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As many of you know there are 3 dumpsters located in the swim center plaza parking lot; 2 of the dumpsters are from Balcones Recycling and are for "anything that tears" and may be used by residents. The other dumpster is for garbage only and IS NOT intended for residents to use. This dumpster is for all the garbage that is picked up on a daily basis from the mail centers, swim center, HOA office and common areas.

Recently we have witnessed many residents dumping their own PERSONAL garbage into this dumpster and even leaving their garbage piled up on the ground when the dumpster is full. PLEASE do not bring your garbage to this dumpster. The landscape crew must pick up all of your personal garbage that is left on the ground before the garbage company will empty the dumpster. This is a safety and health hazard.

Each resident has their own personal garbage and recycling container for their own personal use and if you have a bulky item you can call the City of Austin Solid Waste Department at 974-1945.

We hope we have cleared up any confusion on this matter and as an extra safeguard we now have security cameras on site.

### **Deed Restriction Update**

We will continue driving two sections of Circle C per month to note any violations of the deed restrictions. Violations may include, but are not limited to: excessive weeds, areas of no turf, dead shrubs and/or trees, yard art, grass that is not edged or mowed, areas of dead grass, boats, RV's, trailers and general home maintenance issues. We are required to send notification of deed restriction violations via certified mail and we also send regular mail. If you receive a deed restriction violation notice PLEASE CALL the HOA office at 288-8663. It's impossible to know everyone's individual situation, so we appreciate communication from you.

If you have a deed restriction to report, you may submit the specific address

at info@circlecranch.info or give us a call at 288-8663. Violations that are reported are generally checked with 3 business days and if we are able to confirm a violation, we will begin the deed restriction process (which you can access on the website at http://www.circlecranch.info/documents/ AssociationDocuments/DeedRestrictions/ CCHOA-DeedRestrictionPolicy2003.pdf

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## **CCHOA** News Continued Education Committee Update

The AISD Facilities Use and Boundary Task Force (FUBTF) is in the middle of the process to arrive at the attendance zone for the new Southwest Middle School. As of September 10th, the FUBTF has held 7 previous meetings. The following is a schedule of the remaining meetings:

- September 16, 2008
- September 30, 2008 at either Small or Bailey Middle School
- October 7, 2008 (if needed) to be determined
- October 28, 2008
- November 11, 2008
- November 25, 2008 (if needed)

These meetings are scheduled from 5:30 PM - 8:30 PM in the AISD Board Auditorium of the Carruth Administration Center unless specified otherwise. Dinner is served to the FUBTF members from 5:30 to 6:00; therefore

the discussions usually do not begin until 6:00. Facility Use and Boundary Task Force meetings are open to the public; however, a typical agenda would not include public comment or questions.

At this time, 5 proposals are being analyzed by the FUBTF. By October 8th, the FUBTF will arrive at one proposal to be presented at the October CAC meetings for the various schools, i.e. Kiker, Mills, Clayton, Bailey, Bowie, Austin, Covington, Paredes, O.Henry, Small, Oak Hill, and Baranoff.

The October 28th FUBTF meeting will review the comments from the CAC meetings and, if appropriate, revise the proposal. A public hearing is scheduled for November 6th at 6:00. Another public hearing will be scheduled but the date is not known at this time. The November meetings for the FUBTF are to consider the comments from the public hearings and, if appropriate, revise the proposal. In late November or early December, the FUBTF should present the final proposal to the AISD Superintendent and Board of Trustees for their approval.

## **Circle C Landscape**

Circle C Landscape has been busy installing the fall improvements and repairs approved by the Circle C Homeowners Association Board of Directors for 2008.

They include turf replacement and additional beds at the Slaughter/Escarpment intersection. This area has long been in need of renovation as the grass has been primarily St. Augustine that infiltrated from other sources. In the super hot weather, there is simply not enough water to maintain this type of turf. The turf area has been replaced with Pallisades zoysia, and some of the area has been converted to native landscape beds.

We also have begun adding beds to Escarpment. This large right of way area is undergoing a phased planned renovation to get the area more comparable to the newer areas of Circle C West by using native beds along the sides. This will be a long range project and the area from Needham to LaCrosse is the current area that is underway.

