Bluebonnet Photos!

Bluebonnets in Texas are a major Spring attraction in Steiner Ranch, especially along Quinlan Park Road. Many families took advantage of this year's spectacular showing by taking photos in the Bluebonnets. This is a family tradition for many central Texas families and luckily they have shared many of them with us.

Usually, Bluebonnets grow along many state highways, and can be seen for miles. They typically bloom until the end of May when temperatures get

warm. They tend to peak in mid-April. Blooming along with the bluebonnets are Indian paintbrush, Indian blanket and coreopsis. Once they have finished blooming, Steiner Ranch will not cut them for at least 40 days so that they will adequately form seed to produce another beautiful crop next Spring.

Continuing to work with both the Swim Team and the SRROA Board of Directors to update the John Simpson facility which will allow for some of the Swim Team practice times to be shifted to this facility in 2011. With the new heated facility at Bella Mar, they are working on implementing the most efficient and effective hours of operation for the facility in both the winter and summer seasons, as well as working directly with the contracted Lifeguard Company with lifeguard training issues. The Fields Committee is continuing to work with our contracted landscaping company to restore the Bella Mar and Towne Square fields. Representatives from the tennis community have worked diligently in helping to fairly manage the tremendous use the courts receive and to add features such as additional benches and picnic tables near the courts.

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Steiner's Water Trail

Much has been written about our awesome running, biking and walking trail system, however, another easily accessible trail is right at our back door. Lake Austin is easily accessed for kayaking from the Steiner Ranch Lake Club or from Mary Quinlan Park. You can launch a kayak from either location and paddle north toward Mansfield Dam or in a southerly direction towards the Hula Hut. You will have definitely earned your lunch and a beer if you paddle all the way to Hula Hut.

You will need more equipment than a pair of running shoes to become a paddler but the knowledge and equipment needed are affordable and readily accessible as Austin is one of the best paddling cities in the nation. You can paddle for exercise, to explore, for fishing or to see many of the different critters that live in the riparian environment of Lake Austin. In a two hour paddle I often see Wild Turkeys, Great Blue Herons, Kingfishers, Cormorants, Coots, turtles, and at least a half dozen varieties of ducks.

Paddling is a great upper body and core exercise that compliments a running, biking or walking program. A proper paddling style uses not just the arms but muscles of the shoulders, back, and stomach. Good paddlers use core muscle groups as they are larger and stronger than the muscles of the arm.

Lake Austin will be busy with powerboats and personal watercraft in the summer but even then weekdays and mornings offer relatively calm waters. Most recreational kayaks are very stable. For safety, just stay close to the shore and wear a PFD. From October to April the powerboat traffic is almost non-existent. I paddle almost year around and have never flipped a boat on Lake Austin. But, it's not a bad idea to take a whistle and carry a mobile phone in a waterproof bag.

There are two basic kayaks appropriate for use on Lake Austin. Sit-on-top (SOT) models are self bailing and will not sink even if overturned. SOT's are a sealed unit commonly used for recreation, fitness and fishing. Sit inside models are usually lighter and faster but are harder to empty if they fill with water. Most dealers will allow you to test both models and tell you the pros and cons before you buy. There are a half dozen quality canoe/kayak dealers in the Austin area including one on RR 620. You can also find great deals on used boats and paddles.

Once you learn paddling fundamentals you can venture out to Lady Bird Lake, the San Marcos or Guadalupe, to the coast for saltwater fishing or join in many of the recreational kayak races offered in Central Texas. Recreational kayak races are becoming increasing (Continued on Page 15)

popular and like road races are open to all skill levels. If you are looking for extreme adventure go to San Marcos on June 12th to see the start of the Texas Water Safari, the world's toughest boat race - a 260 mile non-stop trip to Seadrift Texas on the coast. You never know - you might get hooked.

Who settled the land just across the dam? Several families with names you'll recognize: The Hudsons, the Stewarts, and the Ecks. The Ecks? We'll explain. The Hudson Family settled here in 1854. You'll know their name by the bend in the Colorado river which was named after them. There was a census in 1860 and it recorded Wiley Hudson, his wife Catherine and their children. It also listed a household headed by his father, James Hudson. Surveys had been made on the 4,000 acre Hudson Bend tract and the Hudsons acquired 4 of the 25 original tracts.

Stewart Road is named after Benjamin K. Stewart, who came here by covered wagon from Tennessee in 1850. He purchased 1,500 acres of river-front land at Hurst Creek inlet and built a homestead on the site now known as Vinyard Bay. The Stewarts were called "the river people" and because of their location close to the water they got flooded out occasionally. The locals decided that Graveyard Point graves had to be moved to high ground, and they were re-interred at the Eck Cemetery. This was difficult work. In addition to his ranching operation, Ben Stewart served in the militia and fought Indians. Many of his descendants live in the Austin and Lakeway areas today.

