, gate policies, web sites reserve funds, security, communications and vendor recommendations. We also have offered them a column in our Circle C Newsletter. You might have read the articles for Park West residents and I think you may see more for these newer gated sub-divisions.

#### **Hide Your** Garbage Can & **Recycle Bin!**

We are continuing to receive many complaints from residents about owners who are storing their garbage can and recycle bin in view from the street. Garbage cans and recycle bins should be hidden from view - either behind your fence, in your garage or behind shrubbery. #### Circle C Landscape

It is early August and I am writing this for the September newsletter. So, at the current time, it has been over 100 degrees for more than 40 days. Hopefully, by the time you read this, we will have had a couple of good rains and some 90 degree days.

In August, we essentially try to keep everything alive under increasingly adverse circumstances. On the commons areas, you will notice that the goal of really green grass has now given way to grass that will green up with a few good rains. Beginning early August, we start hand watering trees and shrubs that show stress and need deep watering. We will continue this into September if necessary. The additional problem with no rain is that over time the vegetation will begin to yellow from both the hot sun and from the irrigation water which contains chlorine.

Once the weather cools down a good 10 degrees, you might be motivated to get out and work in your garden. During this time of year, it is a good idea to cut back any die back or legginess in shrubs, annuals, and perennials. They will recover and give you a good blooming cycle for the fall.


Turf is easily damaged here between our rocky and shallow soils and, most often, St. Augustine yards which really do require at least afternoon shade. If your yard is spotty, you can add some good turf topper (high quality composted soil) at the rate of about ½" and water it in during your normal sprinkler cycle. When the weather starts changing, it is prime time for brown patch, the most common disease of St. Augustine grass.

Preventing brown patch takes a determined approach. Many people over-fertilize St. Augustine and this contributes to the disease. Also, make sure you water in the early morning so the yard can be dry at nightfall when fungus tends to take over. You can treat the areas with 1 cup of milk mixed in a gallon of water (use every seven days), or if you want a chemical, look for a fungicide that is specifically formulated for St. Augustine brown patch at your local garden store. Do not apply your fall fertilizer yet, wait for the cool end of October weather.

In September in Circle C we will be carrying on the normal maintenance tasks of mowing, trimming, and weeding. In addition, we hope to be replacing some shrubs on Escarpment, weather permitting and setting up some new beds. We are also planning a weed treatment for the Spruce Canyon area south of Lacrosse.

#### The Beijing/Circle C Connection

When the Olympics begin on 08/08/08, you'll have a chance to cheer for two first-time Olympians with Circle C Ranch roots.


Sprint star Garrett Weber-Gale, who won both the men's 50-meter and 100-meter freestyle events at the U.S. Olympic Trials in July, lived in Circle C Ranch and swam for Circle C Swimming during high school before becoming a University of Texas standout and NCAA champion in the 100-yard freestyle. In the process of winning the rare sprint double at the Olympic Trials, Garrett set two American records and became the first American to break the 48-second barrier in the 100-meter freestyle. As the fastest American in the water, Garrett will swim the two sprint events and likely swim two relays for Team U.S.A.

Scott Spann, who pulled off a surprise victory in the men's 200-meter breaststroke at

the Olympic Trials, got his feet wet with Circle C Swimming as well. Spann will swim his first semester at UT this fall after transferring from the University of Michigan.

In addition to these first-time Olympians, world record holders (and former Circle C Swimming stars) Ian Crocker and Brendan Hansen are returning to the Olympics. Crocker, who won silver in the 100-meter butterfly at the 2004 Athens Olympics, set the world record at the 2005 World Championships and will make his third trip to an Olympic Games. Hansen, who won silver in the 100-meter breaststroke at the 2004 Athens Olympics, is the world record holder and won the event at the Olympic Trials.

Our neighbors can be proud of one of our best amenities – our Olympic-sized pool – and the Olympic-sized dreams that it has helped create.



