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Frequently Asked Questions

WHAT ARE THE RULES ON TRASH CONTAINERS AND RECYCLE CART STORAGE?

Trash containers and recycle carts are permitted to be at the curb only on your scheduled collection day. Trash containers and recycle carts are to be stored where not visible from the street at all other times.

ARE BASKETBALL GOALS ALLOWED IN CIRCLE C?

Permanently installed goals are not permitted in Circle C. The deed restrictions state that basketball goals are to be stored out of the view of neighbors when not in use. City of Austin code states that only motorized vehicles are allowed to be parked on public streets and all sidewalks must remain clear and open for pedestrians.

ARE CARS ALLOWED TO BE PARKED ON THE STREET?

The CCHOA does not have jurisdiction over the streets in Circle C; they are the responsibility of the City of Austin. Obviously inoperable vehicles may not be parked or left on public streets for more than 72 hours. Please call 974-8119 to report an abandoned or non-operating vehicle. Please call 311 to report illegally parked vehicles.

WHAT SHOULD I DO ABOUT BARKING DOGS AND STRAY ANIMALS?

Stray Animals may be picked up by animal control by calling 311. The City of Austin states it is unlawful for dogs to make frequent noise disturbing to persons in the neighborhood and violations should be reported to the City. You may also call the CCHOA office at 288-8663 with specific date and time for excessive barking. The staff will send a cooperative letter to the homeowner.

HOW DO I REPORT A STREET LIGHT OUTAGE?

Every light pole has an assigned number mounted on the pole. Jot down the number and call the City of Austin at 505-7617.

ARE BOATS, TRAILERS AND RECREATIONAL VEHICLES ALLOWED IN CIRCLE C?

The Deed Restrictions require that any vehicle or trailer other than a conventional automobile be stored, placed or parked in an area concealed from view of other Homeowners.

WHAT ARE THE RULES ON MAINTENANCE?

Homes are to be kept in a well-maintained, safe, clean and attractive condition at all times. Lawns and garden areas should be kept alive, free of weeds and attractive. Lawn mowing is required

on a regular basis. Trees and shrubs are to be pruned. Public right of way and sidewalks should be clear and unobstructed. Litter, trash, dead vegetation and debris should be promptly removed.

WHAT ARE THE RULES IN CIRCLE C ON WALKING WITH YOUR DOG OFF LEASH AND WHAT ABOUT PICKING UP AFTER YOUR DOG?

Both of these issues fall under the jurisdiction of the City of Austin. It is against CoA ordinance to have a dog off leash except on your private property. It is also a requirement by the City that dog owners pick up and properly dispose of their dog's feces. In this regard, we recommend dog walkers carry a plastic grocery bag or newspaper sleeve. Slide it on like a glove, pick up the offensive matter, pull the bag back over your hand, knot it and throw it in your trashcan when you return home. Please keep our landscaped commons areas beautiful and clean for the enjoyment of all.

DO I HAVE TO SUBMIT PLANS FOR IMPROVEMENTS AND/OR ADDITIONS TO MY HOME?

All improvements such as decks, patio covers, pools, change in fencing or any other permanent structure must be submitted to the Architectural Control Committee. You may download an application form as well as a fee schedule on our website at www.circlecranch. info under the "ACC" quick link section.

WHAT DO I NEED TO VISIT THE SWIM CENTER?

All residents must possess and show their swim center ID card to enter the facility. ID cards are available at the aquatic office. Contact 288-6057 for information on what is required to obtain an ID. Guests of Circle C residents must pay a \$3 entrance fee and sign a liability waiver before entering the facility. Children under 3 are free.

ARE DOOR TO DOOR SOLICITORS AND DOOR FLYERS ALLOWED IN CIRCLE C?

Both of these issues are governed by the City of Austin. By City ordinance, solicitors must abide by "No Soliciting" signs on private property. Some neighbors have had success in placing a small "No Soliciting" sign near the doorbell and/or a small staked sign near the front porch.

WHAT DO NEW TEXAS RESIDENTS NEED TO KNOW?

According to the Texas Department of Public Safety (www.txdps. state.tx.us) a new Texas resident is required by state law to obtain a Texas driver's license, get a Texas vehicle inspection and a vehicle title/registration within 30 days of moving to Texas to legally operate a vehicle.