For maintenance in November, we are replenishing the mulch, trimming back some of the beds, continuing the mowing and, of course, putting up the holiday lighting. Look for it to be on by Wednesday, November 26!!

## **Circle C Supports the Capital Area Food Bank**

December 1-December 15, 2008

In a unique opportunity to work together as a community, the Circle C Homeowners Association Special Events Committee, Circle C Landscape, and the Escarpment Village vendors coordinated by Austin Real Estate Partners will be sponsoring a major food and donation drive to benefit the Capital Area Food Bank during the holiday season.

We encourage everyone to participate.

#### FOOD FACTS FOR CENTRAL TEXAS

- The Capital Area Food Bank partners with 370 social service agencies to distribute food to 21 counties in Central Texas. They also provide additional assistance in times of need for hurricane and other disaster relief.
- In Central Texas, 1 in 4 children and 1 in 5 adults need assistance with obtaining food. Of these, 82% are food insecure, and 49% have outright hunger.
- In tough economic times, and with the cost of food rising, senior citizens, and low income families simply have to make choices between the basics, and often eliminate food to buy medicine, or pay for housing and gas.

#### HOW TO DONATE

- We will be placing food collection bins at prominent locations throughout the neighborhood. Look for the blue barrels at the post offices, swim center, child development center, Escarpment Village, and elementary schools December 1-December 15. See the list below for most requested items. For every 1 lb of food donated, the Food Bank can provide .8 meals.
- Consider making a financial donation online. Go to the Circle C website at www.circlecranch.info and look for the link to make an online donation as part of the Circle C food drive. This is a great way to participate because for every \$1.00 given, the Food Bank can provide 5 meals to a hungry child, adult or senior.

#### OUR GOAL: Provide 15,000 meals for Central Texans

We would like the Circle C community as a whole to provide 15,000 meals for Central Texans during the food drive. Given the 4,000 plus homes in the community, this is certainly achievable. So, take a little time to either donate online or bring any of the following items to one of the food barrels in December.

#### **Political Correctness**

In case you were wondering but hadn't read the response on a mail center bulletin board, it's okay to place a small sign for a political candidate in your front yard. In 2005, the Texas Legislature approved a bill that overrides homeowner associations' covenants prohibiting signage. One sign per candidate is allowed and may be displayed up to 90 days before the election and 10 days afterward. A word to the wise: in order not to interfere with mowing, the front plant bed is the most likely location for a sign.

#### **Recycle Cart Hokey Pokey**

Do you feel like you're doing the Hokey Pokey when it comes to getting your old recycle cart picked up (the tan one with the black lid)? Do you put it out, then put it in, then put it out again, all to no avail? Several residents were not around or just didn't put the old cart at the curb on Monday, September 15, the day the exchange was made for the new, blue (with black lid) recycle cart. There was no advance alert from City of Austin Solid Waste about the swap, so it's really not your fault if it happened to you. However, there is a system in place for getting the old cart picked up and taken away –once and

for all – including the new, blue cart if you're not planning to recycle. You can't just leave the cart at the curb, as you've discovered, and expect it to be taken away. First, you MUST call the city at 311 and tell the operator you want the cart picked up. You will then receive a confirmation number and an approximate date for pickup. (Without a confirmation number, plan on doing the Hokey Pokey indefinitely.) The pickup date will be the next recycling Monday. For example, if you called on October 9, the following Monday, October 13, was a garbage pickup day only, so the unwanted cart would not have been picked up. But it would have been scheduled for pickup on Monday, October 20, a recycling Monday. The operator will tell you to leave the cart at the curb until 6 p.m. If it's not picked up, store it away and call 311 the next morning to find out what happened and get another pickup date. You will be asked for your confirmation number. This can sometimes go on for several recycling Mondays. Be patient - and good luck! (Note: If you're downsizing or upsizing to a different garbage container, the procedure is different. Call 311 for instructions.)

