MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING HELD ON WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 8, 2008

CALL TO ORDER: A quorum being present, the meeting was called to order at 7:04pm.

ADOPTION OF AGENDA: The agenda was adopted as presented.

REVIEW OF FINANCIAL REPORTS: The August 2008 financials were presented. Financials were reviewed as presented. There were 3 items on the Income Statement that were requested be reviewed by PMG and a response sent to the Board on these items.

REPORTS:

DELINQUENCY REPORT: The Board reviewed the current delinquency report. There is currently \$58,000.00 in delinquent dues for 2008.

ATTORNEY STATUS REPORT: The Board was presented with the current attorney status report. A motion was made by David Layman to proceed to the next step in the collection process for those accounts presented. Motion seconded by Shirley Whitley. Motion carried unanimously.

HOMEOWNER DISPUTE OF FEES: Jessica Trafton informed the Board that account 270-6975 was disputing the fees on their account due to an incorrect mailing address. Jessica Trafton presented documentation showing that the certified mail was in fact delivered to the correct address and was signed for. The Board discussed in detail the information as presented. A motion was made by Chris Jackson not to waive any of the fees on the account. Motion was seconded by David Layman. Motion carried unanimously. The homeowner will be given the option of making payment arrangements for the current amount owed. The terms of these arrangements will be communicated to the owner.

DEED RESTRICTION REPORT: Due to Hurricane IKE there was no deed restriction report presented. Inspections will resume on October 13th. Chris Jackson inquired on the process of addressing violations and what recourse the association has for non-

compliance. Jessica Trafton informed the entire Board on the process. A homeowner is sent a first letter informing them of the violation, in 30 days a second letter is sent to the owner, in 30 days a third letter is then sent to the owner informing the owner that the non-compliance has resulted in the account being referred to the attorney for resolution.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

FENCES: The Board was presented with the documentation from the Attorney regarding the fences. Gail brought to the attention of all that there is a section in several sets of the Deed Restrictions that speak about annexation of the remainder of the community as it develops. She made a request that the association's attorney review this information and give us a legal interpretation of this information.

FINAL BUDGET APPROVAL:

The Board was presented a final budget with prior changes. The Board discussed the correction of 3 line items (Telephone, Pool Telephone, and General Maintenance). After a brief discussion a motion was made by Chris Jackson to approve the budget as presented with the changes made. Motion seconded by David Layman. Motion carried unanimously.

MEADOW ESTATES PARK (LANDSCAPE PLAN): The Board reviewed the landscape plan submitted by HiTech for the Meadow Estates Park. A motion was made by Dena Loughlin to accept the plan as submitted. Motion was seconded by Shirley Whitley. Motion carried unanimously.

TROPHY CASE: The Board discussed ideas for the installation of a trophy case in the Fitness Center for items such as trophies and pictures of the swim team, Girl Scouts, and Boy Scouts. Jessica Trafton will request proposals for the installation of a recessed case along the wall to the right closest to the doors of the fitness center.

NEW BUSINESS

ELECTRICAL PROPOSAL : The Board was presented with a proposal from Live Wire Electric (\$2,425.00) for the repairs of the electrical for the entrance to Cypress Mill at Cypresswood.

RECREATION ROOM RENTAL: The Board discussed the increase of the fee for the use of the Recreation Room. A motion was made by Shirley Whitley to increase the rental fee to \$50.00 for a 4 hour rental period. The renter will be allowed one (1) hour before the event to set-up and (1) hour after the event for clean up; *(Continued on page 4)*

ACC Application Suggestions

From the Architectural Control Committee (ACC).

Dear friends and neighbors of Cypress Mill who are anticipating upcoming repair or new work to your current property, the members of the ACC would like to assist you in making the process as smooth as possible. You may know of a neighbor who has submitted an application for work, only to go through the tedious process then receive a notification with APPLICATION DENIED. This is not very common, and the ACC does not wish to deny any application without reason, because it does lengthen the process for both parties causing delay in important work to a property.

The ACC is here to help you so that applications can be approved as quickly as possible. Let's start with a few suggestions to help avoid common mistakes, or reasons why applications are denied. The first, most important thing to do is simply read the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions for the Section of Cypress Mill of which you reside. Many of the most common types of improvements will be covered in the Declaration of Covenants. Developing a basic understanding will also help with completing the required information on the Application. The next step is to complete the Cypress Mill Homeowners Association Application for Modifications. Please contact PMG at (281) 213-3184 or Email Jessica at j.trafton@pmghouston.com to obtain the correct Application Form.

