West Pool Project – Here We Come!

After many years of hoping for this day, I am happy to announce that the CCHOA has finally received the land and funds which our former developer collected and devoted to the building of a new pool and other amenities in Circle C West at Spruce Canyon and La Crosse. For those who are new to the neighborhood, perhaps a history lesson is warranted. Our former developer negotiated several agreements with the builders in the neighborhood which provided that those builders would contribute \$1,000 to an amenities fund each time they transferred a residential lot into the CCHOA. These agreements, among other things, required that the funds be devoted to a pool and other amenities in Circle C West. As late as October 2004, our previous developer's affiliated companies were prepared to voluntarily transfer all rights and obligations under these agreements to the CCHOA. Unfortunately, the local bankruptcy court ruled that same month that all assets, rights and obligations subject to the agreements were part of our former developer's bankruptcy estate.

After many years of working with the bankruptcy court, the trustee for our former developer's estate and other interested parties, the court entered an order in mid-2008 allowing us to assume control of the funds and land which had been set aside for the amenities in our neighborhood. The parties then went through their respective due diligence in anticipation of closing, which took place earlier this month. We now have in excess of \$1,300,000 in our accounts which shall be exclusively devoted to the West Pool Project. What has only been a

concept in the past can now become a reality due to the transfer of these assets to the HOA.

The board appointed a West Pool Committee in March of 2007 to continue the work of its predecessor(s). The committee was asked to research and gather data from the neighborhood through surveys and other comparable neighborhood amenities and develop conceptual plans for the West Pool site. These conceptual plans were presented to the membership at the March 2008 Annual Meeting. The board will receive an update to those plans and the committee's recommendations during a work session following the July board meeting.

So what do we do now? The next steps will include: permitting with the City of Austin to determine exactly what we are and are not permitted to build on the site, fully and finally determining what we want to build and how much we are willing to spend to fund the project and enlisting the help of a project manager to shepherd us through the project and make it happen. We will continue to work with the committee and do our best to build the amenities we want and need within the board's framework of fiscal responsibility to the Association. We will also endeavor to periodically update our website and newsletter, as well as possibly host Q&A meetings to let you know where we're going and how we intend to get there.

Simply stated, hold on to your hats folks – we're off to the races!



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Circle C Landscape Update Submitted by Susan Hoover

This month I am going to use a Q & A format for your monthly landscape report. Since we are in such extreme heat and drought conditions, we have had some questions and I want to make sure that you all have correct information.

Are the trees dying on Escarpment? We have had three trees on the west side of Escarpment north of LaCrosse lose their leaves in the past two weeks. These are burr oak trees, and in general, they get heat stressed easily and often lose their leaves over the summer, generally in late August. The super hot weather has moved up the schedule this year.

The trees are not dead and will recover. We have dug water trenches around them and around 15 other large trees in the neighborhood and these are being hand watered with our water truck two times per week. The trees that have lost their leaves are planted on the small hills (berms) on the west side of Escarpment. This area is particularly rocky and the water has a hard time soaking in due to the slope. Thus, the trees stress practically overnight. The supplemental water will keep them alive, but they look pretty bad right now.

We do have some other trees that have died over the past year and some trees that are at the end of their life cycle and will need to be taken down. All of the dead trees will be removed before the end of August. They have been inspected by a certified arborist and do not have oak wilt or any spreading disease. During extreme drought conditions, some of the weaker trees will succumb to any underlying problems. We have not lost any landmark trees (trees greater than 19" caliper).

What is the watering schedule for the Circle C Commons Areas? The commons areas are under the commercial watering ordinance for the City of Austin. This ordinance allows watering between the hours of 7 p.m. and 10 a.m. on Tuesday and Friday. As a large property, we are allowed to file a water variance plan with the City, which we have done. This allows us to water certain sections a Wednesday/Saturday or Sunday/Thursday schedule. Therefore, you may see water on in certain locations on any day of the week except Monday.

When is a variance granted for watering? The City of Austin allows us to submit a new landscape watering variance request which allows a 30 day period to water in new vegetation. It allows watering at all times during the first 10 days and then sequentially limits water over the next two 10 day periods until the normal watering schedule kicks in on the last day.