Monthly Board of Directors Meeting

The Circle C Board of Directors meet monthly on the third Wednesday of the month at 7pm at the Circle C Child Development Center. Meetings are open to homeowners and if you wish to address the board, please contact the HOA office at 288-8663 to sign up for the Homeowners Forum (five (3) minute speaking slots at the start of the meeting).

HAVE YOU RECEIVED a Deed Restriction Notice?

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you

LAWN CLIPPINGS

The best thing you can do with your grass clippings is to blow or sweep them back onto your lawn so that they are recycled. The next best solution is to recycle them in the brown recycle bags available most everywhere that will be picked up every trash collection day. DO NOT blow, sweep, or leave your clippings in the street.

- This is a violation of City Code 6-5-12 which addresses pollution of our City's
- water supply and specifically mentions grass clippings as
- a pollutant. Grass clippings in the street
- are also unsightly.

WINTER HOURS

HEATING THE POOL EFFICIENTLY-

The Circle C Swim Center completed the installation of two new heaters for the competition pool. The new heaters are over 90% efficient compared with the heater that was replaced, which was 50% efficient. This means that with the new heater only 10% of the energy is lost to the environment compared to 50%. This would be similar to going from a car that gets 9 miles to the gallon to one that gets 17. So, keeping the pool heated to 81° will be significantly less expensive and we will be doing it in a much more environmentally friendly way.

HOT WATER-

The Circle C Swim Center has switched over to a tank less hot water system for the showers and sinks. This improvement is a much more efficient method of heating water, since it heats on demand

GET OUT THOSE HEDGE TRIMMERS

One of the big things we have recently noticed throughout all parts of the neighborhood is UNTIDY AND OVERGROWN SHRUBS. If you take five minutes to be aware of your evergreen vegetation, most of you will notice that the shrubs have either gotten really big, or they look like they could use a haircut in the worst way.

You can do a tidy up or light trimming at just about any time. If you are going to perform a significant cut back, late winter is the best time. For us, that usually means end of January to mid February.

GUIDELINES FOR YARDS IN CIRCLE C:

- a) You should be able to see at least 85% of your front windows after you trim back the shrubs
- b)Shrubs should be self contained, shaped and not overlapping on each other
- c) Sprouted ends that are waving in the wind should be gone
- d)Shrubs should be trimmed back so they aren't touching the house.

Trimming your shrubs regularly improves their health, and will make your home look much more desirable. For a complete guide to shrub trimming, you can access

RULES REMINDER

Oil and other vehicle fluid stains larger than one square foot caused by residents' or guests' vehicles parked in the street must be removed by the resident. In addition, oil stains on driveways are unsightly and can be seen by passersby; therefore, they should be removed as a part of routine driveway/Street Yard maintenance.

HELPING HANDS

Consider contacting your neighbors when you are expecting a pickup of donated items to organizations such as the Salvation Army, Disabled Veterans and St. Vincent de Paul. Some residents hesitate to call when they have just a few items, but if neighbors are aware of the pickup, items can be pooled for a larger donation – a win-win situation for both the donors and the charitable organization!

UPDATE ON RM 1826 & SLAUGHTER A Signal to be Installed in Early Spring Submitted by Valinda Bolton's office

It may not have been a seamlessly smooth process, but we definitely have an outcome that is better, less expensive and can be completed sooner than the proposed plan for a tunnel. The proposed tunnel's overall project costs increased more than expected when is was discovered that extra rightof-way was needed. Rep. Bolton asked TxDOT to go back to the drawing board and think outside the box.



The solution will incorporate a signal at RM 1826 and Slaughter along with a combination of advanced warning technologies to address the sightline problem posed by the hill south of the intersection. Without the advanced warning technology, TxDOT would not be able to install a signal at this location. It's critical that drivers be alerted to the possibility of stopped traffic once they crest the hill. Because of the short distance available to warn drivers about stopped traffic, the use of a signal at this location was dismissed at the beginning of the process. However, TxDOT investigated best practices in states that have lots of hills to find innovative solutions to apply at this intersection to increase safety and allow for a signal to be erected.

We've come up with a solution that meets the needs of the neighborhood and the school. Any time you have multiple, independent governmental sub-divisions working together - and

be a vocal advocate for their needs, AISD was a strong voice for our children's safety, TxDOT continued to work toward a safe solution that met the needs while complying with state/federal safety rules, and Travis County and the City of Austin have provided much needed resources to build sidewalks to complete the project.

