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## Have You Received A Deed Restriction Notice?

As reported in each month's newsletter, the HOA staff drives at least two sections of the neighborhood per month to note violations of the Declaration of Covenants, Conditions and Restrictions. These commonly include: front yard landscape maintenance (mowing, edging, free of weeds), home maintenance (paint, screens, siding) and recreational vehicles (boats, RV's, trailers) parked in the driveway. The HOA is required by state law to notify owners in writing via certified mail and allow for the homeowner to request a hearing before the board of directors. If you receive a letter, please contact us at the HOA office and let us know your individual situation. We would like to work with you to bring your home into compliance. If you would like to report a violation, you can do so via our website


## Thank You!



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## HOME, LAWN AND GARDEN Maintenance Items

The CCHOA wishes to give everyone an opportunity for "Spring Cleaning" of their yard and home. The neighborhood standard that can be enforced through the deed restriction process includes, but is not limited to the following:

#### **TURF AREAS:**

- Mowed regularly, kept at less than 6" high, edged; we recommend you leave lawn clippings on the yard, and blown from the sidewalks and driveways
- Watered conservatively according to City of Austin water conservation guidelines, but not left to die out
- No obvious weeds or clover

#### **BED AREAS:**

• Clean beds, weed and grass free

- All dead vegetation removed
- Shrubs pruned below front window sills
- Plants thinned to present maintained look
- Trees trimmed up over driveways and sidewalks

#### **DEBRIS**:

• No trash, debris, piles of dirt, rock, stone, and extra items stored in the front yard of the home.



#### YARD ART:

• Limited to two pieces, integrated into the landscape. Please put the rest in the back yard.

#### POTS FOR POTTED PLANTS:

• Plants must be alive and tended to. Pots must integrate into the landscape beds. Put the remainder of the pots in the back yard.

#### HOMES:

• Please check your home for mold and mildew on the trim and siding and see if you need to power wash or repaint. Most power washing companies will give you a good price for power-washing these areas and include your driveway and sidewalk as well. You won't believe how good it will look.

## **Circle C Landscape**

As I am writing this in early March, I do believe that we will hit our first spring-like day today. After fog, mist and rain, it is, according to the weather man (?) going to be sunny and 75 degrees. We will see, but I am looking forward to it.

Unfortunately, the only thing that seems to be in bloom thus far is a bunch of pretty bad broadleaf weeds. With all of the inclement weather over the winter, we have only recently had a few appropriate days for spraying weeds. We have treated most of the commons areas, and hopefully, by the time you get this newsletter, we will have some green grass growing in, have had the right weather for mowing and will be fertilizing for the Spring. In other words, after a downright ugly spell, things should be looking good.

As far as regular maintenance on the commons areas, you will see the Circle C Landscape crew mowing, completing bed trimming and mulching, treating for ants, and fertilizing both turf and beds. With a few good spring rains, all will fall into place. We are looking forward to the grass coming out of dormancy, particularly in Vintage Place Park, where it was newly planted in late fall.

During February, we were fortunate to be able to have all of the hardwood trees along La Crosse and the remaining trees that were not done in 2009 along Escarpment pruned by Bartlett Tree Experts. They look great, and will go down in the tree book as another completed area as we prune the over 2200 shade trees on the property. We also cleaned out and completed a prune on a very large live oak by the South Bay post office.

By the time you get this newsletter, we will have removed or be in the process of removing the aging Bradford Pear trees on Escarpment, just north of La Crosse in t he median. Unfortunately, these trees only have a 15-20 year life span and are at the end of days for them. At this point, they begin "shedding" or splitting off limbs that are dangerous to both people and cars. We will be replanting the median with a number of shade and decorative trees, and adding beds. In the second year of the project, the underlying turf will be replaced.

Other special projects that have been recently completed or are in the works by Circle C Landscape are completing the sidewalk project for the new sidewalk that was installed on the south side of La Crosse. We have installed rockwork between the curb and the sidewalk to assist in preventing water run-off in this area. We have also reset the irrigation as a repair after the installation. We will also be installing drip irrigation to the trees along Escarpment, north of the bridge, as well as along South Bay under the shrubs. Other improvements include upgrades to some of the irrigation infrastructure and turf replacement in selected areas.

