TIMELY TIPS FOR AUGUST GARDENERS

But the "FlameProof for Texas" plants will make a believer out of you, and let you enjoy garden color through fall. Every year over 3,000 plants are tested at the Dallas Arboretum Trial Gardens, and those plants that can best take the Texas heat and thrive are "FlameProof"! These plants will look great in your garden from May right up until first frost.

IN AUGUST LOOK FOR:

- *Lobularia 'Snow Princess'*-Blooms fragrant white flowers and grows only 4 to 6 inches tall.
- *Torenia 'Catalina Midnight Blue'*-Dark blue Snapdragon-like blooms on plants 8 to 16 inches tall.
- *Coleus 'Kingswood Torch'*-Vivid dark foliage thrives in full to part sun.
- *Coleus 'Royal Glissade'*-Light moss-green leaves with raspberry touches will tolerate full sun or part shade.
- *Salvia 'Mystic Spires'*-True blue flowers attract butterflies and hummingbirds.

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Drainage Modifications

MUD 341 recently inspected some storm sewers in LOE to investigate complaints of slow draining street drains during heavy rains. Inspections revealed that the storm sewers were basically clear and should provide adequate capacity. Therefore MUD 341 decided to increase the inlet capacity by adding a storm grate in front of the curb drains in an area known to back up during big storms. About six storm sewer inlets were modified, which successfully improved street drainage into the sewer system and stopped the localized street flooding during heavy rains. MUD 341 has requested that we advise them if there are any other problem areas in LOE. If you observe water backing up and almost covering the street, please report the locations to AMI who will forward the information to the MUD board for review.



Tips and Juidelines

How Should You Prepare For Power Outages?

- In the event of severe weather, such as a hurricane, power outages are likely to
- For widespread power outages, CenterPoint Energy has a restoration process by priorities that will be followed in the event of a major storm.
- When a major storm is forecast, all customers should plan to be without power for an extended amount of time following landfall.
- If someone in your home depends on electricity for life-sustaining equipment, you need to make other arrangements. Evacuation would be a good option.
- Turn off your electricity at the circuit breaker if you evacuate and expect flood water to approach your home.
- Unplug sensitive electrical appliances, such as TV and computers.
- Maintain line clearance from trees and weak limbs.
- What should you do following a major storm or hurricane?
- Limit calls to CenterPoint Energy during the first few days to only true emergencies.
 CNP's technology indicates locations in the case of widespread power outages.
- The company's first priority in restoring service is to key facilities vital to safety,

health and welfare, such as hospitals, water treatment plants and public service facilities. Second priorities are the major lines and circuits that will restore power to the greatest number of customers in the shortest amount of time. Third priority, we repair transformers, which typically serve 10 customers and finally fourth priority, we repair individual electric service drops to homes.

- Restoration times can vary for severe weather event. Under CenterPoint Energy's restoration process, your neighbor's power may be restored before yours if there is a problem with your individual service drop.
- Stay away from low-hanging or downed power lines. Treat all downed power lines as if they are energized. Report low-hanging or downed power lines to (713) 207-2222.
- Avoid standing water energized power lines could be submerged in the water.
- If you have evacuated and want to check your home for electric service, please do not call CenterPoint Energy in the first few days following the storm. Instead, we suggest: leave your answering machine activated and call your house to check if it picks up, call neighbors, monitor the news, and check website CenterPointEnergy. com for general outage information.

- Do not connect generators directly to wiring in a house or building without having a licensed electrician disconnect the wiring from CenterPoint Energy's service. It can create a safety hazard for CenterPoint Energy's lineman.
- Never run generators indoors or in a garage. Gasoline-powered generators can produce carbon monoxide, and the odorless fumes can be deadly.
- What should you do if your electrical outlets are covered with water or you have damage to weatherhead or other electrical facilities?
- Contact a licensed electrician before turning on the main circuit breaker.
- Check your weatherhead, which connects the overhead power line to your home or business. Any weatherhead problems will need to be repaired by your electrician prior to CNP restoring service. (Your electrician should obtain all permits required prior to you contacting CNP for a work order.)
- Any submerged appliances or equipment will need to dry for at least one week and be checked by a qualified repair person prior to being turned on.
- Once all repairs have been made to your electrical equipment, then contact your provider and they will issue a work order to CenterPoint Energy to begin work and restore your service.

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COMPUTING 101: KEEPING UP TO DATE

Keeping your computer up to date is the single best way to avoid problems caused by viruses, hackers and just misbehaving software. So what do you need to do to keep your system current? Well, actually not very much. Your key programs will tell you when they need to be updated.

Most important is your operating system. Both Windows and the Mac regularly check for any updates that are needed. Microsoft usually saves its updates for the 2nd Tuesday of each month, but sometimes a critical security update will be pushed earlier than that. It is VERY important that when you get a notice on your Mac or you see the little yellow shield in the lower right corner of your PC that you allow those updates to install. The updates may be to fix bugs that make your system run better, but they may also be to plug holes that the bad guys have discovered as a way to gain access to your computer. Last month I mentioned that Microsoft was ending support for Windows 2000 and Windows XP (with Service Pack 2.) If you're still using Windows XP, right-click on "My Computer" and select "Properties" to check your installation. You need to be running Service Pack 3 to continue getting updates from Microsoft. If you're on a Mac, Apple may soon stop updating "Tiger" (OSX 10.4), and Mozilla (the ones who make the Firefox browser) has already said they will no longer support Tiger.

If your anti-virus software is not updating because it's expired or just not working right, either renew it or fix it. There are good free products available like Microsoft Security Essentials, AVG, Avast and others for the PC. There's no reason not to have basic protection on your computer. Mac's are pretty secure from viruses because nobody bothers with them. The famous bank robber from the early 1930's Willie Sutton was once asked "Why do you rob banks?" He simply replied "Because that's where the money is." With Windows machine about 90% of the market, that's where the bad guys go for the money.

So the browsers (the program you use to get on the Internet) are next in line for updating. It doesn't matter if you use Internet Explorer, Firefox, Safari, Chrome or some other browser, this is a major avenue of attack for the bad guys because they are out there just waiting for you to come to them. If you click on "Help" or "About" in your browser you'll see what version you are using. If you are using Internet Explorer 6, RUN, don't walk to you computer and download IE8. IE7 users should update also. The latest Firefox version as of this writing is 3.6.6. I still find people using Firefox 2.x. It's time to update! Version 4 is now in beta testing and should

be out soon. The latest version of Safari is now 5.0 and is available at apple.com. Google Chrome versions vary depending on what operating system you're on, but if you use Chrome, you're probably geeky enough already to keep it current.

Adobe is one of the worst offenders in keeping you secure. Both Acrobat Reader (for .pdf files) and Flash (for viewing most online videos and animation) constantly are found to have significant problems and Adobe is often slow to correct them. You should go to www.adobe.com/downloads to download the latest versions of Reader and Flash.

Now that your system is completely up to date, don't get complacent or a false sense of security, if you're careless on the Internet or with your email, you can still get bit. Take all the precautions you want, if you decide to walk down a dark alley in New York in the middle of the night, you still might find yourself in trouble.

So be smart, keep your computer up to date and enjoy all the goodness your computer and the Internet can bring you (and stay out of the dark alleys.)
