



Air Soft Wars and the Little Voice

There seems to be an "Air Soft Mania" happening in neighborhoods around Austin. Kids running neighborhoods with air soft guns, having air soft play dates, and air soft birthday parties. Please take time to read what our family recently experienced...

Have you ever had one of those moments when you heard "the little voice" as a parent? Did you listen to the voice as it told you stop your child from doing something he or she shouldn't be doing? I have always been a firm believer in the power of that little voice--an innate gift we all receive with the birth of our children. But all it takes is ignoring it just one time to realize how powerful it truly is.

Our family experienced the aftermath and shock waves of me ignoring the voice, and our son's life will be forever altered. A group of 5th grade boys running the neighborhood with air soft guns seemed manageable with some rules firmly in place. Repeated commands of "make sure you have your eye gear in place" and "don't shoot anyone who's too close to you" were, in hindsight, just too lofty an expectation to have. Our son lowered his eye wear to see where another boy was hiding, and was hit in the eye with one of the air soft pellets. It all happened right outside our back door, on our deck.

The force of the pellet on his eye was unbelievable. It ripped a hole through his retina as well as partially detached it. We are now

at the tail end of a grueling 2 week recovery process from vitrectomy surgery --the patient is required to be face down so that a gas bubble inserted in the eye will be in proper position. You can only imagine how difficult this was for a 10 year old boy. Children who undergo this surgery have a 50% chance for the return of their vision (interestingly, adults have a 90% success rate). Currently, he has no sight in the eye. We should know within 3 months what his vision will ultimately be. In the meantime, we are celebrating small daily victories such as, "I can open my eye all the way". Long term, there will be restrictions on certain sports and physical activities. We can only hope and pray that some of his vision returns. .

Our son has been amazingly strong and optimistic throughout the whole ordeal. I only wish I had listened to the "little voice" so that he wouldn't have to be my hero. After all, isn't that what we, as parents, are supposed to be for our children? So the next time you hear the voice, do yourself and your family a favor--listen to it. I didn't and our lives will be never be the same.

Note: The air soft gun that injured our son's eye was purchased on the internet and is a "high powered sniper rifle". Please carefully consider what you purchase for your children and ask yourself "is it worth it?"



ranked team in the country, the Avengers VI Force. After going down by a score of 5-2 at the end of the first inning, the Toros raced back by outscoring the Avengers 16-4 the rest of the way for an 18-9 win. The excitement continued into the late hours of the night in the Championship game against the 26-0 Kings Black 8U, the second ranked team in the US. With the game tied at six going into the last inning, the Toros managed to score 5 runs in the top of the sixth. The Kings answered by scoring 3 runs to draw to within 2, and had runners on 1st and 2nd with 2 outs. In a dramatic moment, they hit a shot that would have been out earlier in the night, but stayed in the park thanks to a breeze that had picked up throughout the night. Managing to keep runners at first and second, with the score now just 11-10, Klassen made a diving stop on a ball hit sharply in the hole, and got the force out at second base to secure the championship. The victory qualifies the Toros for the Nations Baseball National Championship tournament to be held in Houston in July.





Steiner Ranch History Corner



In Steiner Ranch, Runnels Court is named after Hardin R. Runnels, a former Texas governor and legislator, who was born in 1820 in Mississippi.

His father died when he was 18, and in 1842 he moved with his mother, his three brothers, and his uncle to Texas. The family first settled on the Brazos River, but Runnels soon moved with his family to Bowie County, where they established a cotton plantation on the Red River. From 1847 to 1855 he served as state representative in the Second, Third, Fourth, and Fifth legislatures. He was speaker of the House during his final term. In 1855 he was elected lieutenant governor. During these years he acquired a reputation as a loyal member of the Democratic party and a staunch supporter of states' rights. He was the son of a prominent and wealthy family and Submitted by Rich Keith

also became a wealthy man in his own right. By 1860 his real and personal property was worth an estimated \$85,000 and included thirty-nine slaves. In May 1857 leading Democrats wished to prevent Sam Houston's election as governor and nominated Runnels because of his support of Southern positions and his party loyalty. Runnels won and became the only person ever to defeat Sam Houston in an election.