We are also awaiting the final bollard lighting replacement on Escarpment. The lights are on order and will be installed as soon as possible. We will also be adding some lighting at the Escarpment /Slaughter intersection to replace what was removed during the landscape reconstruction of this area.

## **CIRCLE C PALMS**

In Need of Pruning The unusually cold weather we experienced this winter affected the palm trees of many Circle C residents; resulting in yellow, brown, broken, and dead fronds. Pruning, or trimming, of dead fronds is necessary for maintaining healthy and prosperous palms, and this, the beginning of Spring, is the optimal time for trimming. All yellow, brown, broken, and dead fronds, and any fronds that touch the ground, should be carefully pruned. Gloves, and a protective layer, such as a jacket, are recommended for protection from the spikes on the fronds. Using a large pair of garden loppers prune only the damaged or dead fronds, taking care not to cut too close to the trunk. While this is a relatively easy fix, the CCHOA recommends the use of a tree maintenance specialist for the pruning of any palm taller than 20 feet. The CCHOA will be sending cooperative letters regarding dead palm fronds beginning April 1st. Beginning, May 1st, the CCHOA will issue a deed restriction to those still not in compliance.

Darvin and Veta enjoy reading books, going to theater productions, collecting art and traveling. Their most memorable trip was to Russia. Veta also reads to students at Kiker Elementary School. She has enjoyed this activity for the past 4 years.



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



## **NATURE WATCH** The Song of the Vireo

As a family, vireos are small to medium-sized birds that seem similar to warblers at first glance, apart from their heavier bill and generally dullgreen plumage. In fact, the word vireo is Latin for 'I am green.' Most vireo species are migratory, and return to their breeding grounds in early spring.


Of the 13 true vireo species that are present in the United States and Canada, none is more at risk than the black-capped vireo, which has

been on the endangered species list since 1987. At 4.5 inches in length, it is the smallest vireo to occur regularly in the US, and ranges from only three counties in Oklahoma to central and west Texas, and south to north and central Mexico.

A handsome songbird, adult male black-capped vireos are olive green above and white below with faint yellow flanks and wing bars. A glossy black cap is broken by white spectacles that frame brownish-red irises, and the bill is black, sturdy, and slightly hooked at the tip. It takes two years for a male to reach full adult plumage. Females are similarly marked but duller in color, and have a slate gray crown and greenishyellow underparts.

Recent research has shown that Black-capped vireos have the largest repertoire of song notes to draw from, about ten times larger than other vireos. The males are persistent singers, usually

vocalizing in melodious phrases of two to four notes separated by one to three second pauses. It can also emit several calls, including a scolding 'zhrree', especially while vigorously defending its territory. Insectivores, they glean leaves, twigs, and branches, sometimes hanging upside down or hovering, as they feed on beetles and caterpillars.

Black-capped vireos nest in brushy areas called 'shinneries.' Groups of shin oak or sumac of appropriate height and density are critical success factors for breeding, with the most important requirement being foliage that extends to ground level. Once trees begin to reach to full size, the vireos will look for other early succession sites in which to breed. Nests are an open, hanging cup, only 15-50 inches from the ground, and are made of leaves, grasses, plant fiber, and spider silk. Obscured from view by foliage, they are often decorated with items like lichens or bits of paper. The opening to the nest is usually narrower than the nest itself, but the nest is deep enough so that an adult bird can sit inside with only its bill and tail tip showing.

Both the male and female share the task of nest construction and incubation. After the three or four eggs that are laid have hatched, the female does most of the brooding while the male supplies most of the food. While breeding pairs are sometimes able to produce more than one clutch of eggs during the breeding season, the male cares for some or all of the fledglings, while the female re-nests, sometimes with another male.