The two main communities in 1900 were Bee Cave and Eck, later Teck, just across the dam. There was nothing in Lakeway, and Four Points was many years away. The name for Teck came about as an oddity. Its original name was Eck Community, after Leonard Eck who operated a general store. The original Eck community school was a one-room building on Eck Community Road (now Kollmeyer Rd). Eck School was opened in 1890 and was a first-rate school. Eck became the center of the school district. The Eck Store was the center of activity in town and there was a local band called the Eck Store Deaf Band. When Mr. Eck opened a post office in his store in 1900, postal authorities required a name with at least four letters. Leonard solved the dilemma by adding the letter "T" to Eck and everything became Teck instead of Eck. The town of Teck eventually disappeared by the 1940s. But you can still visit the Teck Cemetery just across the dam west of Hudson Bend Road and Eck Lane. Source: Discussion with Byron D. Varner, author of Lakeway, the First 25 Years. Trails Update

As the weather warms up, the rains come with it. And remember after a big rain it's best to stay off the trails for at least one day. This gives the water a chance to soak in and your boots or bike tires won't cause ruts in the trails. If you see a branch hanging over the trail where it could be hazardous, just bring a hand saw on your next trip and cut it off. Note that any other cutting is never allowed in the greenbelts. Only your HOA is allowed to make trail repairs or reroutes - see below.

There are a couple of Boy Scout projects in play which are helping our trails be in the best shape they can. Andrew Butler built a bridge on Summer Vista, and Grant Phifer is building a rock crossing on Serrulata / Outback. Thank you, Boy Scouts! Is your favorite trail in need of repair or in need of better sign locations? If you see a problem on the trails, call the HOA at 266-7553 or visit http://www. steinerranchhoa.org under "Report A Problem." Be specific about the location on the trail, the problem you see, your ideas for a solution, and your contact information.

Construction of any kind is not allowed on the greenbelts or along trails. Recently a type of fort was found and removed on the Summer Vista. The responsible parties are subject to fines. If you see any construction take a picture and contact the HOA.

Only the HOA is authorized to create trails in Steiner Ranch. Unfortunately, someone has been cutting down trees in our greenbelt trying to make rogue trail. These are not authorized trails and are actually dangerous routes. We don't wish to spend your HOA money trying to close and re-vegetate rogue trails. Instead, we want to hear from those who want new trails because we are actively looking at routes within Steiner to expand our trail system. Would you like to help us plan new trails? Contact your Trails Committee to get involved at 266-8498 or come to the next Trails Committee meeting on Thursday June 3 at 7PM at Bella Mar. All residents are welcome to attend. A trail signage project team is now forming; we are designing a system of labels for our trail sign posts. To get connected here and volunteer your design skills, contact the trails committee at 266-8498.

If you see any rogue trail cutting or dangerous activity, including motorcycles anywhere on the trails or in the parks, take a picture and call the Travis County Sheriff West Command at (512) 854-9728 and the HOA. Remember, your trails are private and are for your use, and your accompanied guests' use only. **SUBMITTED BY RICH KEITH**

BOATS AND WATERCRAFT PARKING Where can I park them?

As summer approaches, boats and other watercraft are frequently seen in Steiner Ranch. Please remember that boats and watercraft must be stored in enclosed spaces at all times. Do not store them on your driveway or park them in the street. They are unsightly in your driveway and are an extreme safety hazard in the street. Repeat violators are subject to fines and/or towing.

If you see a boat, trailer or other recreational vehicle, feel free to report it to the Association at www.steinerranchhoa. org through the "Report a Problem" link. Please include a description of the violation and the address where the violation has occurred.

SPRING IS IN THE AIR ...and that means lawn maintenance!

Spring is on the way - we can only hope that the rain comes with it. What else comes are weeds!

Weed seeds respond to rising soil temperatures and begin to germinate. A lot of the spring time weeds can be managed by a strong, healthy and thick turf. If the turf is weak, thin and sickly, then weeds are more likely. Use of pre-emergent weed control products are in order if the turf is weak. Most garden centers have different choices and you should ask them for their advice. Always follow the directions. DO NOT use the old adage that "if a little is good more is better". Too much pre-emergent product is never better. These products come with a bit of fertilizer which is good because you do not need much fertilizer right now. The typical spring fertilization that will kick start your turf comes in late March or early April, so for now treat your lawn with pre-emergent products if necessary and enjoy the glory of spring.

