There is still time to apply for certification for your yard as a Wildlife Habitat as part of the City of Austin's Wildlife Habitat Challenge. And HPWBANA is offering a free gallon of Blue Bell ice cream to each family that receives certification before October 31.

The Neighborhood Habitat Challenge begins May 1 and ends Oct. 31. The top three neighborhoods that have met all the challenge criteria and certified the most number of habitats will be awarded First, Second and Third place prizes. Neighborhoods that take the challenge must also organize a community invasive plant removal and promote gardening for wildlife through neighborhood newsletters and websites in addition to certifying the highest number of yards as habitats during the contest period. Upon completion of the challenge neighborhoods must register their neighborhood with the Wildlife Austin program.

Residents can certify their yards by visiting the National Wildlife Federations website, www.nwf.org/gardenforwildlife or by requesting a pre-paid habitat certification application (limited quantity) from the Wildlife Austin program at512-327-8181 x29.

Mayfield Preserve Awarded Grant from Austin Parks Foundation

Take a walk through the woods of Mayfield Preserve (3505 W 35th St) and you may notice some big changes in some areas. Volunteers have been busy the last few months removing the invasive plant ligustrum in huge quantities. Areas that were once thick with ligustrum are now open and filled with sunlight. These areas can now recover as the native plants grow and the newly scattered native seeds germinate.

Most people visit Mayfield Park to check out the peacocks, gardens and ponds. A very welcoming 22 acre nature preserve surrounds Mayfield Park, open to all. With its' established trail system put in by scouts and volunteer groups over many years, it is a real gem to our local neighborhood.

Invasive plants are taking its toll on many preserves in the Austin area and Mayfield is no exception. The volunteer effort to clear the preserve of ligustrum started in the winter/spring of 2008 and has really picked up momentum this summer. About 1/3 of the preserve has been completed. The new group Friends of Mayfield Preserve was formed to work with Preserve Manager Rene Barrera and help coordinate the volunteer efforts.

A significant boost came from the Austin Parks Foundation when they supported the effort by awarding the Friends of Mayfield Preserve a grant to hire American Youthworks Environmental Corp for a week.



ECorps has already spent many days at Mayfield Preserve cutting and treating the big stumps and managing/chipping the brush piles.

Although Friends of Mayfield Preserve formed specifically to help with the invasive plant problem in the preserve, other future projects in the preserve are of interest such as helping get the bridges replaced that washed away a few years ago in the storms.

The Mayfield Park 2nd Saturday monthly gardening workday has been expanded to include preserve related projects so if you would like to get involved please join us. 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Ingredients

12 vanilla wafers 1 8 oz. packages cream cheese, softened

¹/₂ C sugar 1 tsp. vanilla 2 eggs

Directions

Line muffin tin with foil liners.

Place one vanilla wafer in each liner. Mix cream cheese, vanilla, and sugar on medium speed until well-blended. Add eggs. Mix well. Pour over wafers, filling 3/4 full. Bake 25 min. at 325°.

Remove from pan when cool. Chill. Top with fruit, preserves, nuts or chocolate.