The black-capped vireo is endangered due to multiple threats of brood parasitism by the brown-headed cowbird as well as loss of suitable habitat through urbanization, fire exclusion, livestock grazing, and brush control. Female cowbirds may remove some of the host eggs from the nest and replace them with their own. These eggs hatch first and the quickly growing nestlings out-compete the smaller vireo nestlings for food and nest space. Cowbird trapping and habitat maintenance and creation through prescribed burning and mechanical manipulation are a high management priority in prime areas like the Balcones Canyonlands Preserve system.

## **DOYOU LIKE FREE SOFTWARE?**

Hey, everybody likes free software – just be careful what you get. Enter anything you want into a Google search with the word FREE and all kinds of things will show up. If you're not careful, you can download a FREE VIRUS – how's that for a deal?

For you readers, here are a few of my favorite free software choices that won't get you into trouble:

For Windows machines, I like Picasa for doing simple editing and cleanup of photos. It's from the folks at Google and you can find it just by going to www.Picasa.com (note that it's Picasa ending with an "a" and not Picasso like the painter with the additional "s"". Do you shop online and like to keep the receipts? Rather than printing them out and storing them in a filing cabinet, use CutePDF to "print" your receipts (or anything else that can be sent to a printer) into a PDF file that you can save on your hard drive. I buy a lot online and CutePDF lets me store all the receipts into a folder on my hard drive that makes life much easier at tax time for my accountant (which is this month if my calendar is correct.) You can download CutePDF at www.CutePDF.com, just download the CutePDF Writer. It installs as if it were a printer and you're ready to go.

For the Mac, Anxiety is a useful to-do list manager to (hopefully) reduce the stress in your life in getting all the things you need to get

done, done. It works with iCal and Mail. You can download it at http://www.anxietyapp.com/. Carbon Copy Cloner lets you backup your entire hard drive to another, allowing you to boot to the 2nd drive should the first one fail completely (and it happens more often than you know.) Download it at http://www.bombich.com/.

Stay away from sites offering free music or movies (like LimeWire), this is an excellent way to contract a virus. If you think you're getting something that costs money in a store for free online, it's probably going to cost you more than you know by the time you get your computer cleaned up.

Be skeptical and be safe. One of the best places to go for free software is http://sourceforge.net/. You're not going to find Microsoft Office for free, but you might find a program that does something close. Want Photoshop but don't have \$400 to spend, then check out Gimp. There are a lot of genuinely nice people developing programs because they enjoy doing it. Some will ask for but not require a donation, that's only fair. If you like a program, throw a few dollars their way to encourage them to keep improving their program. If you can say "I wish I had a program that ......", then you'll probably find something at SourceForge.net that meets your needs. **- Submitted by Laurie Scott**

## **FINANCIAL FOCUS** Put Your Tax Refund to Work

It's Tax Refund Season again. This year, if you're going to get a check from your Uncle Sam, why not put it to work to help you meet your financial goals?

Last year, the average tax refund was more than \$2,700, according to the IRS. The size of your refund, or whether you will get one at all, depends on your individual circumstances. But if you are going to get a refund, plan ahead for what you'll do with it. Here are a few possibilities:

- **PAY DOWN SOME DEBTS**. In these difficult economic times, you may be carrying a higher debt load than usual. If so, you may want to use some of your refund to pay down some of these debts. The lower your debt payments, the better your cash flow and the more money you'll have to invest for the future.
- **BUILD AN EMERGENCY FUND**. If you don't already have an emergency fund containing six to 12 months' worth of living expenses, you could use your tax refund to start one. Without such a fund, you may find yourself constantly dipping into your long-term investments to pay for unexpected costs, such as a new furnace or an expensive car repair. Keep your emergency fund in

a liquid account — one that you don't draw on for your day-today expenses.

• **HELP FUND YOUR IRA.** In 2010, you can put in up to \$5,000 to your IRA. Consequently, if you received a \$2,700 refund, you'd have more than half of what you need to fully fund your IRA for the year. (If you're 50 or older, however, you can contribute up to \$6,000 per year.)