Remember that all homeowners must keep all shrubs, trees, grass and plantings of every kind on their lot, including any Common Area platted as a part of their lot, cultivated, pruned, mowed, edged and free of trash and other unsightly materials.

If you use a lawn service or do it yourself, make sure your lawn clippings are disposed of correctly and remember to keep the bags of clippings out of site and put them at the curb on trash day only.

If your neighbors are not keeping their lawns maintained, it affects everyone, so please let the Association's Office know by going to www.steinerranchhoa.org and click on the "Report a Problem" link.



Greenbelt Tree Cutting

One aspect of Steiner Ranch that makes it such a beautiful place to live in is the extensive amount of natural greenbelts that surround each of the neighborhoods. There are some homeowners that love the greenbelts just the way they are. And then there are other homeowners that might have a bit of a view of Lake Austin or of a valley so they would like to cut down a few trees. That is a request that the Architectural Committee (the "AC") will consider approving within certain parameters.

Approval by the AC is required BEFORE any disturbance to the greenbelt. The greenbelts are private property of the HOA. Disturbing the greenbelt without prior written approval by the AC will result in fines that could cost the offending homeowner thousands of dollars, plus the cost to replace the trees that were cut down. Other additional fines and penalties could be enforced depending on the severity of the disturbance.

Please help us maintain the beautiful, natural trees and vegetation we are so fortunate to have throughout Steiner Ranch. If you back to a greenbelt and would like to remove some cedar trees, please submit a request to the AC before you do any cutting.

Playscape Structure Submittal

If you are thinking about getting the kids a playscape, don't forget that it will need to be reviewed to the Architectural Committee first. Things you should keep in mind when selecting a playscape:

- Must be constructed with a lumber that resists rotting and deterioration, i.e. redwood or treated lumber.
- Canopies on the playscape must be a solid color, preferably green or earth tone.
- Setbacks for playscapes are to be no less than 5' from each property line.
- Views of the playscape must be minimized from public streets and adjoining units.

Once you've decided on the playscape and location, complete the Architectural Modification form and include the requested items (i.e. photo of playscape, description of materials to be used, etc.) along with the required \$500 refundable deposit check to the Association for review by the Architectural Committee.

What should I do if I see a coyote?

To report coyote sightings, call 3-1-1.

You will be asked to describe in detail the nature of your complaint, time, location, etc. The city's Animal Control Program will gather data related to coyotes and provide that information to Texas Wildlife Services for response/follow-up. Animal Control will respond to reports of injured or trapped coyotes.

Call 3-1-1 to report a coyote attack on a human (to date there have been no reports in Travis County of coyotes attacking humans).

Post Office Complaints

The Community Associations Office continually receives complaints about the quality of mail delivery service in Steiner Ranch. Architectural Modification Requirements

So you've decided to do some improvements or make changes to the outside of your home..... what do you do now?

- I. Complete the Architectural Modification form (owner only)
- 2. Include any addendum forms such as for a pool or deck
- 3. Include a scaled drawing showing plan and elevation views of the proposed improvements, modifications or alterations. Submittals must include samples depicting the proposed materials and colors to be used.
- 4. A lot survey (which the owner receives at closing) indicating the location of proposed improvements, and any applicable easements, setbacks, and elevation differences on lot.
- 5. Deposit check in the amount of \$500

Facilities Available for Rent Do you have a holiday party or wedding reception to plan? Baby shower too big for the backyard? Birthday party coming up? How about a school/office party? Is your living room too small for a large celebration? We can accommodate a gathering of any size for a very reasonable price!

Being a resident of Steiner Ranch has many advantages. One of them is the variety of facilities available to rent. Many of you do not even realize that we have two indoor clubhouses with full kitchens! Another benefit is our electronic key tags that long ago replaced the "old-fashioned" keys that give you access to all indoor and outdoor facilities. If you do not have a facility tag or if you have lost* yours, please visit the HOA office to pick one up!

To rent any one (or more) of our facilities just follow these easy steps:

- 1. When and Where? Go to our website at www.steinerranchhoa.org and click on Facility Reservations (on the left). The available areas have a hyperlink that you can click on to check availability. Once you have the date and time in mind, call the Associations Management Office to place your name on the calendar.
- 2. First come, first served. Your reservation is only good for TWO days until you turn in your completed reservation form and make full payment (including deposit, if required). We will not make calls to remind you to pay. If you have not made a payment for your reservation after the two days, your reservation will be relinquished.
- What now? Once you have turned in your 3. payment and paperwork, you need not do anything else. The HOA office will activate your facility tag and post a sign at each

designated facility letting all visitors know you have it rented.

