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


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# **Spring Field Lottery**

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# HERE COME THE RED AND BLUE STEINER STARS

This summer, the Steiner Stars Blue competitive team will join the Steiner Stars Red competitive team as members of the 2010 Northwest Swim Circuit. Both teams will soon be open for registration for the 2010 summer swim season. Over the winter, the Stars Board and the HOA have been working hard to gear up for another exciting season for all of our Steiner swimmers.

Returning family registration will occur March 1st-12th online with information to be found at www.steinerstars.org. At that time, all eligible Stars families will be allowed to register for the team they swam for during the 2009 swim season. Once returning family registration is closed, the Stars board will determine how many open spots for new swimmers per age group per team we have available. Those numbers will be posted on our website prior to new family registration.

New family registration will be held on Friday, March 26th 7pm-9pm at Bella Mar Community Center. All registration information can be found on our website at www.steinerstars.org. 

# What should I do if I see a coyote?

To report coyote sightings, call 3-1-1.

You will be asked to describe in detail the nature of your complaint, time, location, etc. The city's Animal Control Program will gather data related to coyotes and provide that information to Texas Wildlife Services for response/follow-up once the agreement between that agency and Travis County is in place. Animal Control will respond to reports of injured or trapped coyotes.

Call 9-1-1 to report a coyote attack on a human (to date there have been no reports in Travis County of coyotes attacking humans).

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

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# TRAILS UPDATE

Winter is a fine time to be on the trails. The dry, cold days reveal more sight-lines into the woods because of the bare trees. A freeze or a frost shows the trails in a whole new light. In winter the streams run strong and squirrels and birds fight for food. After a big rain it's best to stay off the trails for at least one day. This gives the water a chance to soak in and your boots or bike tires won't cause ruts in the trails.

With a new year comes a new HOA budget for fixing up the trails. Is your favorite trail in need of repair or in need of better sign locations? If you see a problem on the trails, call the HOA at 266-7553 or visit <a href="http://www.steinerranchhoa.org">http://www.steinerranchhoa.org</a> under "Report A Problem." Be specific about the location on the trail, the problem you see, your ideas for a solution, and your contact information.

Construction of any kind is not allowed on the greenbelts or along trails. Recently a type of fort was found on the Summer Vista trail and this is not allowed by our HOA. Responsible parties are subject to fines. If you see any construction take a picture and contact the HOA.



Only the HOA is authorized to create trails in Steiner Ranch. Unfortunately, someone has been cutting down trees in our greenbelt trying to make a rogue trail. These are not authorized trails and are actually dangerous routes. We don't wish to spend your HOA money trying to close and re-vegetate rogue trails. Instead, we want to hear from those who want new trails because we are actively looking at routes within Steiner to expand our trail system. Would you like to help us plan new trails? Contact your trails committee to get involved at 266-8498

or come to the next Trails Committee meeting on February 11 at 7 PM at Bella Mar. Trail signage project team is now forming: We are designing a system of labels for our trail sign posts. To get connected here and volunteer your design skills, contact the trails committee at 266-8498.

If you see any rogue trail cutting or dangerous activity, including motorcycles anywhere on the trails or in the parks, take a picture and call the Travis County Sheriff West Command at (512) 854-9728 and the HOA. Remember, your trails are private and are for your use, and your accompanied guests' use only.

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# **Just Say NO to Concrete**

Steiner Ranch has the best running trails in the Hill Country! As a member of Hill Country Trail Runners, I have sampled all of the trails and races in the area and many others in Texas. We have absolutely the finest variety of trails with picture postcard-like views here in our backyard.

Why run trails instead of the Quinlan Park sidewalk? Actually, running on a variety of surfaces is smart. Bill Rogers, former Boston Marathon champion, has been running for almost 40 years and he attributes his running longevity to running on soft surfaces a high percentage of the time. Your best option, if you are running for fun or training to race, is to vary the surface. You probably know that concrete is much harder than asphalt and asphalt is much harder on your legs than running on trails. Here are statistics from Dr. John Pagliano in Men's Fitness Magazine.


