



If you have not made payment for the 2009 Maintenance Assessment, please make payment as soon as possible.

Work has been completed on the swing set at the pocket part located at the intersection of Golden Sycamore and Ochre Park. The swing set at this pocket park was replaced and setup with two strap swings to be in accordance with the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commission guidelines. As we replace other pocket park swing sets we will attempt to balance the mix of swing types such that parents of toddlers will have a spot to take the little folks for some fun.

By the time school is out for the summer, we should see the completion of revisions and extensions being put in at the play area adjacent to the Bradford Creek Clubhouse. These include a new swing set designed for school age children (5 through 12 years of age), replentishment of safety surface materials, and the addition of two spring riders to the pre-school age children (2 through 5 years of age) play area.

Additional work at our Bradford Creek pool and clubhouse was completed this past month. The hand rails to the pool slide were rusting and had to be replaced. The water heater at the clubhouse was replaced, and a new park bench was purchased for the pool park location. Several pieces of pool furniture were retired and will be replaced by new chairs for the summer pool season.

VANDALISM



Cy-Fair Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)

Cy-Fair CERT now has over 200 team members in your neigh-borhood. The team members are not only from Fairfield/ Cypress area, but Alief, Katy, Bear Creek, Copperfield, Tomball, and Sugarland. More trained CERT members will be needed in each of these areas to form neighborhood teams.

CERT training is designed to prepare you to help yourself, your family, and your neighbors in the event of a catastrophic disaster. Because emergency services personnel will not be able to help every¬one immediately, you can make a difference by using this training to save lives and protect property. For example, during and after Hurricane Ike members of the Cy-Fair CERT volunteered at the phone bank of the Harris County Office of Emergency Management, manned the federal PODs all over the county, distributed Meals on Wheels food, cleared debris in their communities, etc.

The 8-week course (24 hours of training) covers basic skills that are important to know in a disaster when emergency services are not available. You are taught skills about disaster preparedness, small fire suppression, urban search & rescue, medical operations and more. With training, practice and working as a team you will be able to do the greatest good for the greatest number of people after a disaster, while protecting yourself from becoming a victim.

In 2003, President Bush asked Americans to volunteer to serve oth—ers. The Harris County Citizen Corps www. harriscountycitizencorps.com was created to help our citizens find volunteer and training opportunities. CERT training is just one of the programs created.

CERT training courses are provided throughout Harris County. There is no cost for this course. A backpack of emergency/medical supplies is provided to all CERT team members during training. This program is brought to you by Harris County Judge Emmett. The next CERT training class for the Cy-Fair area will begin on April 1, 2009 at the Lone Star College (Barker-Cypress campus).

Harvest Bible Church

After he had said this, while they were watching, he was lifted up and a cloud hid him from their sight. As they were still staring into the sky while he was going, suddenly two men in white clothing stood near them and said, "Men of Galilee, why do you stand here looking up into the sky? This same Jesus who has been taken up from you into heaven will come back in the same way you saw him go into heaven" (Acts 1:9-11).

There are numerous miraculous and wonderful acts of God in the history of the world. Some stand out above others – the creation of the world in six literal days, the birth of Jesus, the death of Jesus, and the resurrection of Jesus. The great event in world history that followed the resurrection and preceded the coming of the Holy Spirit occurred in Acts 1:9 when Jesus ascended into heaven while the disciples watched. Verse 9 says that as soon as Jesus told the disciples that they would receive power once the Holy Spirit came upon them (v. 8) he was engulfed in a cloud and hidden from their sight. He must have ascended into the sky because the disciples are said to have been staring into the sky looking for him.

Jesus had to leave the earth and return to the Father. This was all part of God's sovereign plan. His own words to the disciples stated that he had to return to the Father, hence he came from the Father, in order to send the Holy Spirit – the promised "Helper" (John 16:5-15). Jesus, as the Son of God, now reigns at the right hand of God

the Father interceding as the great High Priest on behalf of those who believe in his name (Rom. 8:34; Heb. 4:14–16).

