Joel Pace who begins his 2nd year on the board continues in his capacity as Development Officer and will keep the board and residents apprised of the commercial development that continues to occur along Slaughter Lane. And, last but certainly not least, Steve Urban, past President, will work to ensure a smooth transition of leadership and will mentor those of us who aspire to accomplish what he did during his officer term last year.

I look forward to working with the new Board and the highly experienced management team and contractors we have engaged. We will all be working to carry out the Board's vision of making our community one that others emulate.

NEW SWIM CENTER

Project Update

We are excited to report that the new swim center project at La Crosse and Spruce Canyon is now underway. As reported previously, the land and amenity fund were conveyed to the Association last year which gave us the responsibility for building a new swim center complex. Beginning in the fall of 2009 we began to solicit bids for a project management firm to manage the project for the HOA. We selected Square One Consultants and they quickly jumped on board to lead the effort in bidding out the design and construction of the project. We are currently negotiating contracts for both of those services and our goal is to begin construction sometime in late fall and complete construction in the spring of 2011. Until we receive the final site plan acceptance from the City of Austin, these dates are subject to change.

We will begin including a monthly update via the newsletter, website and email (if you haven't signed up already for email announcements, please do so at www.circlecranch.info). 


Circle C Neighborhood Blood Drive



We are always working to **improve the facility** for the community. We have installed artificial turf between the Pool Offices and the Café to reduce the amount of mud that accumulates in that area. So far the response has been very positive. Come by and tell us what you think! You may also notice some changes to the restrooms, and different construction projects that are going on. We are working on the mechanical areas of the pool to increase safety, environmental sensitivity, and operational efficiency. We apologize for any noise or inconvenience in advance. We are also in the process of upgrading the facility technology, and as we get everything online and working, we hope that this will decrease the amount of time you need to spend in the office and improve your overall experience at the facility.

As we come up on the summer months, we would ask that you use either the exit gate next to the café by the parking lot, or through the basketball court area. It helps everyone have the opportunity to get through the check in at the front desk much more quickly when the flow is moving primarily in one direction.

We are excited to see everyone starting to come out and play at the pool! The Swim Center is now a WiFi hot spot, so even if you are attached

to your laptop, you can still come out and have fun in the sun! Get those swim bags ready, and we will see you soon at the pool!

Circle C Landscape Update

I would like to update you on all of the maintenance services performed by Circle C Landscape to the commons areas over the past month. This, of course, is the absolute busiest time of year and the extensive commons areas take a lot of attention. By the time you get this newsletter, we will have completed fertilization, pre-emergent weed treatment and ant treatments of all of the commons areas. Shrubs will have been trimmed throughout, and the weekly mowing schedule is in full force. This year, we have lots and lots of oak pollen and weeds, probably more than we have seen in the past five years. The cold and wet winter has caused the grass to stay dormant longer than usual, and the weeds have had a field day in the meantime. So, while everything has looked quite green, some of that green are "undesirables"—i.e. weeds that we must be persistent about to get under control.

I am awaiting the other great thing about spring—the caterpillars and loopers that will probably be numerous this spring. For a few weeks, it feels as if we are raining worms and webs everywhere. We do not treat for the worms in the numerous trees on the commons areas, but if they are bothering you in your yard, we recommend BT worm killer, which is an organic product that will kill the worms pretty readily. You can get it at any local garden store. It is also the time of year to broadcast fire ant bait across your entire yard. If everyone in Circle C did this, the fire ants would relocate elsewhere. The best

products recommended by the Texas Department of Agriculture contain fipronil, and can be found at your local nursery in brands such as Top Choice Fire Ant Bait or Over and Out. These are to be spread throughout the yard on a nice sunny day. They are highly effective in killing queen fire ants and rendering mounds inactive. We encourage everyone to use fire ant bait in May.