- 4. What do you get for your money? All reservations are set and priced for 6 hour blocks. Even if you plan to use it for only 2 hours you must pay the minimum price. All of our outdoor covered pavilions and uncovered areas and parks are \$25. You do not have to rent out the parks unless you want a guaranteed spot. Towne Square is our larger indoor facility that can hold 80 seated persons and costs \$100. Bella Mar is our newer facility that can hold 40 seated persons and is \$75. Both indoor facilities require a \$300 deposit.
- Cleaning Up. Please remember that there 5. may be a reservation coming in right after you. You are required to clean up after your event. We have a maintenance staff on-site that checks in and takes pictures of damage and/or untidiness of the facilities. You may opt for our staff to clean up after you for an additional \$100. (You are still required to dispose of your trash.)
- Cancelling. If you need to cancel your 6. reservation please call the Association Management Office at least 3 days prior to your reservation for a full refund.

Please call (512) 266-7553 if you have additional questions.

*If you have lost your facility tag, it needs to be reported as LOST immediately to prevent it from getting into the wrong hands. There is a \$20 replacement fee required to obtain a new tag.

Please note: The Steiner Ranch HOA provides each facility "as is" with tables and chairs. Outdoor heaters, fire pits, set-up/break-down and ashtrays are not provided.

Kindergarten and Pre-K Registration Set for May 5, 2010



Registration for the 2010 - 2011 school year will be held on Wednesday, May 5, 2010, from 7:30 a.m. - 11:00 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. - 6:30 p.m. at all LISD elementary campuses, including Steiner Ranch Elementary, Laura Bush Elementary and River Ridge Elementary.

- 1. Be 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2010. AND
- 2. Be a resident of Leander Independent School District. AND
- 3. Meet immunization requirements. AND
- 4. Meet at least one of the following conditions:
 - Child is unable to speak and Comprehend the English language; OR Child is homeless; OR
 - Child has a parent or official guardian who is an active duty member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces, who is ordered to active duty by proper authority; OR
 - Child has a parent or official guardian who is a member of the armed forces of the United States, including the state military forces or a reserve component of the armed forces, who was injured or killed while serving on active duty; OR
 - Child has ever been in foster care; OR
 - Child is eligible to participate in the national free or reduced-price lunch program due to limited family income.

NOTE: Due to federal guidelines, income status must be verified on or after June 23, 2010. Until that time, a space will be reserved for the child. Transportation is provided for the Pre-K program in accordance with district guidelines.

TO BE ELIGIBLE FOR KINDERGARTEN CHILDREN MUST:

- 1. Be 5 years of age on or before September 1, 2010.
- 2. Be a resident of Leander Independent School District.
- 3. Meet immunization requirements.

Parents wishing to register their child for Pre-K or Kindergarten must bring the child's birth certificate, social security card, immunization records, a photo ID of parent/guardian, and proof of residency, (i.e. an electric bill, water bill, etc...).

Travis County ESD No. 6 Honored for Leadership

Travis County Emergency Services District No. 6 (ESD6) was recognized for its statewide leadership Feb. 13 at the annual conference of the State Association of Fire and Emergency Services Districts (SAFE-D). ESD6 was named recipient of the annual Ladder Award, recognizing the district that most advanced the professionalism of all Texas emergency services districts.

ESD6 officials, cooperating with State Rep. Valinda Bolton, worked tirelessly during the 81st Legislature to give local residents the chance to provide additional resources for fire protection. "ESD6 led the charge," observed SAFE-D President Don Grogg, "Emergency services districts were created to assure reliable funding for fire protection and emergency medical care.

Specifically, ESD6 worked to raise the visibility with the state legislature for the

need to re-evaluate funding models for ESDs. Currently, funding and taxation laws are designed only to support rural population densities. In urban and emerging suburban densities, additional resources are required to ensure the response times necessary to save lives and property.

"ESD6 worked to make sure that, even in tough economic times, those services don't falter." Lewis continued, "Although the legislative effort fell short by two votes, ESD6 efforts raised awareness of emergency services districts at the Legislature, and those efforts will have profound effect as the discussion continues."

Accepting the Ladder Award were ESD6 Commissioner Brad Ellis and Lake Travis Fire Rescue Chief Jim Linardos. Travis County ESD6 operates Lake Travis Fire Rescue (formerly the Hudson Bend Fire Department) as it provides fire protection and emergency medical first-response to residents in more than 200 square miles of western Travis County.

SAFE-D is the only organization dedicated to helping the men and women of emergency services districts as they protect the lives and property of Texans.



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Gardening in the Hill Country

Spring is in full swing with bright green mornings full of sunshine and bird song. Area garden centers are bursting with eager gardeners loading carts with compost, flowers and landscape supplies. While riding the energy of the season to beautify your yard, keep in mind a few things that will help the garden flourish through spring and summer.

