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



Semi-Annual Assessment Due for 2nd Half of 2009

Semi-annual assessments for July - December 2009 were due on July 1, 2009. Statements were mailed to each homeowner at the mailing address on file in mid-June. If you did not receive a statement, please contact the Community Associations Office at 512-266-7553 and ask for Mindy Stout. You are not exempt from paying assessments or late fees even if you do not receive a statement. Payments received after July 31, 2009 for any reason are subject to an initial \$40.00 late fee per association, and a \$15.00 late fee for each additional month that the assessment remains unpaid. Please note that the assessment must be received by July 31st, not simply postmarked by July 31st. Your escrow account does not pay your assessments.

***Please note that if your assessments are not current, you may lose resident privileges such as pool access, facility rental, and attendance at, or registration for, social functions and children's programs. ***



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FIREWORKS / FIRECRACKERS PROHIBITED

Steiner Ranch Fireworks Policy

The Steiner Ranch Master Association (SRMA) and the Steiner Ranch Residential Owners Association (SRROA) have heard from an increasing number of homeowners concerning fireworks and firecrackers in Steiner Ranch.

All homeowners are reminded that Section 2.14 of the Steiner Ranch Master Association Development Area Declaration and Section 3.13 of the Steiner Ranch Residential Owners Association Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions (CC&R's) titled Hazardous Activities SPECIFICALLY forbid fireworks within Steiner Ranch, unless prior written board approval has been granted for professional pyrotechnic shows meeting all mandated safety requirements.

There are a number of reasons for this prohibition.

- 1. The usage of increasingly powerful fireworks places homes at serious risk of fire.
- 2. The topography and green space of Steiner Ranch are conducive to major fires.
- 3. Federal rules regarding management of the BCCP (which borders Steiner Ranch) impose significant restrictions on activities that may affect the wildlife therein. Serious penalties for their violation can be imposed by federal officials.
- 4. Homeowners are entitled to the peaceable enjoyment of their property.

Fireworks and firecrackers are and will remain prohibited in Steiner Ranch for the reasons above. Your Board has authorized a warning for the first violation and a \$250 fine for the second violation of Section 2.14 and/or Section 3.13. Violations,

once finalized after appeal, are permanent; repeat violations are subject to a \$500 fine. Professional patrols are in place to assist with the implementation of this policy.

Your Board reminds all homeowners that each of us has the ability and the responsibility to enforce the CC&Rs of Steiner Ranch whenever we feel that a violation is occurring. In the matter of fireworks and firecrackers, please contact the Association Office, at (512) 266-7553 as soon as possible during or immediately following an occurrence. Physical and/or photographic evidence is very helpful in substantiating a violation.

Please make a note on your calendars that the Bella Mar pool facility is closed every Monday until 2:00pm during the summer season and the John Simpson Pool facility is closed every Monday beginning at 1:00pm.

The entire Bella Mar facility will also be closed for the Steiner Stars Red Swim Team so they can host their last meet for the year on July 11th until 2:00pm


The following camps will be using the pool area on the following days:

Kidventure Camp:

They will be supervised by camp counselors and you are welcome to use the pool while they are there.

John Simpson: Swim lessons will be using the John Simpson pool throughout the summer from 10:00am – 5:30pm. They will be in one lane, leaving the remainder of the pool for recreational use. Adult Group Swimming will be using 3 lanes throughout the summer every Wednesday night from 8:00pm – 9:00pm.





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No Diapers Allowed

Pool Policy regarding children who are not potty-trained:

Children who are not potty-trained and who use swim diapers are not allowed in the Bella Mar Lap Pool.

All other community pools:

Double diapers (swim diaper + plastic pants) must be worn by children who have not been completely toilet trained.

This policy is in place to help keep accidents from happening and reducing the need to close pools due to contamination.



Pool Procedures BATHROOM BREAK!

Last summer the Steiner Ranch Community Pools had to shut down on several occasion due to "accidents". These types of problems will cause a pool to shut down for many hours, sometimes all day, so the pool can be treated and given time for the water to "turn over".

Parents, please help keep the pools clean by taking your children on frequent bathroom breaks. The lifeguards will have the kids get out of the pool during Adult Swim to give kids this opportunity. Children who wear swim diapers should be checked often and if necessary, should be changed in the bathroom and not at poolside.

Summer Swim Lessons

Steiner Ranch will once again offer swim lessons for children beginning June 10th at the John Simpson Pool. Each session will consist of 8 thirty-minute lessons, held Tuesday – Friday.

Only Steiner Ranch residents with a Facility Tag and in good standing with the Association will be allowed to take swim lessons.