Patience is key when dealing with the weeds in our front lawns. The landscaper and crew have been hard at work recently, laying pre-emergent in two stages several weeks apart which will attack the root cause and help to eliminate them by spring growth. It should be noted as well that the weather and the temperature are important factors in successfully eliminating weeds. The landscape surveys were sent out in early October with a requested return date of October 31. If you haven't filled yours out yet and deposited it in one of the lock boxes on the back wall of each mail center, please do so now. The results will be shared with you as soon as they are tabulated.

#### **Broken Record Department**

• Place your garbage and recycling containers out of view from the street, either in the garage or behind the fence.

Do not leave them curbside longer than a total of 12 hours from before and after pickup. If you are gone on pickup day, arrange for a neighbor or friend to place them at the curb and return them to their resting place within the 12 hour time frame. Never put them out a day (or earlier) in advance or leave them out for a day or longer after pickup.

- Carry a plastic bag for the scooped poop when walking your dog.
- The speed limit on all Park West streets is 20 mph. Please slow down.
- No overnight parking is allowed on the street. Move your vehicle onto the driveway or into the garage.

#### Don't Shoot the Messenger

Sometimes it's necessary for a PWHOA Board member to speak to a resident about a rule or covenant violation. It could be something that appears in the Broken Record Department of this column, something as

minor as an exposed garbage container, or something as major as unapproved landscaping and structural alterations. Park West, as a gated community, has specific rules conducive to the care and maintenance of its unique appearance. As residents of Park West, each of us has a responsibility to ensure the continuance of the beauty and special appeal that convinced scores of us to make our homes here. If you are unsure about a rule, or need to refresh your memory regarding a Circle C or Park West covenant, you will find them all posted on our community website under Community Documents. If you haven't obtained a password to enter the website, e-mail JackieRollins02@aol.com and she'll be happy to walk you through the process.

I know you have seen Jarod's picture before, but since he is still waiting for a permanent home – a Forever Family – it is important to once again share his story.

Jarod will turn 18 in December. While you may think 18 is the time when kids leave home and are on there own, it sometimes doesn't work that way for children raised in the foster care system. In fact, it usually never works that way. Although these kids may be on their own, there are ill prepared to live 100% self sufficient, as most kids are.

For Jarod, we would love to have a family in the Austin area. He is in school, enjoying the work and playing football, and wants to continue with his education and eventually, go to college or in the Marines.

A little more about Jarod...

Imagine growing up in an unstable environment. Imagine having to be responsible for yourself at a very young age. Then, imagine, at 10 years old someone removing you from the only environment you have known and putting you in foster care with strangers. While this is done for the safety and well-being of the child, it is often difficult for children to understand. Sometimes they are sad, hurt, frustrated and angry. They are angry for being in this situation in the first place, angry for being in a strange place, angry because the world has let them down, angry because they now have no control over their future. You see, kids connect to things rather easily, even if it is a bad situation...when that is all you know, that is all you know.



Meet Jarod

Fast forward seven years and several foster homes later and you are still in foster care, you are angrier than ever because of the lack of control and because you simply do not know how to handle things. You mistrust the system, have difficulty getting along with foster siblings who too come and go and you face a very uncertain future.

So, you have Jarod who is now 17. He is a good kid with a good heart who needs direction and desperately needs someone to love him. Loving him will help give him a foundation for developing self worth – you see, he figures that if no one loves him, what is there to love about himself. Jarod needs someone who is going to help him process his anger and feel stable. He needs a strong forever family with a strong male figure. He needs a family with patience who is going to allow him to work through school at

his pace, learn to trust at his pace. The family needs to be okay with baby-steps. Maybe there is a family out there with the mentoring spirit – willing to adopt Jarod and give him a permanent home with no timelines...someone willing to help him finish school and develop plans for the future... most importantly, someone who will allow him to back up and grow up in the right developmental manner, instead of being forced to grow up. You see, for many kids the lack of stability and a family is the foundation on which everything else is built. If you have that mentor spirit and the willingness to take baby steps, please consider Jarod. Adopting a teenager is not easy and you cannot expect him to even resemble 17 years old, he has missed a lot and needs the opportunity to be a youth longer. And, teenagers in general are not easy to parent/mentor. This will take a special family. Did you know you can be single and adopt? Did you know there are no fees to adopt from the foster care system?

