



"Warm up for the Holidays" to residents












Around Steiner

Trails Update



Steiner. Ultimately this activity will only hurt the trail system and all residents. Cutting in the greenbelt is never allowed, and cutting in the Balcones Canyonlands Preserve (BCP) is a Federal offense. Common responses in the public trail system are to close the trails permanently (such as Forest Ridge in Austin). Rogue trails also cause erosion and other problems as reported in the September 2009 Ranch Record.

Don't cut up our trails - you can help plan new trails here! Your Trails Committee now has a volunteer who is looking into where new trails can be made within Steiner Ranch. Working with our developer Taylor Woodrow, we are exploring possible new routes. We invite



all residents who have an idea or a desire for a new trail to come work with us to make it happen. These are your trails and you pay for them. But no one wants to spend money to close and re-vegetate rogue trails; that simply wastes money. Contact your trails committee to get involved at 266-8498.

On the positive side, by now you have seen trail improvements and repairs which make our trail system safer. Two large downed oak trees were removed from the Headlands trail near Westridge

community. Also on Headlands, a very steep and slippery descent has been rerouted to include a gentler slope. This is right above the two wooden bridges near its intersection with the Majestic Oaks trail, and was an area where residents have slipped and fallen on the trail. Next, those nasty T-bar posts in the middle of several trails have been removed or pounded down. These posts are a legacy left by the first contractors who built some trails in Steiner Ranch, along with the now-eroded cedar "steps." These methods are not used by professional trail builders. And we are fortunate to have a professional trail builder on call to build our trails in a maintainable fashion, Talon Trails. Other repairs to the River Heights Overlook and Summer

Trails Update- (Continued from Page 12) Vista trails include reroutes around wet seeps and more erosion control.

The trails committee continues to design a system of labels for our trail sign posts. To get connected here and volunteer your design skills, contact the trails committee at 266-8498.

Is your favorite trail in need of repair or in need of better sign locations? If you see a problem on the trails, call the HOA at 266-7553 or visit http://www.steinerranchhoa. org under "Report A Problem." Be specific about the location on the trail, the problem you see, your ideas for a solution, and your contact information. If you see any rogue trail cutting or dangerous activity, including motorcycles anywhere on the trails or in the parks, take a picture and call the Travis County Sheriff West Command at (512) 854-9728 and the HOA. Remember, your trails are private and are for your use, and your accompanied guests' use only.

SPEEDING IN STEINER RANCH PLEASE SLOW DOWN!



GREETINGS STEINER RANCH FOLKS!

Lake Travis Fire Rescue has been busy serving Steiner Ranch and wants to thank your community for all the support and cookies we receive from you.

Fire calls have diminished in the Steiner Ranch community with all of the recent heavy rain and we want the positive trend to continue. So we want to prepare you for upcoming holiday dangers. First of all, Christmas trees are beautiful and festive, but inside your home they can be exceptionally dangerous. We really recommend that you consider an artificial tree, but if you must have a real tree, please follow these guidelines.

Number one, keep the tree watered. The drier the tree

becomes, the more flammable it becomes. The tree begins dying from the minute it is cut and keeping it watered is a key way to slow down the dying process.

Second, plan to place the tree in an area where you can egress your home without passing by the tree. Do not put the tree next to where you need to exit if the tree happens to catch on fire. Keep all candles and open flames far away from the tree. The tree can ignite rather easily and will become fully involved in a few seconds. Another good reminder is to cut off your Christmas lights when sleeping at night or when leaving your home.

Do not forget to be careful with fireplace and barbecue pit

ashes. We suggest disposing of the ashes in a sealed metal waste can. Let the ashes sit for four to five days before you put them in a regular trash can. We have had people place them in paper bags and set them on a wooden deck. This is a recipe for an undesired 2 a.m. surprise (please do not test our response times to your home)!

I also have to mention the idea of purchasing the new flameless candles. They are attractive and SAFE! Lastly, smoke detectors really do save lives!

Have a great winter and give us a call if we can help you with anything for you and your family's safety.