Healthy soil supports a healthy landscape. Dedicate energy every year to improving your soil, and you will be richly rewarded with better blooms, improved water efficiency, and fewer disease problems. Work compost into garden and flower beds, and top-dress established areas and lawns with compost. Compost improves soil quality, and reduces or eliminates the need for fertilizer.

Water your garden efficiently and effectively. Although some watering is necessary to sustain gardens in the Hill Country, many people water too much! Over-watering wet or shallow soil results in weakened or diseased plants as well as runoff (water and money down the storm drain). For our thin and clay Hill Country soils, ¹/₂ inch, twice per week is the maximum amount you should need to water--even during the heat of summer. During spring and fall, ¹/₂ inch once per week is plenty.

Watering between dusk and dawn further increases the effectiveness

of the water you use by reducing evaporation and increasing the amount of water that makes it to plant roots.

Twice per week summer watering is good for landscapes and also good for water supply. Over 60 percent of residential water is used on landscapes in the summer, resulting in water treatment plants experiencing peak demands. Efficient watering reduces the need to built new water treatment plants.

Healthy soil and efficient watering will insure that the vibrant flowers in your shopping cart at the garden center thrive in your yard throughout the growing season. Be sure to consider using native and adapted plants that are drought tolerant. For more information on drought tolerant plants and tips on water conservation, go to the LCRA web site: http://www.lcra.org/water/save/index.html.

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Weather and Asthma

The effect of weather on asthma symptoms isn't fully understood, but clearly there is a link. Numerous studies have shown a variety of connections, such as increases in asthma-related emergency department visits when certain weather conditions are present. Some people find that their asthma symptoms get worse at specific times of year. For others, a severe storm or sudden weather change may trigger an attack.

Exposure to cold, dry air is a common asthma trigger and can quickly cause severe symptoms. People with exercise-induced asthma who participate in winter sports are especially susceptible. Dry, windy weather can stir up pollen and mold in the air, leading to problems for some people.

Hot, humid air also can trigger asthma symptoms, and wet weather encourages the growth of mold spores, another asthma trigger. In certain areas, heat and sunlight combine with pollutants to create ground-level ozone, which is also an asthma trigger.

Studies have shown that thunderstorms can trigger asthma attacks. One study showed that during thunderstorms, the daily number of emergency department visits for asthma increased by 15%. The study concluded that the problem was caused by the number of fungal spores in the air, which almost doubled. It wasn't rain, but the wind, that caused this increase. Changes in barometric pressure may also be an asthma trigger.

Avoiding Allergy Triggers

If you suspect weather is playing a role in your child's asthma, keep a diary of asthma symptoms and possible triggers and talk to your child's doctor. Once you know what kind of weather triggers asthma symptoms, you can take steps to protect your child:

• Watch the forecast for pollen and mold counts as well as other conditions (extreme cold or heat) that might affect your child's asthma.

- Limit your child's outdoor activities on peak trigger days.
- Make sure your child wears a scarf over his or her mouth and nose outside during very cold weather.
- Keep windows closed at night to keep pollens and molds out. If it's hot, use air conditioning, which cleans, cools, and dries the air.
- Keep your child indoors early in the morning (before 10 AM) when pollen is at its highest levels.
- Your child shouldn't mow the lawn or rake leaves, and should be kept away from freshly cut grass and leaf piles.
- Dry clothes in the dryer (hanging clothes or sheets to dry can allow mold or pollen to collect on them).
- Make sure your child always has rescue medication on hand.

Your child's written asthma action plan should list weather triggers and ways to manage them, including any seasonal increases in medication. A child whose asthma seems to be allergy-related may also need to see an allergist for medication or allergy shots.

Many Women Risk Retirement To Fund College

A recent survey by Oppenheimer Funds reveals that women are highly committed to getting their kids to college and drive most households' college planning – but many take a back seat when it comes to college savings. Nearly three quarters – 74% -- of 1,099

women polled said it's very important for their children to obtain a college degree, compared with 66% of 559 men polled. However, in households that have begun planning financially for college, primary responsibility for this critical exercise most often belongs to men.

It's often true that women are keenly involved in making sure the kids are ready for higher education. But academic preparation



is not enough – the financial side often is addressed too late in the game. The poll indicates about eight of 10 women agree that it's important to plan financially for retirement and college costs at the same time. But only 10% of women strongly agree that they have such plans in place.