As of mid-April, we still have a lot of vegetation that remains dormant, will need further cutting back, or may not recover from our winter freezes. A lot of damage has occurred to African or bi-color irises on the commons areas, and we are systematically cutting out the dead parts. The fig ivy on the walls still looks quite brown, although there are signs of life underneath. We are going to give it a little while longer to recover. Also, some of the crape myrtles that were in windy locations are extremely slow coming out this year, so again, we are waiting it out for their return. Their branches are flexible and they don't appear to be dead, so leafing out is just taking a while. We will also be replanting some beds where the plants were damaged beyond being salvageable. As far as capital improvement projects, we are working on turf installation, bed installation and tree installation on Escarpment. The bollard lights on Escarpment have now all been replaced and repaired, and new lighting has been added at Escarpment and Slaughter. Architectural Control Committee Update

Contact the ACC if you are doing any improvements to your property. All improvements are required to go through the Architectural Review Process. This includes anything that is being permanently installed on any portion of your property. Please see below for items that do not need to be reviewed.

The easiest way to get information about the process is to go the Circle C HOA website at www.circlecranch.info and log in as a resident. Under Resident Services you can access the materials of the Architectural Control Committee, see all of the guidelines and information about specific projects and download the required form for ACC submission.

Yard Art Guidelines

Yard art is a great thing to have and does express a lot of individual taste. Because of this the ACC welcomes as much yard art as possible in the back yard. For the front yard, you are limited to two pieces of small yard art—i.e. less than 18" tall, and they must be integrated into the landscaping. If you are planning an front

yard fountain, it must go through the ACC review process and obtain ACC approval.


Pottted plants may be used in the front yard at appropriate locations such as the front porch, and integrated into the landscape as an accent piece. Potted plants are not suitable for the driveway area, unless it is one single pot that anchors a corner or the midpoint column of the garage. Empty pots should be relegated to the back yard.

The CCHOA regularly issues cooperative letters and deed restrictions for excessive yard art in the front yards, so make sure that you are within the guidelines and that the overall appearance of your front yard is neat and tidy, and maintained to the standards of the neighborhood.

Items Not Subject to ACC Review

Roof Replacement—If you are replacing your roof with shingles
that match the existing shingles, you do not have to go through the
ACC review process. This color of shingle was reviewed during
the building process and already has approval.

• Fence Replacement— For fences that do not abut Commons Areas—side fences and back fences that back to other residences—If you are replacing with the same fence, you do not have to go through ACC review. Fences that face a street are required to have the smooth side out.

• Paint Colors—If you are repainting the same color on your home that was approved as part of the original building, then you do not have to obtain permission.

Rules & Regulations

- 1. All registration forms are due by May 28, 2010. There will be no on-site registration on the day of the cook-off. Judging will begin at noon with turn-ins at separate times. Cooks may begin set-up anytime on Friday, June 4 beginning at 7pm.
- 2. A barbeque team may have no more than 4 people per team. The team captain must be a Circle C Resident.
- 3. Barbeque must be cooked from scratch on-site the day of (or night before) the cook-off. It must be prepared in the open at the team's booth site. No gas cooking allowed.
- 4. Teams are asked to prepare and cook food in as sanitary manner as possible. Cooking conditions

are subject to inspection by the head judge. All food, equipment and utensils must be stored at least 6" off the floor on pallets, shelving or tables at all times.

- 5. Each team will be given one parking space at the back of the swim center. Spaces will be numbered and each team, upon registration, will be given a number. Appropriate themed decoration of your area and related costuming is encouraged, but please remember this is a family event.
- 6. Cooking will take place in the designated parking space area only. Cooks must provide their own materials to include: table, chairs, shade, cooking utensils & ingredients.
- 7. At the discretion of the head judge, cooks may be required to taste their own barbeque in front of a judge at any time during the event.
- 8. Firearms, explosives or other pyrotechnics will not be allowed on the premises.
- 9. Lone Star BBQ Society Rules apply. Complete rules and forms will be posted on the CCHOA website.



Circle C Tennis Announcements

Readers' questions about "Playing Tennis" This month's questions about playing tennis are:

Q – How do I select the type of a racket for my child to play with?

A – Tennis Rackets come in all different styles and sizes. For children, we suggest a small racket that will fit comfortably in their hands and the size to be relative to their height. We normally measure the child on a poster with Roger Federer, that will indicate if the child needs a 19", 21", 23" 26" or 27" racket. These rackets are not too expensive and can be found in most sporting good and discounts stores. They will range from \$15.00 to \$30.00.

Q – I have an old wooden racket that I played in the 70's. Is it still good?

