
BAK-PAK Critters Reading Program Wags into Keith Elementary





DID YOU KNOW? "Likewise, wives, be subject to your own husbands, so that even if some do not obey the word, they may be won without a word by the conduct of their wives, 2 when they see your respectful and pure conduct (1 Peter 3:1-2).

The Greek biographer Plutarch (AD 46-120) lived during Peter's day and wrote the following about marriage in the Greco-Roman culture: "A wife should not acquire her own friends, but should make her husband's friends her own. The gods are the first and most significant friends. For this reason, it is proper for a wife to recognize only those gods whom her husband worships and to shut the door to superstitious cults and strange superstitions." With this as the backdrop of Peter's culture, it makes sense as to why he would address Christian wives married to unbelieving husbands. They, like slaves (2:18), found themselves in difficult circumstances and needed some word from God as to how they might live with a pagan man.

Peter's address is not to women in general but to wives specifically. And these wives were to "be subject" to their "own husbands." To "be subject" (i.e., submit) is to put oneself under the authority of another. In the Greek text "be subject" is a participle that functions as a command. Piggy-backing on the command for all Christians to be subject to government (2:13) and Christian slaves submitting to evil despots (2:18), Peter literally writes, "Likewise, wives submitting..." Now in a world where slaves were plentiful and often mistreated by cruel masters, Christian wives lived in a world where even if their husbands were Christians, these women had very few rights, often being viewed as only slightly above the animal kingdom.

Now being addressed to wives, the passage shows that it is not the husband's duty to force his wife to submit to him; rather, it is the wife's prerogative to submit. In the context of marriage in general, the wife's submission to her husband is simply the way God ordained the institution of marriage. Now Peter was addressing a situation where a believing wife was married to an unbelieving man. The words "even if some (husbands) do not obey the word" may indicate that the majority of the husbands in Peter's audience were indeed believers, but in the case where they might not be, Peter was teaching the wife to be an evangelist to her lost husband.

The words Peter uses for the lost husband are those who "do not obey the word." Peter is all about equating obedience to Christ with salvation in Christ, so he uses "do not obey the word" synonymously with those who are not Christians (cf. 1:2, 14; 2:8; 3:20; 4:17). In other words, Peter believed that obedience to the gospel of Christ was the fruit of true salvation, so those who did not obey the word, though they may have called themselves Christians, were not.

The "word" Peter speaks of is the gospel of Christ (cf. 2:8). God's word was ignored by many, and for those husbands who were guilty of this, their wives were to submit to them so as to win them to Christ "without a word." So, in the same way that subjection to governing authorities closes the mouths of foolish people (2:13-15), and servants submitting to masters is a gracious thing in God's eyes (2:18-19), so too is there great value in wives submitting to unbelieving husbands. Peter was not interested in a women's liberation movement; he was interested in the conversion of the unsaved. Hence, the submission of the wives to their husbands is ordained as part of the Great Commission to save the lost (Matt. 28:19-20).

If you are in a bad marriage, stay put and minister to your spouse. You have the opportunity to imitate Christ by suffering (cf. 2:20-25). When he was reviled and treated wrongly, he endured it without a word. You do the same, and see if God doesn't use your behavior to bring glory to Himself by bringing your spouse to salvation. If you are a wife, submission is your first offensive tool to seeing this happen. It is the avenue through which God will work in your spouse's life.

Millions of Window Shades and Blinds Recalled

WHAT HAPPENED

All Roman shades and pull-up blinds were recalled voluntarily in the United States by the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) and Window Covering Safety Council (WCSC) due to the risk of strangulation to young kids.

Health Canada also issued an advisory alerting parents to the potential strangulation hazard of Roman shades and pull-up blinds. According to the CPSC, in a single year consumers purchase about 5 million Roman shades and 3 million pull-up blinds.

WHAT THIS MEANS

The CPSC is aware of five deaths and 16 near strangulations in Roman shades since 2006 as well as three deaths in roll-up blinds since 2001. Strangulations in Roman shades are possible when a child pulls the cord out of the shade and wraps it around the neck or when a child places his or her neck between the exposed inner cord and the fabric on the backside of the blind.

In roll-up blinds, strangulations can occur if a child's neck becomes entangled in a lifting loop that has slid off the side of the blind or if a child places his or her neck between the roll-up blind fabric and the lifting loop.