It's important to not rob one's retirement

savings to pay for college. And figures quickly show that borrowing for college costs a lot more than many people realize. The cost of borrowing really impacts the ability to save for retirement. And since women on average live longer than men, this reduced savings affects women more than men. What makes no sound and cannot see? Often lives for decades, but seldom moves from a secure spot? Causing a stir, making us ponder their future as well as our own? The answer to this riddle is freshwater mussels! Nearly three hundred species of native freshwater mussels (also called unionids) live in the United States, with more than 50 of them found in Texas. Yet nearly 70% of the known species are extinct, endangered, or in need of special protection,

largely due to the changes that have occurred in their ecosystem in the last 200 years.

Living buried in the sand and gravel at the bottom of river and streams, with a few adapted to the quiet waters of lakes and ponds, freshwater mussels are filter feeders. They draw their food to them by siphoning water into their shells and using their gills to filter out algae list, which means they are protected

and small particles from the water and to take in oxygen. Although freshwater mussels have a muscular 'foot', they don't move very much but use this foot to burrow into the mud or provide limited travel if disturbed by droughts or floods.

Freshwater mussels are protected from predators

by a hard, calcium-based shell consisting of two halves joined by a hinge. Thin-shelled species live on average 4 to 10 years, while thick-shelled species can live 20 to 40 years or more. With colorful common names including terms like floater, pocketbook, fatmucket, pimpleback, pistol grip, and washboard, Texas unionids were often named after items that resembled the shapes of their shells, by those who harvested them for their pearls and for use in the shell-button industry. Fifteen species of Texas freshwater mussels are now on the state threatened list, which means they are protected and cannot be collected or killed. Those found in the Colorado River system in central Texas include the False spike (Quadrula mitchelli), Smooth pimpleback (Quadrula houstonensis), Texas fatmucket (Lampsilis

bracteata), Texas fawnsfoot (Truncilla macrodon), and the Texas pimpleback (Quadrula petrina).

In addition to their unusual common names, these bivalves also have a very unusual reproductive cycle. First, eggs held inside the female need to be fertilized by sperm released into the water from a nearby male. The resulting young mussels, or glochidia, are in turn

released by the female and temporarily attach themselves to a fish's fins or gills. This sounds like tricky business, and it is! Female mussels have evolved to attract certain species of host fish by using insect, worm and fish-shaped Fifteen species lures - tissue-based extensions of their bodies of Texas freshwater

- developed to bring the fish in close enough for the dispersed glochidia to attach. During this harmless parasitic stage, the glochidia grow into tiny mussels and within a few weeks drop from the fish and down to the river bottom or stream bed to mature and continue the cycle.

Sadly, there are many reasons for the decline of freshwater mussel populations in

Texas, and most of them are man-made. Changes in the natural flow of rivers and streams due to dams and lake construction, increased deposition of silt due to runoff caused by the clearing of indigenous vegetation, introduction of aquatic contaminants and exotic plant species, and the lack of native fish hosts are a few of those reasons contributing to the decline.

Freshwater mussels are an important indicator of the vitality of our aquatic ecosystems. Healthy populations would reflect more pure, clean water for humans as well as many other aquatic plants and animals!

Doesn't that mean we have plenty of water and don't need to conserve? Why should I be concerned about my water use?

Because your water is a precious, limited resource. Central Texas is one of the fastest growing areas in the country. To ensure water supplies will be sufficient to serve future needs, water conservation needs to be a way of life for us, and not simply a response to periodic droughts.

Because conservation saves you money and saves energy. Conserving water saves on both your water and sewer bills; you use less water, and put less down the drain. Less water use means less pumping and lower energy costs for the utility.

Because conservation reduces excessive runoff into your rivers and streams. Watering less means less water running down streets and into storm drains where it can pollute your environment with fertilizers and insecticides.

Because conservation saves you tax dollars and fees by delaying the construction of new treatment facilities.

Because the state requires it. All water utilities are required by state law to prepare water conservation plans and implement specific control measures triggered by preset conditions such as water usage levels or drought duration. Utilities are also required to report usage levels and actions that are being taken to reduce per capita consumption. The regional water planning authorities and Texas Water Development Board have set the District's objective to reach a .24% reduction in per capita consumption over the next five (5) years.

Because it is the ethical and responsible thing to do. Central Texas has a hot dry climate in the summer, and is subject to occasional drought periods. As summer temperatures rise and rainfall decreases, much more of our water system's supplies are used for outside purposes such as watering lawns and trees, refilling swimming pools and washing cars. In the summer, many customers use over 5 times what their average use is during the year, and about 60 percent of this water is used on landscaping. If the demand for outside use is greater than the District's ability to treat that water, there may not be enough water, tank levels (our reserves) become much lower, and fire protection could be jeopardized. When pumping and treatment is overworked, mechanical failures can occur creating water outages *(Continued on Page 63)*

for everyone. When tank levels are lower, your water pressure will be lower.