Why do we have large yellow spots in some locations? Our water system has 41 irrigation controllers, about 1500 sections of irrigation and about 10,000 heads. If you see a large section that suddenly yellows out, it is generally a valve that has stopped functioning. We do a check on the entire system one time per month, but a valve can malfunction at any time. We review the property on a daily basis and additionally check any section that looks like it is not coming on. Unfortunately, with such hot weather, that yellow look can come on overnight. The smaller spots are either places where the wind has blown the water away from its watering spot, or a head or nozzle that needs fine tuning. This time of year, we are checking everything daily and making corrections as soon as possible.

What is our water budget for the year, and are we able to work within it? The total water budget for the year is \$180,000. We have

100 acres of irrigated area, so the cost breaks down to \$1800.00 per acre per year, or \$150.00 per acre per month. Most Circle C lawns are less than .3 acres for comparison purposes.

As of June, we had spent \$56,615.00 on water and have \$123,384.00 remaining. We anticipate high water bills for July, August, and September. We have not gone over the water budget in the past five years.

What other watering rules are the commons areas subject to? The City of Austin can mandate or otherwise restrict outdoor irrigation watering. In July when the 54 inch line from the Ulrich Treatment Plant was drilled into by a contractor, the City mandated no outdoor water while they fixed it. Since we are on limited water, an event such as this can cause us to miss a water cycle. If the City determines that excessive water use is threatening the overall water system, they can move the Stage 2 provisions of the water conservation ordinance which limits or prohibits outdoor irrigation watering for commercial properties.

What steps are being taken to promote water conservation?

About five years ago, the CCHOA Board of Directors adopted the Green Community Landscape Model. This has served as a guidepost

for renovating the commons areas to environmentally sensitive water conservation oriented vegetation. All areas that are being renovated are required use drought tolerant sustainable plantings, limit turf area, and use a drought tolerant turf grass.

Improvements have been made to the irrigation system. On the long boulevards of LaCrosse West and Spruce Canyon, individual weather sensors have been installed on all of the irrigation controllers. These sensors calculate rain, temperature and solar radiation and automatically adjust the time settings on the controllers to provide the amount of water they are set for. They are sensitive enough to detect a short rain shower and figure it into the amount of water still needed for the area and provide an automatic adjustment. We are tracking the water use on these controllers and have found them to adjust water accurately, to shut the controllers off quickly during a rain and cut back their watering time if we do get rain. They will also automatically add a certain amount of additional water if conditions warrant.

We have also added a centralized computer based control system for water on Escarpment, Slaughter Lane and LaCrosse between MoPac and Escarpment. These areas have long water loops where water

pressure is an issue. The centralized system monitors the controllers and uses radio communications to reset or stop them if necessary. This system controls about 200 sections of sprinkler heads.

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Swim Center News

POOL MAINTENANCE UPDATE

The Circle C Swim Center recently underwent repairs to the sand filtration system for the main pool, which had begun to malfunction in May, leaving large amounts of sand in the competition pool. Swim Center Staff repaired the filters on June 28th and 29th by removing 10 tons of sand and repairing the broken filtration components "laterals" that allowed the sand to get into the pool. Once the laterals were repaired, 10 tons of new sand and gravel were placed into the filters and the pool was able to reopen on Tuesday June 30th. In addition, the pool sprayers, which cool the pool at night, had a break in the main line. Staff repaired the leak the same day allowing the pool cooling system to stay in operation keeping the pool cool during the hot days of summer.

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

- Friday, August 21st, 4 6 p.m. Open house will be held for students to come check out their new classrooms and chat with their new teachers.



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Circle C Ranch Cycling Club Sweeps Austin Commuter Challenge

During National Bike Month in May, the commuter team of Circle C Ranch Cycling Club (CCRCC) competed in the Bicycle Sport Shop's first annual Austin Commuter Challenge and won all three of Austin's Commuter Cups. CCRCC's commuter team was made up of Dave Dobbs, Steve James, Josh Quist, Ellie Robinson, Kennedy Robinson, Laurie Robinson, Wes Robinson, Bill Simons, Nick Sheen, and John Williams. Over the course of the month, CCRCC's

commuter team replaced 972 car trips with bike trips and logged 2,873 miles. More than 300 Austinites participated in the Challenge and collectively logged more than 8,487 trips and 36,000 miles by bike.