During his term Runnels consistently supported Southern positions. He frequently asserted that Texas might be forced to secede from the Union, supported the unsuccessful effort to put the Texas legislature on record in favor of reopening the African slave trade, and signed into law a bill allowing free blacks to choose a master and become slaves. He also signed into law the bill that appropriated financial support to establish the University of Texas and the bill establishing the State Geological Survey. The most vexing problem Runnels faced during his term as governor was the problem of protecting frontier settlers against Indian issues. The year he took office there was a marked upsurge in Indian attacks, generally by the Comanches. Although Runnels raised temporary ranger battalions to meet the emergency, he opposed efforts to form permanent battalions on the grounds that the state could not afford them and that the federal government was responsible for protecting the frontier. When angry settlers took matters in their own hands and retaliated against Indians on the Brazos Indian Reservation, they clashed with the army. Runnels's efforts to make peace failed. In 1859 the state Democratic convention renominated Runnels, and Houston again

declared himself a candidate. This time however, Houston defeated Runnels by a vote of 36,227 to 27,500.

Runnels retired to his plantation in Bowie County but remained active in the Democratic party, where he was a vigorous supporter of the secession resolution. After the Civil War, although he had not yet received a pardon from the president, he was a delegate to the Constitutional Convention of 1866. At this convention he was one of about eleven delegates who were often termed the "aggressive secessionists" or the "irreconcilables." In the 1850s Runnels built an impressive Greek Revival mansion near Old Boston and furnished it in anticipation of his approaching marriage. For some reason the wedding never took place, and he remained a bachelor for the rest of his life. When the Texas Historical Society was organized in Houston on May 23, 1870, Runnels was elected one of its vice presidents. He was also a member of St. John's Masonic Lodge. He died in 1873, and was buried in the Runnels family cemetery in Bowie County. Cool Computing Tips and Tricks! *Hosted by Steiner Ranch's Laurie Scott*



On unlucky Friday March 13th, many Steiner Ranch residents were lucky to attend a free seminar, Cool Computing Tips & Tricks, presented by Laurie Scott of Tek-Chic Systems. Laurie Scott is a Steiner Ranch Resident who is passionate about helping individuals and businesses develop systems to use technology smarter and safer.

A system isn't about buying things; it's about DOING things - or not doing things as the case may be. For example, everybody has a system for protecting their data from loss. For some it's saying a prayer every night that their computer will work the next day, for others it's burning a copy of important files to a CD or DVD. And for some it's uploading files to a server on the Internet. Whatever your system, you DO have one. Laurie can help make sure it's a smart and safe system.

Laurie began the evening by teaching residents about Email Scams and protecting yourself from web viruses, spyware, adware. They all are generically known as malware bad stuff you don't want on your computer. She continued with advice for, "What to do About My Tired PC?" and exploring the Dangers of Wireless Networking.



Laptop computers have made computing mobile and convenient. However hotspots like Starbucks, airports and hotels present a significant risk to your privacy and economic security unless you take some simple precautions. It doesn't matter if the hotspot is free or you're paying for it, whether unencrypted or encrypted, anyone on the same network can "sniff" your traffic and steal your passwords, read your email, and even download files from your computers. As for online shopping and doing it safely, Laurie explained that there are of course hazards to online shopping, but with basic safeguards you can take advantage of the variety and cost savings the Internet can provide. She also shared the secrets of fireproof backups for 25 cents a month, and tips & tricks to make computing easier along with dozens of Steiner Ranch Web Resources.

Leander ISD 2009-2010 School Year Registration

Leander ISD's Pre-Kindergarten registration for the 2009 - 2010 school year will be held on Wednesday, May 6, 2009, from 7:30 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. at all LISD elementary campuses. Students zoned to attend the new Ronald Reagan Elementary (#22) will register at CoxElementary, while students slated for the new River Ridge Elementary (#23) should register at Laura Bush Elementary.

