Steiner Ranch History Corner

What about Volente?

Volente is on Lake Travis and Farm Road 2769. Volente is from the Latin word meaning "to be willing." A post office was established at Volente in 1886 with Andrew J. Stanford as postmaster. The area

was partially submerged by Lake Travis in the 1930s, and residents had to relocate on higher ground. In the 1940s and early 1950s the community was called Dodd City, for a local realtor and restaurant owner, but later in the 1950s the name was changed back to Volente. The community population was estimated at 250 in 1959 and at 400 in 1989. By 1990 Volente had a church, a combination fire hall-community center, several businesses, and the Anderson Mill Museum.

Is there a mill at Anderson Mill?

Anderson Mill was located on Cypress Creek in northwestern Travis County. It was named for Thomas Anderson, who came to Texas from Virginia in the late 1850s. In the early 1860s he built a mill to make gunpowder for the Confederacy. When the war was over he converted the operation to a gristmill. Farmers came from miles away to have their corn ground, sometimes having to camp near the mill for several days to wait their turn. In the early 1870s Anderson added a cotton gin to his operation. A post office opened at Anderson Mill in 1876 with Anderson as postmaster. In 1884 the community had a population of thirty. The development of steampowered mills and gins gradually forced Anderson out of business. After his death in 1894 his family sold the equipment and moved to Austin. A historical marker was placed near the mill site in 1936. *Cedar choppers & deer skinners*

Journalist Winston Bode described some of the early settlers in the Hill Country as "a proud, independent, robust tribe of transplanted Southerners who came here to flat-cut cedar and burn charcoal." Locals referred to them as "cedar choppers." J. Frank Dobie wrote that when he came to Austin in 1914, "the hills were populated by cedar choppers who hauled charcoal to town by wagons. In addition to cooking over live coals, most ironing was done by flatirons heated over charcoal burners." Burning cedar while green avoids reducing the ash to fine powder and produces a hard char. Men placed several cords of cedar in a kiln or pit, covered it with dirt to shut out air and burned it for two or three days until the coal was ready.

The choppers also hauled large cypress logs from the Pedernales River to a sawmill site called Shingle Hill, so named because of the many cedar shingles made there. Hunting in the early days was more a means of survival than a sport. People hunted to put food on the table as well as for income. The deer were plentiful and hunters killed them for hams and saddles and sold the hides as buckskin for clothing and decoration. Sources: B. Varner, Lakeway, the First 25 Years; V. NEW STAFF: One of the unique and exiting challenges of opening a new school is having the opportunity to hire the new teachers, head-coaches and directors (band, theater, choir, etc.) for the new campus. Hiring excellent classroom teachers is always my priority, but much of the immediate student interest concerns the extracurricular programs that make up such a big part of their overall school experience. Extracurricular courses play a vital role in making school relevant to students, and it is important that we find the right people for these positions. LISD has a reputation for academic excellence and a strong history of supporting athletics and fine arts. By starting early, we have been able to recruit a truly world-class staff for Vandegrift.

When we hire a head-coach or program director, we will provide you with information concerning a future opportunity to meet with the new coach/director to discuss their vision for the program. Typically, the new coach will meet with the players during the day at their home campus, and follow up with a parent meet-and-greet that evening. Even though many of these coaches won't officially start working until July, there are many important decisions that need to be made. Summer camps, uniforms, schedules, off-season training, tryouts, and establishing booster organizations are all examples of details that need to be considered before the end of the year.

Where possible, I have provided the individual information concerning our new staff. In some cases, we need to wait to release this information until the coach is officially hired, or until they finish their current season and have an opportunity to talk to their players. Over the next few months, additional teachers and coaches will be added, and we will share this information with you as it become available.

For now, it is my pleasure to introduce the following new Vandegrift staff members:

GREG COOPER: Head wrestling coach/ Football Offensive Coordinator

Greg Cooper was hired in a dual role in Thursday's Board meeting as the Head Wrestling Coach and Offensive Coordinator for the Vandegrift Vipers. Previous to being hired in LISD, Greg was the Head Wrestling Coach for Austin Travis. He resurrected a nearly non-existent program taking them from next to last in district to District 28 Runner-up for 2007 and 2008, losing only to Austin Bowie. During those two years, he also qualified 17 wrestlers for the Regional Wrestling Meet held in San Antonio, TX. Greg also was an avid wrestler as a young athlete in Michigan City, Indiana from the 6th-12th grade.