#### **Mills Elementary Reading Program** Gets \$2,000 Grant from Target®

Joe Dan Mills, Jr. Elementary School recently received a generous grant from Target<sup>®</sup> recognizing the school's work to help primary students who are struggling with reading basics.

Regina Staffa, mom to three Mills students with dyslexia, is also head coach of the elementary's Roaring Reading Teams. Staffa created the Roaring Reading program to help struggling K - 2readers.

"My oldest son was diagnosed with dyslexia in first grade," Staffa remembers. "But when I went to the school to see what help was available for him, there wasn't any. Texas' school system doesn't offer support for kids who have trouble reading until they've already failed at it a couple of times. I just thought, 'That's too late.""

Staffa sought training in Read Naturally curriculum, and is now studying with the Scottish Rite Learning Center to become a Certified Academic Language Specialist. In-between, she launched and leads Roaring Reading, an all-volunteer program that matches adult coaches with struggling young readers to provide a system for students to practice reading and pre-reading skills. Last school-year, Roaring Reading teams reached 70 Mills students and, over the summer, sponsored Summer Reading Rocks, which opened up the school library for children twice a week, and held storytimes and workshops for kids.

Two Mills kindergarten teachers alerted Staffa about the Target® grants last spring. Staffa decided to pursue a grant, and spent many painstaking hours doing detailed demographic research on Mills and Roaring Reading in order to submit the application last May. It was almost October when she received Target®'s reply.

"I thought it was going to be a rejection slip," recalls Staffa. "But it was a congratulatory letter of acceptance, along with the \$2,000 check. I was - I am - thrilled."

The grant is part of Target®'s ongoing efforts to strengthen families and communities across America. Since opening its doors in 1962, Target® has given five percent of its income to organizations supporting education, the arts, social services and volunteerism. Today, that equates to a nationwide contribution of \$3 million every week.

### Achoo!!!!

If you live in Austin and other allergen-laden locales, you are certainly familiar with the outward symptoms of airborne allergies. And if you've ever rushed to the bathroom after lunch, you may also be familiar with some food allergies and what they do to you. But did you know that depression can actually be a symptom of an allergy at work in your body? So can muscle aches, joint pain, anger and irritability, even an inability to think clearly. The list of allergy symptoms goes on and on.

The exact cause of allergies isn't known. Western science defines an allergic reaction as the body's defense mechanism against an allergen or foreign substance. The body's immune system takes over in an attempt to protect it. Ironically, your body is making you uncomfortable by fighting what are often benign substances.

Allergies to airborne substances, ragweed, mold, dust, mountain juniper, are often indicative of inflammation somewhere in the GI tract. They are typically secondary to a food allergy that is creating the inflammation.

Some allergens are actually inherited, but these are few. In fact, allergic reactions to soy, peanuts, dairy products, and wheat appear to be the only genetic allergies. Changing the pH and calming the

inflammation of the bowels is the key to reducing or eliminating allergies. While it isn't an overnight process, the results are worth it-living without sinusitis, itchy watery eyes, headaches, pressure, fatigue, drainage, sinus infections, irritable bowels, spastic colon, diarrhea, and constipation.

You may be shocked to discover how many of your seemingly unrelated symptoms are actually allergies.

Other symptoms of allergies include migraines, heartburn, fainting, bloodsugar problems, indigestion, and even mood disorders. Often, depression is actually a result of commonly

ingested allergens, and many people find they can reduce or eliminate their need for psychotropic medications by modifying their food intake.

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## The Green Corner - Green the Holidays

Thanksgiving will be here in a few weeks and following hard on its heels is the mecca of consumption – Christmas. I have a few tips that can help you feel easier about your carbon footprint during the holidays. This month I will focus on holiday food and Thanksgiving. In December, I will give you tips and ideas on how to green up your gift giving and holiday decorating.

The Thanksgiving Table: Before you shop, think sustainability. Both Whole Foods and Central Market sell organically grown, free range turkeys. Untreated with hormones, antibiotics and fed on whole grain feed, these turkeys can be purchased whole or partial (I buy a breast for my small family) for a meal designed specifically for your family. Add organically grown vegetables, and if possible heirloom varieties to increase nutritional value and green quotient.

