#### **HOA Voter Turnout**

Voter turnout at our Annual HOA meeting held in March each year has been very poor over the past few years. Voting in the board elections is a way for all residents to play a role in the success of our Circle C community.

For the past few years, volunteers have had to spend the first part of the scheduled meeting making phone calls or visiting friends or neighbors to get them to complete their ballots in order to get enough votes to meet the meeting quorum requirements defined in our organization's bylaws. It takes less than a minute to fill out a ballot. This year it will be on the back of your first assessment which you will receive in February. Please take a little time to research the candidates and vote. If you do not have time to research the candidates, you can name a proxy. You need to make sure that the person you name as your proxy will be voting. All ballots/proxies that are submitted count towards the 10% quorum requirement so you do not have to attend the meeting to be counted.

Be an active community resident and attend the annual meeting. Come introduce yourself to the board, the manager and your neighbors and find a wealth of information about your community!

#### HOA ASSESSMENT

Our Circle C Homeowners Association (CCHOA) assessment is based on the value of each home, as reported by the Travis County Central Appraisal District (TCAD). CCHOA is allowed to collect twenty-five cents for each \$100 of valuation, according to our CCHOA Declarations.

The board may a lower assessments, which they have done by establishing a "cap" on the maximum assessment (Article III Assessment, Section 3). In 2010, homes valued over \$199,200 will pay the maximum assessment of \$498 per year. The cap is approved by the board of directors, when they vote on the new budget each year. It was raised 5% this year. This increase helps to compensate for the declining growth (number of new lots) in the HOA and the rising costs for our HOA operations, staffing, supplies and services.

Someone always asks, "Why are our dues going up?"

When our new Swim Center comes on-line in 2011, our overall pool budget will probably double. By raising the "cap" on assessments at a modest annual rate now, we should have enough income to cover those new expenses, without any sharp increase in the assessments or the need to pass a Special Assessment.

For more details, please look for the Annual Report in the next Newsletter (March), which also includes our Income/Expense Report and the budget for 2010.

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
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

# Have You Received A Deed Restriction Notice?

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you to bring your home into compliance. 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#### **Safety Awareness**

Unfortunately some of you have been victim of vandalism and/or theft this past year so we wanted to ask everyone to be as proactive as possible to deter crime in Circle C. The City of Austin Police Department has these suggestions for deterring vandalism and theft from your property:

#### 1. INSTALL A DEADBOLT LOCK.

Deadbolts are usually locked with a key from the outside and a thumb turn on the inside. The cylinder should be pick resistant. Lock your doors every time you leave the house, even if you're leaving for just a few minutes during the day. The most popular times for residential burglaries are weekday daylight hours. In over 1/3 of burglaries, there is no forcible entry--someone forgot to lock the doors.

#### 2. INSTALL SOLID DOORS.

Outside doors should be metal or solid hardwood and at least 1 3/4 inches thick. Frames must be made of equally strong material and each door must fit its frame securely.

#### 3. KEEP GARAGE DOORS CLOSED AND LOCKED.

#### 4. SECURE SLIDING DOORS AND WINDOWS.

Cut a broom handle to the length of the bottom track so that the

window or door will not slide open when forced. Also, drill one hole through both casings and sliding window and insert a nail or pin.

#### 5. SECURE SASH WINDOWS.

To prevent wooden sash windows from being pried open, drill a downward sloping hole into the top of the bottom window through and into the bottom of the top window and insert a pin or nail. To prevent aluminum sash windows from being broken into, purchase a track lock that blocks the window track.

#### 6. MARK YOUR PROPERTY.

Mark your valuables with an engraver. Marking your property serves as a deterrent to would-be burglars and it helps police in identifying and returning stolen property. Make a property identification list. Put warning stickers on doors and windows.

#### 7. PURCHASE A BURGLAR ALARM.

A home alarm system can be a very effective burglary deterrent and fit into many people's needs. Remember to test your system monthly.

#### 8. LEAVE A LIGHT ON.

When leaving on trips, leave a light on in the bathroom. In the

bedroom, attach a lamp and radio to a 24-hour electric timer set to go on at dusk and off at your bedtime. Close bedroom drapes or blinds.