To be eligible for the half-day Pre-K program children must:

- 1. Be 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2009; AND
- 2. Be a resident of Leander Independent School District; AND
- 3. Meet immunization requirements; AND
- 4. Meet at least one of the following conditions:
- Child is unable to speak and comprehend the English language; OR
- Child is homeless; OR
- Child has a parent or official guardian who is an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces, who is ordered to active duty by proper authority; OR
- Child has a parent or official guardian who is a member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces, who was injured or killed while serving on active duty; OR
- Child has ever been in foster care; OR
- Child is eligible to participate in the national free or reducedprice lunch program due to limited family income.
- NOTE: Due to federal guidelines, income status must by verified on or after June 24, 2009. Until that time, a space will be reserved for the child.

Transportation is provided for the Pre-K program in accordance with district guidelines.

Parents wishing to register their child for Pre-K must bring the child's birth certificate, social security card, immunization records, a photo ID of parent/guardian, and proof of residency, (i.e. an electric bill, water bill, etc...).

Please note: Pre-K registration is ongoing in Leander ISD. If you are unable to make the above date, please register your student(s) at your earliest convenience prior to August 1.



Examination for Acceleration, Grades 1-12

Examination for Acceleration allows students, who without direct instruction have already mastered all content and skills in a particular grade level or course, to advance to the next level or course. These exams are available at no cost to eligible students who test during the district's testing periods.

Students are expected to complete each exam they have registered for. Families are requested to plan accordingly during the summer to ensure students complete each exam. Note: The District does not receive reimbursement for tests not taken. **2009 testing dates are as follows:**

<u>Around Steiner</u>

Lake Travis Falls

...and there she goes! The descent of Lake Travis has been gradual since her irrigation water began flowing to the farms in Matagorda and Wharton Counties on February 25. This year LCRA will begin early and take equal amounts from Lake Buchanan so that the fall will not be so abrupt!

Drought is plaguing Central Texas for a second year in a row. Last year the lake was brimming full at 681 msl (mean sea level) when this agricultural release started. This year Lake Travis was at 654 msl. It was much wider in 2008, so its descent was much slower. (At 681 msl, the lake is about 180 feet deep in its deepest parts.)

Why are the rice farmers taking all this water when the lake is so low? LCRA has a trigger point to curtail the amount of water the rice farmers get. On January 1, 2009, the lakes were slightly above this trigger point.

On January 1, 2006, the lakes were below the trigger point. Rice farmers were curtailed. Their families and farms were going to suffer. Then the rains came. The rice farmers received a lot more water than they had wished for...

LCRA expects "lower than average lake elevations and forecasts of continued drought

conditions". Not much hope for a rain bomb this year.

Trigger points are trigger points—no gray area. Maybe this drought will show LCRA that raising its curtailment trigger points will protect the greatest economic driver in Central Texas—the Highland Lakes system. No Lake Travis is definitely a way to slow growth in Travis County.

If our weather pattern continues, Lake Travis is forecast to fall to the 625 to 630 msl by September, taking Lake Buchanan with it. Where will the marinas be? No ramps will be open. What will happen to the businesses that depend on our recreation for their livelihood?

Will restaurants, boat dealers, fishing guides and even some convenience stores be forced to close? (After all, convenience stores around the lake depend on selling premium gasoline to fill boats, and lots of ice and beverages to fill people.) All businesses depending on the lakes will suffer and many will close. Can our already slowing economy survive the loss of its single largest economic driver?

No taking your boat to see the fireworks on the lake on July 4th! No fresh fish for dinner! No tubing, skiing, wakeboarding or boating. Boats cannot be launched from a cliff. Peaceful water views will become dry, barren rocks.

The rice farmers will get their water this year at the expense of the businesses and recreation in Travis and Burnet Counties all because of a rigid trigger point—no room for compromise here.