As a 23 year veteran of coaching, Greg has been part of many championship teams including the AAAAA Football State Finalist in 2001 and Quarterfinalist in 2004. Also in the track arena has coached a State Champion 200M runner and many State qualifiers. Greg was also awarded the C.T.F.C.A. Offensive Asst. Coach of the Year in 2007 for his offense at Travis High School. His offense set several school records and averaged 31 points per game. He has also coached two 2,000 yard rushers in his career. Greg is married to Norma Cooper and has one daughter, Dakota.

TRENT GREGORY: Football Asst/ Head Boy's Track

Coach Gregory will be joined by his wife Juliana, who has been teaching for eighteen years and is currently teaching sixth grade math at Eisenhower Intermediate School in Mansfield ISD. Their son Garrison is currently a freshman at Timberview HS and participates in football and baseball and daughter, Madison recently got married and lives in the Houston area.

2007-present : Offensive Coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Timberview H.S. (Mansfield ISD). Team advanced to the 5-A Regional Quarter Finals in 2007 and 4-A Area round of the playoffs in 2008.Assistant track coach on team that won 5-A District Championship in 2007, and advanced twenty athletes to the Regional meet. 1996-2007 : Head Football Coach / Athletic Coordinator at Anderson H.S. Team advanced to the State football playoffs in 2000,2002 and 2003. At Anderson, they won the first District Championship in the history of the school in 2003. Anderson was the recipient of A.I.S.D. "All Sports Award" for six years.

1994-1996 : Offensive Coordinator and Offensive line coach at Anderson H.S. Assistant track coach at Anderson H.S.

1992-1995 : Assistant football coach (offensive line & defensive ends) at Bartlett H.S. Teams advanced to Bi-District in 1994, to the Quarter Finals in 1993, and won the State Championship in 1992 with a record of 14-0-1. Coached three All-State players at Bartlett.

1985-1992 : Assistant football coach at Leander H.S. and Leander M.S. Varsity football assistant coach and kicking game coordinator.

As a college athlete at Texas State, his team won the National Championship.

KEITH PIERCE: Head Cross Country/ Head Girls' Track

Keith Pierce comes to us from Krum High School where he began his coaching career in the Fall of 2003. In his time at Krum, Coach Pierce served as both an assistant and head cross country coach, the head boys track & field coach, and assistant basketball coach. Coach Pierce helped lead the Bobcats to the 2003 Class 2A Cross Country State Championship and the bronze medal in 2004 and 2005. place regional finish as the team's head coach. Under his leadership, the Boys Track & Field team has produced two state qualifiers and multiple regional qualifiers.

Coach Pierce is a graduate of Rice University where he was a four year letter winner for the Rice Owls' cross country and track teams. As an Owl, he was a member of the 1999 and 2001 WAC Championship cross country teams. He was a cross country team captain and 1st team all-conference in 2001. On the track, Pierce was a two-time indoor NCAA provisional qualifier in the Distance Medley Relay. In 2003, Pierce was honored with Rice University's Emmet Brunson Award for Excellence in Track.

Pierce has continued his competitive running on the road. He is the only runner to have won three consecutive Fort Worth Cowtown Marathons, taking 1st place honors in 2007, 2008, and 2009. He finished 36th at the 2006 Boston Marathon, which boasts a field of over 22,000 runners. Coach Pierce has aspirations of qualifying for the 2012 Olympic Marathon Trials.

Keith graduated from Childress High School where he was class Valedictorian and the 1998 Class 3A State Champion in the 800 meter dash. Keith is married to Stephanie, a kindergarten teacher. Keith and Stephanie are very excited about the opportunity to be Vandegrift Vipers!

CLIFF ELLIS: Head Boys' Basketball

Coach Cliff Ellis was born and raised in Plano, TX and graduated from Plano East Senior High School where he played basketball and baseball. Coach Ellis graduated from Texas A&M University in 2000 and completed his Master's from Texas State in 2008. As an asst.



coach, his teams have qualified for the post-season every season and this past season as 1st Asst. at Lake Travis, qualified for the Regional Finals. Coach Ellis has also coached golf, cross country, football and has several athletes qualify for the post-season. Leander ISD 2009-2010 School Year Registration

Leander ISD's Pre-Kindergarten registration for the 2009 - 2010 school year will be held on Wednesday, May 6, 2009, from 7:30 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. at all LISD elementary campuses. Students zoned to attend the new Ronald Reagan Elementary (#22) will register at CoxElementary, while students slated for the new River Ridge Elementary (#23) should register at Laura Bush Elementary.