"You cut your injury risk by 50% by running on softer surfaces. Concrete is the hardest at a rating of 1, the other surface impact ratings are: 6 for asphalt, 6.5 for a treadmill, 7 for a high school track, 8 for dirt, 9 for wood chips and 9.5 for grass." Steiner trails are a variety of dirt, wood chips, gravel, rock and grass. To test these ratings, drop a golf ball on concrete and then drop it on dirt. Your legs are experiencing that impact about 1200 times each mile. Ouch!

Trail running is unique. There are no trucks, blaring horns or traffic. Every trail is different and the scenery varies at every corner. I've seen a Red Tail Hawk carrying a mouse, I've run the J-Canyon Trail when it was covered by an inch of snow and I've found a cave that must have housed Steiner's earliest residents. Some people avoid trails because they are afraid of getting lost, worried about falling down or twisting an ankle. Trail running at Steiner Ranch is the best of both worlds - you feel like you are in the "Wilderness of No Return," but you are usually only a couple hundred yards from somebody's back yard. It is smart to either carry a cell phone, to inform someone what trail you will be running or to run with a buddy.

Slow down or walk the more technical areas. Look ahead of you three or fours steps to see rocks and roots. Run slower than you run on the road. Your leg & ankle muscles & ligaments will adapt to the changes and become stronger as you become used to different of foot-strike angles. Strength, coordination and balance will all improve as a result of running trails. Trail running shoes provide stability in uneven terrain, increase traction and provide stiffer soles for more protection. Your road shoes will work on all but the most technical and rocky trails, but trail specific shoes will make a difference. And if you need to walk the hills, no big deal, only the Red Tail Hawks will know.

Our trails have a great deal of variety. The J-Canyon trail is mostly flat with great canyon views except for the first and last 100 yards. The River Heights Overlook trail and Summer Vista trail have awesome picture postcard views of Lake Austin. The Lake View trail may be the most technical and toughest.

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# \* Steiner Ranch History Corner \*

Did you know that Steiner Ranch hosted several large outdoor concerts in the 1970s? Only the Steiner family lived out here but there was a huge field by the lake across from what is now the Caslano development. The Outlaw Concert with Willie Nelson, Waylon Jennings, and Jimmy Buffet in 1976 was produced by the Steiners. Turnout was 10,000 out of an expected 30,000 and it lost money. Reporters said it was the first show in history where the protective fence guarding the stage collapsed from the inside out, because more fans were backstage than in front.

Sunday Break II was held on September 5, 1976, and it followed on the heels of the very successful Sunday Break I outside downtown Pflugerville. The music was great, with sound and visibility being better than SB-I. Reportedly two babies were born, 2,030 spectators were treated for sunburn,

and some 45,000 ticket holders hiked to the concert site. Cars inched toward the ranch with constant nudging by state troopers. Parking lots at the big corrals where LWB and CRMS schools are today overflowed and cars stretched down the road for 10 miles, to the bottom of Tumbleweed Hill. Some people never made it to the concert. Once parked, people armed with ice chests and blankets hiked up to 2.5 miles toward the music in 95 degree-plus heat. Inside the concert area, health authorities distributed water, while it lasted, and salt tablets to control the epidemic of heat stroke. Fleetwood Mac, the Steve Miller Band, Chicago, The Band, England Dan/John Ford Coley and some Austin locals provided music long into the evening.

The biggest surprise of all came the next day when the concert's promoter, Mayday Productions claimed that they were the victims of mass ticket counterfeiters. Gate

receipts showed a \$700,000 shortage but the claims by Mayday's president, Win Anderson, were called into question. Mayday was faced with at least 5 lawsuits, including one from angry ticket holders who were denied entrance due to traffic congestion. Unpaid Mayday employees also filed suit as did Steiner Ranch area residents who claimed their security had been threatened by the rowdy concert crowd. The court responded with a temporary restraining order against future concerts at Steiner Ranch. It was a great place for concerts but poor access to the site ultimately stopped the concerts. 

Thank you to all Steiner Ranch residents who have been careful to store your trash containers in enclosed spaces, maintain your yards, and park your vehicles in your garages and driveways at night! Your efforts are greatly appreciated by your neighbors, visitors, and the staff in the Community Associations Office.