I know, positively everyone says to go organic. But they rarely tell you why it

is important. It isn't just that it is cool or fashionable to be organic (although it is chic to be green)but that organic food is grown and/or raised with sustainability in mind, something that is not taken into account by conventional farming methods. Every time we do something against nature, there is a ripple effect that is felt much farther than our back yard but ultimately comes back to bite us.

Conventionally raised turkeys (and any poultry, beef and most farmed fish) are kept in tight quarters, fed a diet of grains and discarded animal products – usually from animals too sick to be used in human consumption- and fattened until slaughtered. The cramped quarters, lack of exercise, and poor quality food create a breeding ground for disease requiring the animals to be treated with prophylactic antibiotics. Hormones are used to increase the growth and yield of the meat. How is this unsustainable and downright harmful to us though? Over use

of antibiotics have led to antibiotic resistant diseases like MRSA, a particularly nasty and deadly antibiotic resistant staph bacterium, and hormones are absorbed into the meat and ingested by humans or find themselves (Continued on Page 31)

in our drinking water, creating all sorts of havoc in our bodies from suspected early onset puberty in girls to hormone induced cancers such as estrogen or progesterone positive breast cancer. If all this isn't enough, the runoff from poultry farms is toxic and pollutes water ways destroying entire ecosystems and tainting drinking water with poisons, antibiotics, fecal matter and hormones.

Organic vegetables prohibit the use of synthetic fertilizers and pesticides. These products are known to cause cancer and neurological disorders in both humans and lab animals. Many vegetables carry toxic residue to your table and into your body. The toxic runoff from conventional farms pollute rivers, drinking water and create dangerous dead zones in the ocean where high levels of nitrogen kill beneficial algae and bacteria causing dangerous algae blooms like red tide that deplete oxygen levels and kill fish. Our own Gulf of Mexico suffers from a dead zone from the base of the Mississippi river all the way to Galveston that is approximately the size of Rhode Island. Dead zones disrupt oceanic hunting and feeding grounds bringing fish closer to shore which in turn brings ocean predators, such as sharks, closer to shore endangering ocean swimmers (not to mention makes the water just plain nasty).

Heirloom vegetables are great because not only are they fun (purple tomatoes anyone?) but they promote biodiversity which protects our food sources. Did you know the Irish Potato Famine occurred because the Irish relied on only a few species of potato plant as the basis of their food supply? All of which was susceptible to the fungus that attacked the plant and destroyed the food crop. The United States and modern conventional farming has gone the way of Ireland, relying on fewer and fewer species of plants planted in large monocultures to create the basis of our market vegetable selections and eliminating approximately 90% of plant genetic material that was available in 1900. Like Ireland, a simple disease could wipe out a large portion of our food supply and leave us on the brink of starvation. Heirloom vegetables keep genetic plant material alive and in the food source.

I know that organics are initially more expensive. But remember, with conventional products we have to pay to clean up the water to make it safe and drinkable again, to clean up the ocean for access to safe fish, to provide more and more research on how to keep our few remaining plant species from succumbing to disease and pests, medical bills when our bodies react to the environmental toxins, and disaster relief when gigantic storms caused from environmental disruption destroy communities. In the long run, organics are the cheaper way to go.

Avoid the consumption trap by avoiding Black Friday. Instead of shopping use it to decorate for Christmas. If you want to save decorating until December (and wait for my tips!), use the time take a nice hike through one of the Austin area's nature trails or area state parks such as Bastrop State Park or Enchanted Rock State Park – Thanksgiving leftovers make a nice picnic!

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## Saving For College: The 529 Plan

The 529 Plan is named after the section of the federal tax code that governs them. These plans are tax-advantaged programs that help families save for college. Selecting a plan requires homework. Every state offers at least one 529 plan and now a consortium of private colleges also offers a 529 plan. The tax advantages, investment options, restrictions and fees can vary a great deal.

There are two types of 529 plans—prepaid tuition plans and college savings plans. Every state offers at least one of these types of plans. Some states offer both, and now a consortium of private colleges also offers a prepaid tuition plan.

Prepaid tuition plans allow parents, grandparents and others to prepay tuition at today's tuition rates at eligible public and private colleges or universities so that they don't have to worry about future tuition increases.