#### **Park West HOA News**

(Specifically for Park West Residents ) - Submitted by Jackie Rollins

#### Notes from the Board

Besides working diligently on a draft for potential covenant changes, which will be shared with residents soon, the Park West HOA Board has been busy considering and approving other issues that have a direct impact on us all. In mid August, the Board sent out to each homeowner copies of the Park West Dues Collection Process and Homeowners' Forum Policy, just recently approved at the Board's July 28 meeting. And while we're on the subject of a homeowners' forum policy - do you have a minute? In fact you can have five to present an issue or question to the Board at the beginning of a meeting. The Board meets on the third Monday of each month (check a mail center bulletin board for possible changes), and all you have to do to speak your mind is to contact Board Secretary Jackie Rollins at 301-1839 or e-mail JackieRollins02@aol.com to reserve your five minute spot.

#### Lot 103 Update

Anyone attending the last couple of HOA meetings can attest to the fact that Lot 103 certainly generates a great deal of interest. Homeowners whose residences border the lot paid a hefty sum for that privilege. Sales people representing the builders in this area gave many differing accounts of just what Lot 103 is. Frances Bush, who is assigned by the PWHOA Board to be "in charge" of this project, has spent time walking the area and talking to the City of Austin, since they have their signs posted over a considerable portion of the lot. It took a great deal of her time on hold trying to determine just who in the City was responsible for the signs and what was expected of the homeowners in Park West. She eventually found out that this lot is part of the City of Austin's Watershed Protection Area. More specifically, it is part of the Slaughter Creek Watershed, which, in turn, is part of the Edwards Aquifer Recharge Zone. Its purpose is to serve as a buffer for Park West run-off before it reaches Slaughter Creek. Being part of an environmentally sensitive area, there is little we can do to the area; however, we are required to maintain it, which means removal of trash and dead vegetation, especially in the drainage areas on the lot. (Note: Lot 103 borders Park West Lots 57-75 and Lots

78-54.) The HOA Board is proposing a meeting of all homeowners, especially those that immediately border Lot 103, who are interested in listening to concerns about Lot 103 and brainstorming any possible solutions. The meeting is tentatively planned for Tuesday, September 30, beginning at 6:00 p.m., at the Child Development Center. Check a mail center bulletin board closer to that date to confirm the actual day and time. Those attending should park on the east side of the CDC.

#### Landscaper News

Sprinkler checks are still going strong. If you haven't taken advantage of your free front yard inspection yet, call Jackie Rollins, landscape liaison, at 940-5745 or e-mail her at JackieRollins02@aol. com to schedule one. In some cases, it can be done the same day you contact her, so..... what are you waiting for! We've had a couple of good rain showers since the last newsletter, but your front yard is still counting on your sprinkler system – in good working condition – to keep it looking its best in this hot weather.

#### **Mail Center Trash Containers**

The containers, primarily the one at the west mail center, are suffering from overuse. The bags can't be changed fast enough because some people are not only discarding unwanted mail, but dog waste and leftover food containers and cups as well. Since Circle C Landscape relinquished responsibility for emptying and replacing the bags this past January, Park West has had an agreement with Pearson Landscape to "keep an eye" on the containers and change the bags when full. However, Pearson is not in the neighborhood on a daily basis, and most certainly not on the weekends, so a serious problem with refuse overflow has developed. Therefore, your cooperation is requested. In order for the containers to remain in place for your convenience, please use them gently. With identity theft ever present, consider taking your junk mail home to place in your recycling bin instead of tossing it into a public receptacle; and never, ever place anything that eventually will cause an odor, such as food and dog waste, into the containers.

#### **Broken Record Department**

- Use your automatic sprinkler system according to the City of Austin ordinance:
  - Odd numbered houses Wednesday and Saturday.
  - Even numbered houses Thursday and Sunday.
  - NO sprinklers on between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m. ever.
- Place your garbage and recycling containers out of view from the street, either in the garage or behind the fence. Do not leave them curbside longer than a total of 12 hours from before and after pickup. If you are gone on pickup day, arrange for a neighbor or friend to place them at the curb and return them to their resting place within the 12 hour time frame. Never put them out a day (or earlier) in advance or leave them out for a day or longer after pickup. There are some residents – gasp! – who actually do that.
- Carry a plastic bag for the scooped poop when walking your dog.
- The speed limit on all Park West streets is 20 mph. Please slow down.
- No overnight parking is allowed on the street. Move your vehicle onto the driveway or into the garage.

make the first awkward move. Cotillion is our attempt to remedy future empty dance floors, and improve communication and social skills, both inside and outside of the classroom," Foster said. 