For those of you unfamiliar with the Steiner Ranch rules, please be aware that trash containers, recycling bins, yard waste bags, and all other trash should be stored out of view of the street. *Keep your trash containers in your garage or other enclosed space.* Trash containers should not be placed at the curb for pickup until late Wednesday evening or early Thursday morning, and should be returned to their enclosed spaces by Thursday night.

Spring is approaching quickly. This is a good time to begin cleaning out your plant beds, weeding your lawn, and replacing dead plants and sod.

Overnight street parking is prohibited in Steiner Ranch. All of your vehicles must be parked in your garage or on your driveway at night. Homeowners are also responsible for the vehicles of guests. Please make your house sitters and visitors aware of the parking restrictions.

Help keep Association membership costs down by becoming familiar with and following all Steiner Ranch rules, not just those mentioned here! The staff in the Community Associations Office spends many hours each week addressing violations and each violation takes money from all homeowners' pockets. The postage cost alone to send a certified notice for a trash container is \$5.54. By maintaining your property in accordance with the Steiner Ranch Guidelines, and acting quickly when property and landscaping need repair or replacement, you conserve the financial resources of the Association and help keep Steiner Ranch a beautiful place to live.

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# Here Come the WEEDS!

February is a great month to get excited about the landscape. Winter is noticeably leaving and spring is on the way. We can only hope that the rain comes with it. What else comes are weeds. Weed seeds respond to rising soil temperatures and begin to germinate. A lot of the springtime weeds can be managed by a strong, healthy and thick turf. If the turf is weak, thin and sickly then weeds are more likely. Use of pre-emergent weed control products are in order if the turf is weak. Most garden centers have different choices and you should ask them for their advice. Always follow the directions. DO NOT use the old adage that "if a little is good more is better". Too much pre-emergent product is never better. These products come with a bit of fertilizer which is good. You do not need much fertilizer right now. The typical spring fertilization that will kick start your turf comes in late March or early April. So for now treat your lawn with pre-emergent products if necessary and enjoy the glory of spring.

# Architectural Modification Requirements

So you've decided to do some improvements or make changes to the outside of your home.....what do you do now?

- 1. Complete the Architectural Modification form (owner only)
- 2. Include any addendum forms such as for a pool or deck
- 3. Include a scaled drawing showing plan and elevation views of the proposed improvements, modifications or alterations. Submittals must include samples depicting the proposed materials and colors to be used.
- 4.A lot survey (which the owner receives at closing) indicating the location of proposed improvements, and any applicable easements, setbacks, and elevation differences on lot.
- 5. Deposit check in the amount of \$500

# Tenant/Occupant Registration Requirement Do you lease your home?

There are over 3,400 occupied homes in Steiner Ranch, but not all are occupied by the actual homeowners. Some homeowners, for various reasons, rent or lease their home to tenants/occupants, and that is when challenges arise for the Community Associations Office staff. There are certain notification requirements placed upon the Association by the governing documents of Steiner Ranch. These notifications include but are not limited to:

- · Semi-annual assessment statements
- Annual meeting notifications
- Deed restriction violation notices
- General correspondence

Not having a homeowner's absentee or offsite address for the notifications mentioned above can, unfortunately, cause fines or other fees to be charged to a homeowner's account for failure to pay assessments on time or for failure to correct violations on the property within a specified timeframe. When tenants/ occupants are registered at the Community Associations Office, the Association has the homeowner's absentee address on file and is able to send all the required notifications directly to the homeowner.

Having tenants/occupants registered also helps to protect the homeowner and his/her Steiner Ranch property. If the Association discovers that a tenant/occupant is not properly maintaining the landscaping or has caused some other violation on the property, a notice is sent to the homeowner informing them of the violation and a copy of the notice is sent to the tenant/occupant. Quickly correcting violations helps to ensure individual property values as well as the entire community are maintained at their highest level.