WHERE THIS PRODUCT WAS SOLD

Major retailers in the United States and Canada, including Walmart (500,000 Roman shades and 600,000 roll-up blinds), J.C. Penney (more than 2.2 million Roman shades and about 340 roll-up blinds), and Pottery Barn (along with Pottery Barn Kids and PBTeen; about 305,000 Roman shades and 45,000 roller shades; an additional 85,000 Roman shades were recalled in August 2009), and online.

Additionally, the CPSC and the WCSC suggest taking these measures:

Examine all shades and blinds at home to ensure there aren't any accessible cords on the front, side, or back of the product — and if there are any, make them inaccessible to young children.


If possible, install cordless window coverings in homes where kids live or visit.

Place cribs, beds, and furniture away from the windows to prevent kids from climbing on them to reach the cords on the window coverings.

Install tension devices in shades that have looped bead chains or nylon cords to keep the cords tight.



Have You Been Phished?

Phishing (sounds just like fishing) is what thieves on the internet do to get your personal information. In fact, it is just like fishing – they use bait (and you are the fish.)

What does phishing look like? It can look like an email from your bank. They tell you that there has been suspicious activity with your bank account, and in order to avoid having the account frozen you need to click a link and verify your information on their web site. If you click the link, it will take you to a web page that looks just like your banks login page. You enter your username and password, you may then see a page saying thank you for validating your information, or you may see an error page that says please try again later. The problem is you didn't actually go to your bank's web site; instead you just gave your login information to the bad guys.

Another scheme frequently seen at this time of year is an email from the IRS and SURPRISE, it's good news! You are eligible for a tax refund, and all you have to do is click on the link and submit your tax refund request. And oh, if you don't respond within 48 hours they will assume the refund in invalid and it will be suspended. You'll be in for another surprise when you later find out that it wasn't really the IRS, and you gave your personal information, including your social security number to the bad guys. Who are these bad guys? How come they don't get caught? Well, you'll find them in China, eastern European countries and Russia. That's why you'll often find these emails filled with poor or awkward grammar. They buy lists of email addresses and send them out by the millions. There are lots of "phish" in the ocean, but you only have to catch a few to make a lot of money.

How do you protect yourself from phishing attacks? First and most important, NEVER click on links in email. Even if you get an email from a friend, are you sure they intentionally sent it? Many viruses will scan through an address book and then send an email to everyone with a generic message like "this is so funny, check it out" or "did you see this video of you online?" If you're not expecting the email, DON'T CLICK. The same goes for attachments. Don't fall for fake messages from UPS, FedEx, etc. Ask yourself "did I give them my email address?" You probably didn't, so you can be sure they didn't send it.

The Internet is a big world filled with gleaming cities and dark alleys. As long as you're aware that there are bad guys who are trying to steal from you, simple precautions and common sense will keep you safe.

FINANCIAL FOCUS *Time to Make Post-Recession Investment Moves?*



Like a tiresome dinner guest, the recession has long outstayed its welcome. But there are some clear signs that the economy has begun to turn around. If that is indeed the case, how should you, as an individual investor, respond?

Before we get to that question, let's quickly review some of the key factors that suggest the recession may be ending. First, we've seen four straight months of gains by the Conference Board's Index of Leading Economic Indicators. Also, the job market is improving somewhat and bank lending is increasing. The Federal Reserve's efforts to stabilize the financial system have improved conditions in the corporate credit markets, as indicated by a dramatic increase in the amount of new bonds issued by companies thus far in 2009. We've also seen improvements in the housing market and in industrial production.

Even if all this evidence indicates the recession is ending, does that necessarily mean that boom times for investors will follow? A look back in time shows reasons for optimism. In 10 recessions, extending from 1949 through 2001, the S & P 500 rose, on average, 9.5 percent six months following the recession's end date, and 15.5 percent after 12 months, according to Ned Davis Research. Of course, as you have no doubt heard, past performance is no guarantee of future results, but in years gone by, staying in the market rewarded long-term investors —those who could look beyond the recession at hand.

In any case, if the recession is ending, let's return to our original question: What investment moves should you make? As we've already seen, the most important step you can take is to remain invested — and if you're out of the market, consider getting back in. As exhibited by the strong market rally this summer, large gains can come quickly, but they only come to those who aren't on the investment sidelines.