# Volunteers (like you!) help students SOAR to new heights in reading

when you're a kid in elementary school, that extra attention could make the difference between passing and failing the state mandated TAKS test.

Six years ago Kiker Elementary parent Sue Smaus started "Camp Read", a program designed to give additional individual to students in danger of failing the reading portion of the TAKS test. In 2006, the program was transplanted to Clayton Elementary. Redubbed "SOAR" (Students on Adventures in Reading), the program has helped over 100 students prepare for the state exam.

According to program coordinator Nina Telangs, children are selected to participate based on their benchmark scores. If the teacher or the administration thinks that the student will benefit

from some individual attention, they participate in SOAR. The SOAR student is typically one who doesn't have a reading disability, but just needs practice.

There's truth to the old adage that practice makes perfect. Last year, every child who participated in the spring semester of SOAR passed in the first try. And what's more, over 50% of the 3rd grade SOAR children earned commended scores in their reading TAKs test.

At the core of this wildly successful program is a team of 80 to 100 dedicated volunteers. These volunteers "mentors" devote just two half hours per week to reading with a child, cheering them on, and giving them the special attention they need to, well, soar.

A muscle contracts eccentrically when it lengthens under tension during exercise. For example, during a biceps curl, the biceps muscle shortens during the concentric lifting phase and lengthens during the eccentric lowering phase. Eccentric contractions also can occur during aerobic activity, such as downhill running, in which the quadriceps muscle repeatedly lengthens against gravity to lower the center of mass and aid in shock absorption.

#### Don't Be a Sore Loser

**DELAYED MUSCLE SORENESS.** It's the name of the stiff pain you feel as you roll over and reach to turn off the morning alarm after a day in which you trained unusually hard or tried a new exercise. Some people feel there's no better reward; others cease to exercise. What everyone should know is that there is a way to prevent this muscle soreness.

#### What Causes Sore Muscles?

There are two types of exercise-related muscle soreness. Immediate muscle soreness quickly dissipates and is the pain you feel during, or immediately after, exercise. Delayed muscle soreness signals a natural adaptive process that the Delayed body initiates following intense exercise. It manifests 24 to 48 hours after the exercise session soreness signals and spontaneously decreases a natural after 72 hours.

Numerous studies have adaptive been conducted to determine process that the the cause of delayed muscle body initiates soreness, and the theories have been many and controversial. following The most current research intense attributes it to microscopic tears in the muscle and surrounding exercise. connective tissue following eccentric exercise (see "Feeling a Little Eccentric?"). Those who experience delayed muscle soreness include conditioned individuals who increase the intensity, frequency or duration of their workouts, or participate in an activity that they are unfamiliar with. Beginning exercisers, or those who have undergone a significant lapse in training, frequently experience soreness when starting a new exercise program.

Studies on the best methods to alleviate delayed muscle soreness are almost as abundant as the number of studies conducted to determine its cause.

Cryotherapy (the topical application of ice), massage, stretching, and the use of nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs (NSAIDs), among other less conventional approaches, have been tested to determine if they can prevent delayed muscle soreness or are effective treatments. To date, no therapy that hastens the decrease of delayed muscle soreness has been found, however some of the therapies previously mentioned may have a minor impact if initiated immediately after intense or unusual exercise.

#### The Good News

muscle

Once you induce delayed onset muscle soreness at a specific exercise intensity, you shouldn't experience that sensation again until intensity is increased.

> This is because delayed muscle soreness has been shown to produce a rapid adaptation response, which means that the muscles adapt to an exercise intensity. Until it is changed, soreness won't occur. This is the basis for the most widely recommended approach to preventing delayed muscle soreness: Gradual progression and conservative increases in intensity, frequency or duration. Preliminary light exercise may

prevent the onset of soreness following a heavy eccentricexercise workout. Beginners should exercise with light weights, two to three times per week for one or two months, then gradually build. Alreadyconditioned exercisers who want to try a new workout or sport also should begin gradually, taking care not to be overzealous.

#### Pet Waste: Dealing with a Real Problem in Suburbia

Pet waste is not the predominant or most toxic pollutant in urban streams, but it is one of many small sources of pollution that can cumulatively have a big impact if left unmanaged. In North Central Texas the estimated dog population is 1.2 million. The average dog produces three to four pounds of waste daily, according to the Food and Drug Administration. That's about 900,000 pounds of dog poop produced every day in North Texas. Add to this figure cats and other smaller pets, and a significant volume of waste is being generated daily.

