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HOA Board Meeting Recap

The November meeting of the Silverlake HOA was held on Tuesday, November 24, 2009 at the Silverlake Clubhouse on Southwyck Parkway. It was great to see a number of residents at this month's meeting. Here's a recap of items that were discussed:

GENERAL ANNOUNCEMENTS:

The board reminded everyone of the upcoming Neighborhood elections that were to be held on Tuesday, December 1, 2009. The residents were informed that not all of the neighborhoods in Silverlake had homeowners running for neighborhood positions and that unless a person interested in running were found, that neighborhood would not have a representative. There is a quorum requirement of 10% of the homeowners in the individual neighborhoods needed to elect a representative; if the neighborhoods fail to meet quorum on December 1, 2009, the board will convene a meeting immediately following the elections to vote in new representatives based upon those people present.

NEIGHBORHOOD REPS:

The neighborhood reps were asked to present problems or concerns within their specific neighborhoods that needed to be addressed by the board. In response to a problem that was brought up by the Weatherford representative last month, MUD 6 has stepped up to start work on needed sidewalk repairs in that neighborhood. Regarding the mail box issues, the board has now got a good contact at the post office regarding mailbox replacements. Finally, power washing of the selected brick perimeter walls and the neighborhood monuments has been completed. The affected neighborhood reps expressed their thanks for a job well done. The board will be power washing the remaining perimeter brick walls over the next year.

FINANCIAL ACTIVITY:

The board has approved the 2010 budget, a copy of which is available on the website at www.silverlakehoa.com. In addition, the board will be contacting the independent auditor to request that the audit be moved towards the beginning of the year. Finally, based upon a preliminary review of the reserve study that was done for Silverlake, The Gardens, and The Estates at Lake Pointe, the board approved the transfer of \$800,000 of operating funds to reserve.

RESIDENTS:

With the current economy, we've all noticed that Silverlake and the surrounding HOAs has become a target for break-ins. A resident voiced their concerns over solicitors in the neighborhood and what we can do about them. The board has started looking into the situation and will keep you informed. In the meantime, if a solicitor makes you uncomfortable, please consider calling the Brazoria County Sheriff's Office, they will respond to your call and will gather the personal information of those solicitors.

Another resident brought up the Immediate Response Information System "IRIS". This system will be used by the MUDs to inform the residents in Silverlake, Silvercreek and Southwyck about emergency alerts such as water issues, hurricanes, etc. The HOAs will also be able to use the system for general announcements and other items of importance within the HOA. As of now MUD 6 has approved the purchase of the system; MUD 3 will also be approving the purchase. The IRIS system will be a great benefit to our community. Those of you that are in the MUD 2 district, which is made of up Waterbury, Cambridge Cove, Lake Pointe, The Gardens, Parkside and Meadowview, we urge you to contact your board members and let them know you want this system.

Final note, the December 2009 Board meeting will not be held due to the upcoming holidays, however please remember, all monthly board meetings are open to residents. Drop on by, meet your neighborhoods and take part in making Silverlake a great place to live!

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2010 – The Year of Getting Fit

For many people, fitness resolutions will be made, equipment and gym memberships purchased, and diets started. How will you make your resolutions turn into your fitness SOLUTION? Look to the 3 E's: Education, Eating and Exercise.

EDUCATION: For my clients, I try to work on the Law of Conservation (I know, icky science stuff but very important). Simply put, "matter is neither created nor

destroyed". Each pound equals 3500 calories. In order to lose 1 pound, you will need to either decrease your eating or increase your activity levels. You can't get around this, it is the law. So if you are looking to lose 1, 10, 50 or more pounds, you need to have a plan.

EATING: 80% of losing weight can be attributed to dieting according to one of the largest metastudies conducted. Simply put, eating an extra slice of pizza (300 plus calories!) can ruin all the work of a good workout. Eating healthy means first, eat the right portions. Second, eat the right foods (more veggies and less sodas!).



All those diet books out there work, at least to some segment of the population but they all work on a reduced caloric intake – there's that law again!

EXERCISE: This is where people spend the most money and have the worst results. Typically they buy the expensive machine and the latest gear or join the gym; then, the treadmill becomes a clothes hanger and the gym continues to charge your credit

card each month. Exercise should be fun but it should also be challenging. Make it a part of your life and not something that you feel forced to do.

Lastly, create a goal and stick with it. Think about how happy you will be achieving your goal and focus your energies on the steps to get there. Focus your energies on the 3 E's and you will be well on your way to achieving your goals.

HEALTH BRIEFS Baylor College of Medicine

DON'T LOSE SLEEP OVER NIGHTTIME BED WETTING

Giving children control over bed wetting helps them overcome not only the nighttime nuisance but also the stigma of it, say doctors at Baylor College of Medicine.

"Because studies have yet to identify the cause of nighttime bed wetting, no one treatment is guaranteed to work for everyone. Nevertheless, the course of action with which the child is most comfortable tends to produce the best outcome," said Dr. Edmond T. Gonzales, Jr., professor of urology at BCM. "With parents' support, giving children an active role in treatment builds confidence."

Some of the treatment options include prescription medications. One commonly used medicine makes the body react as if dehydrated so the kidneys retain liquids overnight. Another treatment involves an alarm system worn in pajamas that sounds when it becomes wet.

More commonly, doctors suggest parents limit the amount of liquids children drink in the evening and schedule a bathroom break before bed. Gonzales said family doctors can help rule out any major health problems that could be contributing to bed wetting before discussing the many options.



CELL PHONE USAGE MAY SEND WRONG MESSAGE

If you roll your eyes when people are chatting away on their cell phones in a public place, you're not alone. According to an expert at Baylor College of Medicine, public cell phone use may show disrespect and impede social interaction.

"Depending on the situation, cell phone use can be problematic," said Dr. Catherine Barber, assistant professor in the Menninger department of psychiatry and behavioral sciences at BCM. Talking on your cell phone at social events conveys that other people's time is not as important as yours. Loud cell phone talk can intrude on others' privacy and need for quiet, and it can even make people feel uncomfortable.

Romero suggests talking quitely if you must use the phone, or excusing yourself to take a call and making it brief. She suggests not accepting non-urgent calls. It's important to be mindful and respectful of others around you, said Romero.If someone around you is disturbing you with their cell phone conversation, Romero suggests gently approaching them and asking them to reduce their volume. It's important to convey that you are not angry. If they refuse, remove yourself from the situation.

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

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