A – Unfortunately wood tennis rackets went away when aluminum and steel rackets were introduced in the 70's. Since then, many graphite and composite rackets have been designed to give more power and flexibility with the changes of the game. Also, tennis balls have changed in weight and pressure to withstand the power generated by the rackets. The head size has also increased to allow

for more people to be able to play without having the eye and the coordination of a Bjorg Borg.


Q -How do adults choose rackets?

A – The best way to buy a new racket is to follow the same steps as getting a new car. Many tennis websites allow the player to fill out a questionnaire with information about sex, size,

weight, number of times that the person plays and rating (if one has one.) The results of this questionnaire will give the player some ideas of what type and size of racket to choose. The next step is to play with the recommended rackets and see which frame will suit the player best.

Financial Focus

In the investment world, there aren't many certainties, but here's one of them: prices will always go up and down. As an individual investor, you can't do anything about this volatility. But the way you respond to it could make a big difference in your long-term investment success.

Many investors think they can "beat" volatility by trying to time the market — in other words, by buying when prices are low and selling when prices are high. In theory, this is an excellent strategy, but in reality, it's pretty much impossible to follow — because no one can really predict, with any accuracy, market highs and lows. So instead of attempting to time the market, you're much better off by following a time-tested strategy known as systematic investing.

To systematically invest, you simply put the same amount of money into the same investments at regular intervals. To illustrate,

you could put \$100, \$500, \$1000 or more into Investment X on the first of every month. To make it even easier on yourself, you could automatically transfer those dollars from your bank account directly into the investment you've chosen.

In all likelihood, your contribution will buy a different amount of shares of Investment X each month. For example, if Investment X sells for \$100 per share in January, a \$500 investment will buy five shares.

In February, if the price has fallen to \$50 per share, your \$500 will buy 10 shares.


In other words, when you systematically invest, you'll automatically buy more shares when the price is low and fewer shares when the price is higher — and that's a great

way to cope with market volatility. But systematic investing also offers some other advantages, including the following:

- Efficient share building The more shares you own of an investment, the bigger your cumulative gains whenever the price of that investment rises. Consequently, increasing your shares should be a prime objective and systematic investing is one way of building your share ownership.
- **Investment discipline** Most people realize the value of investing for their retirement and other long-term goals, but they often put it off each month and find other things to do with the money— and by then, there's often nothing left to invest. But by setting up a bank authorization to invest systematically each month, you'll "pay yourself first."
 - Lower cost of investing Through systematic investing, your cost per share likely will be lower than if you made sporadic lump sum investments. And by lowering the cost of investing, you will, in effect have the potential to boost your returns.

While systematic investing is typically a good way to fight the effects of volatility, it can't guarantee a profit or prevent a loss in declining markets. And keep in mind that you need to have the financial wherewithal to keep investing through up and down markets.

But if you have that ability, consider putting systematic investing to work for you. It may not be glitzy or glamorous, but it may work for you.

What makes no sound and cannot see? Often lives for decades, but seldom moves from a secure spot? Causing a stir, making us ponder their future as well as our own? The answer to this riddle is freshwater mussels! Nearly three hundred species of native freshwater mussels (also called unionids) live in the United States, with more than 50 of them found in Texas. Yet nearly 70% of the known species are extinct, endangered, or in need of special protection,

largely due to the changes that have occurred in their ecosystem in the last 200 years.

Living buried in the sand and gravel at the bottom of river and streams, with a few adapted to the quiet waters of lakes and ponds, freshwater mussels are filter feeders. They draw their food to them by siphoning water into their shells and using their gills to filter out algae and small particles from the water and to take in oxygen. Although freshwater mussels have a muscular 'foot', they don't move very much but use this foot to burrow into the mud or provide limited travel if disturbed by droughts or floods.

Freshwater mussels are protected from predators by a hard, calcium-based shell consisting of two halves joined by a hinge. Thin-shelled species live on average 4 to 10 years, while thick-shelled species can live 20 to 40 years or more. With colorful common names including terms like floater, pocketbook, fatmucket, pimpleback, pistol grip, and washboard, Texas unionids were often named after items that resembled the shapes of their shells, by those who harvested them for their pearls and for use in the shell-button industry. Fifteen species of Texas freshwater mussels are now on the state threatened list, which means they are protected and cannot be collected or killed. Those found in the Colorado River system in central Texas include the False spike (Quadrula mitchelli), Smooth pimpleback (Quadrula houstonensis), Texas fatmucket (Lampsilis

bracteata), Texas fawnsfoot (Truncilla macrodon), and the Texas pimpleback (Quadrula petrina).

