Abbie is a very dedicated and amazing 11 year old. She is not one you see every day. Abbie is focused, down to earth, and a girl that is always willing to help anyone out anyway she can. She is a pure joy and a source of pride for our team and anyone that knows her. On Sunday, August 2, 2009 Abbie made a commitment to herself and working with our Coach Jason did the remarkable. I believe our Coach's words sum that up the best:

"Tonight at finals I do believe I had a grin on my face that was huge and would not go away. To prelude the evening let me start at the beginning. This morning Abbie did a wonderful job and dropped .3 seconds off her 50 meter free time for 30.20 seconds. In a 50 that kind of drop is very good and we were both happy and EXCITED to hear that she was seeded first going into the finals.

As we were walking down the stairs that evening at A&M to get her over to the blocks for her event we had a nice little chat. I had nothing to tell her about her strokes or how to swim her race as doing the 50 free is like blinking for that girl, it's natural and requires no thought. We talked about what she should do if she took a breath and saw people ahead of or close to her. I told her to use her breathing to find out her position in the race and to use that as fuel to push harder than she ever has before. After the start she came up not quite in first place. She took her first breath after 7 or so pulls and to the right side. She noticed that she did not have a commanding lead so her pace picked up a bit. Her next breath was to the left and that is when she saw someone out in front of her. It was right at that moment that the fire inside of Abbie lit up so brightly that everyone in the whole natatorium could not help but watch as she burned up the pool. After her second breath there was no stopping her and she stormed through that water like she owned it. She ended up finishing first place with a time of 29.25 (almost a full second faster than this morning) and

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


Neighborhood Crime Watch is a program of mutual assistance among neighbors aimed at reducing crime in the community at the grass roots level. It involves getting to know one's neighbors and introducing them to the concept of Neighborhood Crime Watch — that is good neighbors working together, alert to the potential of crime, and willing to look out for one another's interests. Neighbors working together through Neighborhood Crime Watch can combat crime in their area the most effective way — BEFORE IT STARTS!

Citizens offer an open invitation to criminals every day when they leave their doors unlocked, advertise their absence from home with an unlit house, piled up newspapers, or leave car keys in the ignition. Your home is your sanctuary and protecting this valuable asset is important to you, your family and your neighbors. Below is a checklist to use to determine if you have taken some of the necessary precautions to maintain a safe, secure home. An important factor in deterring crime is to not leave the door open to being a victim.

DOORS

Doors are the second highest point of entry for residential burglaries! Over 40% of home burglaries are termed by police as "no force" entries. In other words, doors or windows were left unlocked, allowing the burglar easy access to the home.

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Your Home, Your Asset - (Continued from Page 7)

- __All latch-strike plates on your exterior doors should be secured with at least 3" screws.
- __Exterior doors having glass within 3 feet of the lock should have double-cylinder deadbolts installed on them.
- __All your exterior doors without glass should have a wide-angle door-viewer installed for identifying visitors.
- All exterior doors should be constructed of solid wood.
- __Change the locks when you move into your home or apartment.
- __Always lock all your doors when you are home for the night or when you leave your residence.

EXTERIOR ENTRIES

Most burglars spend only 30 to 60 seconds attempting to gain entry into a home. This implies that the harder it is for a burglar to get into a home, the better chance that he will move on to an easier target.

- __All sheds or outbuildings should be secured with a quality, weatherproof padlock.
- __All valuables stored outside (ladders, motorcycles, etc.) should be secured to a fixed, immovable object.
- __Engrave your drivers license number into valuables.

__Keep ladders, tools or items that could be used to gain access to your home locked up and out of sight.

EXTERIOR LIGHTING

Main entryways to your residence should be well lit to allow for identification of visitors at your doors and to prevent loitering. 90% of all intruders will choose not to enter a residence that is well lit.

- All entrances should be illuminated well.
- __Floodlights or some other type of area illumination should cover all exterior sections of your home and property.
- __Use motion sensors to control your exterior lighting.

GARAGE DOORS

10% of all illegal entries are gained through a garage door.

- __If your overhead garage door is not equipped with an automatic opener, have good-quality padlocks installed on both sides of the door.
- __Your exterior main door and the door from the garage into your home should have quality deadbolts. Always use them.
- __Always close your overhead garage door, even when you are home.




