Echoes of the Drought From the 1950s Bob Rose, LCRA meteorologist

LCRA meteorologist Bob Rose reflects on 2008 and shares his 2009 weather predictions

"During the long Texas drought of the 1950s a joke, probably already as old as the state, was told again and again about a man who bet several of his friends it would never rain again, and he collected from two of them." This line is from Elmer Kelton's famous book, "The Time it Never Rained", a chronicle of the terrible record-setting drought of the 1950s in West Texas. In the book, Elmer states that drought, by Texas definition, is a period of severely deficient moisture that laps over from one year into another. "It often lasts two to three years duration. Anything shorter, though it may be serious, is termed a dry spell, as if more annoyance than hardship."

There's no doubt the long drought of the 1950s is one of the worst on record for Texas. During that period, many cities set records for all-time lowest rainfall in a month and in a calendar year. For example, Austin's rainfall in 1954 was only 11.42 inches, the driest year on record, dating back to 1856. But very dry weather in 2008, although not long enough in duration to qualify as a drought, is matching, if not exceeding, some of the bad drought years of the 1950s. From the Hill Country to the middle Texas coast, rainfall through late December has been roughly 25 to 50 percent of normal. Data for Austin and San Antonio indicate 2008 was the fourth driest year for Austin and the third driest year for San Antonio, as well as the driest year for both cities since the mid 1950s! In reality, the dry weather of 2008 has not just been a dry spell but rather a very serious drought!

The cause of this drought, like most droughts, is not fully understood. It appears to be the result of many different elements in the oceans and atmosphere that have influenced the weather pattern over the central part of Texas most of the year. But in some ways, this drought also seemed to happen by chance, with several large rain storms just missing our region in one direction or another while other storm systems weakened and fell apart just before they moved through. In how many years do you find much of West and deep South Texas wetter than Central Texas?

Scientifically speaking, we're currently in a period caused by a very long-term weather pattern that favors more dry years across Texas than wet ones. So having a fairly dry year right now is not all that surprising. But what is surprising is just how dry this year has been, especially following the very wet year in 2007. Like the two-year droughts of 2005-2006 and 1998-1999, the drought of 2008 still may continue for another six months to a year, possibly longer. No one knows for sure. But I have some hope the drought may back off some later this winter and going into spring. Looking back at the weather from other years with somewhat similar ocean and atmospheric conditions, specifically 1950, 1974 and 1989, dry weather continued into January of the following year, but some fairly generous rains began to develop February into March in each of those years. If 2009 is similar, we might indeed see more rains across our region late winter and into spring. But will this be a true change in the pattern or just a temporary break? Will the dry spell of 2008 turn into the drought of 2008-2009? Let's certainly hope not.

Steiner Ranch History Corner Submitted by Rich Keith



As you are likely aware, the Texas Hill Country was settled by many Europeans. Here is a story about an interesting and

unusual person. There is a street in Steiner Ranch named for Ferdinand Ludwig von Herff, who was a physician, and born at Darmstadt, Germany in 1820. He came from an aristocratic family, and his father was chief justice of the Hessian Supreme Court. While attending the University of Bonn, Herfflived with his uncle, the president of the university, and was able to meet many famous people. Studying under influential medical scientists and learning leading edge concepts and techniques, he began his medical education at Berlin and finishing in 1843. While a surgeon in the Hessian Army (1843-47) he developed ingenious techniques in plastic surgery and tuberculosis treatment.

Because of the political environment in Germany at this time, many Germans were emigrating, especially to America. In 1847 Herff helped organize a group composed mainly of university-educated professionals, Die Vierziger (the Forty), to found an idealistic commune in Texas. The commune was named Bettina and was located on the Llano River near what is now Castell. The enthusiastic settlers were ill prepared to cope with the harsh realities of the Texas frontier, however, and within eighteen months the commune failed. Herff returned to Germany convinced that Texas would be his ultimate

home. He married Mathilde Hoeffer in 1849. He rejoined the military, and his successes in treating battle casualties were attributed to his dexterity and his scrupulous attention to cleanliness which resulted in low

infection rates. He returned to Texas, became

a citizen, and dropped the nobility title "von" from his name.