In addition to their unusual common names, these bivalves also have a very unusual reproductive cycle. First, eggs held inside the female need to be fertilized by sperm released into the water from a nearby male. The resulting young mussels, or glochidia, are in turn released by the female and temporarily attach themselves to a fish's fins or gills. This sounds like tricky business, and it is!

> Female mussels have evolved to attract certain species of host fish by using insect, worm and fish-shaped lures - tissue-based extensions of their bodies

 developed to bring the fish in close enough for the dispersed glochidia to attach. During this harmless parasitic stage, the glochidia grow into tiny mussels and within a few weeks drop from the fish and down to the river bottom or stream bed to mature and continue the cycle.

Sadly, there are many reasons for the decline of freshwater mussel populations in Texas, and most of them are man-made. Changes in the

natural flow of rivers and streams due to dams and lake construction, increased deposition of silt due to runoff caused by the clearing of indigenous vegetation, introduction of aquatic contaminants and exotic plant species, and the lack of native fish hosts are a few of those reasons contributing to the decline.

Freshwater mussels are an important indicator of the vitality of our aquatic ecosystems. Healthy populations would reflect more pure, clean water for humans as well as many other aquatic plants and animals!

Gardening in the Hill Country

Spring is in full swing with bright green mornings full of sunshine and bird song. Area garden centers are bursting with eager gardeners loading carts with compost, flowers and landscape supplies. While riding the energy of the season to beautify your yard, keep in mind a few things that will help the garden flourish through spring and summer.

Healthy soil supports a healthy landscape. Dedicate energy every year to improving your soil, and you will be richly rewarded with better blooms, improved water efficiency, and fewer disease problems. Work compost into garden and flower beds, and top-dress established areas and lawns with compost. Compost improves soil quality, and reduces or eliminates the need for fertilizer.

Water your garden efficiently and effectively. Although some watering is necessary to sustain gardens in the Hill Country, many people water too much! Over-watering wet or shallow soil results in weakened or diseased plants as well as runoff (water and money down the storm drain). For our thin and clay Hill Country soils, ½ inch, twice per week is the maximum amount you should need to water--even during the heat of summer. During spring and fall, ½ inch once per week is plenty.


Watering between dusk and dawn further increases the effectiveness of the water you use by reducing evaporation and increasing the amount of water that makes it to plant roots.

Twice per week summer watering is good for landscapes and also good for water supply. Over 60 percent of residential water is used on landscapes in the summer, resulting in water treatment plants experiencing peak demands. Efficient watering reduces the need to built new water treatment plants.

The City of Austin requires their customers to water no more than twice per week watering schedule effective May 1 through September 30. LCRA encourages all of its retail customers to follow Austin's schedule. The watering schedule is as follows:

Odd Addresses: Wednesday And Saturday Even Addresses: Thursday And Sunday Commercial And Hoa Common Areas: Tuesday And Friday

Healthy soil and efficient watering will assure that the vibrant flowers in your shopping cart at the garden center thrive in your yard throughout the growing season. Be sure to consider using native and adapted plants that are drought tolerant. 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

YEAHYEAH, BACKUP BACKUP,

Nag Nag!

OK, my clients are used to hearing it, "backup backup." I can say if often but it's never too often. Let me put it another way, how much pain are you willing to endure? The hard drive in your computer WILL fail someday. So WHEN it does, how are you going to feel? School's almost out for the summer. How will you feel when that final paper or report disappears right before you're ready to submit it to the teacher or professor?

Maybe you're a young family, and you have thousands of digital photos and videos recording everything your babies have done their first few years. Their first haircut, first birthday, first Christmas, the first time they walk, their FIRST WORDS! All in a pristine, digital format that is very easy to duplicate, yet all GONE, possibly never to be seen by anyone again.

You use something like Quicken or Microsoft Money and keep you banking records on your computer, or you own your own business and ALL your financial records are stored on your hard drive. It's almost tax time and the information can't be retrieved. You now have to spend days

or weeks recreating your records as best you can (this happened to a client of mine.) The "computer ate my homework" won't fly with the IRS.