One of the most common reasons an application is denied is "Lack of Information". Please help by providing applicable information to your improvement. About half way down on the application form are five required items that should be submitted with any application and are as follows: Elevation Drawings, Brochure, Lot Survey, Material Samples, and any additional information pertinent to this improvement. Please give as much information as possible to help the ACC fully understand the proposed work.

Outside of understanding the Declaration of Covenants and providing sufficient information with the Application, the most common reason an application is delayed or denied, is when the proposed improvement does not respect property lines and setback requirements. Please be a good neighbor and allow for reasonable privacy to your neighbors as outlined in the Declaration of Covenants.

With your help, the ACC will try to expedite the





Most of the residents in our area were very fortunate with little or no damage, not counting loss of power, due to Hurricane Ike. There were some fences down, shingles torn off and some tree or plant damage. As most of our trees are small.

the majority of the ones blown over and partially uprooted can be saved.

Gardening Tips by Twyla

Pull the tree or shrub upright and stake it. Use a band around the trunk that won't cut the bark. Replace the soil and water. Continue to water to keep it moist. Add a little root stimulator or fish emulsion at first. If you are pruning broken branches, you might want to treat the wounds with a sterilizing tonic. Mix 1/4 cup ammonia, 1/4 cup liquid dish soap, 1/3 cup antiseptic mouth wash and a gallon of water in a hand sprayer. Drench all the places you have cut.

If you are seeing little black or green bugs on the tip ends or buds of your plants, most likely it is aphids. Hard sprays of water will temporarily get rid of them or add one tablespoon of liquid dish soap to a gallon of water and spray. This solution will work on a number of insects except mealy bugs. These look like tiny bits of cotton and can get on indoor as well as outdoor plants. Add about ¹/₂ cup of rubbing alcohol to the above mixture before spraying. Since we don't have much seasonal change of color in the fall, it's nice to see yards decorated with colorful plants and yard art. The mums look especially pretty.

If you are planting bulbs for spring, try some daffodils. There are some that will bloom every year and multiply even in our heat and humidity. "Grand Primo" and tazetta "Golden Dawn" are a couple of choices. Don't forget, now is the time to plant herbs and perennials.

Tips To Help You and Your Family Enjoy a Safe Holiday Season

The Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays are a special time when families and friends come together to celebrate the festive season. It should be a joyous and happy time for all of us with parties and gift giving. Unfortunately, home and car burglars view the holiday season a little different.

For them, it is an opportunity to burglarize our homes and cars for cash, credit cards and the new gifts of small electronics, computers and jewelry; all easily sold valuables. So here are a few useful tips on how to keep your houses and cars safe during the holiday season.

- Do not display your Christmas tree and gifts in a front window visible from the street. It is too tempting for them to smash the window and grab the wrapped packages. They are looking for a quick escape.
- Do not leave lights switched on 24 hours a day if you are not home and make sure all windows, doors and gates are locked. Install a burglar alarm system. Use a light timer when you are away and ask a trusted neighbor to keep an eye on your house for you.
- Don't hide spare keys under rocks, in flower pots or above door ledges. Instead, give the spare key to a trusted neighbor. Burglars know all the hiding places.
- Sliding windows that are not secure can be seen from a distance. One holiday problem can occur when exterior Christmas light

extension cords are run inside through a window that prevents it from being secured. Hire an electrician or handyman to install an exterior outlet for your holiday lights.


- Disconnect all phones if you are going out of town. Do not leave descriptive telephone answering machine messages like, "you have reached the Wilson's... we are away for the Christmas holiday.... Please leave a message...etc." Burglars like to hear that they have plenty of time to break in and completely ransack your house.
- Always lock packages in the trunk of your car when leaving the store. If you vehicle has no trunk, make sure packages are covered and not visible from the outside.
- Don't leave your packages in your car overnight, especially if you car is left in your driveway, even if your vehicle is locked.
- Don't leave your garage door open while you are in the house or back yard. Burglars can easily check to see if there is anything worth stealing either from your garage or your car.
- Be aware of the people around you when leaving the department store. Be ready to sound the alarm button on your remote door opener if you sense any suspicious activity. If it is dark, you might want to request a security escort from the store to your car.
- Go shopping with a friend, especially if it's after dark.