Because adequate supply does not mean unlimited use. The water treatment plant is designed for a maximum peak day production of 1 gallon per minute per living unit equivalent (single family home) or about 35,000 gallons per month for a 5/8 inch meter in a hot summer month. This is 30 percent greater capacity than the state requires.

The District will continue to follow its state approved conservation plan this year; beginning May 1st all residential outdoor watering systems must water using the twoday watering schedule only. (Commercial and Multi-family customers water two days or less year-round.) Thank you for helping conserve water for today and tomorrow! Visit www.wcid17.org for further conservation tips.

WCID #17 Mandatory 2 Day Per Week Watering Starts May 1st

NO CALENDAR IS NEEDED,

all you need to do is set your irrigation system to your two designated watering days.

STEINER RANCH RESIDENTS:

odd numbered addresses will water Wednesdays and Saturdays even numbered addresses will water Thursdays and Sundays. Residential customers will be required to adhere to this schedule May 1 through September 30,

and encouraged to adhere to it the rest of the year.

Systems such as the one used by the Steiner Ranch HOA using reclaimed or recycled water will not be subject to the restrictions.

The time of day residents may water: To reduce wasting water through evaporation during daytime heat, watering with an automatic irrigation system is permitted before 10am or after 7pm. Watering with a hand held hose or bucket may be done any time of day or any day of the week. Other water uses such as washing cars or boats are not restricted to watering days unless increased conservation measures become necessary.

Eight Water Safety Rules for a Safe Austin Summer



We are dedicated to promoting drowning prevention and helping equip Austin residents with the best tools to keep Austin families safe in and around water.

- 1. Always have a pool fence around home pools. This includes having a locked and securely fastened gate that is not accessible to little ones.
- 2. Continuously educate children on water safety. This is a great thing to do at home, on the boat, at the pool, wherever there is water. Each time you are getting your little one ready for a swim session or water play, go over the

rules of water safety. Repetition is key with small children. Make sure your swim instructor incorporates a "Safety Lesson of the Week" into its lesson curriculum. This includes questions about water safety and how to avoid dangerous situations.

3. Designate a "Water Watcher." This is a responsible adult who sticks to alcohol-free beverages during swim time and who is in charge of keeping both eyes on the pool while it is in use. Or, better yet: consider renting a Lifeguard for your party or group event.

- 4. Remove all pool toys, floaters, ring buoys and other child-enticing items from the pool area when it is not in use. One wrong reach for that floating rubber ducky could be disaster.
- 5. Clear homes of common household items that can be dangerous to a curious toddler. It takes just 2 inches of water for a child to drown in a bucket. Put all mop buckets, dog dishes and coolers out of children's reach.
- 6. Never leave a young child in the pool or bathtub--even "just to get the phone."
- 7. Enroll your child in swim classes. Start lessons early. The longer a child has lessons the more they understand water safety. A great time to do this is in the spring! This way your kids are already prepped and ready to roll for the summer swim season. You'll want to find an inside heated pool and lesson times geared towards working families.
- 8. Supervise, Supervise, Supervise! Try to have your eyes on your children in and around the pool at all times. Adults should always be present when any child is in the pool area.

Let's help our kids love the water while also respecting it by being safe and well-trained at all levels.

YEAH YEAH, BACKUP BACKUP,

OK, my clients are used to hearing it, "backup backup backup." I can say if often but it's never too often. Let me put it another way, how much pain are you willing to endure? The hard drive in your computer WILL fail someday. So WHEN it does, how are you going to feel? School's almost out for the summer. How will you feel when that final paper or report disappears right before you're ready to submit it to the teacher or professor?

Maybe you're a young family, and you have thousands of digital photos and videos recording everything your babies have done their first few years. Their first haircut, first birthday, first Christmas, the first time they walk, their FIRST WORDS! All in a pristine, digital format that is very easy to duplicate, yet all GONE, possibly never to be seen by anyone again.

You use something like Quicken or Microsoft Money and keep you banking records on your computer, or you own your own business and ALL your financial records are stored on your hard drive. It's almost tax time and the information can't be retrieved. You now have to spend days or weeks recreating your records as best you can (this happened to a client of mine.) The "computer ate my homework" won't fly with the IRS.

So I'll ask you again, how much pain are you willing to endure? You do have a few options to backing up your valuable data. One way is to do it yourself (I'll go into more detail later.) Another way to preserve your memories is to pay someone else to do it. Yet a third way is probably the most common way, intentional or not – prayer. No plan, no system, just the hope that nothing goes wrong with their computer. Since I'm not aware of a Patron Saint of the PC, I'll concentrate on the first two methods – you're on your own for the third option.