The Challenge was the brainchild of Chris Carter of the Bicycle Sport Shop and the goal was to inspire people to use their bikes for transportation. Forty-five percent of the car trips in the U.S. are within two miles of the home. Fifty percent of our workforce

lives within five miles of their place of employment. These car trips are the easiest to replace with a bike and do the most to reduce automobile emissions. In addition to the environmental benefits, more bike trips improve individual and societal health, reduce traffic congestion and preserve natural resources, thereby reducing transportation costs for everyone.

Circle C has some of the best bicycle infrastructure in the city. In addition to

the miles of bike lanes and multi-use paths, Circle C is very close to the Veloway and is home to many recreational and transportation cyclists. All of the businesses at Escarpment Village are easily reached by bike, as is the swimming pool and local elementary schools. When teaching bicycle safety classes, I commonly brag on how friendly and accommodating Circle C's motor vehicle drivers are to cyclists. Next time you need to make a trip to the pool, the grocery store, a local restaurant, or grab a coffee or ice cream, consider going by bike.



Park West HOA News

Emergency Vehicles on Park West Streets

Thanks go to Fran Greve, a member of the PWHOA Bylaws and Rules Committee, who gathered the following information while doing research about parking on our neighborhood streets and put it in writing for this column:

The firefighters from Station 43, our local station on Escarpment, made a community service call to Park West on Monday, June 29, and drove through the neighborhood in one of the fire trucks used to respond to emergencies. The purpose of the visit was to assess maneuverability for fire trucks and EMS equipment on Park West streets in the event they have to make a first responders call in our neighborhood. Lt. Josh Anderson and his fellow firefighters drove the neighborhood and made some suggestions for maintaining our streets to ensure that the first responders (fire and EMS) have quick access in case of an emergency. They expressed concerns about negotiating the curve on Tasajillo Trail in the approximate area of houses numbered 6408 - 6425 and 6501 - 6526 if there were cars

parked on the street. This area would be impassable if both sides were blocked. They also doubted they could make the turns directly out of our three cul-de-sacs if there were cars parked close to the intersection or directly across from the cul-de-sac street. (Note: A City of Austin ordinance mandates parking no closer than 20 feet from an intersection.) It may require several attempts at backing/ going forward/backing again to turn. The roundabout, at the bottom of the east side of Park West, is a similar situation; however, it is illegal to park in a roundabout. The fire trucks stationed on Escarpment are pump trucks. Pump trucks can range from 24 - 28 feet long, while ladder trucks can be between 35 - 50 feet in length. This makes it very difficult to maneuver in a small area. Equipment ranges from 7 feet to 10.5 feet wide. Since our streets are approximately 25 feet wide, if cars are parked on both sides of the street, the fire trucks and EMS equipment may not be able to pass. The following are a few suggestions for keeping our neighborhood streets safe:

- Park your car on the driveway or in the garage to lessen the obstructions emergency vehicles face in order to negotiate our streets.
- Whenever possible, don't park opposite another car on the street.
 Have guests space their parking so that there is adequate room for emergency vehicles to pass.
- Park at least 20 feet away from an intersection it's the law.
- Allow 15 feet on each side of a fire hydrant, whether or not the curb is painted. (Park West does not have painted curbs alerting us to the location of a fire hydrant.)
- Remember that emergency vehicles require a much larger turning radius than any car we drive. Park cars to allow for easy and quick egress from the cul-de-sacs.
- Do not park in the roundabout.
- Be particularly aware if parking on the curve on Tasajillo Trail since this presents a hazard for both visibility and maneuverability.

We are fortunate that we have a fire/EMS station in the Circle C Ranch community. By following some guidelines and a few laws regarding parking, we help the firefighters and EMS responders do their jobs in addition to making Park West safe for all our residents. Many thanks to the firefighters who made this community service call and to all emergency personnel for their dedication to our safety.

