One of Our Swan Cygnets Shot

Recently, one of our four cygnets was shot with a high-powered pellet gun. This was discovered after relocating the cygnet and realizing that it could not walk. The avian vet found the pellet next to the spine, which caused nerve damage. Betty Burkett is currently nursing the cygnet. We do not yet know if it will survive.

This irresponsible and cruel act has caused an innocent creature to suffer, and has created an expense for the community and those who care for the swans. Perhaps of greater consequence to the person responsible is that this is an illegal action that could result in a felony record.

This incident has been reported to the police. The police have seen the pellet and have informed us of what brands of pellet guns could have been used. One of our residents is personally offering a \$1,000 reward for information that leads to the discovery of the person or persons responsible. If you have any information, please contact AMI.

Pellet and BB guns should not be fired in LOE. Parents, this may be an ideal opportunity to discuss BB/pellet gun safety and respect for our wildlife with your children.



The Reason for Banners Around the Lakes

When relocating the cygnets every year, we put up banners at the end of a lake before releasing the youngsters. These flags frighten the swans and keep them from that area. After a week, they have adjusted and acclimated to their new situations, come readily for food, and are content. When we erected the banners recently, several residents complained to AMI. This is an appropriate course of action as AMI could explain the reason for the banners and mention their temporary status. Unfortunately, one of our residents took it upon him or her self to remove the banners at Crescent Bay Lake. This did not give the three cygnets transferred to the lake time to adjust and they crossed the street right where the banners had been and are now in the big lake. We can catch them and put them back on the same lake but they will not stay. This is the year I had hoped every lake in our subdivision would have swans but now that dream has come to an end.

Please be patient with the banners. These swans add value to our community. Many people on Crescent Bay Lake are very disappointed that there will be no swans until next year, that is, if the banners are allowed to stay up.

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
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Common Sense In Short Supply

Several recent incidents within LOE have been very problematic. Please review these basic guidelines to ensure all residents can continue to enjoy our beautiful community.

- 1. NO FIREARMS SHOULD BE DISCHARGED WITHIN LOE. Recently one adolescent swan was critically wounded due to being shot multiple times with a pellet gun. No shooting of wildlife or target practice is allowed in LOE. Also one duck has been killed and one wounded. No one should play with, harass, or disturb the wildlife in LOE. Other residents have also reported having their window's shot out by pellet guns. This could be a simple mistake by someone target practicing in their back yard or intentional vandalism. Either way, since you cannot control where the pellet will end up, we ask that residents take these guns outside the subdivision for target practice
- 2. NO GUESTS OR CONTRACTORS SHOULD BE DIRECTED TO THE TANNER GATES. ALL GUESTS MUST BE DIRECTED TO THE MAIN GATE ON ELDRIDGE NO EXCEPTIONS. There have been several incidents of people found waiting to enter the Tanner gates. When approached by residents asking them to enter the front gate, the people say a resident told them to wait there and
- someone would let them in. Even if you live near the Tanner Gates, your guests must enter through Eldridge. LOE maps are being copied so the guards can hand them out to the visitors to make it easier to find the resident's home they plan to visit. We have a great asset by being a gated community, but that asset is damaged by unauthorized visitors. If you see someone trying to enter our property through one of our Tanner Road gates, please direct them to the front gate. If they refuse to comply, write down the license number and notify AMI at 713.932.1122. The owner will then be notified that entry is not permitted at the Tanner Gates. Multiple offenses will result in police notification.
- 3. OUR POSTED SPEED IS 25 MILES PER HOUR. THIS SPEED SHOULD NOT BE EXCEEDED ESPECIALLY AROUND CHILDREN. We love our kids, but several residents have been seen speeding well above 40 miles per hour even in areas where children are present. Please slow down and come to a complete stop at each stop sign you'll still get were you're going and you and your neighbors will be safer and happier.



Notes from the July Board Meeting

The Board of Directors of Lakes on Eldridge Community Association met on Tuesday, July 22, 2008. The following is a summary of what was discussed.