So I'll ask you again, how much pain are you willing to endure? You do have a few options to backing up your valuable data. One way is to do it yourself (I'll go into more detail later.) Another way to preserve your memories is to pay someone else to do it. Yet a third way is probably the most common way, intentional or not – prayer. No plan, no system, just the hope that nothing goes wrong with their computer. Since I'm not aware of a Patron Saint of the PC, I'll concentrate on the first two methods – you're on your own for the third option.

Want to do it yourself? Purchase an inexpensive external hard drive and plug it into your computer's USB port. You can pick up a 500GB (that's gigabyte) external hard drive at Best Buy for around \$80, and maybe a terabyte drive (that's 1,000 gigabytes) for \$100. If you like to shop around online you can probably find something even cheaper. Just about anything you buy will include backup software. If you don't like it, you can try downloading my favorite, SyncBack. Go to 2BrightSparks.com, click on "Downloads" and choose their freeware. Download SyncBack in whatever language you like and go at it.

Of course, if you're not inclined for any reason to do it yourself, you can always pay someone to do the above for you. Also, you can keep the "upfront" cost to a minimum by going with an online solution. Two advantages are you don't have to spend very much up front, and the other is that even in the event of burglary, fire, etc. you can buy a new computer and download all your backed up files. The two most well known services are Mozy and Carbonite, they cost about the same (\$55 a year.) Mac users also have me.com as an option (though it is a little more expensive.)

Now, not all hope is lost if your hard drive should fail. There are services available that will take your hard drive, have employees in "bunny suits" take it into a "clean room" (much cleaner than an operating room), disassemble it, remove the platters (the parts with the information) and rebuild it with matching parts in an attempt to extract the data. IF they are successful, plan on spending approximately \$2,000 to get the data back. It that's a lot of money to you, then look at doing it yourself or hire an expert to do it for you. It's not hard at all to do – but you need to do it. If you don't, you're going to remember how you were "nagged" and didn't do anything when you could have, and there will be a geek waiting for your phone call.

Can the Weather Affect My Child's Asthma?

Weather and Asthma

The effect of weather on asthma symptoms isn't fully understood, but clearly there is a link. Numerous studies have shown a variety of connections, such as increases in asthma-related emergency department visits when certain weather conditions are present. Some people find that their asthma symptoms get worse at specific times of year. For others, a severe storm or sudden weather change may trigger an attack.

Exposure to cold, dry air is a common asthma trigger and can quickly cause severe symptoms. People with exercise-induced asthma who participate in winter sports are especially susceptible. Dry, windy weather can stir up pollen and mold in the air, leading to problems for some people.

Hot, humid air also can trigger asthma symptoms, and wet weather encourages the growth of mold spores, another asthma trigger. In certain areas, heat and sunlight combine with pollutants to create ground-level ozone, which is also an asthma trigger.

Studies have shown that thunderstorms can trigger asthma attacks. One study showed that during thunderstorms, the daily number of emergency department visits for asthma increased by 15%. The study concluded that the problem was caused by the number of fungal spores in the air, which almost doubled. It wasn't rain, but the wind, that caused this increase. Changes in barometric pressure may also be an asthma trigger.

Avoiding Allergy Triggers

If you suspect weather is playing a role in your child's asthma, keep a diary of asthma symptoms and possible triggers and talk to your child's doctor. Once you know what kind of weather triggers asthma symptoms, you can take steps to protect your child:

 Watch the forecast for pollen and mold counts as well as other conditions (extreme cold or heat) that might affect your child's asthma.

- Limit your child's outdoor activities on peak trigger days.
- Make sure your child wears a scarf over his or her mouth and nose outside during very cold weather.
- Keep windows closed at night to keep pollens and molds out.
 If it's hot, use air conditioning, which cleans, cools, and dries the air.
- Keep your child indoors early in the morning (before 10 AM) when pollen is at its highest levels.
- Your child shouldn't mow the lawn or rake leaves, and should be kept away from freshly cut grass and leaf piles.
- Dry clothes in the dryer (hanging clothes or sheets to dry can allow mold or pollen to collect on them).
- Make sure your child always has rescue medication on hand.

Your child's written asthma action plan should list weather triggers and ways to manage them, including any seasonal increases in medication. A child whose asthma seems to be allergy-related may also need to see an allergist for medication or allergy shots.