#### 9. USE PROPER EXTERIOR LIGHTING.

Place a light over every door. Double cones lights on each corner of the house will also light up windows.

#### 10. WORK TOGETHER WITH YOUR NEIGHBORS.

When you are going to be away, tell trusted neighbors and ask them to watch your property. Have neighbors maintain your yard. When on vacation, have someone cut grass. Shrubbery should not hide neighbors' view of windows or doors. Have someone pick up newspapers and mail. Tell neighbors to call police if they notice anything suspicious.

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#### ASSOCIATION DOCUMENTS

Open to Owners

Have you lost your copy of the bylaws? Would you like to read minutes from past board meetings? Would you like to read a resolution for background information on an association policy?

Some of these documents can be found on our association website. However, these and other association documents are available to all members for review; owners have the right to inspect them, and the association is happy to make them available. However, we ask that you follow a few standard procedures so we can serve you efficiently.

First, submit a written request to the manager stating which documents you wish to read. Submit your request several days before you need the documents. We may need extra time to locate older documents if they're in storage.


Before submitting a request, get a clear understanding of what you are looking for and why. Be specific. A request for "documents relating to the capital improvement project" is too broad. Instead, request "vendor contract and blueprints for the capital improvement project undertaken last year."

Your request will be filled as soon as possible, usually within five business days. You will be contacted to set up a time during normal business hours when the documents may be viewed. You can view original documents at no charge. If you want copies of pages from the original documents, make a list or mark the pages you want with a paper clip or sticky note. You will be charged per page for copying. You may also have copies of documents mailed to you and be billed per page for copying and mailing.

Some association records are confidential. Requests for sensitive information, such as personnel files, owners' ledgers or legal files, will be denied. This protects the association and you from liability.

While viewing original documents, do not remove anything and keep pages in the same order as presented.

If you have any questions or need further information, please call the manager or send an e-mail to the association. We're here to help.





#### **Graffiti**

We've had several incidents of graffiti in the neighborhood recently including at the HOA office, bollard lighting along Escarpment and various utility boxes and signs. The association monitors and immediately removes graffiti from common areas and encourages you to do the same with your property. There has also been significant vandalism at the Circle C Metropolitan Park Soccer Field area which included damage to: the buildings in the concession area, fence, new mower, PVC goals, trash containers, bulletin board and fields. If you happen to see someone defacing property, don't try to stop it yourself. Call 911 immediately and report a vandalism in progress. Make a mental note of as many details as possible about

the perpetrators—how many, what age, male or female, distinctive clothing—that will help police. If you have any information on vandalism that has already occurred, please contact the Austin Police Department at 974-8100

#### Circle C Landscape

As I am writing this, we have just endured the coldest weather of the last several years, with a couple of low temperature nights down into the teens. I have to say, the 2009-2010 weather has been a bit challenging.

The great side is that we have caught up on rainfall and are officially out of the drought for the time being. Also, it is great for the vegetation to become completely dormant for the winter months, something that sometimes does not happen due to our mild winters. The other added benefit is that cold weather eliminates fleas and ticks, so your pets will be happy!

Over the winter we do a lot of landscape work, in order to make sure that everything grows and blooms out properly in the spring. We will be trimming back all of the dead vegetation, and re-mulching most areas. We will be light trimming ornamental trees. On warmer days with no wind, we will apply weed treatments in selected areas.

We will not be fertilizing the turf until late March or early April when it is actively growing. Otherwise the fertilizer will probably run off before it is useful to the turf.

Same goes for aeration of the turf areas; although aeration is great at any time, it is particularly helpful when the turf is actively growing.

As soon as the weather warms up a bit, we will start on some of the 2010 approved capital improvement projects. Each year, we attempt to continue the conversion of the older areas to the Green Community model through

replacement of water using vegetation with drought tolerant plantings, establishing limited turf areas, using drought tolerant turf varieties for replacement turf, and following accepted horticultural principles of diversification of vegetation. In 2010, we will also be improving our irrigation system to incorporate more drip irrigation and bubblers on some of our existing trees in preparation for future drought periods.