25 Reasons For Playing Tennis

In the last two months, I listed from one to twenty-four reasons for playing tennis, written by a Tennis Professional who has encouraged us to share them with others. Here is reason number 25:

- 25. Tennis creates life situations which should be viewed by parents and coaches as *opportunities* ... which, if seized upon, can be used to teach <u>Character</u>..., or, *if ignored, these same life situations can teach undesirable behavior patterns and negative character traits.*
 - a. It can teach **Honesty** truthfulness, fairness and sincerity.... or *it can teach lying, cheating and gamesmanship.*

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Help Your Child Read Submitted by Wendy Wilbanks

Studies have shown and experts have emphasized time and again the importance of literacy in child development: The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends reading aloud to babies as young as six months. Carnegie Corporation research showed reading to infants and toddlers helps stimulate brain development. The National Early Literacy Panel reported that a child's background knowledge and understanding of the world represents a key building block for reading comprehension.

So what can we as parents do to nurture our children's literacy? Here are some tips for fostering a love of reading at different ages and stages:

INFANTS/TODDLERS

- Let your little one chew on the story literally! They don't differentiate between books and other toys.
- Keep it simple. Sometimes read the story, other times just point to the words that correspond with the pictures.
- Get ready to repeat. Youngsters love to hear the same story over and over again, and learn through repetition.

PRESCHOOL-AGE

• Just keep reading. At this age, it's normal for children's attention



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to wander. But the child who may not be actively listening still hears what you're reading.

- · Get attention with questions. Use open-ended questions about events in the story to engage the child: "What do you think might happen if the dinosaur came to our house?"
- Use rhyme to make time. Include the child in the reading process by choosing rhyming books in which the child can guess the next word from the pictures.
- · Give them tools. Have a variety of writing utensils, art supplies and letter magnets on-hand to help preschoolers develop prereading skills.

SCHOOL-AGE

- Listen up. Make sure your child is regularly reading aloud to you.
- Be a reading cheerleader! Support and encourage children as they read; leave the correcting to their teachers.
- Follow the finger. Run your fingers beneath the words as you read aloud to your child.
- Pick up on the pictures. Point out the pictures to help your child understand the meaning of the words.

- Provide pauses. Pause often while reading to let your child pose questions or offer comments about the story.
- Employ the echo effect. If reading is a real struggle, then read together by reading a line and letting your child repeat it.
- Team teach. Work together with your child's teacher to discuss reading concerns and address the best ways to help your child succeed.

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"A TRUE TEXAS INSPIRATION" Same Kind of Different as Me by Ron Hall and Denver Moore

At the core of Same Kind of Different as Me, a true story written by Ron Hall and Denver Moore, are the relationships that Ron and Denver have with each other, their friends, Ron's spouse and children, nature, the environment in which they were raised (especially Denver) and most importantly, God.

Denver, an illiterate and homeless African American man from Louisiana has suffered at the hands of many throughout his life but through it all become a true messenger for God. The book begins with Denver recounting his heartbreaking life—from the back breaking work of picking cotton to seeing the people he loved most in the world disappear. The book so graphically reveals the gut wrenching life of a boy who wants for almost nothing, but is treated terribly.

Ron is a self-made millionaire whose heart was open to being guided by God, at the hands of his wife Deborah. Deborah-a person so filled with faith-heard God speak to her and conveyed these very specific and detailed visions to Ron (including seeing Denver's face even though they had not met him yet) and together, they became an integral part of a community of homeless people in Forth Worth, Texas. And this is where Ron's and Denver's lives intersected and forever changed.

The writing is relatable and each personality (the book alternates between Ron's and Denver's voices) is clearly unique and endearing. For example Ron, who worked on this grandpa's farm during summers writes of the land, "...the land is miserable, cursed with soil that may well be the original inspiration for cement."

The book addresses a question that all of us have asked, "Why did God let that happen?" It challenges faith in a very personal way. The book also encourages each of us to believe that God has a purpose for us, even if it isn't clear at this moment.

Same Kind of Different as Me demonstrates that the human spirit is fragile while at the same time immensely strong. It shows how trust, prayer and unconditional love can bring out amazing change and a life long friendship.

The book ended with a wonderful reminder, "...everybody's different...We're all just regular folks walkin down the road God done set in front of us...this earth ain't no final restin' place. So in a way, we is all homeless-just workin our way toward home."