Christmas Tree Safety Tips: Consider an artificial tree (they are much safer and cleaner)

- A real tree should not lose green needles when you tap it on the ground
- Cut 1 inch off the trunk to help absorb water
- Leave the tree outside until ready to decorate
- The stand should hold at least 1 gal. of water
- A 6' tree will use 1 gallon of water every two days
- Mix a commercial preservative with the water
- Check the water level every day
- Secure the tree with wire to keep it from tipping
- Keep tree away from floor heaters, fire places, or other heat sources
- Use only UL-listed lights, and no more than 3 strands linked together

- Use miniature lights--which have coolburning bulbs.
 - Turn off the Christmas lights when you sleep, or if you leave your home
 - Never use candles, even on artificial trees
 - Clean the tree stand to improve the tree's water intake, use one capful of bleach to a cup of water
 - Dispose of the tree properly
 - *** NEVER BURN A REAL TREE IN THE FIREPLACE ***
 - Home Safety
 - Install a smoke detector or new batteries in the ones you have and TEST them
 - Use only lights designed for outdoor use outside your home
- Examine light strings each year, discard worn ones



- Fasten the bulbs securely and point the sockets down to avoid moisture build up
- Connect no more than three strands together
- Never use indoor extension cords outside
- · Avoid overloading wall outlets and extension cords
- Keep outdoor electrical connectors above ground and out of water puddles
- Unplug light string before replacing a bulb. Review the original package to verify proper wattage and voltage
- When connecting light strands, wrap a plastic bag around connections and tie ends with tape
- Never use electric lights on a metallic
- Make sure trees hung with Christmas lights are not touching power lines
- When using candles, place them a safe distance from combustibles
- Place candles in sturdy containers. Remember, hot wax burns kids
- Extinguish candles prior to going to bed or leaving the house

- Dispose of fireplace ashes into a metal container until cold
- After parties, check around and under sofa and chair cushions for smoldering cigarettes. (Provide lots of ash trays)
- Install at least one carbon monoxide detector in your home
- Have an operable fire extinguisher readily available
- · "Safety" gift ideas
- Put together a gift basket containing one or more of the following items:
- · Three smoke detectors and batteries
- A quality fire extinguisher
- A flashlight and batteries or light sticks · A first-aid kit







New Stress Reducer - House Plants

House plants look pretty, fill empty spaces on the floor, and reduce stress. That's right, reduce stress. Being close to house plants makes us feel good. House plants reduce heart rate, blood pressure, and help with skin conductivity. Research has shown that people in planted offices recover from stress more quickly than those in un-planted offices.

No, the nursery with the pink flamingos around the corner from my office did not pay me to write this! It's true, the effect is seen more significantly in situations where the tasks being performed are repetitive or require only low levels of concentration by improving the air quality and people's perception of the building.

Think about it, humans were made to be outside in the woods or jungle, not inside of a cubicle with florescent lighting for eight hours. So, plants in the office help remind our cells there is life outside the four walls of our office.

Plants also give employees a sense of nurturing and caring, and is a highly interactive and a satisfying experience as it relates to our innate desire to take care of something else living.

A number of studies also show plants can reduce the incidence of minor health complaints. Planted buildings have less airborne dust and increased humidity and static electricity. This is mainly because plants are slightly negatively charged compared with their surroundings. This attracts positivity charged dust particles and reduces the number in the air and on the surrounding surfaces.

A Norwegian study, after plants were installed in the trail office, the staff complaints about:

- *fatigue was reduced by 30% *dry throats were reduced by
- 30%
- *headaches were reduced by 25%
- *coughing was decreased by 40%
- *skin irritations were reduced by 25%

So go out and buy a beautiful fern, a prayer plant, or a begonia today and feel better in your office!







Protecting Your Children on the Internet

Just as we try to protect our children from bullies and predators on the streets, as parents we need to be doing the same when it comes to the Internet. Before the internet much of our socialization was done on the telephone. We would talk on and on while our parents were telling us to get off the phone. But with the advent of the Internet has come online chat as well as popular social networking sites such as MySpace and FaceBook, which have provided a totally new way for kids to socialize but at the same time exposed them to a new world of dangers. There is no need however to panic, as there are steps you can take to greatly reduce any risks.

First, talk to your kids. There is no software or hardware that will better protect your children than you. Keep computers out of children's bedrooms and in a public area of the home. Kids should not be talking to people online that they don't know in person. They should enhancing existing relationships, not creating new ones online. Never should your child give out personal information such as a phone number, address, birthday, school, etc.

Netsmartz.org is a fabulous site run by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children; they have lots of material for both parents and kids from K – High School. An excellent tool is their "Internet Safety Pledge" that you and your child can read together and sign as an agreement between you. For younger kids there are kid-safe web browsers such as "MyKidsBrowser" and "Kidzui". There are tools such as NetNanny and CyberSitter that can be installed on a computer to limit what programs can be run and what sites can be visited (be advised that clever teens seem to figure ways around them). OpenDNS is a free service that you can use to transparently control access for all computers in your home (though it does require a little technical knowledge to fully implement).

You tell your children not to talk to strangers and never get into a car with a stranger, using the same caution regarding strangers on the internet is a great first step in allowing your kids to enjoy the richness the Internet has to offer while minimizing the risks.