The water has been off in all areas since mid-December, and we will only water if necessary through the remaining winter months. Our new centralized system and sensor system have prevented any water from going off during periods lower than 37 degrees, thus eliminating any potential for ice on the sidewalks during these cold winter nights.

If we have a few warm afternoons and you are working on your own landscape, it is a good time to prune back any perennials that are not early spring bloomers. You don't want to prune Texas Mountain Laurels, Carolina jasmine, or honeysuckle, among others until after they bloom in early spring, but all of the grasses and summer blooming species can be cut back now.

It is also an ideal time to prune live oak trees (dead of winter, heat of summer) with less risk for the spread of oak wilt. We recommend that anyone who has large live oaks in their yard consult with a certified arborist prior to pruning and take their recommendations for keeping your trees in the best possible shape.



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


I am so proud of the 2009 Board members. We were able to learn to work together as a team, learned to compromise, and most

#### Landscaper News

If you haven't signed up for our landscaper's electronic newsletter, you probably missed the warning on January 6 about turning our irrigation systems to the OFF position for the next five days during the BIG FREEZE. With the rush of cold air coming in from the north, sprinklers going off overnight had the potential to cause damage to some of our plants. However, some sprinklers did go off and the results were icy sidewalks, driveways and icicle-covered plants and shrubs. Get ready for the next alert by signing up for the newsletter at info@pearsonlandscape.com.

The landscape contract has been renegotiated for a savings of more than \$26,000 over the next three years. Originally scheduled to continue into 2010, its third and final year, with a five percent increase over the amount in 2008 and 2009, the contract has been extended for two additional years, foregoing the increase not only in 2010, but in 2011 and 2012 as well.

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



- <u>CHANGE ENGINE OIL AT REGULAR INTERVALS</u> Engine oil will clean, lubricate and cool your engine properly. When oil levels are inadequate or not changed with its filter as recommended, your vehicle consumes more gas to compensate for increased heat and friction among the engines moving parts.
- <u>CHECK FLUIDS MONTHLY</u> Your engines vital fluids including antifreeze, transmission and brake fluids must be kept at their proper levels to prevent rust and dirt build-up which can ultimately clog or restrict the flow of fluids and damage internal parts. An engine deprived of clean fluids will struggle to operate efficiently and ultimately burn more fuel.
- CHECK TIRE PRESSURE WEEKLY FOR MAXIMUM FUEL EFFICIENCY AND SAFETY -- Properly inflated tire pressure is key for fuel efficiency. An under inflated tire causes increased road resistance which makes the vehicles computer to allocate more fuel to the engine. Tires should also be rotated every 5,000 miles to prevent uneven wear and prevent a potential blowout and hazardous situation on the road.

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#### Baylor College of Medicine Keeping Winter Skin At Bay

Just because the temperatures are dropping doesn't mean you should drop your skin care routine. Dermatologists at Baylor College of Medicine say continuing to wear sun block and moisturizers during the colder months is important for healthy skin year round. "It's very common to have dry skin during winter due to the colder, drier weather and the use of heaters," said Dr. John Wolf, professor and chair of dermatology at BCM. "Going untreated, dry skin could lead to discomfort or even an itchy, painful rash known as winter itch."

The key to prevention is moisturizing the skin. Wolf recommends starting with a lukewarm shower using a mild soap for sensitive skin. Before completely drying off, apply lotion or hand cream to damp skin. "This traps moisture onto your skin," Wolf said. "If you are adding lotion or hand cream to dry skin there will be some relief but you aren't hydrating the skin as well as you could be."

Wolf said the type of lotion isn't as important as when you put the moisturizer on. As long as you like the brand and it doesn't irritate your skin then it will work. For dry skin that needs extra help, Wolf suggests using a lotion or cream that contains petroleum jelly. "For your face, make sure to find a lotion that includes some type of sun block (SPF) protection," Wolf added. "The sun's rays can still be harmful during the winter."