To be eligible for the half-day Pre-K program children must:

- 1. Be 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2009; AND
- 2. Be a resident of Leander Independent School District; AND
- 3. Meet immunization requirements; AND
- 4. Meet at least one of the following conditions:
- Child is unable to speak and comprehend the English language; OR
- Child is homeless; OR
- Child has a parent or official guardian who is an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces, who is ordered to active duty by proper authority; OR
- Child has a parent or official guardian who is a member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces, who was injured or killed while serving on active duty; OR
- Child has ever been in foster care; OR
- Child is eligible to participate in the national free or reducedprice lunch program due to limited family income.
- NOTE: Due to federal guidelines, income status must by verified on or after June 24, 2009. Until that time, a space will be reserved for the child.

Transportation is provided for the Pre-K program in accordance with district guidelines.

Parents wishing to register their child for Pre-K must bring the child's birth certificate, social security card, immunization records, a photo ID of parent/guardian, and proof of residency, (i.e. an electric bill, water bill, etc...).

Please note: Pre-K registration is ongoing in Leander ISD. If you are unable to make the above date, please register your student(s) at your earliest convenience prior to August 1.

LISD Kindergarten Registration

Leander ISD's Kindergarten registration for the 2009 - 2010 school year will be held on Wednesday, May 6, 2009, from 7:30 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. at all LISD elementary campuses. The Lure & Lore of Lizards

Various beliefs, myths, and legends have been inspired by the behavioral patterns of lizards. In ancient Egypt and Greece the lizard represented divine wisdom and good fortune, in Roman mythology their hibernation symbolized death and resurrection, and in Australia the aboriginal believed that the sky would fall if you killed one. Today, these ideas largely do not hold true, but lizards seem to fascinate us nonetheless! While Central Texas is home to several species of lizards, geckos, anoles, skinks, and whiptails, those most likely (and interesting) to be seen are the Fence Lizard,

the Green or Carolina Anole, and the Texas Alligator Lizard.

Preferring rocky areas that provide shelter and basking surfaces such as privacy fences and rock walls, the aptly named Fence Lizard is quite common in all but the eastern third of Texas. A light brown lizard ranging from 3.5 to 7 inches in length, they have a light stripe down each side from the neck to the lower back, with dark spots or bands in between,



which gives them a very scaly appearance. Males have two bright blue patches rimmed in black on the belly and throat, and while the females generally lack these colorings, they are slightly larger than the males. A diurnal lizard, they feed on a variety of insects found on the ground in open areas or up in trees in wooded areas. Breeding occurs in the spring and summer, and mature females may lay several egg clutches per year.

Ranging from bright green to dark brown, the Green Anole possesses the ability to change color due to temperature and light.

A small lizard, it has a pale colored underbelly, long claws, and a thin tail. The males have what is called a 'dewlap', a bright pink flap of skin that can be extended and retracted for purposes of intimidating rivals and attracting females during the mating season. These anoles are arboreal, spending most of their time in trees, shrubs, and vines, feeding on insects and spiders. While they have a small territory, the males will aggressively defend it, starting with

extending their dewlap, bobbing their head, performing pushups, and ultimately ending in a chase or a wrestling match. All this posturing and patrolling can make the males much easier targets for predators, however, and they tend to have higher mortality rates than the much more discreet females. If it is late spring and the right to mate is at stake, the winner will once again employ headbobbing and dewlap extension to entice the female, who lays a single, softshell egg among the leaf litter.

Coming in at an impressive 10 to 24 inches long, the Texas Alligator Lizard is a stiff lizard with large, plate-like scales and a long, somewhat prehensile tail. It is the largest lizard in Texas and the one of largest alligator lizards in the world. Varying from ruddy yellow to reddish brown, it has dark crosshatches on its back with a lighter head and small, weak legs that are unmarked. Found on rocky hillsides, it has slow, calculated moves, feeding on insects, spiders, and small invertebrates. When alarmed, it may inflate itself in defense - and like other lizards even lose its tail to distract a potential predator - but more typically it will fold in its legs and slither away like a snake. Unlike many other lizards, breeding can occur yearround, and multiple clutches of eggs can be laid. Females often stay near the nest site to protect it, but once the young hatch they receive no parental care.