Last month we heard about how Bobby Steiner and his 2 brothers had a tutor while traveling with his family's rodeo business. Yes it was work but they made it fun too. Think about what it would have been like to been a traveling family in the 1960's and 1970's. And on top of that, you were traveling with a rodeo, which was as close to being a circus as it is possible to be. Buck and Tommy Steiner were rodeo producers. That meant that when they came to town they brought everybody they needed. They brought the rodeo band, the trick pony riders, an announcer, and an

emcee; all the animal loaders, truck drivers, tent-setters, cooks and clowns were also on the payroll.

Many venues weren't prepared for a rodeo. For these places the Steiners had to bring in much more equipment and perform a complete setup. For example, they would have to buy local dirt and bring it in, spreading it around the arena. They had to bring their own chutes and pens, and all their own lights and sound systems. When they were done, down came the tents and the dirt had to be sold off. It was a lot like a circus

but with a lot more dirt.

For short trips from Austin or from some other city, the family traveled by car. The animal handlers drove their trucks and trailers with many of the rodeo bulls and horses in the trailers. A typical all-day drive to the next rodeo needed only stops for food and water for people and for the stock. But for longer trips the Steiners took an airplane and the rest of the rodeo followed on the ground. Timing these trips required quite a bit of planning. And sometimes they had two complete crews in transit: one for the current rodeo and some in transit for the following rodeo.

Now if you're a kid on the road with your parents, who are you going to play with besides your siblings? In those days the people who traveled with the rodeo mostly went solo, leaving their families behind. There was one employee who worked the rodeo and brought his family, and that was the radio announcer. But for the most part the Steiners were the exception to the rule, being both competitors and producers who traveled with their families to most all of the rodeos. So the Steiner kids learned to enjoy the company of the cowboys, the rodeo clowns and the other performers. Source: Interview with Bobby Steiner. 



Bulletin Board Posting Policy

Due to the small sizes of the community bulletin boards and the large numbers of residents wanting to post notices, the Boards of Directors for Steiner Ranch have adopted the following restrictions for the bulletin board postings:

- 1. Bulletin boards are for resident postings only. Association notices have first priority.
- 2. Notices are posted every Friday and will remain on the board for two (2) weeks. Notices must be submitted by 5:00pm on Thursday.
- 3. Notices may not be larger than 5"x 7".
- 4. Association notices are exempt from time and space restrictions.
- 5. Notices must include either a Steiner Ranch subdivision name OR a Steiner Ranch telephone number.
- 6. Commercial (for-profit) postings by adults are not permitted. (These include, but are not limited to, offers for in-home childcare, nannies, cleaning service, scrapbooking service, piano lessons, pet care, etc.)
- 7. Commercial (for-profit) postings for youth (under 18 years) are permitted. Youth postings may be placed on the boards for no more than one (1) month per calendar year.
- 8. All postings are approved at the Association Staff's discretion.

ARCHITECTURAL GUIDELINES Solar Panel Requirements

All solar panels must be submitted to the Architectural Committee and reviewed for approval, based on design and location, but at a minimum must meet the following requirements:

- The glass, frame, flashing, and other solar panel collector materials must blend with the roof.
- All meters, disconnects, conduits, and other appurtenances must be painted to blend with the exterior of the house where attached
- Solar panels must not overhang the edge of the roof
- Location of panels, meters, disconnects, conduits, and other appurtenances must be submitted to the committee for review
- Solar panels should be located on an interior roof side, or rear facing roof side, when not abutting a street.

Semi-annual assessments for January - June 2010 are due on January 1, 2010. Statements will be mailed to each homeowner at the mailing address on file in mid-December. If you do not receive a statement, please contact the Community Associations Office at 512-266-7553. You are not exempt from paying assessments or late fees even if you do not receive a statement. Payments received after January 31, 2010 for any reason are subject to an initial \$40.00 late fee per association and a \$15.00 late fee for each additional month that the assessment remains unpaid. Please note that the assessment must be received by January 31st, not simply postmarked by January 31st. Your escrow account does not pay your assessments.

Online Assessment payments can be made at www.steinerranchhoa.org, by clicking on the "Online Assessment Payments" tab. There is an additional fee* for using this option and you must have your billing statement with you at the time of payment. Credit Cards and "pay by check" are accepted.

You can still mail in your payments at the address listed on your statement, or bring them to the Association office at 12550 Country Trails Lane to avoid the Online fee.