Pet waste contains bacteria and parasites, as well as organic matter and nutrients, notably nitrogen and phosphorous.

Some of the diseases that can be spread from pet waste are:

- Campylobacteriosis- a bacterial infection that causes diarrhea in humans.
- Salmonellosis- the most common bacterial infection transmitted to humans from animals. Symptoms include fever, muscle aches, headache, vomiting, and diarrhea.
- Toxocarisis- roundworms transmitted from animals to humans. Symptoms include vision loss, rash, fever, or cough.

In addition to these diseases, the organic matter and nutrients contained in pet waste can degrade water quality. When pet waste is washed into a surface water body, the waste decays. This process of breaking down the organic matter in the waste uses up dissolved oxygen and releases ammonia. Low oxygen levels, increased ammonia and warm summer water temperatures can kill fish.

Excess phosphorous and nitrogen added to surface waters can lead to cloudy, green water from accelerated algae and weed growth. Decay of this extra organic matter can depress oxygen levels, killing organisms. Objectionable odors can also occur.

Flies and other pest insects can also increase when pet waste is disposed of improperly, becoming a nuisance and adding another vector for disease transmission.

Managing pet waste properly is something that everyone can do to make a difference in their respective watersheds. Truly, proper individual actions result in significant water quality improvement when carried out by the majority. Unlike some forms of stormwater pollutants, pet waste can be easily and economically managed by the individual.

Sometimes, the 'out of sight, out of mind' attitude exists regarding pet waste. Employing this flawed thinking, waste is often disposed of in the street stormwater catch basin. Aside from dumping directly into a water body, this is the single worst place to dispose of waste. In the next rainstorm, the accumulated waste is transported quickly and efficiently to the nearby receiving water course, polluting it.. That said, then, specifically what can be done?

#### **Proper Onsite Disposal**

Flush it - Pet waste itself (not the litter or bedding material) can be flushed down the toilet. The water from the toilet goes either to a septic system onsite or a sewage treatment plant that removes most pollutants before the water reaches its outlet. The used litter should be disposed of in a securely closed bag in the trash.

Bury it - You can bury the waste directly in the yard. Dig a hole or trench that is 6 inches deep, away from vegetable gardens, play areas, and away from any lake, stream, or well. Often, the woods is an ideal spot. Microorganisms in the top layer of soil will break down and digest the waste, releasing the nutrients for uptake by adjacent vegetation. Never add the waste as a fertilizer to the garden or to the compost pile. The disease organisms will continue to survive and create a significant health risk.

Trash it - Check local ordinances first. Putting pet waste in the trash is against the law in some communities. Even if legal and easy, it's not the best solution. Waste can contribute to the landfill problems in the state.

Leave it to someone else - Believe it or not, a number of professional pet waste disposal services exist. These businesses will completely remove the waste from your yard and dispose of it themselves, for a fee.

#### Odinances, signage and education

Many communities have "pooper-scooper" laws that govern pet waste cleanup. Some of these laws specifically require anyone who walks an animal off of their property to carry a bag, shovel, or scooper. Any waste left by the animal must be cleaned up immediately. Call your local health officer to find out more about pet waste regulations.

In recreation areas, trails, and public parks, 'scooper signage' along with plastic bag dispensers and disposal cans should be provided. This idea is especially critical at streamside or lake shore walking trails.

Public education is critical when addressing the pet waste problem. Interestingly, much of the public thinks of problems associated with pet waste as being only nuisance related-odors or aesthetics. An actual example of this is the woman walking her dog in the park who had brought along a brown paper bag to collect the 150 pound mastiff's waste. This she indeed dutifully did, and then proceeded to dispose of the bag by....tossing it into the lake!

Brochures, newsletters, signage, local public service announcements, and evening seminars are all ways to get the word out to the public. One very effective way to reach people is to have a flyer enclosed in tax bills or other municipally-generated mailings that go to all property owners.

#### Conclusion

The problem of pet waste disposal in suburbia is a real one. Research has indicated strongly that water quality is negatively impacted by this pollutant in Texas. However, unlike many other sources of water degradation in the state, improper pet waste management is a dilemma that can be easily corrected through education by organizations and common sense actions by individuals.