Now as the disciples stood there gazing into the sky looking for Jesus, two men in white clothing suddenly appeared before them. These men are believed to be angels, for angels often appeared out of nowhere in the Bible (Gen. 18:2; Josh. 5:13-15), at times wearing white clothing (Mark 16:5). They asked a seemingly dumb question in v. 11: "Men of Galilee, why do you stand there looking up into the sky?" It's seemingly dumb because they knew why the disciples were looking upward. Jesus had just been taken from them in a cloud of smoke! But the question is more of a rebuke, for Jesus was not lost nor had he been taken away forever. He was simply doing what he promised the disciples he would eventually do – leave them. They had nothing to fear, and they needn't worry about Jesus' whereabouts. The angels then reminded them that Jesus would indeed come back to the earth the same way he went into heaven.

The promise that Jesus would come back the same way he went away refers to his "coming in clouds" (Matt. 24:30; 26:64; Rev. 1:7) at his second coming – not to be confused with his coming to rapture the saints "in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye" (1 Cor. 15:51-52; cf. 1 Thess. 4:13-18). The angels are referring to the second coming which occurs seven years after the rapture of the church. Zechariah 14:4 says that when the Messiah comes again he will descend upon the Mount of Olives (exactly where he departed in Acts 1:9) just outside of Jerusalem creating a severe earthquake. This will be the way in which Jesus returns, and he will return with the previously raptured saints and his holy angels (1 Thess. 3:13; 2 Thess. 1:7).

Jesus came first in humility – as a humble carpenter's son from Nazareth. He proved himself through his actions and the miracles he performed, then he ascended to the Father again so that he could send in the Holy Spirit who would work through His followers with true power. But he has also promised to return again, and when he returns it won't be in humility but in power, for all eyes will see Him on that day with every knee bowing to Him. It's not wishful thinking that Christ will return - it's just the logical and biblical ending to God's eternal plan.

Sustainable Living Houston **Kicks off National Bike Month!**

On Friday, May 1, 2009, residents of Cypress, Texas, will bicycle from the Coles Crossing subdivision to the nearby METRO Park & Ride and transit oriented development. By riding bikes to the Park & Ride, and then taking the #217 METRO bus to their work locations, the residents will complete a long-haul, suburb-to-city multi-modal commute without the use of private automobiles.

METRO has recently installed bike racks at the Cypress Park & Ride, and these will be used to secure the bicycles. There is also limited space for taking a few bikes in the sub-floor storage compartments of the # 217 buses.

Residents will assemble at 6:50 am on Friday, May 1, 2009 at the Coles Crossing Community Center parking lot and depart at 7:00 am sharp. Use of helmets, front & rear lights, red rear reflectors and articles of reflective clothing will be mandatory. Residents will ride on the sidewalk south on Barker-Cypress Rd. to Jarvis Rd., whereupon the group will transition to riding on Jarvis Rd. in a vehicular cycling mode. The total ride distance will be about a mile each way, and the time to the Park & Ride from the neighborhood will be about 6 minutes.

The rain date for this ride is May 15, 2009.

There will be a highly recommended pre-ride safety briefing at the Coles Crossing Community

Center parking lot on April 25th at 8:00 a.m. where helmets, lighting, bike commuter clothing, and vehicular cycling will be discussed, as well as a test ride of the route. This briefing will be led by a League of American Bicyclist certified cycling instructor.





What's at Stake? The Health of Your Trees

Most of us have trees in our front yards that were provided by our home builders. Did you know that the stakes supporting these trees need to be removed within the first year? This

is because stakes provide artificial support that replaces a supportive trunk and root system.

Movement of the trunk helps strengthen the tree by thickening it and giving it taper from bottom to top. Trunk movement also stimulates root growth. The artificial support from the stakes leaves tree trunks weak and their root systems less developed.

Bottom line - all staking material needs to be removed after roots have established. This can be as early as a few months, but should be no longer than one growing season.

Women aren't saving enough - if at all. Even though women will spend more years in retirement than men, women still lag behind in their retirement savings. And 37 of women are currently participating in a company 401(k) or other workplace plan, compared to 41% of men; and just 37% of women are likely to hold an IRA or other non-workplace retirement account, compared to 46% of men.