Holiday decorations (excluding Christmas) may be put out up to fourteen (14) days in advance of the holiday in question. Decoration must be removed no later than seven (7) days after the holiday. Christmas decorations may be put out beginning November 1st and must be removed by January 15th.

Vandegrift High School "How Tough Am I" Swim-A-Thon



NATURE WATCH

The Simple Beauty of Sparrows

Coming from the Anglo-Saxon word 'spearwa' and literally meaning 'flutterer', sparrows often conjure up images of the ubiquitous and non-native House sparrow and the House finch, which isn't a sparrow at all. While most sparrows are generally small to medium brown birds with streaks, the differences between sparrows can best be determined by their relative size, head markings, and habitat.

All sparrows have conical bills that they use to shell seeds, a primary component of their diet year-round, but especially so in the winter months. There is little difference between the males and the females in terms of appearance, but males are on average larger than females. As a group, most sparrows are birds of grasslands, prairies, and marshes, and seem to prefer weedy fields and woodland edges in the winter. Of the sparrow species that migrate, none travel further than the southern United States or northern Mexico.

One of our most common winter sparrows is the Chipping sparrow. Small and slim, with a long notched tail, rusty cap, white stripe over the eye and a black line through the eye, this sparrow moves in loose flocks and frequently feeds in short grass and open woods. While still fairly abundant, this sparrow is declining in numbers, mainly due to habitat destruction, and winters in the southern part of the United States. When first identified in 1810 by an American ornithologist, it was nicknamed 'the social sparrow' for it was easily approached and associated with human habitation.



A fairly large sparrow, the White-crowned sparrow is distinguished by its black and white striped head, unmarked gray breast, and dark pink bill. It is found in large groups in thickets and weedy areas, foraging on the ground. Discovered in 1772 by a German naturalist, this sparrow was originally named the 'white-eyebrowed bunting', for in the Old World, sparrows were usually called buntings.

Found in a variety of grassy habitats, and often in small flocks, is

the Savannah sparrow. Streaked on both their back and their breast, Savannah's have pink legs, yellow above the eye, a thin white median crown stripe, and a short notched tail. First described by a British ornithologist in 1790, it was called a 'sandwich bunting' due to the first specimens being collected from Sandwich Bay in the Aleutian Islands of Alaska.

Lincoln's sparrow is a mediumsized bird with a rather short tail, broad gray stripe above the eye,



buffy moustache stripe, and a buffy upper breast with crisp, blackish streaks. Found in winter in brushy edges of ponds and other moist areas, this sparrow was named by John James Audubon in 1833 after his research companion, Thomas Lincoln, shot the first specimen in Labrador.



Sparrows are gregarious and are often our most hardy winter visitors. Adorned in various shades of brown, gray, black, and white, they reflect the subdued hues of a winter landscape. Often dismissed as 'little brown birds' when seen with the naked eye, these birds invite closer inspection and are nature's way of reminding us that subtle colors and patterns can be beautiful, too!



Top 6 mistakes parents make when naming a guardian for their children

Choosing who will take care of your kids and legally documenting your decisions is estate planning—it's your backup, your Plan B.... if you have kids, you need it.

The most common mistake parents make when naming a guardian for their children is procrastinating. You will NEVER be able to name the perfect person to take your place as guardian of your minor children---only you as the parents are the perfect people. Your goal should be to at least make a B. If you procrastinate and never get a plan in order in the event of a tragedy you have an F.

People make other common mistakes when naming a guardian for their children. Here is a list of the top 6:

- 1. Named a couple to act as guardians when you don't really want both people in the couple and you have not indicated what should happen if the couple broke up or one of the partners in the couple died.
- 2. Not named enough alternates to serve if your first choice could not serve.
- 3. Failed to exclude someone you do not want to serve or who may challenge your decision.
- 4. Considered financial resources when deciding who should raise your children. Your guardians do not have to also be financial decision makers for your kids. They should be the people who will make the best health care, education, housing, discipline and care decisions for your kids. It's your responsibility to leave enough

money behind to take care of your kids either through savings or life insurance and you can name someone other than your guardians to take care of that money if the best choice guardians are not "good with money" people.