The situation is much more serious than the farmers' livelihood vs. the Travis and Burnet County business livelihood. Let's do the numbers...

LCRA states that Lakes Travis and Buchanan are holding about 1 million acre feet (AF) right now. (1 AF equals 325,851 gallons or enough for 2 conservative families of 4 for a year.) Lower basin agricultural irrigation is forecast to take about 300,000 AF—same as last year. The last 90,000 to 100,000 AF of water in Buchanan will be below the flood gate level and cannot be released. The bottom 100,000 AF in Lake Travis is probably not usable. Municipal and power plant usage will probably take about 150,000 AF this year. Guess that means both lakes together will have about 350,000 AF of usable water in them at the end of this year, if our weather pattern continues.

The agricultural irrigation water will go this year—no stopping that! What can we do now with the water we have left? We must begin to realize that every drop of water we use comes out of Lakes Travis and Buchanan. No more hoping for rain!

Atlanta keeps hoping for rain to fill Lake Lanier. Marinas and lake recreational businesses are already closed. Farmers cannot not irrigate. Bet they wish they could get water from somewhere else or at least have a rain bomb like we had in 2007.

LCRA spends little on conservation. LCRA's water operations have just moved into a big new building at Red Bud Trail and Lake Austin Blvd. It sports an enormous, state-of-the-art flood monitoring room (River Operations Center [ROC]). LCRA can monitor every drop of water coming into and leaving the Lower Colorado *(Continued on Page 22)*

River system. This is great for our next rain bomb—whenever that may be... Right now monitoring the "leaving" water is more important.

The Red Bud Center and grounds feature equally impressive water conservation efforts. Air conditioner condensate is captured and used to flush all the low-flush toilets. The grounds are landscaped with drought-tolerant plants. Their rain water collection system is one to be copied—if we have any rain. LCRA clearly knows how to conserve.

Instead of a big, new building, what if that money had gone to conservation? A recent study has shown that lining the irrigation canals, removing the brush, and upgrading the turn-arounds and gates in the lower basin would save a lot of water. Nothing has been done.

The public would cut their water usage, if they just knew how and maybe had a little help from their water suppliers. (Austin has just shown impressive water conservation with their mandatory scheduling and plumbing rebate programs.) LCRA has the ability to require stronger conservation from their wholesalers, if they will just do it.

Think how much water would be saved if all apartment complexes and hotels would install low-flush toilets and water efficient



showerheads and faucets. Sprinkler water should not be running in the streets from commercial landscapes—especially during the day.

LCRA just had a water rate increase from \$126 per acre foot (AF) to \$138 AF. Maybe, just maybe, LCRA might use some of this increase on conservation...before it's too late.

Rain dances, anyone? (They may not work.) We can Save Water. Save Lake Travis.





If you've not stopped to consider what your life could be like in retirement, consider these facts: Women live longer. The average life expectancy for baby girls in the U.S. is now 80 years old, compared to 75 for boys. Some estimates show more than one-third of America women will live to at least age 90, meaning today's women will spend more time in retirement and need more resources.

Women earn less. It's a sad reality that women still earn 76 cents for every dollar a man makes. The average Social Security check for men and women reflects the disparity in income and working years: Women received \$867 in December 2006, while men received \$1,148. 30% of unmarried women 65 and older currently live on Social Security alone.

Women take time off to care for others. Not only are women more likely to take time off to have and raise children, they are also more likely to interrupt their working years to care for ailing parents or other relatives. Seven out of ten unpaid caregivers are women, and more than 50% of caregivers modify their work status because of it. This includes working fewer hours or taking unpaid leaves of absence – all of which affect their career paths, contributions to retirement accounts and accumulated Social Security benefits.

Women aren't saving enough - if at all. Even though women

will spend more years in retirement than men, women still lag behind in their retirement savings. According to new studies from the Employee benefit Research Institute, just 53% of women are currently saving for retirement, compared to 62% of men. And 37 of women are currently participating in a company 401(k) or other workplace plan, compared to 41% of men; and just 37% of women are likely to hold an IRA or other non-workplace retirement account, compared to 46% of men.