Women are more likely to retire in poverty. For all of the reasons listed above, is it really a surprise that women are 71% more likely than men to live below the poverty line in retirement?

It's critical for women to have a plan. Women need to save more money than men because they cycle in and out of the workplace more often. Over 75% of women are widowed at an average age of 56, and 1 in 4 of these women are broke within two months of being widowed. What do you want your retirement years to look like? Do start now. WHAT DO LABELS ON PRODUCTS REALLY TELL US?

We are constantly reading labels because we believe that the product information listed will inform us as to whether the product is healthy for our home and family. Listed below are three best selling products. Each product is manufactured by U.S. companies with both domestic and international sales up to one billion dollars annually. One tends to believe that what is printed on the product label is what truly is in the product. However, many times there are toxic chemicals within that are not listed.

PRODUCT #1 – PLUG IN AIR FRESHENER

Printed on the label: No ingredients listed

Laboratory testing showed that the product actually contained: d-limonene, alpha-pinene, beta, pinene, ethanol, ethyl butanoate, ethyl acetate, 3-hexen-1-01, 1-butanol, 3 methyl-acetate, beta-phellandrene, acetaldehyde, benzaldehy, carene isomer, 1-methyl-3(1-methylethyl-cyclohexane, isopropyl alcohol, 1-butano1, 2-methyl-acetate, camphene, acetone, methyl butanoate, dimethyl ethyl cyclohexane, alpha-phellandrene

PRODUCT #2 - DRYER SHEET

Printed on the label: Biodegradable cationic softeners & perfumes

Laboratory testing showed that the product actually contained: linalool, ethanol, loenyl acetate, cls-rose oxide, carene isomer, 2, 4-dimethyl-3-cyclohexane, 1-carboxaldehyde, d-limonene, 3-methyl-2-buten-1-ol acetate, 2, 7-dimethyl-2, 7-octanediol, alpha-pinene, trans-rose oxide, eucalyptol, alpha-phenyl ethyl acetate, beta-pinene

PRODUCE #3 – SCENTED LIQUID DETERGENT ADDED TO THE LAUNDRY

Printed on the label: Ingredients include biodegradable surfactants (anionic and non-ionic) and enzymes.

Laboratory testing showed that the product actually contained: ethanol, d-limonene, 2-methyl-2 propoanol, 1, 4-dioxane, 3, 7-



dimethyl-1, 6-octadiene, ethyl acetate, alpha pinene, beta-pinene, 2-butanone, 1- methyl-3(1 methylethyl) – cyclohexene, 2, 4-dimethyl – 3-cyclohexene – 1-carboxaldehyde, undecane, beta-terpinene

There is an obvious difference between the chemicals identified in the laboratory study and the chemicals listed on the product labels. Several of the products emit Hazardous Air Pollutants which are harmful to human health. Currently there is not a United States Law requiring that consumer products or fragrance chemicals be fully disclosed even though they are main sources of toxic volatile organic compounds (VOC's). Regulation of consumer products other than food, drugs, cosmetics, tobacco and pesticides largely fall under the Consumer Product Safety Act (CPSA). The CPSA does not require disclosure of all ingredients in all products. This is troubling since ninety percent of total human exposure to VOC's come from small sources, close to us and within our control, but they are not listed on the labels. Shouldn't we be concerned?

May Landscaping By Ron Kerwin

May is a great month to get full usage of our outdoor areas. The morning temps are nice and it has not yet become really hot in the afternoons. Continue to freely plant shrubs, trees, flowers and vegetables. Remember to put down a minimum of 2 inches of new mulch in all your beds. A good layer of mulch keeps the plant roots cooler, helps with weed control, and helps slow the water you apply from evaporating from the root zone.