Due to the challenges that arise as a result of rented and leased homes, the Association REQUIRES registration of all tenants/ occupants in Steiner Ranch. In order for a tenant/occupant to receive access to the Steiner Ranch facilities, the homeowners must register the tenants/occupants via the Tenant/Occupant Registration Form and complete the Facilities Use Agreement. Once these forms are on file in the Community Associations Office, the Association will issue a "Facility Tag" to the tenants/occupants so they may enjoy all the facilities Steiner Ranch has to offer. Without the Facility Tag, tenants/occupants will not be able to enter any of the locked facilities, which includes the pools, tennis courts and the Lake Club.

Please be aware that Tenant/Occupant Registration forms must be completed by the homeowner and the responsible tenant/ occupant. Forms signed by a property manager or other non-homeowner will not be accepted unless a power of attorney form is also submitted naming the managing agent or other non-homeowner as authorized to sign legal documents on behalf of the homeowner.

The Tenant/Occupant Registration form is available at the Community Associations Office and online at www.steinerranchhoa. org. There is a \$50.00 tenant/occupant registration fee that must be submitted with the completed Tenant/Occupant Registration form in order for the Association staff to process the registration.

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





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## **Austin Currents RM 2222 is UR 2222**

RM 2222 is the only east-west roadway west of Austin. Why was it built all the way out near the lake? Texas was good about connecting farm and ranch roads. Four Points, also called Four Corners or Hickmuntown, was at the intersection of what are today Farm Road 620 and Ranch to Market 2222, twelve miles northeast of downtown Austin in northern Travis County. A school, a church, a few businesses, and several scattered houses

marked the community on county highway maps in the 1940s. By the 1980s it was not labeled on county maps.

RM 2222 has had its share of controversy. Originally slated to be a freeway, those plans were terminated in the great freeway kill-off of 1994 as a result of environmental activism within the Austin City Council. Prior to this, the best of all plans had been drawn up by the City of Austin Planning Committee in 1987. It would have preserved the beauty of the original road and removed most of the traffic. This was a freeway called Arterial #8 which connected the Arboretum area (183-360) to Four Points, running right behind



3M and coming out just north of the HEB shopping center. This freeway was designed to carry all the traffic of today's 2222 and 360 combined, on an overland route direct to Four Points. RM 2222 would remain what it was: a small winding road with little traffic. Unfortunately these plans are long dead because the Council killed the freeways in 1994 and that route now runs through the Balcones Canyonlands Preserve, an

endangered species preserve.

Have you seen the abandoned section of RM 2222? Next time you travel westbound on 2222 near City Park Road, look to your right. There the old alignment breaks away from today's alignment. The utility poles clearly show the old right-of-way prior to 1996.

In 1995, the designation of RM 2222 was changed to Urban Road 2222 (UR 2222) by TxDOT although - as with all Urban Roads - no signage changes have been made. Source: interview with TxDOT; Texas Freeway.com. For more information contact Rich Keith@primerica.com (512) 266-8498.

Don't be a Victim!

#### **Crime Prevention Tips**

- Stranger Danger!!! Never open the door to anyone unless you know them. This is something we teach our kids, but seldom adhere to ourselves. Remember that most criminals are skilled at winning your trust, be suspicious!
- LOCK your doors and windows-All homes are vulnerable when unsecured! The most popular times for residential burglaries are weekday, daylight hours. In more than 1/3 of burglaries, there is no forcible entry.
- Don't be an Easy Target! Make the exterior of your home uninviting for a burglar. Prune back shrubbery that hides the doors and windows or behind which a burglar can conceal him or herself. Cut back tree limbs which give a burglar access to upper level windows.
- Con the Criminal! Since most criminals
   prefer to burglarize when no one
   is home, give them the impression
   that you are there. It is relatively
   simple to make your residence appear
   occupied.

- 1. Cancel or get someone to pick up your newspaper.
- 2. Do not leave notes or messages on the phone that you are away from home.
- 3. Have a TRUSTED friend or neighbor check on your home, changing the position of drapes or blinds, parking a car in the driveway, putting their garbage in the front of your home.
- Claim your stuff! Mark your property, especially those items that are expensive, with a unique number (something you can make up), make a file of that number and a description of the item, even a picture. Secure these files someplace safe, preferably away from the home. This system does several things;
- 1. It acts as a disincentive for burglars where items can easily be identified, increasing their chances of discovery.
- 2. It also assists Law Enforcement in returning items that have been found to their rightful owners.