You might not think that your \$2,700 would make much of a difference in the long run. But by investing your refund and giving it many years of growth potential, you could end up with a sizable amount. Consider the following:

- If you put \$2,700 in your IRA, and you earned, on average, seven percent a year for 30 years, you'd end up with about \$20,000, even if you never invested another dime.
- If you put \$2,700 every year in that same IRA, again earning an average seven percent annual return, you'd end up with more than \$270,000 after thirty years.

You'd eventually have to pay taxes on your earnings, typically when you make withdrawals at retirement. And if you qualified for a Roth IRA, you'd never have to pay taxes on your earnings, as long as you had your account for at least five years and didn't start taking withdrawals until you were at least 59-1/2.

• **CONTRIBUTE TO A SECTION 529 PLAN.** If you have children or grandchildren, you may want to establish Section 529 plans to help them pay for college. You can contribute virtually any amount, and the earnings grow tax-free, provided the money is used for higher education expenses. (Withdrawals used for expenses other than qualified education expenses may be subject to federal, state and penalty taxes. Contributions are tax-deductible in certain states for residents who participate in their own state's plan. Please note that a 529 college savings plan could impact a beneficiary's ability to qualify for financial aid.)

You may be tempted to spend your tax refund on things you want today — but, with a little planning, you can use it for things you need tomorrow.

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

# Playgrounds



More and more cities are opening spraygrounds, which are water playgrounds. At a sprayground, kids can shoot each other with water cannons and get sprayed by dozens of water jets that squirt from different colored nozzles and hoses.

Do you have a favorite playground? Maybe it's a new wooden one that has lots of tall towers and passageways. Or maybe your favorite is an oldfashioned playground with swings and a seesaw. Playgrounds are fun places for kids because there's so much to do and other kids to have fun with. But sometimes kids get hurt at playgrounds.That's no fun, so here are 10 ways to keep safe:

**I. Take a grown-up.** As kids get bigger, they like doing things on their own. Going to the playground shouldn't be one of them, though. Grown-ups come in handy because they might spot problems at the playground, they can help you down if you get in a tight spot, and they can help if you happen to get hurt.

**2. Take a good look around.** If the playground has lots of trash, such as broken glass, or the equipment looks broken, don't play there.

**3. Keep your size in mind.** Many playgrounds have some equipment that's for little kids (like 2- to 5-year-olds) and other equipment that's meant for older kids. Use the equipment that's right for your age. If you squeeze yourself onto a swing for toddlers, you might get stuck. Likewise, if your little brother or sister starts climbing something meant for older kids, guide him or her to the little kid stuff.

4. Don't go too high. Many playgrounds have tall stuff to play on, such as towers or open passageways between equipment. Don't climb higher than you feel comfortable, and feel free to ask your grown-up if you need help getting down. Never climb up the outside of equipment, or hoist yourself up on the roof. The view might be cool, but it's a long way down.

**5. Look out below.** The best playgrounds put down special surfacing material, such as mulch, wood chips, sand, gravel, or rubber matting. These surfaces can help soften a fall, but that doesn't mean you won't get hurt, especially if you tumble from a high spot.

**6. Swing safely.** Kids often get hurt at the playground because they get hit by someone on a swing. If you're swinging, watch out for people who

might be getting too close.And if you're walking around the playground, don't get too close to the swingers.

7. Use your head. Sometimes you'll see kids going headfirst down the slide or maybe two or three kids will get on a piece of equipment that's only meant for one. Or some kids might start goofing around and trying to push each other off a swing or off of a high spot. If your grown-up sees you doing this, he or she will probably say, "Knock it off. Someone's going to get hurt." It's true, so try to use the playground equipment properly. And if you get stuck, or don't know how to get down from something, call your grown-up over so he or she can help you down.

8. Report problems. If you see graffiti (when people write or paint on stuff), a broken swing, or find any other problems while you're playing, tell your grown-up. He or she can report the problem so it can be fixed.

**9. Clean up.** If you bring a drink or snack to the playground, clean up your trash before you leave. When you do, the park will look nice when the next kid comes along to play and you will have shown that you're a good playground citizen.

**10.Have a great time!** How can you make a good time at the playground even better? Bring a friend and only complain a little when it's time to leave.