Did you know that Stapp Court and several other streets in Steiner Ranch are named after famous Texans? Here we look at Elijah Stapp (1783-1843), a pioneer settler in the original DeWitt's colony and a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence. Stapp was born in Virginia in1783. He married Nancy Shannon in 1811 and moved to Missouri. There he met the famous Green DeWitt. DeWitt had been awarded a land grant in 1825 by the Mexican government to establish a colony of 400 Anglo-Americans on the Guadalupe River near Gonzales and adjacent to Stephen F. Austin's, subject to the Mexican Colonization Law of 1824. DeWitt wrote a letter of introduction to Stephen F. Austin on Stapp's behalf in 1826. Apparently Stapp was among the few who visited the settlement by July 1826.

Having investigated the new land, Stapp brought his wife and six children to settle in the colony about 1830. Later three more children were born. In 1831 Stapp was issued a Spanish title to a league of land now in Victoria County. By 1835, however, Stapp was providing leadership in meetings of settlers of Navidad and Lavaca to discuss growing dissatisfaction with the Mexican government. He was appointed second judge of the new Jackson Municipality

in 1835 by the General Council of the provisional government. He was later elected to represent Jackson in the Convention of 1836 at Washington-on-the-Brazos, where he signed the Declaration of Independence. After the convention Stapp and those of his family not serving in the army were forced to flee from their homes during the Runaway Scrape, when Santa Anna began his attempted conquest of Texas in February 1836.

Stapp was involved in frontier legal matters. For example, Stapp wrote a letter of character in 1836 to interim president Burnet in defense of a Mr. John J. Linn, who had been arrested erroneously as a spy. Stapp was later elected justice of the peace of Jackson County, Republic of Texas, in 1839, and in 1840 he was postmaster at La Baca, Jackson County. That year he owned 4,428 acres in Victoria County. Stapp died on March 21, 1843, in Jackson County. In 1936 the Texas Centennial Commission erected a monument in the Russell Ward cemetery in his honor. His son William Stapp served in the disastrous Mier raiding expedition into Mexico in 1842 and was captured. After trying to escape, William survived the Black Bean Episode (where every tenth man who attempted escape was to be shot (Continued on Page 26)







Summer weather is here and that means you and your family should remember sun protection when you're out on the trails. Also keep your pets on leash at all times. Snakes are on the move when it is hot so it's important to be aware of your surroundings. Please remember, the Steiner Ranch trail system is totally private and is for the use of Steiner Ranch residents and their guests only.

Have you have seen the numbered signs on some of our trails? The HOA congratulates Scout Brent Borman for his efforts at installing trail signs in Steiner Ranch. Brent has completed Phase 1, which is about safety: the EMS now has the GPS location information for every sign. That way EMS knows exactly where a caller is if they need medical help on the trails. Phase 2 is informative: Phase 2 will design labels showing the trail names, the distance to the nearest exit and the way out. Want to help us design Phase 2? bikers, hikers and trail runners from all over the country showing up on any given Saturday morning. This would certainly ruin our trail system, and is to be avoided through proactive measures. Thank you in advance for your support.

Protect our trails - Motorized vehicles of any type are prohibited on all our trails. Residents who are caught with any such vehicle are subject to criminal trespass and fines under our Homeowners Association bylaws. Please take a camera on all trails with you and if you see riders, take their photograph and contact the Travis County Sheriff at 854-9770 and your HOA at 266-7553. Also, no bikes on the BCCP preserve lands. This is well-marked.

Report a problem - Downed tree? Trail erosion? Mud? As always, you can report problems or issues on the trails using the HOA website http://www.steinerranchoa.org under "Report a Problem."





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A Sensible Plan for College Funding, Part I

As a parent, you may feel a moral obligation to fund your children's education, but you don't want to sacrifice your current lifestyle or rob your future retirement in order to fund education costs. Well, to make funding both their education and your retirement a non-issue, you must consider how to:

- Maximize your cash flow so that you can invest funds in education and retirement accounts. This includes both reducing debt and lowering expenses.
- Utilize the numerous education tax incentives provided by the IRS to reduce taxes and produce so-called "tax scholarships" for your family.
- Qualify for merit and need-based financial aid offered by colleges

If you can maximize the benefits produced by the above strategies, you may not have to compromise your education and retirement goals. Remember that college really costs you more than you think because it is paid with after-tax dollars. And depending on which tax bracket you are in, the amount you must earn to pay for college is a good deal more because you must first pay the IRS...before you pay the college. And college costs are increasing at 2 to 3 times the Consumer Price Index inflation rate.



