

Tech Talk With Tom

5 Neat Tricks for Windows XP

This month we are staying away from the "useful" and the going straight for the, "Yes! I knew it could be done!"

What do I mean? Well, sometimes you want to do something just because you've seen other people do it. Maybe you're just one of those people who knows there must be a way (to maximize, make custom non-Internet favorites,etc.), but you could never find the right commands to make it happen.

Get ready for 5 neat little tricks that might not make you more efficient, but will definitely add a little "cool factor" to your computer.

1.) Is Maximize not Maximum enough for you?

Hold the Ctrl Key - Double Click the Title Bar - PRESTO! The window is now the size of your screen

2.) Create your own "Favorites" toolbar in My Computer

Click Start > My Computer

Now right-click the toolbar > Click Links

You should now see the Links toolbar in the window.

To add an application or file, browse to the application and drag its icon to the Links toolbar and drop it there. Repeat for additional links

3.) Display 2 windows Side by Side

No it's not Candy's dual 22-inch monitors, but its still pretty cool.

Click on the first window you want to open (minimized in the Taskbar). Press and hold the Ctrl key and right-click the second window. Now Click "Tile Vertically," and you can work in both windows at the same time!

4.) 2 Ways to Easily Arrange Files

Open the folder you need to (re)arrange and right-click in any empty place in the window. Select "Arrange Icons By" then click "Show in Groups".

To arrange the icons, right-click in an empty place and select "Arrange Icons By" and your choices are Name, Size, Type, or Modified (meaning the date the file was last modified).

5.) Make Icons

C'mon, you know you always wanted to know how to do this!

Go to Start > Programs > Accessories > Paint

Once Paint is open go to Image > Attributes

Set the height and width to 32 pixels and put your artistic talent to work!

To save your new icon:

Go to File > Save as and choose the location you want to save your file to. Name the icon whatever you want, but make sure you end the name with ".ico" and click "Save."

My personal favorite is number 5. Being able to make your own icons for your favorite programs is just too cool not to try at least once. Probably the most useful is number 3. I love having the two windows side by side; it makes editing and data entry a lot easier. Try them all for yourself - just don't be surprised if everyone starts asking "How did you do that?"



Battling Boredom

ARE YOU FINDING IT DIFFICULT TO GET

out of bed in the morning for your daily walk and making up excuses to skip the gym on the way home? Even the most dedicated exercisers occasionally get bored with their routine. Waning motivation, cutting workouts short and not having your old enthusiasm all are signs of a stale exercise regimen.

Quick Fix

First, evaluate your current routine to determine what really bores you. A new variation on your favorite activity — such as cardio-funk or kickboxing instead of step aerobics, or hoisting free weights instead of working on machines — may be enough to reinvigorate a stale routine.

If you've always worked out indoors, logging miles on a treadmill, stairclimber or stationary bike, move your work-out outside for a welcome change of scenery. Run, hike or bike on trails; swim in a lake or ocean.



When tweaking your routine isn't enough, make bigger changes. Take up an entirely new activity — especially something you never thought you'd do. If you've always stuck to solitary pursuits, sign up for a team sport, such as volleyball, basketball or even doubles tennis. Or tackle something you've always shied away from — indulge your thirst for adventure with a rock-climbing class (start on an indoor wall, then move to the real thing as your skills improve).

Good Company

Working out alone often is an oasis of solitude in a busy day, but maybe you need some company. Exercise companions add a social element to any routine. Ask a friend to be your workout partner—you won't skip a workout if someone is waiting for you.

Just about every sport or activity has a club; to find one, ask around at gyms or local community centers. Keeping up with the crowd also means you'll be challenged to improve your skills. Ask about organized workouts and fun runs offered by local track clubs, as well as group rides hosted by cycling clubs.

Challenge Yourself

Many exercisers work out simply to stay in shape, and most of the time that's just fine. But setting a goal, such as

finishing a 10K race or completing a rough-water swim, will give your daily workouts more meaning.

Start by incorporating bursts of speed into your workouts. After a gentle warm-up, alternate a fast pace with a slower one for recovery. This can be as simple as sprinting to the next tree, or as structured as running intervals on a track or sprinting laps in the pool.

Add Variety

Elite triathletes pioneered the cross-training concept, and it works for the rest of us, too. If you usually focus on one activity, substitute another a few days a week. Ideally, any exercise program includes elements of cardiovascular exercise, weight training and flexibility.

New Toys

Small exercise gadgets aren't necessary, but they can make your workouts more fun and challenging. Heart-rate monitors, aquatic toys and safety equipment are just a few items to consider. Find out which new training gadgets are available for your favorite activity.

Take a Break

Sometimes you really do need time off. In that case, cut back on your usual routine, and substitute other activities. You might even find one that you enjoy more than your old favorites.

Once you've fought your first battle with boredom, you'll know the tricks to keep exercise from becoming too routine. Trying new sports, new classes and new activities — and learning how to throw a little variety into old favorites — can help you overcome the nagging inclination to devise those creative excuses for not working out.

yogurt, cream cheese, guacamole, or salsa dip) for dunking and decorating. Serve colorful fruits and veggies in a "food rainbow" or on a kabob. Cut cheese, veggies, and sandwiches into shapes.

And if your picky eater opts not to eat anything at all, don't make a big deal about it — your finicky kid won't starve. Simply offer nutritious choices again at the next scheduled meal or snack. But if your child is regularly skipping meals and snacks or you're worried that your little one isn't getting enough calories or nutrients, talk to your doctor.

Luckily, although lots of tots are picky eaters at some point, this often-frustrating phase too shall pass. In the meantime, get creative, be patient, stay positive, and stock up on snack and meal ideas from other parents, KidsHealth's recipe section, and tools like the USDA's new website (go to MyPyramid.gov and click on MyPyramid for Preschoolers). And, just think, in no time they'll be really big kids raiding the cabinets!