He and his wife settled briefly in New Braunfels, then moved in 1850 to San Antonio, where Herff began one of the most prolonged careers in Texas medicine. There was no lack of patients, but most were poor, and Herff's philosophy that professional satisfaction was its own reward led to family hardships. Of necessity surgery was performed in homes, hotels, and even in open-air locations. His reputation grew as a result of remarkable medical feats, including the removal of two large bladder stones from a Texas Ranger, an operation which was Herff's first use of chloroform and was witnessed by a crowd of onlookers which included Ranger William A. A. (Big Foot) Wallace; cataract removal resulting in the (Continued on Page 7)

restoration of eyesight; the correction of a depressed skull fracture to alleviate traumatic epilepsy; and expert arrow removal (one victim traveled over 100 miles to obtain lifesaving relief). He also performed gastrostomy on a young person who had ingested lye, and at age eighty-four under primitive ranch conditions he operated on his daughter-in-law, who had an ectopic pregnancy.

Herff worked tirelessly to achieve high standards of medical practice. He helped organize the Bexar County Medical Society, the West Texas Medical Association, the Texas Medical and Surgical Record, and the Texas Medical Association and served on the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners. He was also instrumental in the establishment of San Antonio's first hospital. Herff shunned praise but he received many honors, including recognition from the University of Giessen and St. Louis College of Physicians and Surgeons. He died in San Antonio on May 18, 1912. 

Vandergrift High School

Opening Fall, 2009



Dear LISD Community,

As the newest LISD high school principal, I am excited and honored to be a part of the Leander tradition of excellence. My family and I have lived in the Steiner Ranch area for over ten years, and I currently have three children at 2 different LISD campuses (from PreK to Middle School). I have been a principal for the last ten years in neighboring Lake Travis ISD, and I'm blessed to now have an opportunity to serve in my community. Like many of you, I am amazed at the unprecedented rate of growth in our area. In response to this growth, the district's leadership began the process of constructing the 5th high school (Vandegrift) and the 7th middle school (Four Points) in the south end of Leander ISD to meet the needs of our community. I'm pleased to share that the construction of these new facilities is on time and well underway.

In the fall of 2009, Vandegrift High School will officially open at its temporary location on the campus of the new Four Points Middle School in Ribelin Ranch, on FM 2222 near "Tumbleweed Hill." The current plan is to open the Four Points Middle School building in 2009 with Grades 9-10. In 2010, freshmen, sophomores and juniors would move to the new Vandegrift campus, and Four Points Middle School would officially re-open as a full (grade 6 - 8) middle school.

Opening a high school in this two-step fashion will pose many exciting challenges; however, the immediate benefits of having a stateof-the-art high school closer to the students' own neighborhoods will far outweigh the temporary logistical issues. Vandegrift was designed as a full four-year high school. This stunning, modern campus will in every way match the educational content of LISD's other four high schools, and will eventually accommodate up to 1,800 students. I guarantee that the temporary inconveniences will be well worth the wait! An extensive FAQ document has been prepared to help answer and anticipate some of your questions. I have included a few of the most commonly asked questions below. Please take a moment to review this information on our new school website. The website has been updated to include construction photos, the new 2009-2010 High School Course Catalogue, and a virtual tour of the Vandegrift HS campus. Together, we will begin to tackle some of the challenges involved with opening a new high school and start to create the traditions and campus culture that will be uniquely Vandegrift.

GENERAL QUESTIONS

1. Q: Where is Vandegrift High School? What are the attendance boundaries ?

A: Vandegrift High School is located in the southern portion of Leander ISD's 200-square mile district, and – in general – will serve students living in and along the south west 620 corridor and west of 2222 in the areas currently zoned to attend Canyon Ridge Middle School. Attendance boundaries for VHS will finalized at January 8th meeting of the LISD Board of Trustees. For up-to-date information on the attendance zone, go to the district website at www.leanderisd.org.

2. Q: How was the name, Vandegrift, selected? Who was Lt. Matthew Ryan Vandegrift?

A. The LISD Board of Trustees unanimously voted to name the school in honor of Lt. Matthew Ryan Vandegrift, a Leander High School honors graduate (Class of 1999) and athlete – who was killed in Iraq in April 2008. He graduated from Texas A&M University with honors and a degree in international business, before enlisting in the United States Marine Corps in August 2005. He was killed just four days past his 28th birthday.

Lt. Vandegrift grew up in the Steiner Ranch subdivision — very near this new high school — and was an honor graduate at both the high school and college level. He participated in

extracurricular activities, and demonstrated the highest character, plus a devotion to service demonstrated by the fact that he volunteered to defend the ideals of our great nation. Matthew Vandegrift was a walking role model for what we hope to see demonstrated by each and every Leander ISD graduate.