Lizards have been around for 100 million years longer than humans, and descended from the same family tree that gave rise to the dinosaurs. The next time you're lucky enough to have one cross your path, show it some well-deserved respect!

Austin Adds Jobs for 2nd Straight Month

AUSTIN – The Austin-Round Rock MSA* added 5,100 jobs in March, following a 6,000 position increase in February, according to the Texas Workforce Commission (TWC). Unemployment for the area decreased slightly to 6.2%. Much of the increase was due to temporary hiring to support annual spring events such as Spring Break, the South by Southwest film and music festival, and the Star of Texas Fair and Rodeo.

"The Austin metro area received some good news with March employment statistics, with local unemployment dropping slightly from 6.3% in February to 6.2% in March," explained Alan Miller, Workforce Solutions' Executive Director.

Leisure & Hospitality continued its strong growth, adding 2,700 jobs in March after adding 1,500 in February. Government (+1,600) and Education & Health Services (+800) continued to show consistent growth while the combination of Manufacturing and Trade, Transportation, & Utilities lost 1,800 jobs combined.

"The good news is that we seem to be holding steady in terms of employment and unemployment with no large swings. The economy still has a ways to go but there are positive signs," added Miller.

In the past 12 months, the Austin area has added 3,300 jobs, for an annual growth rate of 0.4%. Austin hasn't experienced a negative annual job growth rate since January 2004. Sectors showing strong annual growth are Professional & Business Services and Government.

According to the TWC, the unemployment rate for the Austin-Round Rock MSA in March 2009 dropped by 0.1% to 6.2%. The rate was 3.8% one year ago.

The March 2009 unemployment rate for Texas rose slightly to 6.7% percent, while the U.S. rate climbed to 8.5%.

Let's look at a new law enacted in late 2008: the Pension Act's RMD Waiver for Calendar Year 2009. Many retirees have had to sell retirement plan account or traditional IRA assets at distressed values in order to generate the cash needed to make required minimum distributions (RMDs). Beneficiaries of retirement plan accounts or traditional IRAs have faced similar problems. The Pension Act enacted late last year provided relief by waiving the RMD for calendar year 2009 only. It also relieved designated beneficiaries of the need to make minimum distributions for 2009. Had the waiver not been granted, many individuals with retirement accounts invested in beaten-down assets such as stocks or mutual funds would have had to sell assets at a loss to generate RMDs for 2009. But the new law change helps even those people who would otherwise have to make RMDs from retirement plan accounts and traditional IRAs invested in "bulletproof" assets such as government-insured CDs. If you can afford to skip this year's RMD, you can lower your tax bill for 2009.

The overall purpose of the RMD rule is to make sure retirement accounts and IRAs are used primarily for the owner's retirement, rather than as a tax-sheltered nest egg for the family; a prohibitively expensive IRS penalty rule applies if an RMD isn't made. Distributions from retirement plans or IRAs are fully taxed as ordinary income (unless you made nondeductible contributions). The new law allows older individuals to skip the RMD that would otherwise be required for calendar year 2009.

The new law has an impact on three distinct groups of people here's how you or a family member may be affected.

(1) Older individuals who are retirement plan account and traditional IRA owners. Generally, required payouts from IRAs must begin when you attain age 70 1/2. Once they begin, RMDs must be made following an IRS schedule over your life or over the lives

of you and the person you designate as beneficiary of the retirement account or IRA.

(2) Beneficiaries of retirement plan accounts or traditional IRAs. If a person dies before exhausting the funds in his or her employer retirement plan account or IRA, the balance may be left to an individual designated as a beneficiary (there may be a group of beneficiaries). If you are a designated beneficiary, you also must make minimum annual withdrawals (which generally are fully taxable) from your inherited retirement plan account or IRA. The new law allows designated beneficiaries of retirement plans or IRAs to skip the annual payout that would otherwise be required for calendar year 2009.

(3) Beneficiaries of Roth IRAs. The new law doesn't affect owners of Roth IRA accounts for the simple reason that they do not have to make lifetime RMDs from these accounts. However, it does affect beneficiaries of Roth IRAs, who must make minimum annual withdrawals after the account owner dies. Thanks to the new law change, RMDs are waived for 2009 from their inherited Roth IRAs. This won't affect their income tax, since distributions to designated beneficiaries of Roth IRAs are tax-free. However, it will avoid having to sell reduced-in-value assets to make the otherwise-required distributions, and it will make it possible for designated beneficiaries to leave more money at work within the tax-shelter of the Roth IRA. What to do About My Tired PC? Part I

Ultimately it gets down to what is probably my most used answer – "it depends".

