Constable's Notebook – December 2008

This year's presidential and congressional elections mattered more than perhaps any in my life time. Our new president will confront two wars and the worst economic crisis since the Great Depression. Unlike some elections, there was a real difference between the candidates. I have written more than a few columns that urged citizens to participate in their democracy by voting for candidates and issues that represent their interests. I expressed dissatisfaction that less than 10% of registered voters have determined who is elected to city council, school board and community college boards. I railed about the fact that presidential elections in the United States have attracted far fewer of its citizens than almost any other democracy. I used guilt and even shame to encourage more citizens to exercise their constitutional right and responsibility to vote.

Did the most closely watched and historic and exciting presidential election in generations live up to the expectations of historic voter turnout? The good news is that the national percentage turnout in the presidential election was the largest since 1968. But while more than a record 125,000,000 Americans cast votes this year, turnout only exceeded the 2004 voter turnout by about 3 million votes. Travis

County voters again led Texas counties in voter turnout. Though the total number of votes cast increased by almost 50,000, the turnout percentage only increased from 64% in 2004 to just over 66% this year. Five voting precincts including 237 (Highland Park Baptist Church) and 256 (Casis Elementary School) exceeded 80% turnout but less than half of the registered voters turned out in 11 Travis County precincts.

We all hope that the incoming administration and congress will quickly and effectively address the challenges they inherited. This holiday season local officials and our non-profit community, also hit hard by the economic downturn, need help in order to respond to an increased need for shelter, food, clothing, toys and medical assistance. All the great religions speak to our need to help the least among us. I am proud that my employees have decided to dramatically downsize our office holiday party in order to sponsor several families who are in crisis. There can be no better gift than to assist others who have not been blessed with health, wealth, or stable family lives.

I hope you and your family enjoy a safe and happy holiday season.

American Cockroaches a.k.a. Waterbugs

American cockroaches, also called waterbugs or palmetto bugs, are about 1 ¹/₂" long, reddish-brown with tan markings on the pronotum (the shield that covers the head). Nymphs look similar to the adults, but do not have fully developed wings. Like all cockroaches, females lay their eggs in a purse-like sac called an ootheca.

American cockroaches are not a common pest that breeds indoors in Texas. Typically these cockroaches move in from outdoors in search of food and water or to escape cold temperatures. They can enter structures around pipe penetrations, vents in the attic, through weepholes or cracks around doors and windows.

Exclusion is great method to keep the cockroaches outside. Check weather stripping around doors and windows to make sure there is a good seal. Use caulk to seal around pipe penetrations or any cracks and crevices that may lead into the home. If your home has a brick or stone facade, use steel wool or copper mesh to block the weep holes (steel wool should not be used on light color facade since it rusts when it gets wet).

Commonly used formulations for cockroach management include baits, sprays and dusts. Residual sprays and dusts should not be used in the same location as baits to avoid contamination of the baits. Sprays and dusts should be targeted to crack and crevice areas or wall voids. When using baits, old bait should be scraped away before new bait is placed out. Target baits to areas where cockroaches will be able to locate it easily.

Indian Meal Moths

There are numerous insects that infest stored products; typically they are brought into the home by nfested products. Food can become infested while in the field, warehouses or stores.

Indian meal moths can be found in dogfood, birdseed, cereals, dried fruit, nuts, powdered milk and candy. Adults are small with gravish wings tipped with copper. Larvae are creamy yellow and often crawl along pantry walls. Spun pupal cases are often found along corners and edges of wall areas.

To eliminate a pantry pest problem, the first step is to locate andremove all infested items. Removing infested items is the easy part; finding the infestation is not always so simple. Begin with the oldest food items, usually in the back of the pantry. Inspect everything, including unopened food items since these can also be a source. If you find an infested item, do not stop your inspection, more than one item may be infested.

Infested items can thrown away. If you don't feel that you can throw away food, place the infested food in a ziptop plastic bag and place it in the freezer for about 5-7 days or spread the infested food item on a baking sheet and bake at 250 degrees for 4-6 hours to kill any insects. Once all the insects are dead, you can sift the food item or pick out the insects. Of course, you can always just leave the insects in the food and get a little more protein with your meal!

It is extremely important to find the source, and not all pantry pest infestations come from the pantry. Check rooms for items such as dried, decorative peppers, dried flowers, potpourri or rice heating packs.