Tips for Teaching Children about Table Manners

Teaching your children table manners may sound old fashioned, but it never goes out of style. Having good manners shows your respect for other people, and it's more than saying "please" and "thank you." It's about helping your children develop habits and behaviors that will help them relate to adults and other children in a positive way. "To make your family mealtime time special and relaxing, slow down, sit and talk with your children and expect good behavior. You will be pleasantly surprised at how much easier and enjoyable it will become," said Dr. Mary Zurn, vice president of education for Primrose Schools. "This is important because children with good manners often find it easier



to make friends and get along with others at school and at home."

Dr. Zurn offers five table manners tips to get parents started:

1. Start early: Don't wait until you think your child is "old enough" to learn polite behavior. Just as children learn to crawl before they learn to walk, they also learn manners in stages. Even infants watch parents for rules of expected behavior. Very young children can learn to sign key phrases such as "please" or "thank you" and then transition to the spoken words around age two. By age three, children should be able to stay seated at mealtime if you sit down with them. 2. Give specific feedback: Children learn best when they receive specific feedback about their behavior which is far more effective than generic praise. For example, instead of saying, "Good job," you can say, "I'm so glad you set the table."

3. Encourage polite conversation: Children as young as two can learn to engage in polite conversation at the dinner table with the right kind of guidance. As you are at the table eating together, show them how to take turns listening, talking, and asking questions.

4. Set a good example: Make sure your words and actions match. Children watch parents all the time for

behavior clues. For example, if you want your child to eat broccoli because it's a healthy food choice, you will need to let them see you enjoy eating it as well.

5. Create a routine: Children learn best from consistency because it helps them know what to expect. Start with the repetition of a few simple steps such as putting a napkin in your lap when you sit down. Create a routine that is easy for them to repeat and remember. NATURE WATCH The Simple Beauty of Sparrows



Coming from the Anglo-Saxon word 'spearwa' and literally meaning 'flutterer', sparrows often conjure up images of the ubiquitous and non-native House sparrow and the House finch, which isn't a sparrow at all. While most sparrows are generally small to medium brown birds with streaks, the differences between sparrows can best be determined by their relative size, head markings, and habitat.

All sparrows have conical bills that they use to shell seeds, a primary component of their diet year-round, but especially so in the winter months. There is little difference between the males and the females in terms of appearance, but males are on average larger than females. As a group, most sparrows are birds of grasslands, prairies, and marshes, and seem

to prefer weedy fields and woodland edges in the winter. Of the sparrow species that migrate, none travel further than the southern United States or northern Mexico.

One of our most common winter sparrows is the Chipping sparrow. Small and slim, with a long notched tail, rusty cap, white stripe over the eye and a black line through the eye, this sparrow moves in loose flocks and frequently feeds in short grass and open woods. While still fairly abundant, this sparrow is declining in numbers, mainly

due to habitat destruction, and winters in the southern part of the United States. When first identified in 1810 by an American ornithologist, it was nicknamed 'the social sparrow' for it was easily approached and associated with human habitation.

A fairly large sparrow, the White-crowned sparrow is (Continued on Page 33)

distinguished by its black and white striped head, unmarked gray breast, and dark pink bill. It is found in large groups in thickets and weedy areas, foraging on the ground. Discovered in 1772 by a German naturalist, this sparrow was originally named the 'whiteeyebrowed bunting', for in the Old World, sparrows were usually called buntings.

Found in a variety of grassy habitats, and often in small flocks, is

the Savannah sparrow. Streaked on both their back and their breast, Savannah's have pink legs, yellow above the eye, a thin white median crown stripe, and a short notched tail. First described by a British ornithologist in 1790, it was called a 'sandwich bunting' due to the first specimens being collected from Sandwich Bay in the Aleutian Islands of Alaska.



Lincoln's sparrow is a mediumsized bird with a rather short tail, broad gray stripe above the eye, buffy moustache stripe,

and a buffy upper breast with crisp, blackish streaks. Found in winter in brushy edges of ponds and other moist areas, this sparrow was named by John James Audubon in 1833 after his research companion, Thomas Lincoln, shot the first specimen in Labrador.

Sparrows are gregarious and are



often our most hardy winter visitors. Adorned in various shades of brown, gray, black, and white, they reflect the subdued hues of a winter landscape. Often dismissed as 'little brown birds' when seen with the naked eye, these birds invite closer inspection and are nature's way of reminding us that subtle colors and patterns can be beautiful, too!