HOMEOWNER/GUEST FORUM

A homeowner suggested contacting solar water heating companies to see if the community could obtain group purchase discounts for interested homeowners. He was to submit additional information to support the consideration.

Three residents suggested installation of speed bumps or similar structures to reduce speeding along Lake Center run and Lake Shore Ridge. They requested that the matter be placed on the agenda for the annual meeting for a vote by the Members.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Financial Statements: The Board reviewed the financial statements for the month ended June 30, 2008. The Association had cash balances of \$339,770 in the Operating Fund and \$378,961 in the Replacement Fund. Operating income for the six months ended June 30, 2008 was \$509,364, Operating Expenses were \$629,811 and the Deficit was \$120,447. The Operating Deficit was the result of the \$80,000 contribution to Reserves plus the transfer of over \$100,000 in sales tax refunds from 2007 to the Reserves. The financial statements were accepted.

<u>Collections:</u> The Board reviewed current delinquent accounts and the legal status report from the community's legal counsel and instructed the managing agent accordingly. \$13,945 of delinquent accounts was collected during June 2008. Total Accounts Receivable

at June 30, 2008 was \$33,366 as opposed to over \$55,000 a year earlier.

The Board reviewed the legal status report and all delinquent accounts and instructed the managing agent accordingly.

Hearing: The Board agreed to hold a hearing for a delinquent owner at 5:30 p.m. on August 19, 2008.

2009 Budget: The managing agent distributed copies of the first draft of the 2009 budget for review by the Board. This preliminary draft was also to be submitted to MUD 241 for use in its 2008/2009 budget. Any changes in the Lakes on Eldridge budget between now and time of formal approval were to be resolved with MUD 341 at yearend

COMMITTEE REPORTS

Access Control: The committee chairman reported that he was called out by ISSC personnel to witness an incident in late June involving solicitation in our neighborhood by a company attempting to sell alarm systems door to door. The Sheriff's Department was summoned and the young representative of the company, after much argument, was told to leave and not return. Gate attendants are advising contractors not to solicit when they enter the property.

At a meeting with ISSC on Monday July 14th the following items were discussed:

- 1. An updated map showing all street names. This has been further delayed because of formatting problems, and efforts will be continued to have these maps completed as soon as possible.
- 2. The toilet area in the gatehouse needs

- cleaning. The managing agent was to determine if the person who cleans the Beach club would also clean the gatehouse with each visit.
- 3. The chair needs replacing it is soiling or tearing shirtsleeves. ISSC was directed to replace the chair and include the cost in its regular invoice.
- 4. A resident directory would be most helpful. The managing agent had emailed an updated directory for use by the gate attendants.
- 5. Gate attendants have no training to reset the gates when a breaker trips.
- Cell phones with caller ID for the gate attendants have been requested. The board denied a cell phone but instructed ISSC to purchase a phone with both a landline and a wireless handset.
- 7. A fan for outside the guardhouse would be appreciated on these hot days.
- The board asked the managing agent to check on a remote button for the gate attendants, solar screening for the front window and to confirm whether the circuit breakers for the entry gate had been installed.

Parks & Pool: The committee chairman reported that the LOE Swim Team ended the season with a 2nd Place Finish at the Divisional Meet. Numerous swimmers qualified for post-season competitions. The team is now preparing for the Fall Swim Season.

The Board agreed to request charges from LOEN and Twin Lakes to help pay for the increased cleaning requirements of a 200+ swim team.

The pool bathrooms now smell fresh and the new circulation fan is really quiet.

The new vents are installed on the pool equipment room doors but the new chlorinators have not been installed. Also the pool gate needs to be fixed, as the spring does not close it properly.

GHPM also needs to be reminded to obtain the piece needed to repair the broken umbrella.

The Board also asked the managing agent to instruct a contractor to proceed with painting of the arbors in the parks.