3. Q: Who will attend Vandegrift High School?

A: All freshmen and sophomore students zoned for VHS will attend VHS this fall (fall 2009). Students affected by this change will be officially notified when the attendance boundaries are finalized by the district. There are two exceptions to this "no transfers" rule:

1. Freshman and sophomores zoned for VHS who have Junior/ Senior siblings that will be attending CPHS during the 2009-2010 school year may request a transfer to their sibling's campus (CPHS) so that they may both attend the same high school. 2. VHS-zoned freshmen and sophomores may apply to transfer to LHS to be part of the International Baccalaureate (IB) advanced academic program. To be eligible, students must enroll in pre-IB classes in all four core academic areas. Any student dropping these pre-IB classes will be returned to his or her "home" campus (the campus designated for his/her attendance zone). 4. Q: How many students will the VHS and FPMS campuses accommodate?

A: Vandegrift will be a slightly smaller campus than the other four LISD high schools. It is built to accommodate approximately 1,800 students. The smaller size is based on future enrollment projections and demographics. Four Points Middle School has been designed to accommodate 1,200 students.

5. *Q: How many students are zoned for VHS the first year?*

A: Approximately 600-650 freshma n and sophomore students are projected to attend VHS in 2009-2010 the first year. This number is approximate, since the attendance boundaries have not been yet been finalized. No middle school-age students will be housed at Four Points Middle School until the 2010-2011 school year when the high school students move to the Vandegrift campus.

6. Q: What will the new high school look like?

A: Chuck Fields of Fields & Associates architects presented a design development update on Leander ISD High School #5 at the LISD Board of Trustees meeting on May 15, 2008. The presentation included the layout of Four Points Middle School

and buildings on the site (located south of 3M off of RR2222), as well as drawings of the Vandegrift campus and stadium. You may view the HS#5 Design Presentation and a virtual tour of the campus complex via this webpage link on the district website.

7. Q: What is the rationale behind opening with Freshman and Sophomores?

A: The Leander ISD Board and administration were asked by the community to consider opening LISD High School #5 with both 9th and 10th grades. After weighing the pluses and minuses of the 9th-only vs. grades 9 & 10 grade configurations, Dr. Bret Champion determined that LISD High School #5 will open for the 2009 - 2010 school year with freshmen and sophomores. Dr. Champion noted that the primary reasons for this decision were parent input, the positive impact on Cedar Park High School overcrowding, and the unique physical location of the HS#5 site in the far south portion of Leander ISD.

A: The following freshmen and sophomores who are transferring can participate in UIL activities in their first year:

- 1. 9th and 10th graders transferring into Vandegrift High School (inaugural year only);
- 2. 9th and 10th graders transferring from the VHS attendance zone into CPHS to attend with an older sibling;

- 3. Freshmen or sophomores transferring into Leander High School to be part of the International Baccalaureate (IB) program.
- Q: What are the VHS mascot and colors?

A: The students who will attend our new campus will help select the Vandegrift High School mascot and school colors. A student advisory committee consisting of current CPHS 9th graders and CRMS 8th graders who will comprise the first classes of Vandegrift HS will determine the process and criteria for selecting the school mascot. All students will be allowed an opportunity to suggest and rank mascot names prior to the final decision.

The primary school colors used in the design phase of VHS were determined earlier by the district architectural committee and incorporated into the final school design. The color palette consists of blue, silver (with red, white accents). These existing color palettes/schemes will be considered by the committee when determining the final school color palette for spirit-related purposes.

Long Term Care: Manage the Costs Submitted by Rich Keith

Yearly long term care costs have increased 15% since 2004 to nearly \$75,000 in 2007. And 75% of Americans have no long term care plans.

A recent survey from Genworth Financial's 2007 Cost of Care Survey found the average national cost of care for nursing homes, assisted living facilities and in the home has steadily increased over the past four years and has reached new highs that exceed most household incomes in the U.S. The rising costs of long term care

may, therefore, present difficulties for many Americans should they need to pay for long term care out of their own pockets.

A separate national poll conducted by Public Opinion Strategies for Genworth Financial with input from the Alzheimer's Association found that 75 percent of Americans have made no long term care plans and 59 percent expressed concern about being able to pay for long term care. Almost half of the respondents (44 percent) incorrectly believe that Medicare or their private health insurance will pay for their long term care needs. In actuality, health insurance and the federal Medicare program do not generally cover long term care.

