Constable's Notebook – June 2009

Nearly 20 years after passage of the landmark Americans with Disabilities Act, and in spite of aggressive enforcement efforts, handicap parking violations are as widespread as ever. In 1995, my office established Texas' first county volunteer handicap parking enforcement program. During that first year, volunteers wrote more than 1,000 tickets throughout Travis County. Since then the Texas Legislature has provided additional enforcement tools and increased fines. Local media outlets have widely publicized the need for handicap parking spaces by people with disabilities. My officers and volunteers have also worked with other law enforcement agencies to conduct periodic sting operations. This year we will write more than 1,500 tickets.

Three years ago a study conducted by my office found that 65% of those who used handicap parking placards to park in the downtown area were actually using someone else's placard to park for free in handicap parking spaces or at meters. We estimated that the City of Austin loses as much at \$500,000 per year in parking meter revenue. Recently during the Legislative Session, deputy constables wrote 22 handicap parking tickets around the State Capitol Complex. Twenty tickets were written to state employees. All 22 tickets were written to people who were using other peoples' handicap parking placards to park in handicap parking spaces or at meters for free. The deputies said that with additional resources they could easily have written dozens more tickets.

This abuse is not just occurring at the State Capitol. It is occurring throughout Texas. Violators prevent people who need these parking spaces from gaining access to public places and they are stealing parking revenue from their cities. A couple violators said receiving tickets two or three times per year would still be cheaper for them than paying for parking. It is clear that current state law and local law enforcement efforts have so far failed to achieve the expectations of the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Many disability organizations and law enforcement officials have asked the Texas Legislature to further increase handicap parking fines so violators won't continue to view getting a couple of tickets per year as a cheaper option. As of this writing it is not clear if increased handicap parking fines will pass, but you can be assured that my deputies and volunteers will continue to aggressively enforce access rights in Travis County.

Last month, the HPWBANA reported that there may be a bike lane added on Balcones between Edgemont and 35th Street. The City of Austin has revised the master bike plan and there will be no bike lane on Balcones at this time.

Pink Hibiscus Mealybug

Pink hibiscus mealybugs (PHM) are soft-bodied insects closely related to scale insects. PHM adult females are wingless with oval bodies and a white, waxy coating covering the body. The females have a couple of waxy filaments coming off the edge of the body and two buttons of wax on the abdomen. Male PHM have wings and two long waxy tails. Both have a pinkish to reddish body that exudes a reddish-brown fluid when pierced.

Damage occurs to plants in the form of "bunchy top" where new growth curls and the stems stop growing and become thicker. There is usually a white, waxy accumulation on the plant.

Currently, biological control is the best method to manage PHM populations.

The Texas Department of Agriculture is working on releasing beneficial insects



in areas where PHM has been confirmed, so if you suspect that you have a pink hibiscus mealybug infestation, please contact me. Heavily infested plants can have infested areas pruned. Pruned areas should be double bagged and disposed.