Can I upgrade inexpensively without having to buy a new computer? Quite possibly. We're fortunate that software hasn't quite kept up with the power of the hardware the last few years. Do you need more storage? Hard drives are very cheap: as low as \$55 for a 500 Gigabyte drive! That's a lot of pictures! Computers in what I call the "sweet spot" (2-5 years old) generally benefit greatly from additional memory. Windows XP today really needs at least 512MB (Megabytes) and Vista needs 1 ¹/₂ GB minimum. The great news is that memory is dirt cheap. Depending on your particular system, a full 1GB of additional memory can be as cheap as \$15. Slow systems often have other problems, but additional memory is an

inexpensive way to eliminate one possibility as the problem.

Computers that are in that sweet spot benefit greatly from what I call a "rebuild". This means first backing up your documents, pictures, etc. and then wiping the hard drive clean and reinstalling Windows and your programs. This will often double your speed and will cost you nothing but time. It will put your computer into a like-new or better condition. Imagine a car in which you never change the oil, just top it off as it gets low. After a few years, it's pretty gunky in there. Well, Windows is very similar after a few years. A fresh start can do wonders. And if you add memory and a larger hard drive – woo hoo!!!

Next month I'll continue with part II, and will talk about whether it's better (and cheaper) to build your own computer rather than buying one in a store, and which is better for you, a PC or a Mac?

May Landscaping

By Ron Kerwin

May is a great month to get full usage of our outdoor areas. The morning temps are nice and it has not yet become really hot in the afternoons. Continue to freely plant shrubs, trees, flowers and vegetables. Remember to put down a minimum of 2 inches of new mulch in all your beds. A good layer of mulch keeps the plant roots cooler, helps with weed control, and helps slow the water you apply from evaporating from the root zone.

Water your lawns less frequently and more deeply. Frequent short duration watering leads to shallow

root systems. Less frequent longer duration watering leads to deeper root systems. Deeper root systems are more healthy and better for your lawns. They will hold up better in the extreme heat. Our lawns need one inch of water per week. Put out a container with straight sides and catch the water as you irrigate, you can easily measure the result. Two watering times at ½ inch each are better than 4 times at ¼ inch, the water penetrates further and this will force the roots down



to find it. Regular mowing is critical for good lawn health. Mow only the top 1/3 of the total length. Letting the grass grow long and then cutting off more than the 1/3 is damaging to the grass, and makes the mulching process less efficient and less attractive.

There is a new soil disease coming into our area that I was made aware of late last year. It reveals itself in St Augustine grasses. It is not cinch bugs, it is not grubs although it does resemble their grass damages. The grass blades die and fall off the runners. The

runners remain in place, but somewhat resemble a cobweb. It is NOT a grass disease, it IS a soil disease. The big chemical companies do have chemicals to treat it. This is a Gulf Coast epidemic that is moving North. Homeowners with no foot traffic and do their own yard work still get it. Its origins are a guess at this point. I am trying to be pro-active and let you know your turf may get the problem & to watch out for it.

Britt's Book Buzz:Twilight

I Couldn't Resist the Temptation

Twilight is the first novel in a series by author Stephenie Meyer. I picked up it solely because of the buzz around it. The book is a fun read. Not the best written book, but who cares? It kept me reading and reading and captures the conflict of a vampire who wants to be with his true love (who happens to be human), but is constantly at odds with his primal need, his thirst. He resists the temptation...so far.

Even with the author's exhaustive mentions of how beautiful Edward the vampire is, I personally can't imagine myself falling in love with a vampire no matter how perfect. The way the author describes their cold, stone-like skin itself just makes me cringe. I do enjoy the way Meyer demonstrates mood and emotions by focusing on the vampires' eyes.

The story is very imaginative and gives a new perspective on a different breed of vampires—those who have chosen alternative diets so they can be a part of human society.

I keep thinking that this girl, Bella, has gotten herself into a messy situation—her beau can appear anywhere, can run at lightning speeds and can hear thoughts (except for hers). There's no way to escape. This is especially true when Bella, the main character, is hunted down by a dangerous vampire.

Is this a big put-on? Is Edward's ultimate plan to drink her blood? Will Bella join the Cullen family for eternity?