Landscaper News and Sprinkler Checks

Summer is here, and is it ever! With heat of 100 degrees plus beating down on our lawns every day, it's a wonder that, for the most part, they stay green. As long as we continue to water them on the schedule set by the City of Austin, they should continue to make it through the summer. However, many of our lawns and curb grass areas have parched sections in one or more spots. According to the landscaper, the reason could be a broken or malfunctioning sprinkler head causing the spraying water to miss or overshoot its mark. If you have parched areas on your lawn, please schedule a sprinkler check as soon as possible to see if this could be the problem. 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



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The "Four Awareness" Points When Playing Tennis

In past issues, I have written about how to choose proper tennis equipment and efficient ways to practice. This issue offers advice on how to tackle the "critical points" in your matches.

In every match, you will find critical points that can determine whether a player wins or losses. At these critical points, I suggest reviewing what I call the "four awareness" points:

FIRST AWARENESS: SELF

Every player possesses certain shots that they feel more comfortable hitting on a critical point. For example, it could be a forehand topspin, or a slice one. When choosing which shot to hit on a critical point, decisively utilize the shot that comes more naturally without changing your mind. That is when mistakes are made.

SECOND AWARENESS: OPPONENT

When the players decide on a shot at a critical point, they need to consider their opponent's strengths and weaknesses. During the match, they should notice the shots the opponent has less success with than others. On a critical point, players should use the shot they feel more comfortable with but also they will aim towards their opponent's weaknesses.

THIRD AWARENESS: COURT

Once you decide on your most consistent shot, consider the opponent's weakness, you also need to take into account the court conditions. Factors such as the sun, wind, and surface will make a difference on the shot executed. When in doubt, you should either choose a shot toward an opening on the court, or directly at your opponent's feet; open spaces or shoe laces.

FOURTH AWARENESS: SCORE

When you decide on your shot, the placement and being aware of the court challenges, a good player should also remember the score in hand. Players will be aggressive when the score is in their favor, and be more conservative when tied, or behind. For example, when a player is serving at 40-15, the serve should be a powerful and assertive. In contrast, if the score is 15-40, the player should serve the first serve with some power, but with more placement.

Over time, these four awareness points will become both automatic and reactionary as players become more experienced in playing and competing. After the shot has been properly executed, they will sometimes give themselves a pat on the back for doing the right thing at the right time, and remind themselves that they followed the "four awareness" points.

- All registration forms are due by July 31, 2009. There will be no on-site registration on the day of the cook-off. Judging will begin at 2pm with turn-ins at separate times. Cooks may begin set-up anytime on Friday, August 14th beginning at 6pm.
- 2. The team captain must be a Circle C resident. A barbeque team may have no more than 4 people per team.
- 3.Barbeque must be cooked from scratch on-site the day of (or night before) the cook-off. It must be prepared in the open at the team's booth site. No gas cooking allowed.
- 4.Teams are asked to prepare and cook food in as sanitary manner as possible. Cooking conditions are subject to inspection by the head judge. All food, equipment and utensils must be stored at least 6" off the floor on pallets,

- shelving or tables at all times.
- 5.Each team will be given one parking space at the back of the swim center. Spaces will be numbered and each team, upon registration, will be given a number. Appropriate themed decoration of your area and related costuming is encouraged, but please remember this is a family event.
- 6.Cooking will take place in the designated parking space area only. Cooks must provide their own materials to include: table, chairs, shade, cooking utensils & ingredients.
- 7. At the discretion of the head judge, cooks may be required to taste their own barbeque in front of a judge at any time during the event.
- 8. Firearms, explosives or other pyrotechnics will not be allowed on the premises.

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A Sensible Plan for College Funding

As a parent, you may feel a moral obligation to fund your children's education, but you don't want to sacrifice your current lifestyle or rob your future retirement in order to fund education costs. Well, to make funding both their education and your retirement a non-issue, you must consider how to:



- Maximize your cash flow so that you can invest funds in education and retirement accounts.
 This includes both reducing debt and lowering expenses.
- Utilize the numerous education tax incentives provided by the IRS to reduce taxes and produce so-called "tax scholarships" for your family.
- Qualify for merit and need-based financial aid offered by colleges

If you can maximize the benefits produced by the above strategies, you may not have to compromise your education and retirement goals. Historically, we see that college costs have risen at 2 to 3 times the inflation rate of the Consumer Price Index. And college really costs you more than you think because it is paid with after-tax dollars. Depending on which tax bracket you are in, the amount you must

earn to pay for college is a good deal more because you must first pay the IRS...before you pay the college.