Contribution limits: You pay for amounts of tuition (years, credits or units) in one lump sum or through installment payments. There are a number of options. Some prepaid tuition plans offer contracts for a two-year community college or a four-year undergraduate program, or a combination of the two, and can cover one to five years of tuition. Some plans even allow the contract to be applied to graduate school tuition. Covered educational expenses: With only a few exceptions, however, most prepaid tuition plans do not cover other expenses, such as room and board. So you may want to consider other college savings options to cover these costs.

Guarantees and safety features: Most states guarantee that the funds you put into a prepaid plan will keep pace with tuition. Some, but not all states back their prepaid tuition plans by the full faith and credit of the state, meaning that if the program should find itself in financial difficulty, the state will step in to provide the necessary funding.

Residency requirements and other limitations: Most state prepaid tuition plans require either you or your child to be a resident of the state offering the plan when you apply. Some limit enrollment to a certain period each year. Many prepaid tuition plans also have age or grade limits for beneficiaries (i.e., future college students).

Portability: If your child chooses not to attend a college covered by the prepaid tuition plan, all is not lost. Although you will not get the benefit of guaranteed tuition, all prepaid tuition plans allow you to use plan money to pay tuition at other colleges and universities. Many state prepaid tuition plans will pay out an amount equal to the weighted average tuition and mandatory fees at your state's public

institutions, not to exceed the actual tuition and fees you incur. Most prepaid plans also let you transfer the plan to a child's brother or sister (although age restrictions may prevent transfers to an older sibling). Unfortunately, if your child chooses not to go to college and a sibling doesn't use the plan, or you need to cancel the prepaid plan, most plans will only give you back what you originally contributed with a reduction or elimination of any interest earned. Some plans also charge a cancellation fee.

Before buying a 529 plan, you should find out about the particular plan you are considering, and be sure you understand the plan's description of fees and expenses. Work with your financial professional to help you make the right choices.

#### **Native Fruits & Berries**

Among the key components of any healthy, natural habitat are the native plants that provide sustenance for wildlife. In Central Texas, there are several species that provide abundant fruits and berries during the warmer months, most are edible for humans as well as wildlife, and now is the perfect time to plant them!

Common in brushy areas, open woodlands, and stony hillsides, the Texas Persimmon is a small tree (8-12 feet) that is moderately deer resistant. Flowering in March/April, this tree has little green leaves and attractive smooth pale reddish-gray bark that peels off to reveal a whiter trunk. The female trees bear 1-inch fruits that turn from green to black as they ripen in late July to September. Texas or Littleleaf Mulberry, also a large shrub or small tree, produces an edible fruit that is small, fleshy, and berry-like. It varies from red to black and ripens in May, although in ideal conditions this tree is known to produce a large quantity of fruits over a longer period of time, providing much needed food for migrating and nesting birds.

Our native Escarpment Black Cherry is a fast-growing, straighttrunked tree with long clusters of white flowers in April/May, followed by small purple-black cherries ripening in August through October. Although impractical for fresh eating, the cherries are used in juices and wines, and the bark was once used in making cough syrup. This deciduous tree is also unique in that it offers stunning yellow fall color. Another attractive tree is the Mexican Plum, whose dense white flowers appear before the leaves in early spring, and

offer a very sweet, heady scent. The plums, which ripen from July to September, are nearly as ornamental as the flowers, as their color varies widely from gold to crimson to purple-black.

Agarita, a common native barberry, is a medium evergreen shrub whose graygreen holly-like leaflets are joined by yellow flowers in February/ March and small red fruit in May through July. The leaflets have sharp points at the ends, so care must be taken to harvest the fruit, which makes an excellent jelly. Another

sprawling shrub with thorny, woody stems is Southern Dewberry. A bramble common to sunny meadows and open fields, its white flowers bloom in March/April, followed by berries that resemble blackberries but have a more sweet/tart flavor. Usually found climbing along fencerows and high over other plants in woodland edges and stream sides is the Mustang Grape. Best used for wines and jellies, these vines can grow up to 40 feet long, and produce small clusters of acidic berries that ripen in August and September.