5. Only named long-term care guardians and did not make any arrangements for the immediate term if you were in an accident. The last thing any parent wants for their child to end up at child protective services. But, if you are in an accident and no plan is in place to locate the person who is legally able to take control of your children and the legal documents authorizing such, this nightmare could become your children's reality. If your named guardian does not live near you, it is imperative that you name

a temporary guardian who lives within 20 minutes of your home. It is also imperative that you have a plan in place so that the police department is capable of knowing who your temporary guardian is and is able to contact them at any time.

6. Placed your guardianship instruction inside your will and then protected your will in your safe deposit box, fireproof safe or some other 'secret' location. If your documents are under lock and key or if the proper people don't know how to get access to them immediately and from any location, how is your PLAN B going to actually be implemented? Actually preparing the legal guardianship documents is only the first step. How will the police know you have designated a temporary guardian? How will your babysitter know? While this is being sorted out, your children are being shipped off to foster care. Smart parents think about these things in advance and have an emergency plan that can actually be implemented.

I.WARM UP AND DRINK PLENTY OF WATER.


A proper warm-up is critical in morning, take because cold temperatures can make your muscles tight and therefore more prone to injuries.



Staying Healthy During Your Holiday Travels

FLEETHE FLU

Some experts say it's a myth that the recirculated air on airplanes spreads colds and other maladies. But it's not a myth that you need to protect yourself from the germs spread by folks sniffling and sneezing around you, especially with double threat of the seasonal flu and H1N1, or swine flu, ready to pounce.

What can you do?

- Fill 'er up with regular: Get the regular flu shot. Now. If you don't have time to see a doctor or stop by a pharmacy or grocery store flu clinic, there are flu-shot kiosks in many airports, and even some bus and train stations.
- Get some sleep: Plan on a good night's rest before you travel and try to eat right and exercise when on the road. Experts say lack of sleep and the stress of travel contribute more to getting sick than that icky airplane air.

- Wash your hands: A lot. Ignore the stares and use sanitary wipes on your airplane armrests and tray table. At the hotel, wipe down telephone, the TV remote control and other germy surfaces.
- Research swine flu: Find out if you're in the target group for the H1N1 vaccine. If so, find out when and where you can get the shot
- **Stay home:** If you get sick, don't go to the airport. And although it won't help you if you decide not to travel, this may be the season to explore travel or trip-cancellation insurance. You know just in case.
- Wear a mask. Seriously, many people think masks are ineffective; but I'd rather take that precaution and maybe look a little foolish than get the flu bug.

WATCH WHAT YOU DRINK

While it's a good idea to stay hydrated, you may reconsider what you drink, or

decline to drink, on an airplane. Five years ago, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) tested the tap water served to airline passengers. In late 2004, the water on nearly 20 percent of the airplanes tested fell below EPA standards and had unacceptable, and in some cases dangerous, levels of bacteria. Since then, many airlines have been voluntarily monitoring their tap water and reporting back to agency, but last week it issued rules that spell out exactly how often airlines must clean and disinfect airplane water systems and test for coliform bacteria.

Airlines have up to two years to comply with those rules, so in the meantime, it's a good idea to:

• **BYOB** — **of water:** Buy a bottle once you pass through security or bring an empty bottle from home and fill it up at a post-security water fountain.



- **Drink from the bottle:** When on the plane, drink soda, juice or water you see being poured from a bottle. And skip the coffee and tea: the water temperature used to brew coffee or heat water for tea usually doesn't get high enough to kill germs.
- **Don't drink in the bathroom:** Don't drink the lavatory water, and think twice about using it to brush your teeth.
- Avoid caffeinated drinks and alcohol. Nothing causes dehydration faster than the combination of caffeine or alcohol and the dried-out air on an airplane. Stick to water and non-carbonated beverages to stay hydrated.
- **Take your vitamins.** Take plenty of Vitamin C. Many travelers I know use Emergen-C, which is a powerful powder that you can mix with water. It's packed with vitamin C and bioflavanoids.

Following all the above tips may keep you well during your next airplane flight. Hopefully when you reach your destination, you will be well enough to enjoy your destination, instead of being confined to your hotel room with an unwanted illness.

Remember, whenever you travel and wherever you go, just sit back and Enjoy the Journey!