<u>Landscape</u>: The committee chairman reported that a meeting was held between Landscape Images, AMI and LOE. It was agreed to work toward water conservation, improving turf areas and reducing general maintenance requirements. A resident in LOE with extensive irrigation and landscaping experience, has been and will be very helpful in making this transition. The following action items were resolved during the meeting:

- 1. LIOT to change controllers to water overnight instead of during the day.
- 2. Convert to "Cycle & Soak" process wherever possible to reduce water requirements
- 3. Check / Replace rain sensors as needed
- 4. Change moving pattern to avoid compacting turf
- 5. Use existing pine straw to "mulch" hollies rather than dispose of material.

- 6. Check drainage in built up beds to avoid standing water
- 7. LIOT to submit proposal for installation of perennials at next color change out.
- 8. LIOT to investigate and submit estimate for use of Liquid Compost Extract instead of granular fertilizer.
- 9. A committee member will meet with LIOT after 8/15 to review and propose additional irrigation changes to save water and enhance turf.
- 10. LIOT and LOE will work together to determine additional budget items as necessary.

<u>Website:</u> The committee chairman advised that there was nothing new to report and suggested that the Website Committee be recombined with the Newsletter Committee as a Communications Committee. He would continue to work with the website as part of the Communications Committee. The board agreed to combine the Committees.

Social/Events: The committee chairman reported that July's social committee met at 6:30 on July 2, 2008 for "social hour" and started the meeting at 7:00. The meeting was an evening meeting to try and gain more attendance from the normal meetings the 1st Wednesday of the month at 12:00. Attendance was up slightly but no new members attended.

This month's committee meeting discussed the following events:

- 1. July 4th Parade discussed volunteer duties.
- 2. Discussed the successful Quiz Night in June. Everyone on the social committee heard positive feedback from those in attendance.
- 3. Oktoberfest: decided that we would not have the Dairy Maids cater due to cost. The social committee will provide food & snacks. We are going to also suggest attendees bring light snacks as well. A member will approach a contact at Rudi Lechner's to discuss them catering the event at a lower cost or donating some food.
- 4. National Night out: Date has been confirmed for 10/7/08. There will be one event at the Beach Club versus smaller events in each village. The sheriff department and fire department will be present to demonstrate their vehicles to the neighborhood kids.
- 5. Christmas Toy Drive: We began discussing dates for the Christmas Party and Toy Drive. December 12 is one possibility.

The 4th of July Parade and Family Festival was a success. About 20-25 kids entered the bike-decorating contest and at least 40 kids participated in the parade. About 50 to 70 people attended the Family Festival. A water safety course was conducted by GHPM. Afterward the Swim team and GHPM put on water games and volunteers served hotdogs.

MANAGEMENT REPORT

Action Items: The Board reviewed the list of action items and instructed the managing agent accordingly. After reviewing costly proposals to install either polished concrete of wooden flooring, the Board decided to look to re-carpeting the Beach Club using a dark color to help hide stains.

The managing agent reported that emergency repairs were being made to the pedestrian bridge across Turkey Creek.

Deed Restrictions: The Board reviewed the deed restrictions at July 22, 2008 and instructed the managing agent accordingly.

SCHEDULE NEXT MEETING

The next regular meeting of the Board of Directors was scheduled to be held at 6:30 p.m. on August 19, 2008.

The Board also scheduled the Annual Meeting of Members for October 22, 2008 if Kirk Elementary is available.

August 25 – The Diplomat's Wife by Pam Jenoff. Love was not a luxury Marta Nedermann could afford during the war. But with the Nazis defeated, her life takes a surprising turn when she meets Paul, a handsome American soldier. Their whirlwind romance is cut short when his troop is deployed, but promises of marriage and a rendezvous in London bolster Marta's spirits. Then, tragically, a plane crash claims Paul's life, and Marta is left alone to discover—to her delight and dismay—that she is pregnant. Now, two years later, Marta has picked up the pieces and moved on. She has started over in London with her husband, a British diplomat, with whom she shares a companionable, if passionless, marriage. Simon asks her no questions, and Marta is happy to keep close her memories of Paul and let her deeds of the past remain unspoken. But Marta's new life is anything but simple. 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
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Adventures in Mothering at BridgePoint Bible