Debt Stacking-Get Out of Debt!

Modern financial planning has to address consumer debt to be realistic. Debt is the biggest blocker to financial success that I know of. And getting out of debt seems to be something most Americans want to do these days. This discussion will focus only on what is known as "bad debt" which includes credit cards and revolving charge accounts. If you would truly like to get out of debt, the first thing you need to do is stop incurring more debt on your credit cards. Pay cash for a month and track your "latte factor." There are several strategies to use from this point. You can transfer your balance to a lower rate card, but beware of the fees associated with transferring the balance. As I am fond of saying, the large print giveth and the fine print taketh away. You can also ask your lender or credit card company to lower your interest rate, but it has become tougher to achieve this.

Many clients benefit from doing a debt consolidation loan which can free up hundreds of dollars a month in cash flow. A powerful method which I recommend is called "Debt Stacking". Debt stacking allows you to use less money to pay off the same amount

of debt more quickly. The method of Debt Stacking states that you pay off the highest interest rate debt first, while making just the minimum payments on all the other credit cards. When you pay off that high interest rate credit card, you then transfer the amount that you were paying monthly on that card to the next highest interest rate credit card. Let's look at an example. First, arrange your credit cards in order of highest to lowest interest rate:

- Revolving Charge Card A: \$4,000 at 24% APR, minimum payment \$100
- Credit Card B: \$5,000 at 18% APR, minimum payment \$100
- Credit Card C: \$3,000 at 12% APR, minimum payment \$100

Assuming that you are able to pay \$400 per month towards all credit cards, use the Debt Stacking method to pay \$200 towards Revolving Charge Card A until it is paid off. Then you would add that \$200 to the \$100 equaling \$300 that you would pay on Credit card B until it was paid off. Finally you would add the \$300 you were paying on Credit Card B to Credit Card C for a total of \$400 dollars

until the last one is paid off. In a comparatively short time you are out of debt. You will have paid less interest and gotten out of debt more quickly than if you had you paid the same amount of money spread equally over the three credit cards.

In conclusion, your steps to get out of debt are to stop incurring more debt, pay less interest on the debt you do have, spend smarter, and use the Debt Stacking Method. You'll be debt free much faster, and you will save a lot of money!

Let rise again for about 1 hour. Bake in 350° oven for about 40 minutes or until browned.

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
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#### **NATURE WATCH**

A Bird That Prefers To Run

Spend any amount of time in Texas or the southwestern United States and you'll undoubtedly spot the Greater Roadrunner, a long-legged, ground-dwelling member of the cuckoo family. It is regionally called 'paisano', meaning constant friend or compatriot. This large chicken-like bird, with its long tail and shaggy crest, is fully capable of flying, but usually runs instead, at speeds up to 18 miles per hour. True to its name, a group of these birds is known as a 'marathon' or a 'race' of roadrunners.

and parallel to the ground.



The roadrunner is an opportunistic forager, and while it can catch small birds at feeders and nest boxes, more often it eats a variety of fruits, seeds, as well as venomous prey items, including large insects, spiders, scorpions, and even rattlesnakes. Surprisingly agile, two birds will frequently cooperate to kill a large snake, taking turns to distract it, pin its head with their heavy bill, and beat it against a rock or the ground. When alarmed or curious, the roadrunner raises its crest and white-edged tail, and utters a series of coos or

black skin between its wings that helps it quickly absorb more solar

energy. When running at top speed, it holds its head and tail flat



rapidly clatters its beak.

Living in dry, open habitats, the roadrunner has adapted by developing salt glands in front of its eyes to excrete excess salt from its blood. While these glands are more common in ocean-going birds that drink seawater, the roadrunner is able to go without drinking water as long as it eats food with high moisture content, but will drink water if it is available. When courting, many male roadrunners attract a female with cooing calls and then offer her food, usually in the form

of a dead lizard. If the female accepts, copulation occurs, during which the food is often exchanged.