Water your lawns less frequently and more deeply. Frequent short duration watering leads to shallow root systems. Less frequent longer duration watering leads to deeper root systems. Deeper root systems are more healthy and better for your lawns. They will hold up better in the extreme heat. Our lawns need one inch of water per week. Put out a container with straight sides and catch the water as you irrigate, you can easily measure the result. Two watering times at ½ inch each are better than 4 times at 1/4 inch, the water penetrates further and this will force the roots down to find it. Regular mowing

is critical for good lawn health. Mow only the top 1/3 of the total length. Letting the grass grow long and then cutting off more than the 1/3 is damaging to the grass, and makes the mulching process less efficient and less attractive.

There is a new soil disease coming into our area that I was made aware of late last year. It reveals itself in St Augustine grasses. It is not cinch bugs, it is not grubs although it does resemble their grass damages. The grass blades die and fall off the runners. The runners remain in place, but somewhat resemble a cobweb. It is NOT a grass disease, it IS a soil disease. The big chemical companies do have chemicals to treat it. This is a Gulf Coast epidemic that is moving North. Homeowners with no foot traffic and do their own yard work still get it. Its origins are a guess at this point. I am trying to be pro-active and let you know your turf may get the problem& to watch out for it.

A Hyperactive Nightmare on Two Legs Does This Sound Like Your Child?

Screaming fits, temper tantrums, hyperactive, letters home from containing those ingredients. It would be a bit harsh saying your child school, lack of focus, antisocial and unacceptable behavior. Is your child? I so understand your situation. My young daughter can be a big pain depending on what she has consumed.

There could be a very simple solution to these behavioral issues. It is now widely accepted that food additives and delayed patterns of food allergies play an important role in causing learning and behavioral problems both in children and adults. A huge number of convenience foods contain a number of preservatives and colorants that have an adverse effect on some individuals, especially the young.

So what's the answer? Some suggest you cut out a whole range of foods and drinks such as all dairy products, yellow foods, junk food, all food with colorants, fried foods, soda and fruit juices for 2 weeks. You will then need to slowly reintroduce each of them and monitor any behavioral differences, but I know if I did this, my little one would be packing her bags and moving in with the neighbors.

I suggest the first step is to keep a food and behavior diary with time lines for 2 weeks to allow you to monitor what is drunk and eaten along with any personality changes. If you see a link between certain foods or drinks with a change in behavior, check all the ingredients can't eat birthday cake because of all the colorants, but you can do as I do and just think ahead and be prepared for the fallout.

Although every one is different the most common causes of food intolerance are colorants such as sunset yellow (E110), carmoisine (E122), tartrazine (E102), allura red (E129) and also products such as soda's, energy drinks and even those 'healthy' fruit drinks that contain lots of sugar.


Although it's hard it is to limit their favorite foods, it helps if once you have discover what might be affecting them try a similar alternative to their favorite munchie, but without those problem additives. Whilst this maybe time consuming it can be done. You will then need to educate them to avoid the 'bad' foods. If you are a busy parent or just need some help to put you in the right direction it is worth contacting diet and nutrition specialists. They can help by analyzing the diet and then going on a super market run with you to work out the 'good options'.

Now as the first option in fighting behavioral problems many parents and individuals are looking at what is consumed rather than opting for drugs as the only solution.

10 Ideas to Help You Get Organized this Spring!

Computer: Examine your desktop for icons or shortcuts you no longer use. Delete those and organize the remaining ones on the desktop in an order that makes sense for how you use them. Then add any extra icons of frequently used programs.

Pantry: On a pantry door, place a clear shoe organizer. It can be a useful place to store gravy/soup/sauce mixes, flavored rice and pasta packs, dry marinades and sauces, Jell-O, extra utensils, spices, or other small items. Shoeboxes are also great to use as inexpensive organizers for small pantry items.

Refrigerator: Before grocery shopping, examine your fridge. Discard any stale food & clean shelves with a damp cloth. Upon return, the new groceries can go right in.

Freezer/Fridge: For food in the freezer/refrigerator, rotate the oldest to the front and newest in back. Use adhesive labels to date items in storage containers.

Laundry: Before putting small articles of clothing into the washing machine, get a few inexpensive mesh bags (used for hosiery) and separate each family member's socks, undergarments, and other small items into them. 