Genworth's annual benchmark study surveyed more than 11,000 nursing homes, assisted living facilities and home care providers. It was conducted by CareScout between January and February 2007 to gain a comprehensive view of long term care expenses. The survey is available at www.genworth.com.

According to the survey, the average national cost in 2007 of a single year in a private nursing home room is \$74,806. To put this into context, one year in a private nursing home room costs nearly one and a half times the average full 4-year college degree in the U.S., including tuition, room and board. Note the College Board's national average for public colleges is \$51,184 for four years, making a single year in a nursing home 46 percent more expensive.

The cost of assisted living facilities has also increased sharply in the last four years, by more than 13 percent, to a new annual average cost of \$32,573 for a one-bedroom unit.



If given the choice between care in a facility such as a nursing home or an assisted living facility and care at home, 75% of national poll respondents said they would prefer care at home. However, the hourly rate for a home health aide has increased 2.7 percent since Genworth's 2004 Cost of Care Survey. The average cost for a 40-hour per week home health aide - \$52,977 a year - is more than the median household income in the U.S. of \$46,272.

The Alzheimer's Association recently reported that the prevalence of Alzheimer's disease has increased 10 percent in the last five years and that someone in America develops Alzheimer's every 72 seconds. Seventy-two percent of poll respondents said that the possibility of developing Alzheimer's disease makes planning for their long term care more important to them. Following are key findings from the survey, broken out by major category.

Nursing Homes: The average annual national cost of a private room in a nursing home is \$74,806 or \$204 per day, reflecting a 14.8 percent increase over 2004 rates. This remains the most costly care option.

Assisted Living: A private one-bedroom unit in an assisted living facility has an average annual cost of \$32,573, a 13 percent increase since 2004.

Home Care: The average hourly rate for Medicare/Medicaid certified and state licensed home health aides is \$25.47 an hour, a cost that translates to a \$52,977 per year for 40 hours per week.

With so many Baby Boomers heading into retirement, it's critical that long term care planning be integrated into every adult's retirement strategy. Paying for just a few years of long term care out of pocket can very easily deplete an entire life's savings and retirement. Not planning ahead can also limit the variety of choices available, such as the ability to live independently at home with assistance from a home health aide. Source: Genworth Financial, Inc.

Virus and Spyware and Mail... Oh My!

Here we are in 2009, and the days of thinking that our anti-virus and anti-spyware software will protect us is over. We live in a time when organized crime all over the world is trying to either get your personal information directly or turning your computer into a "zombie" that without your knowledge attacks other computers or sends out spam. Even Apple computer has posted (rather quietly)

a recommendation that Mac users consider using anti-virus software.

The generic term for viruses, spyware, etc. is malware, and malware authors are getting more and more creative in getting their hands into your computer. A particularly nasty approach being used is to trick you by popping up a window that says your computer is being scanned for viruses, and that upwards of 40 have been found. It instructs you to click on a button to download their "anti-virus" software to clean your system. When you click on that button, you've just allow the spyware onto your system. It is a very convincing window and looks legitimate. Once downloaded, it adds insult to injury by telling you need to purchase the software to actually remove the viruses. Of course, it doesn't remove any spyware or virus, and getting you to send them money is just icing on their cake. The most common names for this program is WinAntiVirus 2008 (and now a 2009



version) and Pro AntiSpyware.

The problem with these and many other malware programs is that they are increasingly difficult for your anti-virus and anti-spyware program to detect and almost impossible to completely remove. Many threats appear before the anti-virus companies even have a chance to update their software, leaving you completely unprotected.

So how can you keep your computer safe from such threats? The first thing you must do is be sure to keep your anti-virus up to date. If your subscription has expired, you should either renew it or else use one of the free anti-virus programs like AVG Free or Avast (they have paid versions but you don't need them). Microsoft's anti-spyware program "Defender" is included with Vista and can be downloaded free from Microsoft for Windows XP. Though the threat for Macs is low, programs like ClamXav and MacScan are available, as are programs from Symantec and McAfee. Next is keep your operating system up to date. Both Microsoft and Apple frequently issue updates, and it's very important you patch your computer before the bad guys worm their way in.