How old will you be when your last child graduates from college? Assume that you are 45 years old and you plan to retire in 20 years and that a public college costs \$60,000 for 4 years. You take the money out of your retirement savings today. The money you give to a public college for four years will cost your retirement fund about \$280,000 at an 8% return. Elite colleges cost more, but there is a hidden benefit which we will get to later. And remember, these numbers are for just one child's college education.

Clearly this presents a funding dilemma shared by parents everywhere: how to fund college and retirement? Experts agree there are two methods to make this work:

The first method is by using your money through: (A) paying out of your current income, (B) paying with withdrawals from your savings accounts, or (C) borrowing. Most people use some combination of all three. The second method is to use money from others. This comes in the following forms: (A) financial aid, (B) by using special education tax strategies, (C) gifts from relatives, or (D) your child's resources (his/her income and assets). We will explore this topic in future columns, how to make a sensible, methodical plan for funding college expenses.



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
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Nature Watch - Webs of Intrigue by Jim and Lynne Weber

Spending summer days in the fields, woods, and even our own suburban gardens can yield many interesting sights, but few are more curious than that of the spider web. Formed out of protein-rich silk extruded from a spider's spinnerets (or silk-producing organs located at their abdomens), webs can take many forms, including spiral orbs, tangles, funnels, tubes, sheets, domes, and tents. While most spiders can use both sticky and fluffy silk to construct a web, they can also position the web horizontally or vertically or at any angle in between, depending on its specific purpose.

Web construction is unique and delicate process, with the spider using its own body for measurements. Starting with the most difficult part, the first thread, spiders use the wind (and a bit of luck) to carry it to an adhesive surface. Once caught, the spider will carefully walk over the thread while strengthening it with another thread, repeating this action until this primary thread is strong enough to support the finished web. Step two involves the process of making many radials, making sure that the distance between each radial is small enough to cross. Ergonomically speaking, this means that the number of radials in a web depends directly on the size of the spider and helps to determine the final size of the web.

Once the radials are complete, the spider will fortify the center of the web with several circular threads, and move outward, continuing a spiral of non-sticky, evenly-spaced threads made so the spider can easily move around its own web. Then, beginning from the outside edge and moving toward the center, it adds sticky spiral threads by utilizing the radials and non-sticky spirals as guidelines. Once again using its body as a measuring device, the spaces between each of the sticky spirals is directly proportional to the distance from the tips of its back legs to its spinnerets. After the sticky spirals are complete, the spider consumes the

non-sticky spirals as they are no longer needed, chews off the initial center spiral threads and sits and waits for prev.

Webs are literally extensions of a spider's ability to feel, and they allow them to catch their prey without having to expend the energy to run it down. Some spiders will decorate their webs with loose, irregular tangles of silk to disorient and knock down flying insects and to warn birds and other flying predators of the presence of the web. Constructing a web is energetically costly for a spider due to the large amount of protein required, so broken webs, especially if they are still structurally sound, are not always repaired. It is not uncommon, however, for spiders to eat their own web daily to recoup some of the energy used in spinning and recycle the protein by spinning a new web. Normally, a spider's web will remain in one location for the entire summer, but spiders can change locations usually early in the season, if they find a place with better protection or better hunting.

Commonly, webs are about twenty times larger than the spider building it. Rich in vitamin K, which can be effective in clotting blood, spider webs were used several hundred years ago as gause pads to stop an injured person's bleeding. Today, we know that the tensile strength of spider silk is greater that the same weight of steel and has a much improved elasticity. Research into its microstructure is being performed for potential and surprising applications such as bullet-proof vests and artificial tendons!

The next time you are out in your garden in the early morning hours and you come across a delicate spider web glistening with drops of dew like strings of tiny diamonds, appreciate what you are seeing for its natural beauty, strength, and purpose!