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We will explore this topic in future columns, how to make a sensible, methodical plan for funding college expenses. First, though, there are some brand-new tax laws which you should be aware of which offer more "tax scholarships." Remember to consult your tax professional to make sure you qualify. So if you have a Section 529 college savings plan or are paying college bills this year, here are a few recent developments you may find helpful.

Investment Changes:

A Section 529 plan normally may allow an account holder to change the investment strategy selected for an account only one time per year and when a new beneficiary is designated. However, given the extreme volatility in the economy and the stock market, the IRS has loosened this rule somewhat. For calendar year 2009 only, a plan may permit two changes in investment strategy, as well as a change if a new beneficiary is designated. The goal is to give people a little more flexibility with their plan investments.

Computer Costs:

Section 529 plan distributions are tax free if used for qualified higher education expenses. In addition to tuition and fees, these expenses

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A Sensible Plan- (Continued from Pg. 36) generally include room and board for students who attend at least half-time, books, supplies, and equipment required for enrollment or attendance, as well as expenses for special needs students. For 2009 and 2010, tax-free withdrawals are also allowed to pay for computer technology, equipment, and related services, including Internet access. (Some restrictions apply.)

American Opportunity Tax Credit:

Also for 2009 and 2010, the Hope Scholarship Credit has been renamed the American Opportunity Tax Credit and made more generous — up to \$2,500 per student per year. The income phaseout ranges also have been raised. The new credit phases out for taxpayers with modified adjusted gross income (AGI) between \$80,000 and \$90,000 (\$160,000 and \$180,000 on a joint return).

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Installing Video Cameras for your Home

We know you want to feel safe at home and you should. Maybe you've tried trimming foliage, increasing exterior lighting and installing a home security system. Maybe you've even considered installing video cameras outside your home to feel more secure.

Before you invest in a high-tech video system, there are a few things to consider. Personal safety and privacy are two ideals everyone wants in a community, but they can collide. Association policies weigh both these concerns, while also taking local and state laws into consideration.

Installing any security equipment, including cameras, is considered an architectural alteration of the home's exterior and therefore requires written approval from the association. In addition, the installation will only be approved after the neighbors' right to privacy and quiet use and enjoyment of their property has been considered. We may also ask the association attorney to review your application.


If you chose to install video surveillance, the camera needs to be placed in the least intrusive or least visible location, and it can only be focused on your property—never directed at windows of adjacent structures, neighboring or common property.

Applications to install a security camera must include a plot plan showing the camera's location in relation to neighboring structures, a property survey and specifications on the size, shape, camera range and field of view of the camera. Any changes from the application, such as altering the location, equipment or field of view of the camera may require a new application.

Before deciding to install a security camera system, think about why you want to monitor particular views. Ask yourself:

- What do I achieve by installing cameras?
- Are the lighting conditions (night and day) good enough?
- How much video do I want to store before the system records over itself?
- Do I want to monitor cameras myself, access them via the Internet or keep a recording for investigative purposes?

Many homeowners are going beyond motion-detecting lights and in-home security systems, and installing video cameras for safety. However, our association must—at the same time—balance your desire to feel secure and your neighbor's need for privacy.

The Best Breed of Book

The more I find myself referencing the book I am currently reading (or have read) to friends, family and co-workers, the more I realize how much I've enjoyed it. Well, I've been talking about The Story of Edgar Sawtelle by David Wroblewski quite a bit and not because the author and I share long Polish last names.

I'm a sucker for human-dog stories and this is a unique and unforgetable journey between a young boy and his dogs. The main character, Edgar, is born unable to talk. He creates his own form of sign language, allowing him to communicate with his parents and their dogs (his family breeds a custom specialty of dog) until something happens that really rocks Edgar's secure world.

The book captures the love and devotion between dogs and humans and communicates the personality in every creature. I enjoyed reading about dog training and its related terminology and how much companionship and loyalty define our outlook on life. The family unit, prior to Claude, was truly special and the drama that ensued post-Claude entering the scene left you waiting for disaster.

This book is truly an adventure with the best breed of companionship. There's little dialog since a majority of the book is spent on Edgar's journey (both literally and figuratively), which is engaging every step of the way. It's heartbreaking to witness his relationship with Almondine, his best friend.

I have two points of contention with the book, parts of which were told in the voices from the main characters in the book (one of them being Edgar's dog, which I thought was really great). Edgar's mom, Trudy, shared her frame of reference, but it was so poorly portrayed. The author did a good job of developing her character, but either hadn't fully developed Trudy's voice or severely lacked experience in the mind of a woman. It was shallow and weak and didn't correlate to the character he built for her.

My second point of contention was how the book ended. I have never truly complained about the way a book ends, but I feel strongly enough to say that I hoped the author would have found a more creative end. In the end, was it all for naught?!

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

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
