Dear Resident:

The Board of Directors (the "Board") of Harris County Municipal Utility District No. 168 (the "District") would like to take this opportunity to notify you that the District will hold an election for the approval of \$5,500,000 of Recreational Facilities Bonds on Saturday, May 8th, at the Steeplechase Clubhouse, 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Early voting will be held Monday through Friday, April 26 through May 4 at 9910 Jockey Club Drive from 7:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.

The purpose of this election is to authorize funding for the construction of recreational facilities to try to maintain property values and to enhance the quality of life in the District. The Board plans to sell bonds to fund its recreational facilities as current debt is paid down with the intent of NOT RAISING TAXES to fund such facilities.

The District has developed a master park plan which includes the elements listed below. We must emphasize that this is a plan. It is based on needs as the Board sees them today. The Board will review the needs and revise the projects as the park plan is implemented. This bond election is only the first step to authorize the District to make these improvements. Subsequent steps such as designing the facilities, acquiring land, obtaining permission to make improvements along the bayou and selling bonds to fund the work will be required, and there is no guarantee that all the facilities can be constructed. However, without the authority to sell bonds to fund the work, there is little likelihood that the District can fund these improvements.

The Master Park Plan Includes The Following Improvements To The District:

- A concrete fence, sidewalks, lighting, seating and landscaping along the east side of N. Eldridge
 Parkway to beautify this entrance into the District and to provide residents a safe walk to and
 from the retail and eating establishments located at N. Eldridge and FM 1960;
- Renovations, additions and redevelopment of the three existing parks in the District consisting of new and improved play equipment and exercise equipment;
- A new park with parking to be constructed in the Green Belt area along Steepleway Blvd. between Churchill Way Drive and Gold Cup;
- Jogging and walking trails along the Bayou connecting Steepleway Blvd. (near Jones) and N. Eldridge Pkwy; and
- New sidewalks and sidewalk repairs for damaged sidewalks and areas currently without sidewalks, connecting the major thoroughfares in the District for safe pedestrian walking.

This work will take place in phases over several years. The Board intends to coordinate such construction with planned improvements to the District's infrastructure in order to maintain and improve the quality and service of the District and to provide minimal inconvenience to the residents. 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


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Do You Know Where You Will Be *On June 14th?*

June 14th is the special election day for voting on the merger of the churchill, cobblestone, and greenbrook bridge associations into the steeplechase community improvement association.

With approval by 2/3rds of the member residents eligible to vote, there will be a single association and a single board of directors responsible for the operation of the steeplechase community instead of the four associations as is the current situation. This will simplify and streamline the management of, and the planning for, the overall steeplechase community.

If you are going to be gone, don't worry; you can still vote by proxy. The members of the board of directors for each association will be soliciting proxies door to door starting in early may in case you are unable to vote on the day of the special election. The ballots will be mailed by pcmi in late april/early may to the owner of record. Of course, you can return your proxy direct to pcmi. How to do this will be included in the mailing from pcmi.

Regardless of how you do it, by mailing your proxy ballot to pcmi, by giving your proxy ballot to the board member that contacts you directly, or by voting in person on june 14th, exercise your civic privilege and vote.

All boards have unamimously voted for the merger of the associations for a better, more effective steeplechase community improvement association.

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
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RECYCLING

I looked up and down the street. There were only 8 bins of recycling sitting by the curb. Come on people, it is very easy to do! With just my husband and I living here we always have at least 1 full bin of recycling every week, usually 2. 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
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Join the Steeplechase **Crime Watch Program**

ASK YOURSELF:

- If Sheriff, Ambulance or Fire Department were dispatched to your home right now, could they easily find it?
- Is your house number clearly visible on the curb in front of your
- Is your house number clearly visible on the front of your home?
- Is your porch light left on at night?
- Are all streetlights near your home operational?

Answering "No" to any of these questions means valuable minutes are lost trying to find your location - verses helping you. When time is of the essence, safety is on the line; do you want emergency response to waste precious time trying to find your home?

If navigating someplace new, you usually use directions, look-up the location on the internet, have identifying clues such as type of car in the driveway, balloon on mailbox, turn left at the Valero. When emergency services are dispatched to your location, in most cases this is the drivers first time to your location, they have limited time available to get there and identifiers such as a visible house number are essential in reducing response time.

In driving around Steeplechase, I am dismayed at the number of homes that are dark and lack an easily visible house number. I'm not sure how you think any of the emergency response teams can find you, but I assure you, it will take them much longer than necessary.

I urge each resident to take a moment and take a look at your home at night. If you can't easily and quickly see your house number on the front of your home and curb, please rectify. If your streetlight is out, report it. And, leave your porch light on at night.