Want to do it yourself? Purchase an inexpensive external hard drive and plug it into your computer's USB port. You can pick up a 500GB (that's gigabyte) external hard drive at Best Buy for around \$80, and maybe a terabyte drive (that's 1,000 gigabytes) for \$100. If you like to shop around online you can probably find something even cheaper. Just about anything you buy will include backup software. If you don't like it, you can try downloading my favorite, SyncBack. Go to 2BrightSparks.com, click on "Downloads" and choose their freeware. Download SyncBack in whatever language you like and go at it.

Of course, if you're not inclined for any reason to do it yourself,

you can always pay someone to do the above for you. Also, you can keep the "upfront" cost to a minimum by going with an online solution. Two advantages are you don't have to spend very much up front, and the other is that even in the event of burglary, fire, etc. you can buy a new computer and download all your backed up files. The two most well known services are Mozy and Carbonite, they cost about the same (\$55 a year.) Mac users also have me.com as an option (though it is a little more expensive.)

Now, not all hope is lost if your hard drive should fail. There are services available that will take your hard drive, have employees in "bunny suits" take it into a "clean room" (much cleaner than an operating room), disassemble it, remove the platters (the parts with the information) and rebuild it with matching parts in an attempt to extract the data. If they are successful, plan on spending approximately \$2,000 to get the data back. It that's a lot of money to you, then look at doing it yourself or hire an expert to do it for you. It's not hard at all to do – but you need to do it. If you don't, you're going to remember how you were "nagged" and didn't do anything when you could have, and there will be a geek waiting for your phone call.

Why Exercise Is Cool

Kids exercise all the time without even thinking of it. Just being active, like when you run around outside or play kickball at school, is a kind of exercise. What else counts as exercise? Playing sports, dancing, doing push-ups, and even reaching down to touch your toes.

When you exercise, you're helping build a strong body that will be able to move around and do all the stuff you need it to do. Try to be active every day and your body will thank you later!

EXERCISE MAKES YOUR HEART HAPPY

You may know that your heart is a muscle. It works hard, pumping blood every day of your life. You can help this important muscle get stronger by doing aerobic (say: airo-bik) exercise.

Aerobic means "with air," so aerobic exercise is a kind of activity that requires oxygen. When you breathe, you take in oxygen, and, if you're doing aerobic exercise, you may notice you're breathing faster than normal.Aerobic activity can get your heart pumping, make you sweaty, and quicken your breathing.

When you give your heart this kind of workout on a regular basis, your heart will get even better at its main job — delivering oxygen (in the form of oxygen-carrying blood cells) to all parts of your body.

So you want to do some aerobic exercise right now? Try swimming, basketball, ice or roller hockey, jogging (or walking quickly), inline skating, soccer, cross-country skiing, biking, or rowing. And don't forget that skipping, jumping rope, and playing hopscotch are aerobic activities, too!

EXERCISE STRENGTHENS MUSCLES

Another kind of exercise can help make your muscles stronger. Did you ever do a push-up or swing across the monkey bars at the playground? Those are exercises that can build strength. By using your muscles to do powerful things, you can make them stronger. For older teens and adults, this kind of workout can make muscles bigger, too.

Here are some exercises and activities to build strong muscles:

- push-ups
- pull-ups
- tug-of-war
- rowing
- running
- inline skating
- bike riding

EXERCISE MAKES YOU FLEXIBLE

Can you touch your toes easily without yelling ouch? Most kids are pretty flexible, which means that they can bend and stretch their bodies without much trouble. This kind of exercise often feels really good, like when you take a big stretch in the morning after waking up. Being flexible is having "full range of motion," which means you can move your arms and legs freely without feeling tightness or pain.

It's easy to find things to do for good flexibility:

- tumbling and gymnastics
- yoga dancing, especially ballet
- martial arts
- simple stretches, such as touching your toes or side stretches

EXERCISE KEEPS THE BALANCE

Food gives your body fuel in the form of calories, which are a kind of energy. Your body needs a certain amount of calories every day just to function, breathe, walk around, and do all the basic stuff. But if you're active, your body needs an extra measure of calories or energy. If you're not very active, your body won't need as many calories.

Whatever your calorie need is, if you eat enough to meet that need, your body weight will stay about the same. If you eat more calories than your body needs, it may be stored as excess fat.

EXERCISE MAKES YOU FEEL GOOD

It feels good to have a strong, flexible body that can do all the activities you enjoy — like running, jumping, and playing with your friends. It's also fun to be good at something, like scoring a basket, hitting a home run, or perfecting a dive.

But you may not know that exercising can actually put you in a better mood. When you exercise, your brain releases a chemical called endorphins (say: en-dor-funz), which may make you feel happier. It's just another reason why exercise is cool!