Women are more likely to retire in poverty. For all of the reasons listed above, is it really a surprise that women are 71% more likely than men to live below the poverty line in retirement?

It's critical for women to have a plan. Women need to save more money than men because they cycle in and out of the workplace more often. Over 75% of women are widowed at an average age of 56, and 1 in 4 of these women are broke within two months of being widowed. What do you want your retirement years to look like? Do start now. 

Make Sure Your Irrigation System is Ready

Spring is quickly approaching and now is the time to make sure your irrigation system is ready to start working again after being off all winter. How? Follow the tips below:

See For Yourself

The fastest way to check your irrigation system is to check it yourself. Here's how:

- First, set your controller to operate a two-minute test program. (If the controller does not have a pre-programmed test program, set each zone to come on for only two minutes using the C or D program that may not be normally used.)
- Start the program manually and then watch the system as it runs through each station.
- Look for heads that are broken or leaking, heads that are misaligned and not watering what they ought to, or heads that are clogged or obstructed by grass runners or shrubs.

Ideally, the test program should be run monthly to keep track of how the system is functioning. This may also prevent increases in your water bill caused by leaks or multiple broken heads. To keep your irrigation system running as efficiently as possible, call a licensed irrigator to fix the problems for you.

Don't Overdo It

Your spring watering schedule should be half of what you'd water during the summer. Yet, in their eagerness to see new green grass, spring is when people are most likely to overwater plants and turf. With cool temperatures in the evenings and mornings, it is not necessary to water as frequently as you would during the summer.

- Beginning in March or April, we recommend watering once every 7 to 10 days with one start time.
- Remember, the mandatory watering schedule begins on May 1st each year. Any irrigation with an automatic system or hose-end sprinkler must be used on an assigned watering day.
- Set controllers to run before 10 a.m. or after 7 p.m. It's a more effective use of water, and it's the law.
- Hand-held hoses can be used any time on any day. If an area of your landscape needs extra attention, it's best to spot-water as needed.

Get Some Help

How can you tell if you may be overwatering? If your water bills exceed 25,000 gallons per month, you might benefit from professional help. The Water Conservation Division offers free irrigation system evaluations to check out your system and provide you with a recommend watering schedule based on your plants, the amount of light the yard receives, and the type of sprinkler heads installed. The service is available to all City of Austin water customers or eligible MUD customers, and is ideal for new owners of irrigation systems as well as those who just aren't sure about their lawn's water needs. Call Water Conservation at 974-2199 to schedule your free irrigation system audit, or to talk with a licensed irrigator about your system. You can also schedule audits online at www.waterwiseaustin.org.

What's at Stake? The Health of Your Trees

Most of us have trees in our front yards that were provided by our home builders. Did you know that the stakes supporting these trees need to be removed within the first year? This is because stakes provide artificial support that replaces a supportive trunk and root system.

Movement of the trunk helps strengthen the tree by thickening it and giving it taper from bottom to top. Trunk movement also stimulates root growth. The artificial support from the stakes leaves tree trunks weak and their root systems less developed.

Bottom line - all staking material needs to be removed after roots have established. This can be as early as a few months, but should be no longer than one growing season.

Spring Is In the Air *Time to Start Your Own Organic Garden Submitted by LCRA*

In a world of iPod's, computer games, and DVDs, gardens are our nearest gateway to nature. Planting an organic garden with your family or friends builds relationships as well as stronger connections to the land, weather, and plants of Texas.

When looking for a garden site in your yard, choose an area with a good six to eight hours of sunlight and access to water. If you have shallow or poor soil, consider creating raised beds. Decide the garden's design by drawing shapes on paper and thinking about how you might arrange flowers, herbs, and vegetables within those shapes.

You may want to read through regional gardening books and seed catalogs when choosing plants. Native plants will be much easier to grow and keep healthy, and native flowering plants attract hummingbirds and butterflies. Avoid toxic plants, and consider aromatic herbs and edible plants. If you choose to start some plants from seed, create garden markers using either names or drawings to help recognize the plants when they germinate.

