

#### **Fantastic Fossils**

From the Latin fossus, literally meaning "having been dug up", fossils are the preserved remains or traces of animals, plants, and other organisms from the remote past. The study of fossils is called paleontology, a science that helps us understand how and when fossils were formed, as well as the evolutionary

relationships between organisms, and has greatly contributed to our understanding of ancient plants and animals and the natural world in which they lived.

Fossilization is an exceptionally rare occurrence, because most components of formerly living things tend to decompose relatively quickly following death. In order for an organism to be fossilized, the remains normally need to be covered by sediment as soon as possible. Exceptions to this condition are if an organism becomes frozen, desiccated (exposed to extreme dryness), or comes to rest in an oxygenfree environment. There are several different types of fossils and fossilization processes, but due to the combined effect of decomposition and simple mathematical



chance, fossilization tends to favor organisms with hard body parts, those that were widespread, and those that lived for a long time.

The rocks of the Edwards plateau consist primarily of Lower Cretaceous or Commanche series limestones and chalks, formed over 100 million years ago, many of which are very

fossiliferous. Part of the Mesozoic or "middle-life" geologic era, outcrops of these rocks and their associated fossils can be found along many streams, roads, and highways of Central Texas. These fossils are usually abundant and varied, with the most common form being invertebrates, or animals without a backbone or spinal column. This includes cephalopods (marine invertebrates with well-defined head and eyes and tentacles around the mouth such as squid, octopus, nautilus, and ammonites), pelecypods (bi-valved aquatic invertebrates such as clams and oysters), gastropods (terrestrial or aquatic invertebrates with a single-valved, coiled shell such as snails), and echinoids (bottom-dwelling, unattached marine

invertebrates with an exoskeleton of plates covered by movable spines such as sea urchins).

While Texas does not have a state fossil, it does have a fossil for its state stone, which is petrified palm wood. This wood is the petrified remains of trees that grew on the Gulf Coastal Plain around 30 million years ago. At that time the shore of the Gulf of Mexico was further north than it is now, which explains why the wood is usually found in the more northern areas of the state, as well as in Louisiana and Mississippi. Of all the petrified wood found in Texas, petrified palm wood is the most common. Formed when a palm tree died and was buried by sediments, minerals in the groundwater permeated the wood, replacing the original organic matter and turning the wood to stone. The main mineral that remains is silica, but trace elements in the silica impart a variety of colors to the petrified wood.

Simply put, the conditions under which fossilization takes place are quite rare, and it is highly unlikely that any given organism will leave behind a fossil. So when you come across a fossil as you explore Central Texas, it gives you even more reason to celebrate their mystique and rare beauty!






\*Organizations will provide one liaison to work with Solid Waste Services and Parks and Recreation to assist with any communications.


The response last year from homeowners was truly impressive and very much appreciated. We hope our endeavor can be put on your calendar and that homeowners will again make a difference in this program.

#### **Happy Pets Make For Happy Holidays**

The fall holiday season is a wonderful time for fun, food, family and friends all of which can be overwhelming for you family pets. The extra activities of the season can dramatically change the household routines, sights, and smells around the home. Therefore, it is import to consider these holiday activities from your pet's perspective and safe guard your furry friends to ensure that everyone in your family enjoys a happy and healthy holiday season.

First it is important to understand the hazards that our pets face as the holidays approaches. The following are some basic hazards that each pet can face during the holidays:

- Rich, fatty foods can be very dangerous to both cats and dogs. Many holiday foods such as turkey, smoked ham, garlic, onions and chocolate can cause GI upset, vomiting, diarrhea and even death.
- All bones, especially turkey bones, can cause intestinal tears and obstruct the digestive tract.
- Even grapes and raisins can be dangerous for dogs and can lead to kidney failure.
- Caffeine and alcohol can be toxic and should never be given to our pets, no matter how funny Uncle Pete thinks it might be.
- Cooking aids like aluminum foil, string and holiday decorations can all be very enticing for any pet, but each can be very dangerous and potentially deadly if ingested.

In addition to these specific hazards, the fact that the family routine can change dramatically can be very stressful to any pet. As parties occur, or when family and guests spend the night, pets can be overwhelmed with the noises and interactions which often leads to unwanted behaviors such as aggression, soiling and possibly running away.

With all these hazards to contended with my recommendation is to develop a simple and direct plan that everyone, both young and old, family and guest, can quickly understand and support.