In addition to staying invested, consider these other post-recession moves — which are actually pretty good moves before and during a recession, as well:

• Look for quality. In any economic environment, you'll be making a smart move by focusing on quality investments that fit your unique situation. You may look for the stocks of those companies with strong management teams and competitive products. And stick with investment-grade bonds, if fixed income is appropriate.

• Diversify. Build a portfolio containing a variety of investments, including stocks, bonds, government securities and certificates of deposit. While diversification, by itself, can't guarantee a profit or protect against a loss, it can help you reduce the long-term effects of volatility on your holdings.

• Keep a long-term perspective. It's not easy to overlook market fluctuations, especially severe ones, but if you can keep your eyes



on what you hope to achieve in the future, you might be less likely to over-react to short-term events. While you may need to periodically adjust your investment mix in response to changes in the economy and in your own life, you'll be better off, in the long run, by establishing a strategy that's appropriate for your individual risk tolerance and goals — and sticking to it.

As individuals, we're all subject to the ebbs and flows of the economy. But by focusing on those things you can control — such as buying quality investments, diversifying and thinking long-term — you can become an investor for all seasons.

News You Can Use FINANCIAL FOCUS

Most investors pay a great deal of attention to the price of their investments — yesterday's price, today's price, tomorrow's price, next year's price and so on. And that's understandable, because we always want the prices of our investments to rise. Yet, if you focus too much on prices, you could end up making some costly mistakes.

Why? Because price-driven behavior is emotional behavior — and as an investor, you're much better off making decisions with your head, not your heart. Suppose, for example, that you've seen a steep decline in the price of one of your investments. After a while, you may feel that you just can't take it anymore and you decide to "cut your losses" by selling the investment. Conversely, you may have an investment that has gone up and up — and to grab even bigger gains, you buy more shares.

Both these decisions could backfire on you. When you sold the investment whose price had fallen, you might find yourself on the investment "sidelines" if that same investment starts to turn around. And when you throw more money at an investment whose price has skyrocketed, you're betting against history — because no investment goes up forever. Furthermore, in both cases, your emotions will have led you to violate one of the guidelines of investing: buy low and sell high.

But apart from the tactical errors you may make when you overconcentrate on price movements, you're also ignoring another key characteristic of investments — their value.

Traditionally, an investment's "value" has been largely defined as whether or not it's considered "expensive" or "cheap." That's why many investors take a close look at a stock's price-to-earnings ratio (P/ E). Generally speaking, a high P/E means a stock is more expensive, relative to its earnings, than a stock with a low P/E. Investors may be willing to pay more for the high P/E stocks because they feel these companies will be worth more in the future.

But P/E doesn't tell the whole story of investment value. Any individual investment may have value to you because it can help you diversify your holdings. And while diversification, by itself, can't guarantee a profit or protect against a loss, it can help you reduce the effects of volatility on your portfolio. For instance, if your portfolio is heavy with stocks, the presence of some bonds — even those whose market price has fallen because interest rates have risen — can help reduce the impact of a downturn that primarily affects stocks.

Clearly, the value of any investment has several dimensions — any or all of which may be valuable to you as your pursue your goals. So, as you build, maintain and adjust your portfolio over time, keep an eye on the changing prices of your investments — but don't overlook their true value.

- provide financial assistance to girls
- offer training for adult volunteers
- keep camp and program fees at a minimum

• support special initiatives, such as offering Girl Scout programs in underprivileged communities like public housing facilities and detention centers

Less than a third of the selling price of a package of Girl Scout cookies goes toward the actual cost of the cookies. This means that more than two thirds of every Girl Scout cookie purchase goes toward programs and services to benefit girls. A portion of that goes directly to the troop/group selling the cookies.

Each Girl Scout council's volunteer board of directors determines the baker, the price per package of cookies, how revenue will be used to provide vital services in the community and how much money will be returned to troops/groups selling cookies for their projects and activities.

Within our Council, approximately half of the operating budget is funded by the Cookie Sale. The price for a package of cookies is \$3.50. Troops receive 56 to 63 cents of every cookie package they sell. Service units receive 3 cents per package. Troops/Groups and Service Units decide how they want to spend their bonus money. The national organization receives no funding from the cookie sale.