Find sturdy gardening tools. Many nurseries and garden centers sell spades and rakes in various sizes - make sure you find one that fits you best. Avoid digging with hand trowels unless the soil is very friable, or you are working in pots—small hands and wrists tire easily.

Use soaker hoses with timers to keep soil moist while your seeds are germinating. Keep a calendar to record when you plant seeds and when they germinate. Place a rain gauge in the garden to keep track of showers. Find a magnifying glass to peer at leaves, flowers, and insects in your garden.

Keep your garden safe for everyone by avoiding the use of toxic landscape chemicals. Visit <u>www.growgreen.org</u> for information on less toxic landscaping.

Finally, celebrate your harvest of wildflower bouquets, herbs for cooking, and tasty vegetables. Organic gardening is a lot of fun and very rewarding.

Surprises After a Rain

Magical things happen when it rains in the Texas hill country! Historically, spring and fall generally bring the most amount of precipitation to our area, and the flora and fauna respond accordingly. Exotic-looking rain lilies pop up and bloom a few days after a good rain, but what you might not know is that there are two species of this delicate plant that are native to central Texas.

Cooperia pedunculata, or hill country rain lily, tends to have a main spring bloom season after significant rains occurring March through early August, although it can bloom sporadically over the rest of the growing season. These lilies begin to open slowly at dusk and are fully opened the next morning. An all white bloom with three petals and three sepals, the flower is trumpet-shaped, roughly two inches across, and is at the top of a single unbranched bluegreen stem about five to nine inches high. The leaves are thin, long, and branch away from the stem at the base. The slightly fragrant bloom lasts only a day or two, turning from white to light pink as it fades.

Often found in groups in meadows, open woodlands, and even roadsides, these lilies can be grown easily from seeds or bulbs and combine well with groundcovers or plants that have naturally short foliage. They are native to east and southwest Texas as well as adjacent Mexico, and have since spread east to Louisiana.

Cooperia drummondii, or evening rain lily, tends to have a slightly later bloom season, occurring from late May through September, with the most frequent flowering in late *(Continued on Page 38)*

summer and fall after a substantial rain. The solitary, fragrant, and ephemeral white flower is made up of six petals and tops a leafless, twelve inch stem. It too opens in the evening, and after two to four days the flower turns pink and withers. After it fades, the smooth, gray-green, grass-like leaves elongate. The bloom is quite similar to the hill country rain lily, but slightly smaller in terms of size.

Originally native to northern Mexico, the western two-thirds of Texas to New Mexico, and southeast Kansas and Louisiana, the evening rain lily has expanded its range to Oklahoma, Arkansas, Mississippi, and Alabama. It gets its species name from Thomas Drummond, a naturalist born in Scotland that arrived in Weslaco, Texas in 1833. He spent twenty-one months working the area between Galveston Island and the Edwards Plateau, focusing on plants and birds along the Brazos, Guadalupe, and Colorado rivers, and contributing extensively to natural history collections for museums and scientific institutions around the world.

The next time you see some of these elegant beauties gracing an open field or a grassy area on the side of a road, think of them as a treasured gift given to you by a recent rain and a reminder that rain brings more than just rainbows!

Healthier Homes

Have you ever walked around the neighborhood and looked at some lawns and thought "I wish my yard looked that good"? Well, here are some tips to get your yard looking great by creating a healthier turf.

Don't use Weed and Feed. 2 4-D the pesticide in most Weed and Feed product is neurotoxic and contains half of the ingredients found in Agent Orange. Studies have shown that lawn chemicals are tracked or drift inside where they remain on surfaces or in the carpet for up to a year when they are not exposed to direct sunlight (little children spend lots of time playing/crawling on carpet). Also, Weed and Feed can actually hurt the health of the lawn by killing beneficial microorganisms, insects and earth worms that maintain a healthy grass.