In a small tree, scrubby bush, or a stand of cactus, both parents build a shallow platform of thorny sticks, line it with leaves, grass, feathers, and occasionally shed snake skins. Clutch size can vary from two to six eggs, depending on the food supply. If all the eggs do not hatch at roughly the same time (called asynchronous hatching), and the food supply declines during the breeding season, the parents may eat the younger chicks or feed them to their older siblings. In times of abundant food, roadrunners will double-brood, or raise a second family just as soon as the first is out of the nest.

Greater Roadrunner populations appear stable across their range, and are seen in central Texas year-round. However, like most species, they tend to disappear when their habitat is fragmented by development.

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#### THE GIVER BY LOIS LOWRY

"A Perfect World?"

The Giver by Lois Lowry won the 1994 Newbery Medal. Considered a young adult book, I

purchased it for my nephew, but wanted to preview it before giving it to him. While I thoroughly enjoyed the book (it is intensely deep and invited more thought and examination than any other book I've read in a long time), I don't think the content is appropriate for young adults. I'll explain this in more detail, but in preparation for writing this review, I noticed that The Giver is on many middle school reading lists, but it is also on many banned book lists and appeared on the American Library Association's list of the most challenged books of the 1990's.

KS Book

Although I didn't give the book to my nephew, I think it is an excellent adult read. This book makes you really think. It describes a community that lives in what the author describes as a "perfect" world—one without pain, emotion (including love), color, decisions, surprises, memories, inconvenience and even temperature variations. While this is definitely not my idea of a perfect world, this community of people lives their daily lives in a very robotic and extremely organized way.

Each member of this community is assigned a specific role at the age of 12 and the main character, Jonas, is given the role of Giver. He is given all the memories of past generations where there was pain, love, hunger, the brilliance of color and he is responsible for holding all of these memories so no one else has to live through them. The way the Receiver transfers these memories to Jonas and the horrifically hard life that awaits Jonas is extremely interesting and creative.

When Jonas questions things—which he has never been permitted to do—he understands the very hard, but accepted way of life in his community. In particular, the "releasing" of the rule breakers, elders and anyone else who stands out or is an inconvenience to the group is heart wrenching—this is the part that is not for young adults.

The book is extremely creative; from the way the community and each family are structured to the unique role each person is assigned. It begs the question, "What would you give up to live in a more secure world?" and on the other hand, "What would you sacrifice to live life to the fullest?"

I definitely have Gathering Blue and Messenger on my reading list, two other books that are companion reads to The Giver.

### **Battling Boredom**

#### ARE YOU FINDING IT DIFFICULT TO GET

out of bed in the morning for your daily walk and making up excuses to skip the gym on the way home? Even the most dedicated exercisers occasionally get bored with their routine. Waning motivation, cutting workouts short and not having your old enthusiasm all are signs of a stale exercise regimen.

#### Quick Fix

First, evaluate your current routine to determine what really bores you. A new variation on your favorite activity — such as cardio-funk or kickboxing instead of step aerobics, or hoisting free weights instead of working on machines — may be enough to reinvigorate a stale routine.

If you've always worked out indoors, logging miles on a treadmill, stairclimber or stationary bike, move your work-out outside for a welcome change of scenery. Run, hike or bike on trails; swim in a lake or ocean.

#### Bigger Changes

When tweaking your routine isn't enough, make bigger changes. Take up an entirely new activity — especially something you never thought you'd do. If you've always stuck to solitary pursuits, sign up for a team sport, such as volleyball, basketball or even doubles tennis. Or tackle something you've always shied away from — indulge your thirst for adventure with a rock-climbing class (start on an indoor wall, then move to the real thing as your skills improve).

#### **Good Company**

Working out alone often is an oasis of solitude in a busy day, but maybe you need some company. Exercise companions add a social element to any routine. Ask a friend to be your workout partner—you won't skip a workout if someone is waiting for you.