Tips for Teaching Children about Table Manners Submitted by Rebecca Beavers

Teaching your children table manners may sound old fashioned, but it never goes out of style. Having good manners shows your respect for other people, and it's more than saying "please" and "thank you." It's about helping your children develop habits and behaviors that will help them relate to adults and other children in a positive way. "To make your family mealtime time special and relaxing, slow down, sit and talk with your children and expect good behavior. You will be pleasantly surprised at how much easier and enjoyable it will become," said Dr. Mary Zurn, vice president of education for Primrose Schools. "This is important because children with good manners often find it easier to make friends and get along with others at school and at home."

Dr. Zurn offers five table manners tips to get parents started:

1. Start early: Don't wait until you think your child is "old enough" to learn polite behavior. Just as children learn to crawl before they learn to walk, they also learn manners in stages. Even infants watch parents for rules of expected behavior. Very young children can learn to sign key phrases such as "please" or "thank you" and then transition to the spoken words around age two. By age three, children should be able to stay seated at mealtime if you sit down with them.

- 2. Give specific feedback: Children learn best when they receive specific feedback about their behavior which is far more effective than generic praise. For example, instead of saying, "Good job," you can say, "I'm so glad you set the table."
- 3. Encourage polite conversation: Children as young as two can learn to engage in polite conversation at the dinner table with the right kind of guidance. As you are at the table eating together, show them how to take turns listening, talking, and asking questions.
- 4. Set a good example: Make sure your words and actions match. Children watch parents all the time for behavior clues. For example, if you want your child to eat broccoli because it's a healthy food choice, you will need to let them see you enjoy eating it as well.
- 5. Create a routine: Children learn best from consistency because it helps them know what to expect. Start with the repetition of a few simple steps such as putting a napkin in your lap when you sit down. Create a routine that is easy for them to repeat and remember. 

Same Kind of Different as Me by Ron Hall and Denver Moore

At the core of Same Kind of Different as Me, a true story written by Ron Hall and Denver Moore, are the relationships that Ron and Denver have with each other, their friends, Ron's spouse and children, nature, the environment in which they were raised (especially Denver) and most importantly, God.

Same Kind of Different as Me demonstrates that the human spirit is fragile while at the same time immensely strong. It shows how trust, prayer and unconditional love can bring out amazing change and a life long friendship.

The book ended with a wonderful reminder, "...everybody's different...We're all just regular folks walkin down the road God done set in front of us...this earth ain't no final restin' place. So in a way, we is all homeless—just workin our way toward home."

AUSTIN CURRENTS Recharge Zone

"Now Entering the Edwards Aquifer Recharge Zone." How many times have you seen those signs? Have you ever wondered what they mean? It turns out that we live on the edge of a vast artesian groundwater system. The Edwards Aquifer is an underground layer of porous, honeycombed, water-bearing rock that is between 300-700 feet thick. It is made of rock called the Edwards limestone and the water is contained by other limestones. Yes, it's big: the aquifer forms a 160 mile arch-shaped curve from Brackettville in the west to near Kyle in the northeast, and is between five and 40 miles wide at the surface.


The recharge zone is a 1,250 square mile area where highly faulted and fractured Edwards limestones outcrop at the land surface, allowing large quantities of water to flow into the Aquifer. For this reason, the Edwards is often called a fault-zone aquifer. About 75-80% of recharge occurs when streams and rivers cross the permeable formation and go underground. The rest enters when precipitation falls directly on the outcrop. Medina Lake is a surface water reservoir built partly on the recharge zone and it contributes large amounts

of water to the Aquifer. Recent findings suggest that up to 10% of the total recharge water enters the Edwards from the Trinity aquifer. Most of the annual average recharge of about 724,000 acre feet (for the period 1934-2008) occurs in the western counties of Medina and Uvalde, where the Edwards outcrop is very wide at the surface. But rainfall is highly variable and so recharge amounts also vary widely from year to year

A little-known fact is that some local features such as Barton Springs and San Felipe Springs are part of the Barton Springs segment, which is a different segment of the aquifer than the San Antonio segment. While part of the same aquifer system, their waters do not mix. The Barton Springs segment extends from south Austin to Kyle. The San Antonio segment is where much of the use by humans takes place, where most of the major natural springs occur, and where the water use issues are most hotly-debated.