Finally and most important is your behavior when using your computer. You can own a Volvo or Mercedes with 12 airbags and 5-way seat belts, but if your behavior is to drive 120

miles an hour, those safety features aren't going to help you when you hit a solid wall. Likewise, when you're using your computer, don't click on links or open attachments in email, even if it's from someone you know - they may not even know they sent it! If you're expecting it, then ok. Don't click on email links that look like they came from your bank, many people have given their banking login information to thieves because they thought they were logging into their bank, but really weren't. If you use Internet Explorer, be sure you've upgraded to version 7 (click on Help | About to see the version number.) If you're using Firefox, you should be using version 3. Safari users should be at 3.2 (4.0 will be released sometime "soon".) Don't click on pop-up's, and don't download music sharing sites like LimeWire, where malware is EVERYWHERE. Follow those few tips and you'll enjoy a much safer computing experience.

As long as you keep your expectations in check and temporarily overlook the multitude of clichés, gender stereotypes, predictability and overused character traits, this quick page turner is pure entertainment with very minimal effort. As a frame of reference, I've read just about every one of Sparks' books and I rank this one towards the bottom (The Notebook being the best).

The main character finds a picture of a mysterious woman while in Iraq and goes in search of her by foot upon his return home. 

What's at Stake? The Health of Your Trees

Most of us have trees in our front yards that were provided by our home builders. Did you know that the stakes supporting these trees need to be removed within the first year? This is because stakes provide artificial support that replaces a supportive trunk and root system.

Movement of the trunk helps strengthen the tree by thickening it and giving it taper from bottom to top. Trunk movement also stimulates root growth. The artificial support from the stakes leaves tree trunks weak and their root systems less developed.

Bottom line - all staking material needs to be removed after roots have established. This can be as early as a few months, but should be no longer than one growing season.





February is American Heart Month! Here are some facts and tips to help you keep your heart healthy and help prevent Heart Disease.

COOL HEART FACTS:

- o The heart beats 2.5 billion times in a lifetime (65 yrs) (if you take care of it, maybe more!)
- o It takes 23-24 seconds for a drop of blood to circulate through the entire body
- o Your body pumps 1 million barrels of blood in a lifetime!
- o Your body has 60,000 miles of blood vessels
- o Every day over 650 Americans have coronary bypass surgery.

RISK FACTORS:

I. Unalterable Risk Factors you CAN NOT change:

- o Family History (father/brother had heart disease before age 55, or mother/sister before age 65).
- o Gender (men have a higher risk)
- o Age (Men over 45 and Women over 55 are at increase risk)

II. Risk Factors you CAN alter:

- o High Blood Pressure (three readings at 140/90 in a month, see your doctor)
- o Smoking (#1 preventable cause of heart attacks in the US. Smokers have a 70% great risk than nonsmokers). Tough habit to break, but sooner or later you will quit!
- o Cholesterol (Blood cholesterol of 200 mg/dl is desirable, 239 mg/dl is borderline and 240 mg/dl+ is high) Know your numbers and get a complete breakdown of your total cholesterol, HDL, LDL and Triglycerides. Have your doctor explain the numbers to you!
- o Obesity (more than 30% of your desirable weight) Eating too much of the wrong foods can make you fat! Focus on 5 fruits or veggies a day for the next 20 days.

o Physical Inactivity (Choose to move! 30-60 minutes 3-4 times a week!)

III. Other contributing Factors


- o Diabetes
- o Stress/Tension
- o Hormonal Factors
- o Alcohol

Primary Risk Factors have the strongest relationship to heart disease (family history, smoking, high blood pressure, high cholesterol and physical inactivity), when two or more of these are present, the likelihood of heart disease greatly increases.

10 TIPS TO HELP DEVELOP HEALTHY HABITS AND PREVENT HEART DISEASE IN YOUR FAMILY

Take care of your heart and your children's hearts by:

- 1. Regular daily physical activity (walk, bike, hike together)
- 2. Participate in age-appropriate sports, lesson or clubs. Let kids try a variety and find what they like
- 3. Participate in household chores (the physical kind)
- 4. Follow a healthy diet; low in fat and high in complex carbohydrates. Be supportive. Focus on positive instead of negative. Praise for a job well done!
- 5. Don't reward kids with food...find other ways to celebrate!
- 6. Be supportive. Focus on positive instead of negative. Praise for a job well done!
- Limit TV, video game and computer time...disconnect from it! 1-2 hours a day max!
- 8. Be a positive role model and practice what you preach
- 9. Set goals and limits. Daily activity, 1-2 desserts a week
- 10. .Learn CPR. The next life you save may be someone you love!