#### **HOLIDAY GAME PLAN:**

<u>Post the Rules:</u> How often have you heard your guest say "Oh, just one bite won't hurt"? The problem is if everyone offers your pet a little nibble there is no way to know what might have caused your pet to get sick. Preventative safety measures are the best strategies. By simply letting everyone know the rules your pet well be safer and there won't be

any confusion about your expectations from both family and friends.

Food that is high in sodium and fats, such as peanuts, chips, poultry skin and other meats can cause an inflammation of the pancreas which can lead to pancreatitis, a potentially life threaten condition. Always try to maintain the same feeding schedule as the rest of the year and if Uncle Pete just can't resist, have a small amount of veterinary approved pet treats on hand.

<u>Tidy Tidy:</u> This means everything from food to decorations. I know that this is easier said than done, but if everyone knows the game plan you will be more successful than you might expect. Decorations might not seem like a good meal, but the holiday season can seem like a buffet smorgasbord to some pets. Keeping the house neat with decorations out of reach will discourage bad behavior and help you keep track of the ornaments that go missing. Keep leftover foods out of reach and in tightly closed containers and make sure garbage cans are secure and all trash bags and places in trash can. It only takes a couple of minutes for a pet to tear up a trash bag and devour whatever is inside.

*Time Out:* When animals are stressed they can often become unpredictable and behave erratically. This is never good for a party. Be mindful of how scared you cat might get with a house full of strangers or how hyper Fido can be when all of the cousins are over. Providing a quiet out of the way spot for your pet to relax and get

away from all of the holiday activities can go a long way to ensuring a comfortable get together for everyone. Consider a pet time out when you sit down to eat. This will serve double duty by limiting the temptations for everyone. Cats are especially well served if they can hideaway in a back bedroom until everyone has gone home.

<u>Be Prepared:</u> This is especially true during the holidays. Always have your pet fully vaccinated and maintain your records for easy access. If your pet bites a guest the first question the ER will ask is "Is the animal vaccinated for rabies." If you can answer yes and provided current documentation you will greatly reduce all medical concerns and your potential financial obligations. Also, keep your veterinary hospital and the emergency veterinary clinic numbers handy. Your veterinarian can provide you with the closest emergency clinic information, this is especially important during the holidays when many animal hospital are not open.

The holiday season should be fun for everyone, including you family pet. By putting together and Holiday Game Plan you can ensure the health and safety of your pet and you guests. Remember to share you plan with all of your family and friends, maintain your pets regular diet and schedule, keep hazards away and be prepared and ready to take action of your pet becomes sick. By following these simple guidelines you can ensure that your pet will be healthy and happy for the holidays.





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## **Public Input Helps Shape LCRA's Long-term Water Supply Planning**

Citizens told LCRA these values related to water supply were the most important.

- 1. Clean water, protection of environment
- 2. Recreation and lifestyle
- 3. Availability
- 4. High quality water supply
- 5. Management of growth
- 6. Affordability
- 7. Jobs and economic growth

On behalf of LCRA, I want to thank everyone who participated in the community conversations about water supply this summer. Your input has helped shape the types of water supplies that LCRA will study in our effort to plan for our grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

More than 220 people attended three community conversations about water supply held in Burnet, Wharton and Austin. These were unique opportunities for neighbors to sit down together and discuss their values about water supply and wishes for future generations. Also, nearly 500 interested stakeholders participated in the process through our Web site.

In all, participants suggested 189 water supply options and gave more than 150 values that they hold regarding water supply. LCRA staff has compiled and analyzed the public input. The three water supply options mentioned most often were conservation, desalination and reuse. The values that were mentioned most often were clean water, protection of the environment, recreation and lifestyle, and availability.

I gave a report to the LCRA Board of Directors about the public input this month. We reviewed the list of water supply options that LCRA will study in our long-term plan, the Water Supply Resource Plan. To review a copy of this list or to learn more about the

planning process, please visit our Web site at www.lcra. org/watersupply.

LCRA is preparing the Water Supply Resource Plan so we will have a roadmap for how to meet needs for water in the future. The plan will show how much water is available and when and where it can be provided in the future.

Today, LCRA's customers rely on the Highland Lakes and water rights that allow water to be taken from the lower Colorado River. All of LCRA's water supplies

provide ample water for today's needs -- even during times of drought. As our population and businesses grow, we will need to pursue additional water supplies. That's why LCRA is pursuing this planning effort now, so we can support vibrant, healthy and growing communities for our grandchildren and greatgrandchildren.

We truly appreciate everyone's participation and input. Your ideas have contributed greatly to the process. We will have a draft Water Supply Resource Plan prepared by spring 2009 and will ask for your review and feedback.

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