Just about every sport or activity has a club; to find one, ask around at gyms or local community centers. Keeping up with the crowd also means you'll be challenged to improve your skills. Ask about organized workouts and fun runs offered by local track clubs, as well as group rides hosted by cycling clubs.

#### Challenge Yourself

Many exercisers work out simply to stay in shape, and most of the time that's just fine. But setting a goal, such as

finishing a 10K race or completing a rough-water swim, will give your daily workouts more meaning.

Start by incorporating bursts of speed into your workouts. After a gentle warm-up, alternate a fast pace with a slower one for recovery. This can be as simple as sprinting to the next tree, or as structured as running intervals on a track or sprinting laps in the pool.

#### Add Variety

Elite triathletes pioneered the cross-training concept, and it works for the rest of us, too. If you usually focus on one activity, substitute another a few days a week. Ideally, any exercise program includes elements of cardiovascular exercise, weight training and flexibility.


#### **New Tovs**

Small exercise gadgets aren't necessary, but they can make your workouts more fun and challenging. Heart-rate monitors, aquatic toys and safety equipment are just a few items to consider. Find out which new training gadgets are available for your favorite activity.

#### Take a Break

Sometimes you really do need time off. In that case, cut back on your usual routine, and substitute other activities. You might even find one that you enjoy more than your old favorites.

Once you've fought your first battle with boredom, you'll know the tricks to keep exercise from becoming too routine. Trying new sports, new classes and new activities — and learning how to throw a little variety into old favorites — can help you overcome the nagging inclination to devise those creative excuses for not working out.

#### New Year Means New Opportunities for Roth IRA Conversion

If you already have a Roth IRA, you're aware of its biggest benefit: Your earnings grow tax free, provided you meet certain conditions. If you don't have a Roth IRA, you may want to consider one — and it may be easier for you to do just that in 2010.

Before we get to the reasons why 2010 may be your year to open or convert to a Roth IRA, let's look at some differences between Roth and traditional IRAs. If you own a traditional IRA, your contributions may be tax-deductible, depending on your income level. But whether you can make deductible contributions or not, your earnings grow on a tax-deferred basis, which means your money can grow faster than it would if it were placed in an investment on which you paid taxes every year. On the other hand, Roth IRA contributions are never tax-deductible, but your earnings grow tax free, as long as you've held your account at least five years and you don't start taking withdrawals until you're at least age 59½.

Furthermore, unlike a traditional IRA, a Roth IRA does not require you to start taking distributions when you reach 70½. Consequently, you'll have more flexibility and freedom when it comes to making withdrawals.

If you have a traditional IRA, you might be thinking it's a good idea to convert to a Roth IRA because tax free sounds better than tax deferred — and, all things being equal, tax free would indeed be better. However, it's not quite that simple. If you convert your traditional IRA to a Roth IRA, you'll have to pay taxes on those traditional IRA earnings and contributions that had previously gone untaxed. If you do convert, you'll be better off if you use money held outside your IRA to pay the taxes. If you simply take money from your IRA, you'll obviously lower the value of your IRA — and, if you're under 59½, you may have to pay an additional 10% penalty on the amount you withdraw to pay the taxes.

In the past, many investors have been prohibited from converting their IRAs due to either their tax filing status or their income. Under previous rules, you could convert your traditional IRA to a Roth IRA only if you were married and filed a joint return or were a single filer, and your modified adjusted gross income (MAGI) was \$100,000 or less. But starting in 2010, you can convert funds to a Roth IRA even if your MAGI is over \$100,000. You will also be able to convert to a Roth if you are married and file separate tax returns.

And that's not the only piece of good news regarding your conversion ability. As mentioned above, you will have to pay taxes when you convert to a Roth IRA. A conversion is usually reported as income for the tax year the conversion takes place. However, in 2010 only, your conversion amount will be split and reported as income for tax years 2011 and 2012 unless you elect to report the entire conversion amount on your 2010 taxes. You may find that spreading the taxes over two years can make the conversion more affordable.

In any case, consult with your tax advisor before converting from a traditional IRA to a Roth. If done correctly, such a conversion can potentially make a big difference in your ultimate retirement lifestyle.

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
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#### Sudoku

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