Instead, consider building up the health of the soil through yearly aeration and organic compost application (ex. Farm Style Compost from Natural Gardener). Corn Gluten can be applied for pre-emergent weed control. Biological controls for insects can be used if necessary such as nematodes to get rid of grubs. Apply annually a slow release nitrogen organic fertilizer as commercial fertilizers frequently contain toxic herbicides such as 2, 4-D mentioned earlier.

You are on your way to transitioning to a natural lawn care with these easy steps. If you are looking for or currently have a lawn care service, ask them to adopt these methods. If they wish to use IPM (Integrated Pest Management) be wary because these usually include the use of toxic pesticides.

Within a short time you too will have a robust looking lawn but more importantly, you will know that it truly is healthier and safer for your family too.







Lemon Berry Delight

Serves 4

| 2 Cups | Mixed fresh berries |
|---------------------|--------------------------|
| ¼ Cup | Sugar (or more to taste) |
| 1⁄2 Cup | Lemon curd |
| 1½ tsp | Lemon zest |
| 1⁄2 Cup | Heavy whipping cream |
| ¹ /2 tsp | Pure vanilla extract |
| - | Mind sprigs to garnish |

Gently combine mixed berries with sugar and refrigerate about 30 minutes. In a large bowl, stir together the lemon curd and the lemon zest. In the bowl of an electric mixer, whip the cream with the wire whip until stiff peaks for.m. Stir in vanilla. Gently fold the whipped cream into the lemon mixture. In parfait glasses or dessert dishes, alternate layers of cream mixture with berries. Garnish with mint sprigs and serve.



Britt's Book Buzz: Thirteen Moons An Adventure for the Reader

Thirteen Moons is the second novel by author Charles Frazier (his first novel was Cold Mountain). The book caught my eye because I enjoyed reading Cold Mountain and when I read the back cover of Thirteen Moons, I was intrigued by the subject matter—a young orphan is sent to the unknown territory of the Cherokee Indians.

The book takes the reader on a journey into the mid-1800's, interweaving actual historic events and people (the Indian Removal Act, The Trail of Tears and Davey Crockett) with a detailed, fictional and personal tale that is true adventure for the reader.

The narrator, Will Cooper, is obligated to run a trading post. It is here where he meets Bear, a Cherokee chief, and together they fight to keep the land on which their tribe is living (at this time, Indians were being forced to move West). Will meets many other characters along his journey, all very memorable due to the ensuing conversation ("whiskey camaraderie"), expeditions, gun fights and chivalry that take place.


I always love books that make me revisit our American history. I was talking about this book to our babysitter and she was actually in the middle of studying Indians and trading posts. To refresh my memory, I did a bit of research on the Indian Removal Act, Andrew Jackson and the Trail of Tears. Did you know:

- The Indian Removal Act was passed in 1830—it offered the Indians land west of the Mississippi in return for evacuation of their tribal homes in the east.
- Andrew Jackson, the 7th president, was in office during this time
- In 1838-1839 Georgia evicted the Cherokees and forced them to march west. About twenty-five percent of the Indians were dead before they reached their new lands in Oklahoma. The Indians refer to this march as the "Trail of Tears"

One of the amazing things about this book (and is characteristic of the author) is the subtle and intelligent humor interspersed throughout the book and integrated into the characters. I find humor very hard to portray through the written word, but Frazier nails it!

AT&T to Improve Wireless Coverage with "Mega-cell" Service

Apr. 1 2009 In an attempt to satisfy its many wireless customers who constantly suffer from dropped phone calls within northwest Austin, AT&T has decided to add an additional tower that will greatly improve the coverage for the community's cell phone users. The location for the new tower is going to be located on Phobos, one of the two moons of Mars using AT&T's new Mega-cell transmission service. A spokesman for AT&T who insisted on being anonymous said that after much research, it was determined that the residents of northwest Austin would never get a good wireless signal without an unobstructed line of site to the tower, and as they found it impossible to do on land, they chose Mars to locate their new "Megatower". 
